Tornado Outbreak

Many places throughout the U.S. have been hit with many tornadoes and severe weather throughout the past week or so. Many rivers have started to rise and become way higher than usual, causing many places to flood. Many mandatory evacuations have been sent to anyone in any of the areas such as Kentucky, Georgia, Missouri, and more. On Monday, April 7th, 2025, the US media said, "Approximately 9 million people have been told they are under a flood watch". Approximately 22 people have died from all of the flash flooding and the damage from all these tornadoes that have broken out throughout the Midwestern and Southern parts of the United States.

Most of the people that have died were in Tennessee, but Missouri, Kentucky, Indiana, Mississippi, Georgia, and Arkansas have also reported that they have had deaths as well. On Monday, this severe weather brought heavy rain to Florida, Georgia, and the Carolinas. The

National Weather Service said, "It could take days or weeks for water to recede in some places." The same areas throughout the U.S. got hit with tornadoes, wildfires, and many dust storms, which killed approximately 40 people and caused a lot of damage in March.

In Kentucky, a nine-year-old boy was

walking to his bus stop to go to school and got swept away from the flooding. People found his body



approximately 2 hours later.

In Missouri, Chevy Gall, a 16-year-old volunteer firefighter, was trying to rescue people that were stuck in the storm but died in a crash. The fire chief, Terry Feth, said, "Chevy Gall died while answering the call to help other people." The fire chief, Terry Feth, also said, "Our entire department is grieving, as we are mourning with Chevy Galls' family, friends and all the first responders during this difficult time." Many people are dealing with lots and lots of severe weather.



Canadian And U.S. Border **Tensions!**

Last Sunday the Canadian government issued a new warning for travelers entering the U.S saying they "should expect scrutiny" at their phones and that their phones and other



electronic devices may be issued for a search. This travel advisory was pushed after President Trump's motions to tighten

security and immigration policies, advisories from prompting similar countries such as the U.K., France, and Germany. Trump's economic and annexation threats against Canada have led to a marked drop in trips and bookings to the U.S. by Canadians, who are the top source of international visitors, generating 20.5 billion dollars in spending last year, according to the U.S. Travel Association.

Under US law, Customs and Border Protection agents may demand passwords to unlock devices during inspections. Travelers who refuse the demand risk having their electronics confiscated and may face long delays. The

advisory recommends placing devices in airplane mode before crossing to prevent unintended downloads of remote files, which could complicate screenings.
