Miscellaneous Reports and Discussion:

Positive Comments:

• Cindy Price attended the RMS Interview Day. She commented that the students were very talkative and the day was really interesting. The interaction with the students was really good and enjoyable.

Central Office Reports:

- 1. Superintendent
 - A. High School Graduation Rate/Post-Secondary Success (Strategic Plan #1)
 - i. Travis Stalford, high school Principal presented information to the school board.
 - Post-Secondary Success. In the past, this was only based on the assessment tests, but were missing a lot of "other" data such as attendance, graduation, enrollment in college, etc. That is what brought about the Kansas Can.
 This has now been implemented, but there are a few issues such as when a
 - This has now been implemented, but there are a few issues such as when a student moves to a new district due to the way the state counts student movement.
 - The state currently has us at an 88.4% graduation rate. This year, with the corrections, we should have been around 90-91%. At some point, the deadline has to arrive with no more changes and the figures are locked in. Data was disaggregated in the various different ways by ethnicity and gender.
 - Post-Secondary progress counts when a student meets one of the four areas. Once such area that has been focused on is in an Industry Recognized Certificate. Students may not graduate from college, but they are certified. These are typically 2-year programs. All of these will increase the postsecondary scores for the high school and are good for students.
 - a. Food handling, welding are two examples of where students can get certificates.

- A. Teacher Licensure (Strategic Plan #1)
 - i. Lora Stalford presented information to the board for the teacher licensure and the "Grow Your Own" teachers.

- ii. These are teachers who are in different routs to receive their KSDE license from the state of Kansas.
- iii. There are several different alternative licenses opportunities that are available.
 - a. Transition to Teaching
 - b. Restricted Licenses
 - c. Limited Residence License
 - d. Limited Teacher Apprenticeship Licenses (mainly through WSU)
 - e. Limited Elementary Residency Program License
- iv. USD 445 currently has 18 classroom teachers that are in one of these programs. Four are at the secondary level and 14 at the elementary level
- v. There are also several individuals in the state who are in the classroom who only have a substitute license. Currently USD 445 has one classroom teacher in this position. Normally this is due to the individual who is not in the WSU program but another similar program that has been created by other colleges/universities.
- vi. Without these options for licensure, there leaves only a few options:
 - a. we would have to fill the positions with substitute teachers
 - b. we would have to double up on teaching assignments (similar to what is happening at the high school with English)
 - c. increase class size dramatically

- 3. Business Manager
 - A. Michael Speer presented the bids for the Board Office roof replacement to the Board.
 - i. The roof is old, approximately 30 years old and is done. There are multiple places that have failed and water is pooling on the roof.
 - ii. Three bids were received, all from highly qualified vendors
 - iii. Recommendation is to go with Wray Roofing.



Progress

Graduation Rate: The 4-year adjusted cohort graduation rate is the number of students who graduate in four years with a regular high school diploma divided by the number of students who entered high school as 9th graders four years earlier (adjusting for transfers in and out).

Success Rate: A student must meet one of the four following outcomes within two years of High School graduation.

Student earned an Industry Recognized Certification while in High School

- Student earned a Postsecondary Certificate Student earned a Postsecondary Degree

Student enrolled in Postsecondary in both the first and second year following High School graduation

Effective Rate: The calculated Graduation Rate multiplied by the calculated Success Rate.


Risk Factors

KSDE researchers used linear regression to identify factors that depress districts' postsecondary effectiveness rates.

The significant detractors were: (1) cumulative poverty (2) student mobility (3) chronic absenteeism.

They explained 60 percent of the variance between accredited districts' effectiveness rates. Students' cumulative poverty was by far the strongest detractor of effectiveness rates.





Relative Performance

39.9 +((44.3-39.9)2) = 42.4 41.5-42.1=-0.6 -.6 / 6.51 = -0.092

While the categories below are somewhat arbitrary because we are dealing with a normal curve and a continuous distribution, we could categorize different performance levels like this:

Far above average = \geq 1.5 standard deviations (sd) above the mean or predicted rate

Above average = > 1 sd but < 1.5 sd above the predicted rate

Typical or average = \leq 1 sd above and \geq -1 sd below the predicted rate

Below average = < -1 sd below and > -1.5 sd below the predicted rate

Far below average = \leq -1.5 sd below the predicted rate
