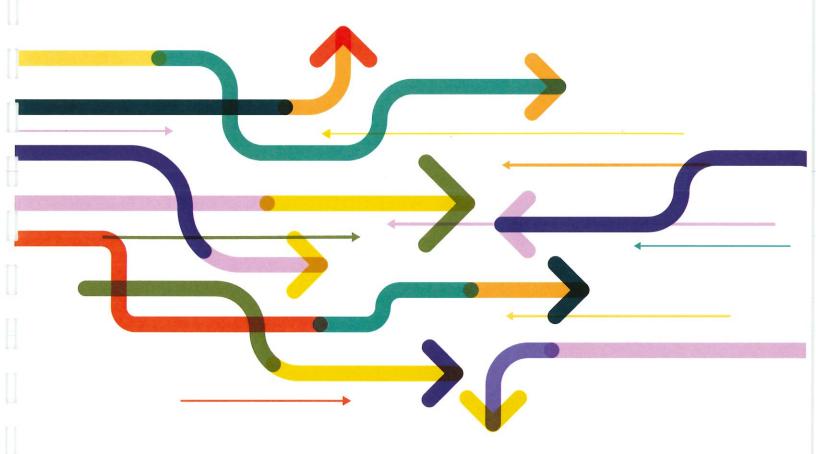

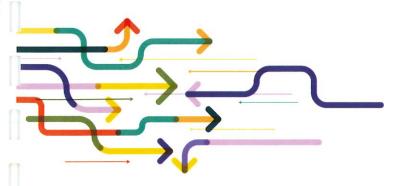

Goal Area: Student Experience

Goal Statement: To develop an environment that promotes creative and independent thinking with a focus on academic excellence and the arts; that is also adaptable to each student.

Objectives:

- Create an environment of teacher excellence through robust professional development, maintaining small class sizes and encouraging improved reciprocal parent-teacher communication.
- 2. Improve leadership and consistency within departments to encourage alignment with academic goals and transparency in communication between teachers; attention given to continuity from grade to grade to improve articulation of the curriculum
- 3. Develop a robust program of experiential learning that exposes students to applied skills and encourages artistic development and civic awareness.
- 4. Ensuring the child study team is adequately and fully staffed and is supported in providing the best environment possible for this community of learners.
- 5. To identify and serve both the academic and social emotional needs of gifted students so that they are learning in an environment and at a pace that encourages them, understands their unique neurological profile, and aligns with their cognitive abilities per NJ law.
- 6. Develop capstone program and incorporate extras (i.e., science fairs) at every level.

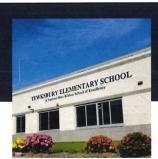

- Top performance in the Grade 3-8 NJSLA in English, Math, and Science in comparison to other Hunterdon County schools
- On the Grade 9 NJSLA at Voorhees/North Hunterdon, former Tewksbury students scored the highest in math and far exceeded their peers in English Language Arts
- This year we are encouraging an increase in student participation rate on NJLSA and a focus on math achievement among middle school students

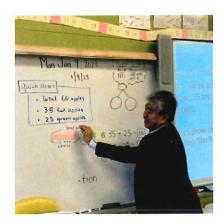

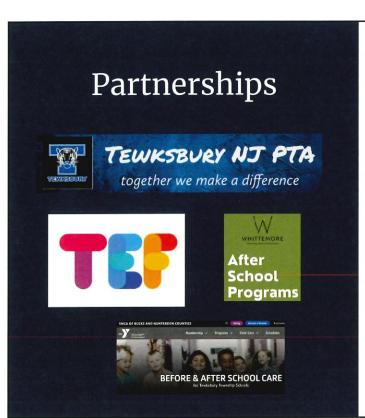

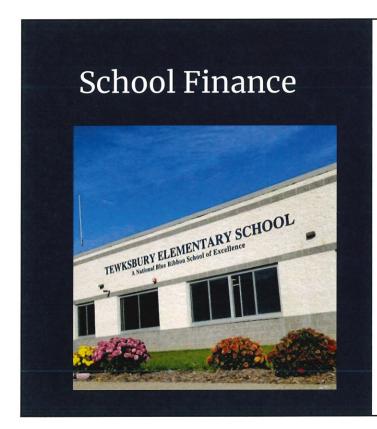

Shared Services and School Choice

- Tewksbury Township School District participates in Shared Services with Califon School in order to reduce costs.
 Our CST team oversees the special education services in Califon and we provide speech services to Califon students.
- Tewksbury participates in the New Jersey School Choice Program. We have 26 seats for out-of-district wishing to attend our schools and we consistently have a waitlist.

- Buildings are in excellent condition due to ongoing maintenance

School Budget

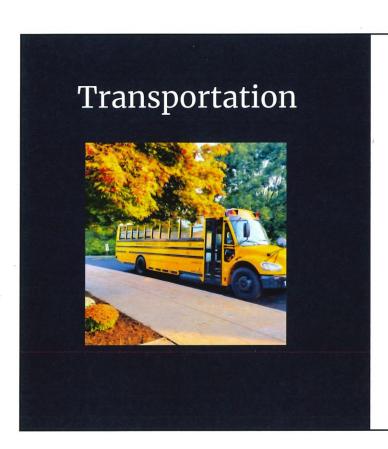

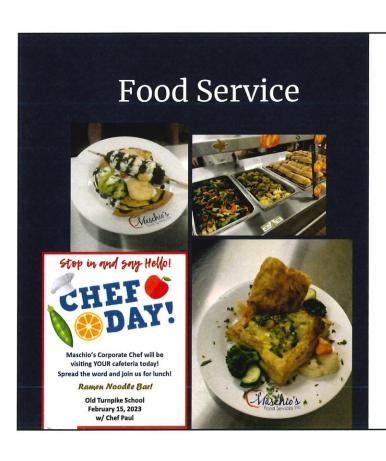




- Several school safety mechanisms are installed in our facilities: including panic buttons, interlock vestibules, safety film on windows, and school cameras inside /outside the buildings and on school buses
- Monthly practice of our safety drills by staff and students
- Newly formed School Threat Assessment Team (with our school safety coordinator, psychologist, social worker, teachers, and Tewksbury Police)
- Memorandum of Agreement with the Tewksbury Police (12 officers) shared trainings, daily visits to both schools, cameras linked to the police with color painted hallway designations, detailed 3d diagrams of our buildings
- Strong Relationships- Tewksbury Police, EMS, and local Fire Departments
- An updated School Safety Plan guides our protocols



- Tewksbury Schools offers transportation to and from school for all our students, plus out-of-district students
- Travel about 575 miles every school day
- Town is 32 square miles with 54 cul de sacs
- Provide transportation for our many Field Trips and Sporting Events.
- The school district owns our buses: 10 full size buses and 3 small buses.
- We employ 8 bus drivers.
- Our transportation coordinator (Mr. Bob Hoffman): Carefully plans all bus routes, facilitates the safe transport of students, advises the superintendent on poor road conditions due to weather, and drives a bus when a substitute is needed.
- Our school transportation is also a community service:
 - Assisted the police department and the township
 - Provide transportation for the Junior Police Academy and for Senior citizen events
 - Transport the Choir and Jazz Band to the Women's Club luncheon and the Seniors Club luncheon to perform.
 - We have delivered food to the local food pantry.



- Maschio's is our Food Service Provider
- We do not participate in the National School Lunch program due to our district makeup and this allows us flexibility with lunch choices
- \$6.25 for a student lunch: includes grains/breads, meat/meat alternative, fruit/juice/vegetable and milk/water. (Students choose at least 3 items.)
- PaySchools account allows parents to replenish their student's lunch account online or by check
- Parents can add restrictions to account: like snack choices, and spending limits
- Food Service Committee: with parents, nurse, students, teachers, BOE members, and administration meets throughout the year
- Recent positive feedback from students and parents on improvements to our school lunch program

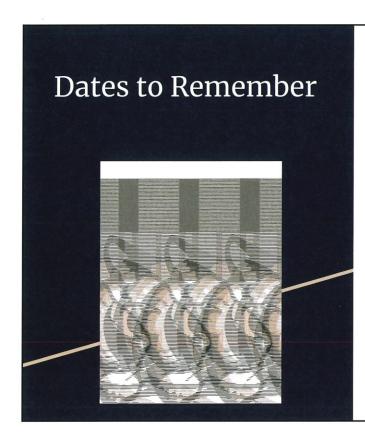

Session 1 What are the Strengths, Achievements and Challenges of the Tewksbury Township School District?

On February 12, 2024, Tewksbury Township School District administrators, Board of Education members, staff, parents, and community members, fifty-two (52) in all came together to initiate strategic planning. The first evening focused on the strengths and challenges/opportunities of the Tewksbury Township School District. The meeting began with a welcome and introduction by Board President, Andrea Stein. The State of the Community Report was given by Jean Frankel and Andrea Maranca, Councilwomen and Jennifer Shouffler, Superintendent presented the current "State of the Schools" report. The three goal areas identified at the conclusion of the second meeting were: The Student Experience, Facilities/Finance, and School Environment.

The information that follows is a summary of the work of the small groups. As discussed with the meeting participants, all consensus points are recorded and posted on the district website to share the group work during the course of the strategic planning process.

Development of Goal Statements and Objectives

Three goal areas emerged from the end of the second meeting and are listed below:

- 1. The Student Experience
- 2. Facilities/Finance
- 3. School Environment

Goal 1: The Student Experience

Goal Statement: To develop an environment that promotes creative and independent thinking with a focus on academic excellence and the arts; that is also adaptable to each student.

Objectives:

- 1. Create an environment of teacher excellence through robust professional development, maintaining small class sizes and encouraging improved reciprocal parent-teacher communication.
- 2. Improve leadership and consistency within departments to encourage alignment with academic goals and transparency in communication between teachers; attention given to continuity from grade to grade to improve articulation of the curriculum
- **3.** Develop a robust program of experiential learning that exposes students to applied skills and encourages artistic development and civic awareness.
- **4.** Ensuring the child study team is adequately and fully staffed and is supported in providing the best environment possible for this community of learners.
- **5.** To identify and serve both the academic and social emotional needs of gifted students so that they are learning in an environment and at a pace that encourages them, understands their unique neurological profile, and aligns with their cognitive abilities per NJ law.
- 6. Develop capstone program and incorporate extras (i.e., science fairs) at every level.

Goal 2: Facilities/Finance

Goal Statement: To create a financial framework so that we can create:

Objectives:

- 1. Outdoor learning spaces
- 2. Art/Science Classroom
- 3. Modernize facilities: solar parking -coverage structure
 Stage at OTS- structure, audio, and lighting

Goal 3: School Environment

Goal Statement: To create a welcoming and supportive environment to foster in our students a life long love of learning and robust connection to their school and wider community.

Objectives:

- 1. Expansion of enrichment and co-curricular programs to include science fairs, spelling bees, model UN, debate, and others to provide engagement with other districts.
- 2. Annual review of expansion for flexible learning environments to include seating, visual aids, and upgrades to educational technology.
- 3. Prioritize group and interpersonal interaction of students while reducing reliance on screens for school work/projects whenever possible.
- **4.** Create more opportunities for community service projects and family/community involvement.
- **5.** Cultivate an inclusive climate where student differences are celebrated to promote a sense of belonging including kindness initiatives, expansion of world languages, expansion of special education and Aspire, and more exposure to diverse cultures and backgrounds,
- **6.** Increased collaboration within and between the schools. i.e., students move up day for all grades.

Next Steps:

The next step in the process is the development of the action plans. The Superintendent and the Administrative team will develop the action plans for the strategic plan. The timelines will be developed for a 5-year plan.

The action plans will include:

- Major activities for each objective
- Who is responsible for the activity
- The resources to be deployed
- Due dates for completion
- Indicators of Success (how we will know the activity has been accomplished)
