IT IS A GREAT PRIVILEGE THAT I HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO WRITE TO YOU AS THE NEW CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS AT THE NEIGHBORHOOD ACADEMY.

I remember fondly being at the very first graduation for the school in 2005 and feeling something special in the air. Education has always been a priority of mine, and in TNA I saw what every school should strive for: giving great kids not only a path to success, but also a vision for that success and a belief that it is possible. When Reverend Tom Johnson and Jodie Moore started TNA in 2001, they may have been the only ones with a clear vision of what this school could accomplish, but now we all can see that just as clearly. I am honored to play a part in continuing their legacy.

The 2020-2021 school year was not an easy one, but it was a success. We started the year giving our families the option of an all-virtual or hybrid learning experience. Whether students opted to remain virtual or come into the building two days a week, they were all held accountable to their studies, and they did not disappoint. We have many groups to thank for this success such as our corporate sponsors, including Comcast (who donated laptops for all our students prior to the pandemic), our wonderful faculty and staff (we had a 100% retention rate to start the school year), and of course our students who took this adversity in stride.

One group in particular who deserves mentioning is our senior class, which was compromised of 26 young men and women; our largest graduating class to date. This was not the senior year that they envisioned, but that did not deter them from stepping up to the challenge. The proof of their hard work can be seen in the results: acceptance of all students to multiple schools each – bringing the list to 50 in total, including nine Historically Black Colleges and Universities, and two lvy League Schools (our first ever.) On top of this, they earned a cumulative \$1.3 MILLION in scholarships. Not to mention, getting back to an in-person graduation was icing on the cake. These current college freshmen have a lot to look forward to. As our alumni pool grows, we are seeing the success of this work. 75% of our students are graduating from college in five years or less and entering the workforce. We have alumni in careers at major Pittsburgh companies such as BNY Mellon, UPMC, PJ Dick, and the City of Pittsburgh Police just to name a few. 89% of our college graduates are currently in a career that is relevant to their degree. We continue working with local companies for internships and career opportunities to ensure that we will keep the talent that we are cultivating here in the Pittsburgh region.

We have all heard horror stories from friends or have seen news segments of schools struggling significantly during COVID-19. My belief is that if a school is strong enough as a community, it will rise up to defeat any challenge, including COVID-19. The faculty, staff, administration, board, and of course students, are only part of that community. We all know that there is a much larger community that includes all of you, the supporters of the school. I want you all to know that our school strives for this level of success because we know you are with us. and we will not let you down. Tom Johnson always said your support can be time, treasure, or talent. Please know your gift goes far beyond that and provides inspiration. Thank you for your continued support of the mission and vision of The Neighborhood Academy.

OUR MISSION

The Neighborhood Academy (TNA) is a faith-based, college preparatory, independent Middle and High School whose mission is to break the cycle of generational poverty by empowering youth and preparing them for college and citizenship.

THE HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL BEGINS IN

WHEN CO-FOUNDER JODIE MOORE BEGAN WORKING WITH AT RISK ADOLESCENTS IN LARIMER, THEN, AND NOW, ONE OF PITTSBURGH'S MOST DESOLATE AND UNDERSERVED NEIGHBORHOODS.

What was then known as the Larimer Avenue Youth Club evolved into a nine-year summer skill-building program for at-risk 7th through 11th graders, run by The Reverend Tom Johnson in the basement of Allegheny United Church of Christ. Ms. Moore and Reverend Johnson, who met at the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, quickly realized that the psychosocial burdens of poverty weighed heavily on these students and impeded learning. They believed that if these young people could be immersed year-round in a caring environment with high expectations, they could become educated young people with the potential to lead fulfilling lives. With generous support from pioneering community members, this vision evolved into The Neighborhood Academy.

The college preparatory school opened its doors to its first class of 8th and 9th graders in September 2001 and has since grown to 142 students in grades 6 through 12. In 2011, the school moved to its new home at 709 N. Aiken Avenue in Pittsburgh's Stanton Heights neighborhood.

Since 2018, the American Eagle Outfitters Foundation has supported our Writing Center, increasing students' access to laptops and drasticallyincreasing their access to the Internet and digital instruction.

HANS AND LESLIE: THE DYNAMIC DUO

Leslie and her late husband, Hans Fleischner, have been stalwart advocates for Pittsburgh's arts and education institutions, one particular school being The Neighborhood Academy.



"Education has always been a priority for our family," said Leslie. "Hans always looked at supporting education as 'payback.' He would say, 'Someone helped me through school when I needed it, so it's important for me to help others.'"

Hans was born in Vienna, Austria in 1927. His family left Vienna in 1938, and Hans attended Downside School in Stratton-on-the-Fosse, United Kingdom. Upon completion of school, he immigrated to the United States – joining his family – and enrolling at Harvard University, graduating in 1949.

Leslie attended Bryn Athyn Church School in Philadelphia from prekindergarten through her first year of college. She moved to Pittsburgh to continue her college education at Carnegie Institute of Technology (now Carnegie Mellon University,) and she and Hans met through the Pittsburgh Ski Club. Hans and co-founder, Jodie Moore, met before The Neighborhood Academy opened its doors in 2001. Hans donated \$100 and said, "Let's see how this goes." As the school began to outgrow the rented warehouse space, it presented an opportunity for the Fleischners to invest in its growth.

"Hans picked up very positive vibes from both Jodie and Reverend Tom Johnson. Hans, himself, had a very positive attitude and quickly saw the good in others. We became strong believers in The Neighborhood Academy's mission and vision," Leslie said. "I remember when The Neighborhood Academy introduced sports, we caught word that the students were embarrassed they had to play another school without proper jerseys. Hans and I were happy to purchase the uniforms."

Years later in 2013, through the generosity of the Fleischners, The Neighborhood Academy's indoor soccer field was constructed and named after them.

"We have been fortunate to have the opportunity that when we see something we want to support, we have the supportable funds to do it," said Leslie. "When our grandson was six years old, he would listen to PBS radio. One day they were having a fundraiser, and knowing how Hans and I loved to donate to the arts and education, our grandson called Hans and asked, 'What are you going to do, Bubble?' We then had to make a donation!"

Hans passed away in November of 2021, but Leslie continues their legacy of giving.

"Hans and I loved to see the reaction from the students when we would make a gift impacting them directly. When I'm gone, I can't see their reactions, so it's important for me to give with a warm hand. I encourage everyone to come, take a tour, and meet the students, faculty, and leadership."

MOFFITT'S MARSHMALLOW TOWER

In Ms. Maleita Moffitt's Math Class, students were asked to engineer the highest tower using the least number of resources in 45 minutes using only spaghetti, marshmallows, and wax paper. The towers needed to be constructed with a strong foundation to withstand the weight of the marshmallows. The students learned how to manipulate the resources provided to build their towers. The winning teams were sixth graders: Zosha Nowe, Naier Johnson, and Eric Swan; and seventh graders: Amari Grant and Justin Dyer who all realized that doubling the number of toothpicks helped create a thicker and sturdier structure.



SHARK TANK

In March, ninth grade students spent a week swimming with the sharks. Ms. Jennifer Kane's English class pitched their innovative ideas to a panel of judges from various companies in the Pittsburgh region. While this Shark Tank did not take place in-person, the students still presented virtually via Zoom. Diamond Washington, Josh Freeman, and Carynn Richards all received the top award (\$5,000 in virtual cash) from the judges.

Nathaniel Shelton was a top finisher at Penn Hills Charter School of Entrepreneurship's fourth-annual "Soaring Shark Tank" business pitch competition. Nathaniel's business revolved around an app designed to connect parents to resources and reviews of schools with special-needs services.

LEGACY LEADER: JUDIE COMPHER

'What should I do with this life I've been given?' is what Judie asked herself after suffering an aortic aneurysm at the age of 35. She realized at this young age how precious life truly is. What legacy could she leave with the time she was given?

Judie has used her years to the fullest, serving as Vice President and President of the Board for the Pittsburgh Aids Task Force, being actively involved with Calvary Episcopal Church, and working for H.J. Heinz Company for 34 years. After retiring at the age of 56, Judie went on to earn her Bachelor's Degree in English from Westminster College at the age of 62 (graduating summa cum laude.)

Now-a-days, if it's Thursday, you can bet Judie is at The Neighborhood Academy tutoring students.

Before becoming a regular TNA volunteer, Judie was involved at The Neighborhood Academy during Calvary Episcopal Church and Rodef Shalom Congregation's Mitzvah Days. The Hebrew word "mitzvah" means "good deed," and the day revolves around local volunteer work.

"I was familiar with The Neighborhood Academy. I clearly remember scrubbing lockers during the Mitzvah Day," said Judie. "Not only that, but I am friends with Dr. Beverly Harris Schenz and contributed to her Mary Martin Tinsley (MMT) Scholarship Fund." The MMT Scholarship fund is an endowed scholarship that helps outstanding TNA students in their pursuit of higher education. Judie decided to further her volunteering efforts with TNA back in 2019 after attending The Nancy & Paul O'Neill Speaker Series featuring Mark Whitaker.

"I noticed in the event program that TNA was looking for tutors, and I knew I was ready to commit my time to helping students... plus I was able to put my English degree to good use!" said Judie. Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic halted volunteering soon after the event, but Judie was able to begin her in-person tutoring in September 2021. "When I see the school—the model— and what it does for the students, I'm happy to be a part of it," she continued.

After attending this event, Judie decided it was time to become a member of TNA's Legacy Society to make a long and lasting impact on the school.

"For some time, I have been flirting with the idea of changing my will to add The Neighborhood Academy. Listening to Wes Moore speak and being part of the benefit really sealed the deal for me... My husband, Keen, was a professor at Westminster College, and education meant so much to him... He passed away over three years ago of ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease. This donation will keep Keen's legacy alive by giving others the gift of education."

LEGACY LEADER: SUPERHERO

The latest member of The Neighborhood Academy's Legacy Society is currently employed as an educator in New Jersey. He has had TNA in his DNA since before the school opened its doors in 2001– even from 350 miles away.

> "I knew Reverend Tom Johnson and supported TNA back when it began as a summer program in the basement of Allegheny United Church of Christ on Avery Street in the North Side of Pittsburgh in the 90's. I'm so impressed by today's campus. It's beautifully designed, and the moment I entered it struck me as a place





that fosters a stimulating learning environment of which these students are worthy."

Nikki has a tremendous respect for art, and she loves to dabble in all forms of artistic expression whether it be painting, dancing, drawing, music, or theater. However, her favorite expressive outlet is creative writing.

"I currently have over 30 different stories plotted and planned in my Google Docs. I absolutely love the adventure and fantasy genre stories, and I am fascinated by authors creating different worlds, cultures, and norms," she said.

With this passion for writing, Nikki intends to major in English and minor in Spanish or Korean. "I've chosen to study English because there is so much I can do with it and so many different career paths I can take. I'm deciding between becoming a teacher, a college professor, going into journalism, or even becoming a doctor," said Nikki.




Within these walls, we have experienced both love and heartaches. We grow together, we struggle together; we laugh, we cry. We are a true family.
