

Greetings, South Amboy!

On March 13, 2025, I shared a letter with the community to express my sincere appreciation to the voters who cast ballots in the referendum held on March 11 to upgrade our schools. Conversations have begun with City Officials and we will continue to work collaboratively as we plan together for a brighter future for all scholars enrolled in South Amboy Public Schools!

On April 28, our Business Administrator, Ms. Nicole Navarria, and I will facilitate the required hearing for the 2025-2026 District Budget. The Public Meeting will begin at 7PM, and we anticipate the budget hearing will begin at 8PM. As you may be aware, our district sustained a decrease in state funds as well as equalization aid. This loss of funds has greatly impacted our operational budget for the upcoming school year. During the April 28th Budget Hearing, we will share the "State of the Budget" as well as plans for how we will move forward.

Each year, we include three (3) additional days into our District Calendar to accommodate for inclement weather and/or other incidents that may require schools to close. As of now, we did not use any of those emergency days, and in anticipation of there being no inclement weather in the month of April, I am prepared to recommend approval, on the April 28th agenda, a revision of the 2024-2025 District Calendar. Those "give back days" will be part of the published agenda that will be posted on the district's website prior to the public meeting.

South Amboy Public Schools will participate in "Take Your Sons/Daughters to Work Day," but since the official date occurs during our Spring Break, we will observe the date on Thursday, April 17, 2025. Our Instructional Leaders and their teams are planning myriad activities that will welcome and engage our guests!

Speaking of Spring Break, all schools and offices will follow the Early Dismissal Schedule on Thursday, April 17, 2025 and will be closed April 18, 2025 through April 27, 2025. For those who observe, I wish you a Happy Pesach (Passover); wish you a holy Good Friday; and a Happy Easter! —*Dr. Frederick D. Williams*

George Street Arrival



Celebrating Black History

Throughout February, teachers and students across various subjects and grade levels were actively engaged in meaningful lessons and projects to celebrate the achievements, history, and contributions of Black individuals through history. Students explored powerful works of literature by Black authors, analyzing themes of resilience, identity, and justice. History classes dove into discussions on the Civil Rights Movement, influential Black leaders, and lesser-known figures who made a lasting impact on society. Art students created visual tributes inspired by the Harlem Renaissance, and STEM classes highlighted Black innovators and scientists. "Our goal was to go beyond just acknowledging history—we wanted students to engage with it, reflect on it, and connect it to their own lives," said one of the participating teachers. Some specific lessons: Ms. Tavakol and Mrs. Smocovich's 6th Grade Language Arts classes read several articles about African Americans, including "Jackie Robinson: Justice at Last," "The Shutout," "Kenny Washington," and "The 16th Street Baptist Street Church Bombings." Students found the main idea, notable person's contribution, and found supporting details from each article. Students also conducted research on a famous African American of their choice and created an MLA-style one-page paper and presented to the class. Mr. Heady's Computer **Applications class** used their Microsoft Word skills to create professional, engaging flyers, each highlighting a significant Black History Icon, incorporating technical skills such as Word Art, table formatting, and layout techniques. Meanwhile, the Web Design class created a four-page website dedicated to Black History Month, including a variety of interactive elements, such as an image carousel, a Google Form trivia quiz, and even a Google Map to explore key historical locations.





2025-2026 Preschool Registration

Pre-Kindergarten registration for the 2025-2026 school year opened on February 18, 2025 and will continue through the end of the school year. To be eligible for our program, students must turn 3 or 4 on or before October 1, 2025 (Policy #5112). Students already enrolled through one of our partner sites do not need to register for preschool again. Some information may need to be updated.



2024-2025 Culture and Climate Surveys

South Amboy Public Schools is once again participating in survey data collection using the New Jersey School Climate Improvement (NJ SCI) Survey to help obtain multiple perspectives on aspects of school climate. Collecting data is important for understanding strengths and needs in our school and how it feels to be a member of the school community. Over the next few weeks we will be asking students, staff, parents, and community members to complete the survey. Your voice is important to us, and your opinions will help us to address current priorities. The results from the anonymous survey will be used to help create a plan to address school climate needs and make improvements to the school. You may submit a separate survey per child in the school building if you feel their experiences are different, but you do not have to. More information will be provided through your child's school and will be posted to the District's HIB page. Professional Development Workshops

South Amboy Public Schools hosted two professional development sessions for our staff on February 27 and 28, 2025. The sessions were held following student dismissal and focused on a wide range of topics. Administration hosted the workshops which included an Artificial Intelligence roundtable discussion, and introduction to Document Based Questions for Elementary Teachers, empowering paraprofessional support in the classroom, in addition to student led discussions and cooperative learning. Over the next few weeks the staff will use these strategies in their classrooms and participate in additional training as we prepare for the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment.

Introducing our new Director of Special Services

Dr. Alain Mollinedo joined our district as the new Special Services Director on February 18, 2025. Since his arrival, he has prioritized visiting our school buildings, reviewing special education programs and procedures, and familiarizing himself with staff, faculty, parents, students, and with the South Amboy Community. Dr. Mollinedo has worked as a director in other districts in New Jersey, but he has also worked as a member of the child study team, the district's Interventions and Referral Coordinator, and Special Education Compliance Supervisor.



Dr. Mollinedo is a staunch advocate for inclusive practices, believing that all students deserve equal access to education and the opportunity to reach their full potential. He emphasizes the importance of parental involvement, improving home-school communication, and fostering an environment where every student is supported in their academic and social growth. A firm believer in the power of early intervention, he is committed to ensuring that all students, particularly those with mental health challenges, have access to necessary resources to ensure their safety and well-being. Dr. Mollinedo's philosophy also highlights the significance of preventive interventions, which he believes are vital to providing a proactive approach to student support.

As the Special Services Director, Dr. Mollinedo oversees all operations of the department in alignment with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and ensures the implementation and compliance of 504 accommodation plans under the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Additionally, he serves as the district's Homeless Liaison under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, working to ensure that all students, regardless of their circumstances, receive the support they need to succeed.

SEPAG aims to enhance the partnership between home and school, recognizing the vital role that parents and families play in shaping a positive and effective educational experience for students with special needs. We encourage all interested families to become actively involved as we strive to continuously improve the educational experience for all students. *Please note that SEPAG meetings are not intended to discuss individual students' needs. This is a forum for general input and collaboration.*

Our district's transition program provides students with meaningful, hands-on experiences that foster independence and valuable life skills. Through community and work-based learning opportunities, students actively contribute to local businesses while gaining confidence in real-world environments.

These partnerships and other previously discussed visits provide skill development and additionally showcase how students positively impact the community they live in. Whether it's navigating a store, keeping a business tidy, or preparing materials, our students are thriving and making a difference!

- Home Depot: Here, students navigate the location to locate essential items for the classroom. Students have begun working on their garden, using the location to acquire gardening tools, seeds, gloves and other materials necessary for a successful garden.
- ShopRite: Our middle school students are also now visiting
 their local ShopRite. Students have learned to navigate the
 store and locate essential items throughout. Students purchase
 goods to bring back to school and have lessons on ingredients
 needed and preparing meals.
- Dolce Salon: A new work-based learning site, Dolce Salon
 welcomes students and provides them with opportunities to
 prepare the site for clients. Students gather and organize
 materials and assist in setting up workstations needed for
 cosmetologists to work with their clients and have become key
 contributors to the daily success of the salon.
- Bowling: Students recently visited Majestic Lanes Bowling Alley
 in Woodbridge. Here students participated together with their
 peers to have a fun and engaging outing at their local bowling
 alley. Students navigated the alley to both find the proper ball
 to use and locate the other exciting locations within the facility.

Cybersecurity attacks on the public sector on the rise!



Cybersecurity threats are increasing, with over 26,000 compromised credentials reported last year in the public sector alone. These incidents have the potential to disrupt schools, causing significant setbacks when accounts and services are breached. In response, South Amboy Public Schools has implemented a variety of proactive measures to safeguard both staff and students from these targeted attacks. Our efforts include staff phishing training campaigns, Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) for high-level systems, and the launch of a student cybersecurity initiative. This program is designed to educate students on the risks of cyber threats and help them recognize potential phishing emails.

Reminder: Use the ParentSquare app to receive Parental Notifications

The South Amboy Public School District is partnering with a new communication platform called

ParentSquare. This system will replace SchoolMessenger for school-to-home

communications; the primary contact information parents have on file in SchoolTool has been transferred to ParentSquare. All unregistered South Amboy families have received an invitation via text or email to register their account with ParentSquare.






