

East Islip Alum Challenges Middle Schoolers to CHOOSE TO BE GREAT

East Islip High School Class of 2001 alumnus and inspirational speaker Rohan Murphy recently paid a special visit to East Islip Middle School, talking to students about the importance of perseverance and doing your best. Murphy lost his legs at birth, and had not participated in sports due to this physical disability, but when he was an eighth grader, he was offered a position as equipment manager for the soccer, wrestling and tennis teams. He joined the wrestling team in his freshman year at East Islip, rising above adversity to become one of the school's most decorated wrestlers and earn three-time All-League and twotime All-County honors. He later wrestled at Penn State University before focusing on powerlifting. Representing the U.S., he won a bronze medal in 2006 at the International Paralympic Committee's World Powerlifting Championships in South Korea.

"As you get older, you have the same choice as me, to be average, good or great," Murphy told the middle schoolers in the auditorium. "I hope from here on out you choose to be great, to get the most out of life and do your personal best. Because as we all know, you get one life, so you might as well make it count, with or without legs."





East Islip Wins Two Quill Awards at Adelphi's Press Day

Members of East Islip High School's journalism class and school newspaper club recently attended Adelphi University's Press Day and Quill Awards. The students took advantage of this opportunity to learn about journalism from a panel discussion and various workshops led by esteemed Adelphi professors and professionals in the field. 




A Star-Studded Wax Museum at RCK

then created their own individual clay vessels using the style, symbols and techniques of Native American artists.

"It is always an inspiration for me to see the faces of the students and their sense of accomplishment as they learn to transform a simple lump of clay into a beautiful work of art in just 60 minutes," Mendelson said.







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Champions of the Courtroom:

El Mock Trial Team Wins County Title

East Islip High School's mock trial team emerged victorious in the Suffolk County Championship on April 2, delivering a standout performance in the final round, held at the Suffolk County



Surrogate's Court in Riverhead. Judged by the Hon. Vincent J. Messina Jr., the team faced off against Northport High School in a high-stakes battle of legal minds. East Islip's decisive win was the culmination of months of hard work and collaboration. Making it to the finals was a total team effort, with all 14 members – alternating between plaintiff and defense roles – contributing throughout the season. Coached by social studies teacher Patsy Lester and attorney Brian Mitchell, the team has been a playoff mainstay for years, but this season's success is particularly sweet. With the county title secured, East Islip now advances to the New York State finals in Albany, where the top eight teams in the state will compete for the title of state champion from May 18-20.
