<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Offer resources to students in a variety of ways to accommodate for multiple learning styles.</li> <li>● Engage all learners through implementation of various resources including visual, audio, and tactile materials.</li> <li>● Provide easy access to course resources so the student can utilize materials within the classroom or at home to reiterate content learned within the course.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Utilize a multi-sensory (Visual, Auditory, Kinesthetic, Tactile) approach as needed during instruction to better engage all learners.</li> <li>● Provide alternate presentations of skills and steps required for project completion by varying the method (repetition, simple explanations, visual step-by-step guides, additional examples, modeling, etc).</li> <li>● Allow additional time to complete classwork as needed, when required according to students' IEP or 504 plan. Break assignments up into shorter tasks while repeating directions as needed.
