# Opinion: One year of The Tortured Poets Department

It has been nearly one year since pop star, Taylor Swift, released her 11th studio album, *The Tortured Poets Department* with a surprise drop of an additional 15 songs. The album release with the additional 15 songs is referred to as *The Anthology*. Since the release date of April 19, 2024, Swift’s fans are still finding hidden messages throughout the album.

The studio album had a record-breaking release week where it surpassed 891.27 million official streams. All 31 songs on *The Tortured Poets Department: The Anthology* charted in Billboard Hot 100 with the first 14 songs securing the top 14. Not only did every song chart for The Billboard Hot 100 but also for Spotify’s Top 50, which has only been done by a few other artists

such as Michael Jackson and Drake. The album also is the first album to surpass 300 million streams in one day on Spotify.

Although Swift did not win any Grammy awards for this record-shattering album, she won many awards at other music awards nights such as the VMAs and iHeartRadio. At the VMAs Swift won Video of the Year. “Fortnight,” featuring Post Malone, broke the record for most Video of the Year awards. The song won Best Collaboration, Song of the Summer, Best Directions, Best Editing, and Best Pop and Artist of the Year.

While the album had a record-breaking year, after being first released many people had opposing views about the album, even some of Swift’s fans. Many

fans find that they cannot relate to the album as they can with her other 10 albums, making it one of their least favorite albums of hers. Others say they relate to it much more than the other album and that it is one of their favorites.

The fans who place the album as one of their least favorites claim that the album is very repetitive, often talking about the same situation. They also feel as if they cannot connect to the album due to Swift’s use of a higher vocabulary.

The other half of Swift’s fandom that is able to relate to the album appreciates her strong lyricism. Swift uses figurative language to express how deep her feelings go. Swift uses phrases such as “my white knuckle dying grip” in

her song So Long, London, to show the sense of feeling like one is dying but still tightly holding on to what is draining them. Fans claim that Swift has a way of describing and putting the listener’s feelings into words that they could never think of, allowing them to better connect to the album.

Swift’s eleventh studio album has had one incredible and record-breaking year, all happening in the middle of her worldwide phenomenal tour. The tour itself even won Tour of the Century at the iHeartRadio awards. Swift’s lyricism is greatly appreciated and even now, a year later, people are still finding more things they love about *The Tortured Poets Department*.
