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## Introduction to the Diocese of Grand Rapids Curriculum Framework for Catholic Schools and Parish Faith Formation Programs

### Mission

The call to a New Evangelization is at the heart of all ministerial initiatives within the Diocese of Grand Rapids, including Catholic schools and parish faith formation programs. This curriculum framework aims to assist schools and parishes in bringing about a renewed zeal and commitment to know and love Jesus and the Church.

### Three Parts of a Whole

The Curriculum Framework is structured to be comprehensive in scope. There are three parts to the diocesan framework: **Encounter, Grow, and Witness**. This paradigm is proposed for leading the faithful into a life of discipleship.

The framework emphasizes God's invitation to a loving relationship with Him through an **encounter** with His Son Jesus Christ and the student's free response to His invitation as appropriate for each grade level. Knowing Jesus in a personal way opens the mind and heart of the child to want to **grow** in knowledge about God and the Catholic Church and adhere to the authority of Christ's teachings as entrusted to us through the Catholic Church. This dynamic relationship with Jesus and His Church empowers the student to be an effective **witness** by living as a joyful missionary disciple of Jesus Christ.

The goal of evangelization and catechesis is not simply a transmission of information, but of a person - Jesus Christ (CT 6). So, it is important to consider ways for the students to **encounter** Jesus each time they gather, to **grow** in their understanding of the Catholic faith, and to be a **witness** of Christ in the world.

The three parts of the paradigm are not intended to be steps in a sequence, but as an integrated framework throughout a student's experience, rooted in the pillars of the Catechism of the Catholic Church and the six tasks of Catechesis. The following chart shows the relationship of its parts.

## Curriculum Framework Chart Explained

As noted in the chart, the three parts of the paradigm are then organized into twelve anchor standards. The first anchor describes the work of our first part: **Encounter**. The final anchor describes the work of our final part: **Witness**. The second through eleventh anchors comprise the **Grow** aspect of the paradigm, as students grow in their understanding of the Catechism in grades PreK- 8th. Additionally, students in Catholic schools grow in their understanding of Catholic theology in their other academic content areas as well as through alignment with the USCCB framework in theology courses in grades 9-12. Grades 9-12th have employed the use of the Encounter, Theology of the Body, and Witness anchors to complement their course alignment to the USCCB framework.

In Catholic schools, opportunities to **encounter** Jesus Christ and expectations for conducting one's self as a Christian **witness** are extended to all aspects of a student's experience, throughout the entire school year and throughout a student's school day. Catholic school students **grow** in their understanding of Catholic Church teaching in all subject areas in their course of study, with specific curriculum standards reserved for their theology course work.

Parish faith formation programs seek to form the whole person. Active participation in worship, prayer and service experiences promote an opportunity to **encounter** Jesus Christ and **witness** a missionary spirit in society. Weekly religious education lessons offer the opportunity to **grow** in knowledge and understanding of the Catholic faith.

### **Terminology Used throughout the Framework**

The following terms are used to describe the structural components of the Curriculum Framework:

**Framework:** The structure used to describe the organization of Catechesis within a paradigm of Encounter/Grow/Witness.

**Pillar of the Church:** The four main divisions of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. These are: The Profession of Faith, The Celebration of the Christian Mystery, Life in Christ, and Christian Prayer.

**Task of Catechesis:** Faith must be known, celebrated, lived and expressed in prayer. So, catechesis comprises six fundamental tasks, each of which is related to an aspect of faith in Christ. All efforts in evangelization and catechesis should incorporate these tasks (NDC 20).

Catechesis promotes knowledge of the faith

Catechesis promotes knowledge of the meaning of the Liturgy and the sacraments.

Catechesis promotes moral formation

Catechesis teaches the Christian how to pray with Christ

Catechesis prepares the Christian to live in community and to participate actively in the life and mission of the Church

Catechesis promotes a missionary spirit that prepares the faithful to be present as Christians in society

**Anchor:** The twelve sections of curriculum standards in the Curriculum Framework. These are Encounter (ENC), Sacred Scripture (SCR), Church History (HIS), Creed (CRE), Sacred Liturgy (LIT), Sacraments (SAC), Dignity of the Human Person (DIG), Theology of the Body (TOB), Human Community (COM), Morality (MOR), Christian Prayer (PRA), and Witness (WIT).

**Curriculum Standard (outcomes):** Each anchor includes a set of curriculum standards which describe outcomes of what the student is expected to experience, learn, and comprehend as a result of the teaching, activity, discussion, prayer, and reflection on the lessons. These are expressed as outcomes within the parish faith formation lessons. In schools, these are broken down into more specific outcomes or learning targets associated with grading rubrics or assessments.

## Curriculum Framework in the Diocese of Grand Rapids

### Encountering Jesus Christ

The call to a New Evangelization is at the heart of the ministerial initiatives within the Diocese of Grand Rapids. It is the intention that this framework for cultivating opportunities to **encounter Jesus Christ** will assist schools and parish faith formation in renewing their zeal and commitment for encouraging all to know, love, and serve Jesus and the Church. The Diocese of Grand Rapids Catholic Schools Strategic Plan, *Bridging Faith and Future*, calls for a strategic focus on the Catholic Culture and Mission of each school. In particular, Bishop Walkowiak notes that the Catholic schools are “the single most effective means the Church has created for evangelization” (BFF). The Office of Catholic Schools is committed to the formation of students “in every dimension of life - nurturing a relationship with Christ as the foundation for both an inspiring program of academic study and a lifelong journey to heaven” (BFF).

This document intends to lay out the basic principles and signposts for the strategic and Holy Spirit inspired cultivation of opportunities to “a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting him encounter [us]” (EG 3).

#### The Meaning of Encounter

Encountering Jesus Christ is the decisive event in the life of the human person: “Being Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction.” (DCE 1). Evangelizing and catechizing students in the Catholic schools and parish faith formation programs is an essential task, and at the core of the mission of the Church. The great work of evangelization, which belongs perennially to the life of the Catholic Church, aims to form young persons to become joyful missionary disciples, confirmed and trained in the Catholic faith, and powerful witnesses to the Gospel of Jesus Christ, able to offer a renewed encounter with Jesus by which we discover the “fullest truth of our being.” (EG 8) For this reason, the work of evangelization and catechesis always begins and is constantly renewed by encountering Jesus Christ in the whole life and mission of the Catholic Church.

1. The responsibility for preparing a person to encounter anew, or for the first time, the love of God belongs to the entire school and parish community. Indeed, evangelization is the essential mission of the whole Church and of each of her members (EN 14).
2. The goal of evangelization and catechesis is not simply a transmission of information, but of a person – Jesus Christ (CT 6). We are called to participate in the mission of the Church and ensure the missionary aspect of bringing other people to Christ and making disciples who deeply, personally, and communally know Jesus Christ.
3. A deeper life with Jesus Christ, through His Church, is always proposed to the school community, parish and each of its members. This proposal or invitation is to come to know in one's own life that the life of faith in Jesus Christ is one in which reality, in all its depth, is most deeply encountered, embraced, and integrated into one's life. The truth of which we are convinced is that Jesus Christ is the Way, the Truth, and the Life and most deeply reveals the meaning of our own lives to us.

### **Contexts of Encountering Jesus**

Encountering Jesus anew, or for the first time, is a daily event in the life of the disciple of Christ. This event, moreover, emerges in a variety of contexts and for a variety of persons involved in catechesis.

#### ***Faculty and Staff***

- The staff of the school has a genuine vocation for teaching; each person and the whole community of the staff have a call from God to engage young persons in their own total formation and development as a disciple of Christ. This vocational element is cultivated in the silence of prayer, encounter with Jesus, and in the life of the staff together.
- School leaders take responsibility for the recruitment, professional growth, and faith formation of faculty and staff, with careful attention to hiring and retaining faculty and staff who share in the joys of their personal encounters with Jesus Christ.
- School leaders provide various opportunities for faculty and staff to regularly discover anew Jesus Christ and His call on their lives.
- Teachers are responsible for providing moments of genuine encounter of Jesus Christ for all students. These moments may begin as the indicated grade-level lists below, but also grow from the cultures, interests, and curiosities of each class.

#### ***Parish Catechetical Leaders and Catechists***

- The vocation of the parish catechist is to hear and respond yes to Jesus' call to live as a disciple, grow in holiness and to formally teach others to do the same. Catechists nurture their vocation through personal prayer, participation in the church's

liturgical and sacramental life, especially Sunday Eucharist, the source of nourishment for catechists, and the life of the parish community.

- Parish catechetical leaders are tasked with recruitment, formation, ongoing development, and evaluation of catechists. They accompany catechists in the journey toward transformation of lives through true encounter with Jesus.
- The catechist continually seeks opportunities to share with joy, moments of encounter of Jesus Christ. These moments may begin as the indicated grade-level lists below, but also grow from the cultures, interests, and experiences of each class.

### **Students**

- In Baptism, the person is brought into the family of God. In this way, as well, each young person already has a relationship with Jesus Christ. The entire parish, school, and all of its parts, then, conduces to deepening this presence of Jesus in the life of the young person. The parish and school is a place where the gentle love of Jesus Christ echoes unceasingly.

### **Family / Parish**

- The family and parish communities are indispensable places for encountering Jesus Christ, for both students and staff. Parish faith formation programs and schools invite parents to faith formation opportunities, strengthening them in their roles as primary educators of the faith. Collaboration among schools and parishes in these endeavors allows for a multitude of family opportunities for faith formation.

### **Signposts for Encountering Jesus**

Encountering Jesus Christ is the decisive event in the life of the person and gives to life its whole meaning. The following practices invite the members of the school and parish faith formation communities to Encounter Jesus Christ:

1. The School Mission and Vision are clearly, intentionally, and strategically aimed at integration of the life of the school into the life of the Church. Discipleship is the norm for the school community. The leaders of the school routinely and strategically integrate this mission as the normative reference point for all school activity, and the school's mission is routinely reviewed and renewed by constituents of the school community.
2. The lens of Scripture and the Catholic intellectual tradition is deployed routinely in all subject areas. Careful attention is paid in the curriculum and teaching to the religious, spiritual, moral, and ethical dimensions of the content area and of the learners.
3. The whole school climate is an experience of Christian living through the following elements:
  - a. Routine opportunities for spiritual renewal
  - b. Regular and timely retreats for students and for staff.

- c. Schools as places of community, friendship, and belonging. These are integral structures for the spiritual reconciliation and healing of Jesus Christ. Friendship is hallmark of the Christian life, even of Jesus' own life on earth. Members of the school community are invited to become aware of and participate in spiritual reconciliation and healing.
  - d. Student and staff mentoring, as all benefit from the ability to be mentored and potentially mentor another. Personal mentoring is a key feature of being a disciple.
4. Schools have regular celebration of the sacraments and immersion in the whole liturgical rhythm of the Catholic Church.
  5. Parish life is integrated into the school community, and adult faith formation is offered by the parish and school in order to support the parents, faculty, and parish community members.
  6. Parents are the primary educators in the faith. Parishes and Schools collaborate with the life and faith of the whole family, as the Domestic Church of the home, in regular and strategic ways.

### **Opportunities to Encounter Jesus Christ at Each Grade Level**

Providing opportunities for students to encounter Jesus in our schools and parish faith formation programs is a shared responsibility among school and parish catechetical leadership, classroom teachers, and catechists in collaboration with the student's families and parish community. Though the principle of subsidiarity allows for each parish, school and classroom to organically seek moments of encounter, the following sections relate the standards for schools and parish faith formation to provide moments of encounter for students at each grade level.

### ENCOUNTER organized by grade bands

Through classroom and school-wide experiences led by role models of the faith, students in the following grades encounter the Lord Jesus Christ through --

## Growing as a Disciple of Jesus Christ

The call to a New Evangelization is at the heart of the ministerial initiatives within the Diocese of Grand Rapids. **Growing as a disciple of Jesus Christ** articulates a renewed zeal and commitment to know and love Jesus and the Church through all Catholic school course offerings as well as in parish faith formation programs. The Diocese of Grand Rapids Catholic Schools Strategic Plan, *Bridging Faith and Future*, prioritizes, with the first Strategic Focus, “forming our students in the faith of the Church, in order to evangelize our students who, in turn, evangelize the world” (BFF).

### In All Content Areas in Catholic Schools

To follow Jesus is to be in a constant process of growth, like the seed that fell on rich soil. Students grow in their relationships with Christ as they learn to serve Him. Growth in the Body of Christ aims especially “to reveal in the Person of Christ the whole of God's eternal design reaching fulfillment in that Person” (CT 5). The intellectual formation of the curriculum seeks the integration of insights in this discipline with the faith itself, since “the light of reason and the light of faith both come from God” (SCG I.7). Indeed, knowledge of the truth, and Truth Himself, “enlightens man's intelligence and shapes his freedom, leading him to know and love the Lord” (VS). Starting from the revelation of God in Jesus Christ, we can come to know the goodness, beauty, and harmony of creation. Starting, as well, from the study of the various aspects of creation embodied in this curriculum, we can come to know the goodness, beauty, and harmony of God Himself. This curriculum seeks to “include integration of the religious, spiritual, moral, and ethical dimensions of learning in all subjects” (NSBECS 7.2).

In Catholic Schools in the Diocese of Grand Rapids, students grow in their Catholic faith throughout their study in all grades and all content areas. For this reason, the curriculum standards for each grade and each content area is infused with the expectations of integrated Catholic faith. Students are provided opportunity to encounter Jesus Christ, grow in their relationship with Him, and become Christian witnesses of our faith seamlessly in their hours, days, and years within our Catholic school communities. The concept of growing as a disciple of Christ is especially true within these diocesan curriculum standards. Whereas an entire school community is responsible for the design and opportunity for encounters with Christ and expectations for Christian witness, each course of study has specific expectations for growth in the students' understanding of the Catholic faith. Students are called to grow as a disciple of Christ in each and every course within our Catholic schools.

### **Catechesis in Parish Faith Formation Programs**

Conversion to Christ involves making a genuine commitment to Him and a personal decision to follow Him as His disciple (NDC 17). Catechesis, on the other hand, is the teaching of Christian doctrine imparted in an organic and systematic way, with a view to initiating the hearers into the fullness of Christian life (CT 18). Catechesis assumes that the person knows Christ. Catechesis is a moment in the process of evangelization, it is the teaching and maturation stage (CT 18). Catechesis is concerned with ongoing conversion and *growth*.

Faith formation *informs, forms, and transforms* the student into a disciple of Jesus Christ. It is a holistic approach that affects both the head and the heart.

## Witnessing to God’s Unfailing Love

The call to a New Evangelization is at the heart of the ministerial initiatives within the Diocese of Grand Rapids. This framework for **missionary and apostolic witness to the unfailing love of God the Father, the salvation of Jesus Christ, and the power of the Holy Spirit** assists school and parish faith formation in bringing about a renewed zeal and commitment to know and love Jesus and the Church. The Diocese of Grand Rapids Catholic Schools Strategic Plan, *Bridging Faith and Future*, emphasizes the necessity of a relationship with Jesus Christ in view of the personal discovery “that [a person’s] potential is much greater with Jesus than without Him.” (BFF) The Catholic schools are “centers of Catholic culture that meet the world’s needs” (BFF).

This section lays out the basic principles and signposts for the strategic and Holy Spirit inspired dynamic of missionary and apostolic witness to the Gospel of Jesus. Every disciple of Jesus strives to be “ready to put his or her whole life on the line, even to accept martyrdom, in bearing witness to Jesus Christ, yet the goal is not to make enemies but to see God’s word accepted and its capacity for liberation and renewal revealed” (EG 24). This flows from a sense of “a responsibility to be a living sign of the Father’s love in the world” (MV 4).

### The Meaning of Witness

Having received the mercy of God, in the saving mystery of Jesus Christ and its extension in the whole life of the Church and her sacraments, the disciple of Jesus is led to share what has been freely given. Throughout the Scriptures, those who come into contact with God are routinely sent on mission by Him to witness to the world the saving love of God. One needs only to think of Abraham, David, or one of the prophets or apostles, to see the dynamism of encountering God and growing as His disciple. Moreover, the work of witnessing to the Gospel, of inviting others to come to recognize the abiding love of God the Father, always involves a personal commitment to the good of the other person. This love and compassion springs from the risk one took in inviting Jesus to a renewed, personal encounter. Jesus, however, “does not disappoint those who take this risk; whenever we take a step towards Jesus, we come to realize that he is already there, waiting for us with open arms” (EG 3).



## **Contexts of Witnessing**

Witnessing to the Joy of the Gospel, the joy of being a beloved child of God the Father, is a dynamic and reciprocal engagement with our neighbor. For this reason, three key contexts emerge in which the Gospel witness must be situated.

### ***Faculty and Staff***

- The faculty and staff of the school are, above all, witnesses to the Gospel in our schools and within the appropriate purview of each person's responsibilities. This takes a variety of forms: for example, hospitality for those who newly come into our buildings, welcoming them as welcoming Jesus, is an indispensable witness.
- The school leader has primary responsibility in relation to the Gospel: as the faith leader of the school community, the school leader therefore needs to witness to the power of the Gospel for the staff of the school. In this way, the school leader provides the authentic witness to the mission of the Catholic school and effectively engages the staff in that mission.

### ***Parish Catechetical Leader and Catechist***

- A generosity of spirit, respect for diversity, habit of hospitality and inclusion all witness the love of God and God's holy people by the catechetical leader and catechists.
- The depth and breadth of this curriculum calls for catechists to be disciples and authentic witnesses to the Christian life.
- Witnesses share their own life experiences, the difference Jesus makes in their lives, and exhibit courage and conviction to live the life of faith outside the classroom.

### ***Students***

- Students are called to witness the Gospel values they are learning. This involves a certain risk on their part and, as such, involves doing so within the context of the support and guidance of the school and parish communities.
- Students are held responsible for their role as witnesses, as outlined in this document. This accountability is not solely the responsibilities of the theology teacher or catechist, but a shared responsibility of all the student's teachers and catechetical team.

### ***Family & Parish***

- The family and parish are the primary locus of Gospel witness in the life of the student. The witness of these communities, and the close integration of young persons into the communities, is indispensable in their development. School faculty and staff can draw from the fountain of eternal life in our parish communities. The school is a support system and educational structure that supports this deep and enduring work.

### **Signposts for Witnessing to God's Unfailing Love**

The work of witnessing the Gospel, and all its saving and joyful power, is the necessary outgrowth of the Encounter with Jesus Christ and Growth as a Disciple of Christ. Witnessing takes place in the three contexts mentioned above. The following are indicators of this work within our schools:

1. School leaders, with support from the Office of Catholic Schools, are committed to hiring faculty and staff who are ready to pursue and enhance the evangelizing, growing, and witnessing mission of our Catholic schools.
2. School leaders, with support from the Office of Catholic Schools, are committed to the ongoing formational needs of their faculty and staff in relation to the mission. As Bishop Walkowiak notes, the “world has an increasing need for individuals steeped in the Catholic faith who walk with Jesus Christ every day. This need is, in part, the result of our culture’s secularization, access to instant global communications and growing individualism in our society” (BFF). This requires strategic, persistent, dynamic, and ongoing formation of faculty and staff.
3. Students are held accountable to age-appropriate indicators of Christian witness and virtuous behavior as detailed in this document.
4. Schools are held accountable to the National Standards and Benchmarks for Effective Catholic Elementary and Secondary Schools (NSBECS) through self-assessment and/or accreditation through the Michigan Nonpublic Schools Accrediting Association (MNSAA).
5. Characteristics that are consistent with the portrait of a catechist who is a witness and disciple of Jesus Christ: living faith and life of prayer; moral integrity; active sacramental life; well formed in the faith; ongoing in their own formation.

### WITNESS organized by grade bands

By encountering Jesus Christ and growing in their understanding of Catholic tradition within all content areas of study, students are called to demonstrate Christ's love to the world. Christian witnesses are able to --

## The Use of Curriculum Standards in Theology Courses

### In relation to the Diocese of Grand Rapids Curriculum Framework

#### Theology Courses Program Goal

In Catholic Schools in the Diocese of Grand Rapids, students experience opportunities to develop a deeper knowledge of the Catholic faith and its relevance throughout their lives, develop a greater love of God, of dignity of all people, and of the value of all creation, serve others in response to Christ's call for justice and be people of conscience motivated by the Holy Spirit, and be provided sacramental experiences through liturgy, prayer, and faith-sharing opportunities.

Catechists teach in the name of Christ, and are the teachers of the truth of the faith. The Catechism of the Catholic Church presents the message of Christ and consistently offers the teachings of the Church in relationship to the person of Christ. Teachers in the Diocese of Grand Rapids are Catechists. The Catechism of the Catholic Church is the main source of reference used in our theology courses, as referenced in all materials and texts used in our classrooms. The Catechism of the Catholic Church presents the fundamental truths of our faith: the content of the faith and the moral life.

Students encounter Christ in a full and real way in and through the sacraments, and especially through the Eucharist, as it is only through Christ that they can fully live out God's plans for their lives. Students grow in their knowledge of the Church's history from apostolic times to the present.

In grades kindergarten through eight, students develop understanding of Church teachings in the Catechism. Students are called to evangelize and develop their role as missionary disciples. They study Sacred Scripture and the history of the Church. Through continued study, they develop understanding of the Creed and the Sacred Liturgy. Students experience the call to community within the Catholic Church. Students experience and learn various forms of Catholic prayer as they develop their personal relationship with Jesus Christ. The curriculum standards in these grades are a spiral representation of the four pillars of the Catechism and the six tasks of Catechesis. Students establish grade-appropriate understanding of Church teaching in each of these grades, laying a foundation for lifelong relationship with God.

In the theology courses in grades 9-12, students continue to develop a deeper knowledge of Catholic teaching and a deeper appreciation of faith. Students continue to study Sacred Scriptures, encountering the living Word of God, Jesus Christ, with particular



attention to the Gospels, where they may grow to know and love Jesus Christ more personally. Students learn how Jesus Christ is the ultimate Revelation to us from God. In learning about who He is, students learn who He calls us to be. Students also learn that for all eternity, God has planned for us to share eternal happiness with him, which is accomplished through the redemption Christ won for us. Students reflect upon what it means to be a disciple of Christ and what life as a disciple entails. Students also come to know that the Church, with both divine and human elements, is the living Body of Christ today. Students also reflect on Christ's concern for others, especially the poor and needy, and how that is relevant in today's world, through the Church's social teaching and mission.

### **Educator Use of K-8th Grade Curriculum Standards**

Anchor standards for use in grades kindergarten through eighth grade were created to reflect twelve areas of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Each Anchor standard represents a section of the Catechism. While delivering instruction in religion courses, teachers reference the Catechism alongside a variety of materials and texts found on the *Conformity Listing of Catechetical Texts and Series*, produced and updated by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). These twelve anchor standards provide a framework for teachers as they organize their curriculum at the specific grade level. Through the study of Scripture, saints, prayers, and key concepts and vocabulary, students demonstrate grade-level understanding of the theology and tradition of the Catholic Church. In partnership with the Diocese of Grand Rapids, each parish makes local decisions regarding best practices and best materials for use through conversations with the pastor, principal, and director of faith formation. The development of courses and vertical alignment continuously occur within each school.

### **Educator Use of 9-12th Grade Curriculum Standards**

Catechists and theology teachers in the Diocese of Grand Rapids are guided by the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, the *Doctrinal Elements of a Curriculum Framework* by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), and the DOGR Curriculum standards. Each school is required to use materials and texts found on the *Conformity Listing of Catechetical Texts and Series* produced and updated by the USCCB, while designing course content and student learning objectives. In partnership with the Diocese of Grand Rapids, each parish makes local decisions regarding best practices and best materials for use through conversations with the pastor, principal, and director of faith formation. The development of courses and vertical alignment continuously occur within each school.
