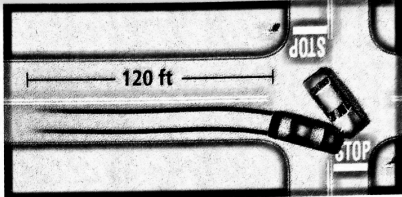

The coefficient of friction under accident conditions was 0.7. Is the driver telling the truth about his speed? Explain.</p> <p><u><b>Answer:</b></u></p>

If the driver were traveling 45 mi/h, the skid marks would measure about 96 ft. Because the skid marks actually measure 120 ft, the driver must have been driving faster than 45 mi/h.

State the domain of the following radical functions. Use interval form.

- a)  $f(x) = \sqrt{x + 5}$
- b)  $f(x) = \sqrt{x^2 - 36}$
- c)  $f(x) = \frac{3}{\sqrt{x+6}}$

**Answer:**

- a)  $[- 5, \infty)$
- b)  $(- \infty, - 6] \cup [6, \infty)$
- c)  $(- 6, \infty)$

**Task 2:**

Solve  $\sqrt{x + 15} = x - 5$ . State any extraneous solutions.

**Answer:**

$x = 10$ ; extraneous solution:  $x = 1$

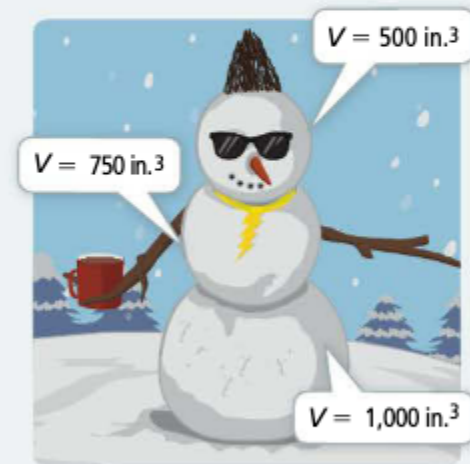
