Miscellaneous Reports and Discussion:

Positive Comments:

- Darrel Harbaugh commented on Dacy Bond who placed first at the Montgomery County Spelling Bee. She will compete later at the state level. Mr. Harbaugh also commented on the Theatre Department's production of "A Night Under the Stars" and how good a job the middle and high school students did.
- LaKisha Johnson commented on the girls and boys basketball teams for having a very good season. The girls won more games than in the past several years, and the boys made it to the 2nd round of sub-state.
- Dr. Correll commented on the recent Alumni Dinner that was held, stating there were a lot of alumni who returned to Coffeyville for the dinner. Dr. Correll also commented on how well received the "Paint the Town Purple" campaign was received and the number of business and individuals who participated.
- Jason Barnett thanked the staff for all their work and time on the electrical and water issues as well as the recent bomb threat and how it was handled.

Central Office Reports:

- 1. Superintendent
 - A. Academic Data (Strategic Plan #1, #2)
 - Lora Stalford presented local data information to the school board.
 - FastBridge is the name of the program that we currently use. It helps us to look at the data and identifies students' strengths and needs.
 - b. The local assessment is given three times each year, fall, winter and spring, to help teachers adjust instruction during the year. It also gives the district an idea of where the district is at overall.
 - c. Helps the district make informed decisions regarding curriculum directives and direction.
 - d. There is a Kansas state reporting requirement in reading that this helps with.
 - ii. Angie Krause, CES Building Principal shared information regarding CES students to the Board.

- a. For different grades some data shows increased in cohort groups while other grades showed some decreases.
- b. Reading typically has more ups and downs while math tends to be of a steady increase.
- c. We are currently up for ELA adoption, so we are looking to see if the new curriculum adoption will make a difference in this trend.
- d. Several of the younger grades are unfamiliar in how to take the test, so that also impacts how the students perform. Students are just not used to taking a test in this format.
- e. The program is able to disaggregate the data by multiple different criteria and show changes over time.
- iii. Julie Dunham, Principal RMS, presented information to the Board regarding middle school data.
 - a. Both math and reading shows some increases from test to test, but they also maintained without losing.
 - b. For the eighth grade there was more of the up and downs over time. There are several new standards both in reading and math that impact between the 7th and 8th grades.
- iv. Travis Stalford, Principal FKHS, presented student test score data to the Board for the high school students.
 - a. We have currently identified three or four areas that we need to focus on.
 - b. Math scores stayed about the same for the different grade levels without a whole lot of growth. Reading scores tend to fluctuate radically comparing the testing dates.
 - c. The high school started using FastBridge one year later than the other buildings. FastBridge at the high school was not available at the time.
 - d. All students are tested at the high school with very few exceptions.
 - e. We stopped teaching Pre-Algebra last year, so every student takes Algebra. There was a lot of Geometry on the assessment, but by the time some of the students took the test, they were only enrolled in Algebra. This year's sophomores are the first class to take the state assessment in math under this new plan.
- B. First Read Board Policy AC School District Grade Levels (pg. 55)
 - i. Jason Barnett read the proposed Board Policy change for AC School District Grade Level.

2. Curriculum Director

- A. Virtual Program (Strategic plan #1, #2) (pg. 53)
 - Travis Stalford presented the information to the Board.
 - ii. The program we used Edgenuity which is a part of Imagine Learning. Over the years, several schools have started to move away from the program.
 - iii. The SchoolsPLP program has multiple languages available to students that is fully integrated into the program. Edgenuity did not have a seamless capability for students.
 - iv. The structure of the classes as well as just the look and feel is more up to date.
 - v. The cost of the program is actually cheaper than the current program. We would go live with the SchoolsPLP July 1st, 2025.
 - vi. The Coffeyville Virtual Program is only available for Coffeyville students and is not open to other districts. Some programs, such as Humbolt, will take any student from anywhere to their virtual program. This can cause problems if the student does not perform well at Humbolt, they are kicked

out of the program. Since they live in Coffeyville, they return to our school sometimes a full year behind where they need to be. It is now up to the school district to "catch them up" and get them graduated on time or they are counted as a dropout.

Tri-County Special Education Report

- Tri-County had their fiscal year audit with no findings on the report.
- Tri-County is still actively recruiting teachers
- The Tri-County negotiation team has been finalized for negotiation later in the spring.
