## Due on the first full day of classes

#### Book Selection Guidelines:

- Students may choose any book that meets the following criteria:
- Must be a fiction or nonfiction book appropriate for high school-level reading.
- Must be at least 200 pages in length.
- Should have literary or educational value (no graphic novels, short story collections, or books primarily based on movies or video games).
- The book must be **new to you**—no re-reading books you've already studied in school.
- If unsure about a book choice, get approval from the teacher.
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#### **Assignment**

# This assignment is intended to teach you to become a more analytical reader.

What is it? A one-pager is a one-page reaction to your reading that links the ideas in the book you read to your thoughts. The one-pager aims to demonstrate your understanding of the major plot points, themes, and connections within your independent reading book.

# Directions and what to include in your one-pager (use this as a checklist):

☐ Include the title of the book and the author somewhere on the page.
☐ "It can be big and creative.
☐ Write a brief summary of the book and include any significant plot points.
☐ This needs to be at least <b>three</b> sentences long.
☐ Draw or create at least <b>five</b> images representing themes, characters, conflict, or the book's
setting.
☐ These should be firmly connected to the book and should stand out.
☐ Ensure each image has the theme, character, conflict, etc., written next to
it.
☐ Include a timeline of events according to the plot.
☐ At least three plot points.

☐ Include a sentence describing the event and the page number.					
☐ Make sure your events are in order.					
☐ Write three responses or connections about what you've read					
☐ Example: "I couldn't understand why Gatsby wanted to be with Daisy					
despite her being married to such a horrible person like Tom. This					
would have raised a red flag for me because a popular phrase says,					
'You are who you surround yourself with,' and Daisy chose to be with					
Tom. So, this indicates that she's not a great person."					
☐ Find <b>three</b> examples of figurative language (simile, metaphor, hyperbole, alliteration,					
etc.) and label them along with the page number.					
☐ Include two quotes from the book that were your favorite.					
☐ Include page numbers and a quick blurb on why you like the					
quote/why it resonated with you.					
☐ Example: "Dishonesty in women is a thing you never blame deeply—I was casually sorry, and then I forgot (Pg.58). I like this quote because it reflects Nick more than Jordan. It speaks volumes about his own distrust of women.					
☐ Write a 5-7 sentence letter to the author expressing your thoughts on the book. Be a					
critic.					
☐ Be colorful and neat.					
<ul><li>☐ Your entire page should be filled with these elements.</li><li>☐ Repeat any of the above steps/ elements if you have extra room.</li></ul>					
☐ No space should be blank.					
<ul> <li>□ Nothing should be left in pencil.</li> <li>□ Your name should be on the <b>back</b> of the one-pager.</li> </ul>
