


SPRING 2024: PERCENT OF STUDENTS ON TRACK FOR COLLEGE-LEVEL LEARNING





FROM KITCHEN TO CAREER IN THE NKHS CULINARY **ARTS PROGRAM**

t North Kitsap High School, the Career & Technical Education (CTE) Culinary Arts Program is more than just a class. It's a high-energy, hands-on journey where students step into the fast-paced world of professional cooking. Our students start with the basics and work their way up to running a fully licensed restaurant—all while still in high school! Along the way, they earn industry certifications and build skills for a future in food service and hospitality.

As they progress in the program, students sharpen their techniques by learning to operate a commercial kitchen, master food safety, and prepare meals for restaurant service and catered events. They also run the Odin Inn, a student-operated restaurant located next to the North Kitsap Community Pool. We invite you to stop in for lunch and enjoy a freshly prepared meal created by these talented young chefs.

By the time they complete the program, students have earned industry-recognized certifications and valuable experience that can take them straight into culinary careers or further education. Whether they dream of becoming a chef, restaurant manager, or entrepreneur, the NKHS Culinary Arts Program gives them the foundation to succeed.

ngineering students at Kingston
High School don't just learn about
technology, they bring their ideas to life!
Through the Engineering and Robotics
Career & Technical Education (CTE)
pathway, students design, build, and
test real projects, gaining hands-on
experience in robotics, coding, circuitry,
and 3D modeling. These skills prepare
them for future careers in STEM fields.

This pathway can start as early as sixth

grade with the Middle School Robotics program at Kingston Middle School, where students begin exploring robotics through Lego-based programming and design. This early experience builds teamwork, problem-solving, and engineering skills, creating a strong foundation for more advanced learning.


In high school, students take those skills further, working with Arduino microprocessors, 3D modeling software, and circuitry. They design and build remotely operated vehicles (ROVs), applying their knowledge to real-world engineering challenges. Recently,

they put their ROVs to the test at the Port of Kingston, facing challenges like buoyancy, leaks, and the impact saltwater has on their designs. Several successfully navigated the open water, proving their designs worked!

With support from NAVSEA Keyport volunteers, our students tackle real engineering challenges, applying their skills in new and practical ways. Their guidance helps students build confidence and prepare for future careers in engineering, programming, and design.

DELIVERING ON THE 2022 CAPITAL LEVY

Thanks to voter support, the \$35.7 million Capital Levy, approved in 2022, is delivering on the commitments we made to our community. These projects mark the first construction improvements in over 15 years, along with ongoing technology and safety upgrades across our schools.

2024 CAPITAL LEVY: THANK YOU, VOTERS!

Our community continues to invest in our schools and students. In November 2024, voters approved a \$32 million Facilities and Technology Capital Levy to fund safety and security upgrades, program equity, critical repairs, and technology improvements.

Planning is well underway, with input from school staff, families, and the community helping shape these improvements.

SUQUAMISH ELEMENTARY GYMNASIUM

The gymnasium addition opened at the end of January 2025 and provides 4,200 square feet of dedicated space designed to meet the physical activity needs of both students and the community.



POULSBO MIDDLE SCHOOL EXPANSION

The expansion officially opened the first week of January 2025, providing students and staff with modern, collaborative learning spaces designed to enhance education for years to come.



DAVID WOLFLE ELEMENTARY GYMNASIUM

The 4,200 gym expansion broke ground in September, and the construction team is making great progress. The new gym building is set to open in this spring.



Our Facilities Advisory Committee

Formed in March 2024, the Facilities Advisory Committee (FAC) is a dedicated group of community members, parents, and staff working to ensure NKSD's schools are safe, well-maintained, and prepared for the future. They meet regularly, visit school facilities, and study data to develop both short- and long-term facility recommendations.


