<u>Presentation - Chief Grillo and Lt. Besonen</u>, Expert on building security and active violence response - Meridian Township Police

- Meridian Township has 39 officers (3 still in training); Issues with staffing full team
- Last yr caught up a bit on hiring
- DARE disbanded in MI, but taught here in Township to 5th graders
- TEAM (similar to DARE) making safe decisions
- Provide security for big events, particularly big sporting events
- Crossing guards most challenging /hard time recruiting
- Working on Bennett Woods traffic circle. Much better now.
- Safety meeting at middle schools last fall
- Make sure officers know school layouts/maps at their fingertips ipads for all officers with maps uploaded.
- Make sure doors are secure day and night
- Smooth evacuation response (BW)
- Education:
 - Do lots of training, certified emergency manager
 - Stop the bleed kits (he's certified instructor) pressure, wound packing, tourniquets
 - Prevent to Protect (grant funded program) behavioral threat analysis. Program with MSU. Have their own counselors. (Required) parents are involved. Most involved program.
- Question: How do we train subs/temps on these emergency kits/procedures?
 A: walkie talkies, emergency bags in all classrooms/rooms in the district. Will all be fully trained in August. Operational by the time school starts.
- Who gets involved? Response team from schools (teachers, counselors, etc.) decide what the need is; talk to parents. Process to follow to figure out what level they are at.
- 911 for immediate danger.
- Police do home visits if needed.
- Can require counselling for parents/families.
- Staff continue to train. Many drills
- Police help provide gun locks.
- DARE: last year talked about sextortion. Is it part of our programs? DARE is just 5th graders and very prescribed.) TEAM program (teaching, educating and mentoring) would be more for this.
- Regular health curriculum talks about safety online and such.
- What they learned from SWATTING incidents. It was Michigan's learning incident. Have had trainings since then.
- Officer Short: in schools; not scheduled, as needed and random checks. Plus Katie Diehl, our security director.

<u>Principal's Report</u> - Joseph Corr, Hiawatha Principal

- Just had conferences with nearly 100% cooperation
- Secret staff spirit week (see if the kids notice)
- 100 second talent show. Assembly in gym
- After break Book Bingo. Joe is the DJ. All kids will have a bingo card. Goal that everyone goes home with a book.
- Global gathering was a success. Food was amazing
- Met with parents for coffee at Taste Coffee down Okemos Road. Left topics open.

• Red Haven dinner special with parents. Raised \$600. 30 people. Can do up to 40. \$50/pp plus 25 as donations so \$75pp total.

<u>Superintendent's Report</u> - John Hood, Superintendent

- Mascot (wolf costume) showcased in May. HS students writing a jingle. Costume flexible, so no size requirements.
- 3 yrs ago we joined a lawsuit against Juul. Now we will install vape detection in bathrooms with the money. Will tell kids. Serves as prevention.
- Meta: Need to be adults. Part of lawsuit.
- Also signed onto insulin price gouging (for employee insurance).
- **Budget**: \$1.3+ million deficit this year. Special Ed funding mechanism from ISD went down (reimbursement). Substitute budget up. \$2.5 m deficit. Last year the largest graduating class left, this year was the smallest Kindergarten coming in. (We are funded by per person funding)
- We have small endowment, but not enough (OEF).
- ISD changed the formula on how they are funding special education.
- We don't take more school of choice than filling classrooms.

Board of Education Report - Andy Phelps

Kinawa remediation (\$1M) also fed into budget deficits.

Bond updates:

- Cornell rendering released. 4 classrooms + flex space as needed. 500 student capacity.
- Goal: reduce carline spillover onto Cornell road. 5 lanes.
- Cornell bidding coming in about one year
- Chippewa supposedly on time
- HVAC \$3 million upgrades; mostly part of control systems
- High School Kitchen, increased band space, bathroom replacement outside gym (through bond)
- Hiawatha new carline on hold. Addition on hold. Not as urgent.
- MASB -> State funding. Analyzing federal reduction impacts. Goal is to insulate children. \$300K federal funding to be concerned about (probably mostly food aid).
- Question (Liz): Were our benchmarks hit from previous strategic plans?
- Annual Reports: All accomplishments from departments for the Board of Education. Challenges, points of pride, etc. Will be available next year.
- Minimum wage law updates
- Trune (our law firm) sends big policy updates
