Ms. Raja Bhandari

From Military Bases to Home Base

After college, Ms. Raja Bhandari joined the Air Force on a delayed enlistment program. Originally her plan was to become an Air Force medic but was

introduced to another opportunity that changed everything. Impressed after a trip to one of Macon, Georgia's squadrons, she decided to pursue space operations. She controlled GPS satellites,

making sure phones, airplanes, and military systems navigate accurately. Later, she became a certified instructor, evaluator, and manual writer for all satellite operators, passing on her expertise to others.

Road to Notre Dame

Ms. Bhandari loved her career in the military, but she became more interested in education. When her son was at OLPH and Notre Dame, she actively participated in parent organizations, chaired the curriculum committee, all while leading the middle schools Science Olympiad team. Although she was offered a teaching position, she said the timing wasn't right. Two decades into public school, Ms Bhandari decided it was time to join the Notre Dame staff, simultaneously coaching their girl's tennis team to win a state championship. She has now been inspiring students at Notre Dame for three years and counting. She was a natural fit at Notre Dame with her long-time experience and passion for science, specifically anatomy.

"I wanted to be at Notre Dame because it has always had a reputation of being such an amazing Catholic school, and it was one that I trusted to send my son to because I knew he would get a good education. More than that, I just wanted to be here because of the family atmosphere because it truly is like a family."

Intro to Anatomy

Ms. Bhandari didn't plan to teach anatomy but having already finished a pre-med track in college and later studying it in nursing school, she had the perfect background in the subject. With her previous healthcare knowledge and love for anatomy, teaching was

a breeze. Ms. Bhandari's overall favorite part of anatomy is when she watches the light bulb moments happen during case studies after students use their knowledge and apply it to real life medical situations. She also loves hearing her students share experiences they had outside the classroom where they were able to apply what they learned from her. For example, going to the doctor and being able to translate for your parents what is going on.

"When you learn about the human body it hits closer to home more than anything else that you could possibly take because it's all applicable to yourself."

Ms Bhandari's Approach to Anatomy

Her philosophy mirrors college-level practice and expectations because she models it exactly like her college classes at Chattanooga State. College-style quizzes, model study, and labs ensure that her students are well prepared for future healthcare studies and more. Her former students that are now in college, specifically nursing majors, share how easy their anatomy class is after high school. Anatomy in college, especially for pre-med, is commonly known to be very challenging. Her alumni frequently return and tell her they're passing the class without any trouble thanks to the solid foundation she provided.

Hands-On Learning

Under Ms Bhandari's guidance, Notre Dame's anatomy program

has thrived. When I asked her what makes the program so great she said it was because of the autonomy she's given to teach what she feels is most important while still following standards. She also credited her colleagues from Chattanooga State for the curriculum she brings to high school to almost match so that kids see "how broad the scope of material there is". The class has improved with new 3D anatomical models for all systems of the body for interactive learning. The tools and flexible curriculum allow her students to have the best immersive educational experience.

Officer Neely

It's apparent to all around him that Officer Neely brings passion and joy into the work and service he does every day at Notre Dame. Lunch wouldn't be the same without his entertaining lunch line trivia questions that students always look forward to. His constant watchfulness and willingness to help the student body at Notre Dame illustrates his care for them. Officer Neely is always striving to make the campus safer. Just this year, he oversaw the installation of a new security system.



In addition, he has been working on the privatization of the road in front of Notre Dame High School, which would elevate school security to a whole new level. Officer Neely has truly excelled in his role of protector of the school.

Ms Bhandari to Me

Ms. Bhandari is the most thorough teacher I've ever had, and she is so knowledgeable about so many different parts within the subject. Innovative teaching methods and real-world applications have prepared us for the real world, not just a paper exam. She has cultivated curiosity and critical thinking in the classroom and boosted interest in the medical field by sponsoring the healthcare careers club here at Notre Dame.

JM: What brought you to Notre Dame?

ON: I used to work with the previous officer that was here, Mr. Sam Clay, and he said they were looking for an extra officer in the evening time. I went into the interview, and I met with Mr. Valadie and Mr. Mullin, and then my journey started here at Notre Dame High School. And that was 5 years ago. I wouldn't change it. It's been the best journey in the world.

JM: What does a typical day look like for you here at Notre Dame?

ON: Well, a typical day at Notre Dame High School consists of making sure everything is on properly in the school, and making

sure the lighting and all the safety things are up to date. I direct traffic to ensure the students get to and from their vehicles safely, because safety is my number one priority here for the students. I do security sweeps and door checks to ensure that no one without authorization gets in with the students, and to ensure that anybody who's supposed to be on campus is on campus. I also try to make the lunch line as fun as possible...giving everyone a fair opportunity to get to the front of the line with the trivia, even if you are coming in late. Making sure everyone on the Notre Dame campus is safe—from students, faculty, staff, and all the way to the cafeteria crew—is my number one priority.

JM: What are some things you do that most people wouldn't know about?

ON: I am also a bounty hunter. I have a team that I am

on. We do go pick up people when needed, which can be a little challenging sometimes. Then you are dealing with actual criminals that are trying not to go back to jail. It's not always the safest situation, but it is necessary to keep the community safe. How I always see it: I don't know what

side of town my students live on, but if I got a bad guy possibly, I don't want him near my students, my faculty, or anything. I always have Notre Dame in mind and at heart when I'm doing something.

JM: What is the most rewarding aspect of your job?

ON: That I can ensure everyone's safety. I also receive an overwhelming amount of love from my students with the letters and cards, which is something I will always cherish. It is very rewarding for me, even though it is my job to do. Just to have that appreciation and love from your faculty and your students means everything. I still have every last one of them (letters).



JM: What new security technologies have been installed, and how will they improve school security?

ON: Yes, we do have a new security system here at Notre Dame. Our cameras are audio and video. To be able to always have an eye on your students (and) to make sure they are safe everywhere on campus, is good, and I'm glad we actually got that (new security system). So, our cameras have

helped us see things in the neighborhood overnight that weren't school related. Our camera systems have definitely done the job, and we are very grateful that we can protect our students.

JM: I heard that there are efforts to privatize the road in front of Notre

Dame. Can you just tell me a little bit about how this will make campus safer?

ON: Privatizing the road up front would mean that we would be able to block off the two streets. That would enable us to protect the campus a whole lot better to ensure a higher percent(age) of safety; more than what we already have. That would actually be a great thing if and when that happens. Considering that it is a city street, you know, our upper administration is in contact with the city of Chattanooga; they have had multiple meetings and planning. And that's why I'm always on campus, to make sure the safety of my students and faculty is my number one priority.



During Catholic Schools Week, the OLPH Student Council delivered posters and handwritten notes to the local veterans center. During their visit,




students had the opportunity to engage with the veterans, who expressed heartfelt appreciation for their kindness and support.

s a student in Coach Charles Fant's personal finance course, Kolby McGowan '18 discovered his love of the financial world. These lessons sparked his interest in the field, setting him on a journey leading him to San Francisco's Financial District. As a West Coast Sell Side Account Manager for Bloomberg L.P., McGowan found his passion in life and dreams of launching his own business. From writing his own finance book to managing a robust roster of clients, McGowan has quite the story to tell.

ND: What have you been up to since leaving Notre Dame?

KM: Right after I left Notre Dame, I went to Cornell University to play football [in] Upstate New York, and that was my first time just kind of being out of Tennessee and away from home. Before graduating, I did an internship with Bloomberg in San Francisco my junior year of college, going into senior year, and I got the return offer from that internship. Immediately after graduating from Cornell, I just decided to start my full time career here in San Francisco.


Now, I'm currently working for Bloomberg. I'm in our sales department, but my title is account manager, so my main

responsibility is looking after 600-plus [individual] clients across major sell side institutions and banks like J.P. Morgan and Goldman Sachs. It's more like a consultive role where I'm helping them use our software and upselling any opportunities that I identify.

ND: What has been your biggest accomplishment since graduating from high school?



I also have to shout out George Valadie, [he] was extremely, extremely supportive, he always wanted the best for me. I feel like when there was time to give advice or when there was time to kind of give guidance or feedback on certain things, he was very straightforward, but also he did it in a way that was helpful for me and I needed it at that time.

ND: So, what's next for Kolby McGowan?

KM: I think now, I've really just been focused on, in the next five years, my personal development, career-wise. I picture myself, hopefully being in a leadership position in the company within five years and being able to lead a group in our corporate sales department would be ideal. I'm still very ambitious and kind of entrepreneurial, [so] I do want to eventually start my own business one day and hopefully within the next five to ten years, through [the] learning, I'll be able to make that a reality, especially being out here in Silicon Valley.







