What is SHAC?



School Health Advisory Councils (SHACs) help parents and the community have a voice in issues that impact child health. Whether it is about school meals, staff wellness, vaping, recess or bullying; SHACs can provide input and resources to District leadership as they work to find solutions to the health challenges they face.



SHAC - Meeting Requirements

- SHAC must hold at least four public meetings each school year.
- "Public meeting" requirements:
 - Must post notice of date, hour, place and subject 72 hours prior
 - Must make an audio or video recording of the meeting and maintain minutes
 - Must submit the recording and minutes within 10 days for posting on the district website

Student Wellness and Health Services

Wellness Plan



Referred to as the "wellness plan" (the plan), is intended to implement policy FFA(LOCAL), which has been adopted by the Board to comply with the requirements for a school wellness policy. [Section 9A(a) of the National School Lunch Act (NSLA), 42 U.S.C. 1758b; 7 C.F.R. Part 210.] https://pol.tasb.org/PolicyOnline/PolicyDetails?key=436&code=FFA#regulationsTabContent

<u>Strategies to Solicit Involvement:</u> Federal law requires that certain stakeholders be involved in the development, implementation, and periodic review and update of the wellness policy.

- The SHAC will permit the following persons to work with the SHAC on the District's wellness policy and plan: parents, students, the District's food service provider, physical education teachers, school health professionals, Board members, administrators, and members of the public. See more at:

- The SHAC will solicit involvement and input of these other interested persons by:
 - Posting on the District's website the dates and times of the SHAC meetings at which the wellness policy and plan are scheduled to be reviewed, discussed and evaluated.
 - Listing in the Student Handbook the name and position of the person responsible for oversight of the District's wellness policy and plan, along with an invitation to contact that person if anyone is interested in participating in the development implementation, and evaluation of the wellness policy and plan.

State law <u>requires</u> school districts to annually assess the physical fitness of students enrolled in grade three or higher and to provide the results of individual student performance on the administered physical fitness assessments to the Texas Education Agency (TEA). The **Physical Fitness Assessment Initiative** (PFAI) is a program designed to collect and analyze the required student physical fitness data.

What Physical Fitness Assessment are Required for grades 3-12



- Aerobic Capacity
- Pacer or One-Mile Run or One-Mile Walk
- Body Composition
- BMI or Skinfold
- Muscular Strength and Endurance
- Curl-Up, Turn Lift and one other item:Push-Up or Modified Pull-Up or Pull-Up or Flexed Arm Hang
- Flexibility
- Back Saver Sit and Reach or Shoulder Stretch

Human Trafficking Youth Prevention Education (HTYPE)

This is a Human Trafficking prevention education program to educators and other staff that equips them to identify and respond to students who are experiencing human trafficking or are at high risk, how to report concerns, and how to respond to student disclosures. This program also educates students on how to identify risk factors and is designed to build resilience to labor trafficking and sex trafficking by strengthening students' knowledge and skills, increasing their perception of risk, and encouraging the adoption of healthy behaviors.

Region 19 applied for a Human Trafficking grant and teamed up with several districts in the region. CISD is part of this grant, the district is has received evidence based education to train

all staff and students.



Let's Explore the Why...







DEFINITION according to U.S. Department of Justice:

Human trafficking is a crime involving the exploitation of someone for the purpose of compelled labor or a commercial sex act through the use of **force**, **fraud**, or **coercion**.*



*Any case that involves a child under the age of 18 who is induced to perform a commercial sex act is a crime regardless of if force, fraud, or coercion occurred. There are no exceptions.

Key Statistics

- Human Trafficking is the third largest, fastest-growing criminal enterprise globally (UNODC).
- In 2021, a total of 3,534 human trafficking cases in Texas were reported to the National Human Trafficking Hotline.
- In 2020, Texas ranked second in human trafficking cases reported by state.

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El Paso-Juarez Community Need



2 The Need for Prevention in ESC19



- The FBI has identified the El Paso-Juarez Metro as an increasingly active center for human trafficking
- Region 19 students face compounding vulnerabilities, as more than 80% are considered economically disadvantaged. 91% of students are Hispanic and over 30% of the student population utilizes ESL services.
- Educators, caregivers, and community leaders have expressed an urgent need for human trafficking prevention and intervention resources.

PROTECT works alongside schools and community stakeholders to ensure that in the event a minor is identified or self-identifies as a victim of human trafficking, there are coordinated, agreed-upon response protocols and procedures in place.

TRAINING



PROTECT provides comprehensive training to school communities across the country to increase their knowledge about how to recognize human trafficking. respond using a traumainformed approach, report suspected cases and prevent this crime.

The Journey to PROTECT



- · Recall the federal definition of human trafficking
- Describe how sex and labor trafficking occurs in the United States.
- Recognize situations and indicators that may raise concerns about sex and labor trafficking with a special emphasis on children and youth in school settings.
- Provide examples of strategies commonly used by traffickers to groom and recruit children and youth for sex and labor trafficking.
- List protective factors that can decrease the risk of exploitation.
- Apply a trauma-informed and person-centered approach when addressing human trafficking in a personal and professional setting.
- Practice responding to disclosures in a culturally responsive, linguistically appropriate, trauma- informed, and personcentered manner.
- Understand your legal obligations to report human trafficking.
- Identify local and national resources for those who have experienced human trafficking and/or are at risk.


