

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

In June of 2023, the Avonworth School District broke ground on a construction project on the district's secondary campus. This project became necessary to address the district's growing enrollment, which has increased 14% from 2004 to 2014 and another 25% from 2014 to today. Currently, the secondary building houses grades 7-12. The project will address space issues at the secondary campus by adding high school and middle school classrooms. Additionally, a new administrative addition is being added to create one main entrance for the middle/high school as opposed to the two separate entrances the building had in the past. Lastly, once completed, the increased space in the secondary building will allow us to bring our sixth-grade students back to the secondary campus, which opens up space at Avonworth Elementary School.






During the summer of 2023, the first phase of the project was completed, which included the following:

- · Technology Office
- Three smaller classroom/office spaces
- Seven new classroom spaces
- New library with three study rooms

After the start of the school year, the project shifted to classroom renovations, construction of the new middle/high school administrative addition, new bathrooms in the back hallway of the high school, and foundation work for the two-story middle school addition.

The project continues to progress on its scheduled timeline. Early January brought a significant milestone in the project timeline with the opening of the new administrative addition. This addition includes the new main entrance to the middle/high school, the main office for the middle/high

school, administrative offices, the athletic director's office, a nursing suite, and a counseling suite. The new administrative addition opened on January 16, 2024.

As the project continues into the second half of the 2023-2024 school year, classroom renovations continue in the high school, and the erection of steel for the middle school addition is getting close to completion. We are excited to see the middle school addition begin to take shape when it gets to having a roof and construction begins on the inside.

Once the school year is completed, a lot of work is scheduled for completion over the summer. In addition to the continued construction of the middle school addition, all of the site work on the outside of the building and the renovation of the commons/cafeteria areas will be completed before students return on September 3, 2024. The substantial completion date for the project is December 18, 2024.

SCHOOL SAFETY UPDATE

The safety of our students and staff is a priority at Avonworth School District.

The district is fortunate to have a positive and collaborative relationship with the Ohio Township Police Department (OTPD), the Ohio Township Fire Department (OTFD), and other local municipality support. Corporal Chris Simcoviak continues to serve as our full-time School Resource Officer (SRO). This is made possible through a Memorandum of Understanding between the district and the Ohio Township Police Department.

Starting this school year, the district has contracted with Gittings Protective Security Inc. for additional after-school hours security. They provide the district with a security guard on the secondary campus during evening hours.

Proactively approaching safety is the best way to maintain a safe environment. We work hard to find ways to be proactive in identifying students and families in need of assistance. We do this by utilizing all available resources. Forging relationships between students, parents, teachers, staff, and administration is paramount to maintaining a supportive culture. The school fosters this through mentoring programs, advisory, and connections programs. The district aims for all students to have a go-to adult in their school. A team approach allows adults to become aware of student needs and proactively address them.

An additional proactive measure taken beginning in the 2023-2024 school year has been closing the secondary campus, including Lenzner Field/Track, to the community during the school day. This decision was made to ensure the safety of staff and students. During the school day, outdoor spaces, including Lenzner Stadium, are utilized as extensions of the classroom. We appreciate the help of the school community by remaining off of the secondary campus and not using Lenzner Field/Track during the school day. Thank you for your cooperation.

The Avonworth School District also continues to ensure measures are in place to meet the mental health needs of our students. Funding from the various school safety grants has allowed the district to enhance these systems. These funds supported hiring additional mental health support, including a licensed professional counselor and social worker. Each school building has a full-time, highly qualified school counselor on-site. Our school counselors provide numerous support to our students, including classroom lessons, individual consultation, and group support. Our counselors are also critical components of each building's Student Assistance Program teams, which seek to connect students and families with additional support.

The Safe2Say Something (S2SS) anonymous reporting system runs effectively throughout the district. Safe2Say Something is a school safety program that teaches students, educators, and administrators to recognize the signs and signals of individuals who may be at risk of hurting themselves or others. Safe2Say is also an anonymous reporting system. Anyone can make a report through the Safe2Say app, website, or 24/7 Crisis Center Hotline. All staff and students have been provided an orientation on the Safe2Say Something reporting system and a link to the Safe2Say Something reporting system is available on the district website.

Additionally, Avonworth School District staff have participated in various safety-related training. Listed below are some of the training staff members have received to prepare them to provide a safe environment and respond in case of emergencies:

- A.L.I.C.E (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate)
- Nonviolent Crisis Intervention
- Stop the Bleed
- NARCAN Opioid Overdose Treatment
- Training from the Association of Threat Assessment Professionals
- Managing Bias in Threat Assessment
- Food Allergies/ Anaphylaxis/Diabetes





"MORE ACCEPTED, MORE EMPOWERED, AND MORE VALUED" AVONWORTH SCHOOL DISTRICT

AVONWORTH SCHOOL DISTRICT CREATES CLASSROOMS FOR ALL

In any other district, she might have been forgotten. Neither ahead of her peers nor behind them, neither extra-outspoken nor ultra-withdrawn,

she might have floated through school unnoticed, her strengths unrecognized and her needs unmet.

But not in the Avonworth School District, and not in Katie Libbon's fourth-grade classroom.

It was there that the student first took the RIASEC, a science-backed assessment of her talents and interests. Designed to point her toward possible career paths, the survey told her something valuable — namely, that she was artistic, creative, and had plenty to offer the world.

And one day, during a group project in Libbon's classroom, the student decided to share it. "She made a suggestion to her group. Just one little suggestion about how the project should look," Libbon recalls. "And all of a sudden, she became the go-to girl for her peers. They started coming to her for all things artistic, asking, 'What do you think about this? What do you think about that?' And my jaw dropped, because it was just so lovely to see."

It's the kind of classroom every student deserves, says
Superintendent Jeff Hadley: a place to discover, develop, and assert one's unique self. The fourth-grader in Libbon's classroom "now feels more accepted, more empowered, and more valued than she did before," he says. "And that's a great example of how we create safer, more equitable environments" in the Avonworth School District.

The drive to build those environments led Hadley and his colleagues to join the Western Pennsylvania Learning 2025 Alliance, a regional cohort of school districts working together — and with peers around the country — to create student-centered, equity-focused, future-driven schools that prepare every learner for tomorrow.

"Right now, technology is moving faster than ever before," says Hadley. "And it's moving slower today than it will for the rest of our lives. We need to think about what that means for our kids. How can we, as educators, better equip them for the future?"

In Avonworth, one answer is World of Work, a framework that builds on the district's renowned career-exploration program. Using the RIASEC survey, World of Work helps kids discover their unique personalities and skill sets: Realistic, Investigative, Artistic, Social, Enterprising, and Conventional. Equipped with newfound self-knowledge, students explore careers that match their strengths through classroom projects, hands-on experiences, and visits from real-world professionals.

First developed by the Cajon Valley School District near San Diego, Avonworth and a coalition of other districts from the Western Pennsylvania Learning 2025 Alliance

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have brought World of Work to the Pittsburgh region, tailoring the framework to the dreams and needs of local students, including the budding young artist in Katie Libbon's classroom.

"The first time I saw [World of Work] in action, it was like something inside me woke up," says Libbon.
"I thought, 'This is it. This is the direction we need to go. This is why kids come to school: for their futures."

Fellow fourth-grade teacher Jessica Kostewicz agrees. "Every year, we do a science unit that asks students to design a house," she says. "The kids figure out the wiring, take measurements for the flooring, work on the design, and everything else needed for the model house. And usually, when they do a project like that, they want to work with their friends."


But with World of Work, "They're coming up to me and saying, 'Mrs. Kostewicz, we have someone who's

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really good at math. They can help with the cost analysis. Now, we need someone who's artistic to help with interior design.' It's so authentic — they get the connection between their lives and what they're learning." Perhaps most importantly, "They start to see themselves as more than just fourth-graders."

The result is excitement, engagement, and an eagerness for more. Though it's still in the pilot phase, Avonworth's fourth-graders have already spoken about World of Work to the district's school board, giving them a taste of civic life and an opportunity to advocate for themselves and their peers.

To Hadley, that's the real value of programs like World of Work. "When we think about what it means to be future-ready, of course we think about work skills and possible jobs," he says. "But being future-ready requires much more than that. It requires students to be citizens. It requires the confidence, tools, and virtues to succeed in a changing world. That's how we'll prepare our kids for tomorrow — whatever tomorrow might bring."











Nation's First Wisdom Squads Meet at Avonworth Primary Center

It was an exciting day at Avonworth Primary Center in January 2023 when more than 100 students from schools throughout Allegheny County came together for a Pittsburgh Wisdom Corridor event!

Each school has created (or is creating) their own "Wisdom Corridor" filled with wisdom found within their own school community thanks to the generous support of the Grable Foundation and Project FUEL.

Thank you to Deepak Ramola, founder of Project FUEL, and Remake Learning for supporting our students as they work together to bring this incredible project to life.

First Hand Experience

On May 23, 2023, forty 8th grade ELA Civics students traveled to the Allegheny County Courthouse to experience the Judicial Branch firsthand!

Students completed a writing assignment in order to be eligible for this enrichment field trip to learn more about our criminal court system. After passing through security, students met with police officers and police dogs from the Allegheny County Sheriff's Office K9 unit.

Then, students were escorted to several different courtrooms to observe real criminal trials.

Common Pleas Judge Beth Lazzara, as well as lawyers from the district attorney's office and a public defender, also took time to talk directly to students visiting their courtroom. Students had previously learned about courtroom procedures and terminology in their ELA Civics classes, but now were able to observe them in action.

After two hours of courtroom drama, students enjoyed lunch (and some ice cream) in the historic Strip District before returning to school.





Sophomore Wins State Championship in Newspaper Writing at Penn State

Sophomore Emma Noss competed at the PA School Press state championship on March 30th, 2023 alongside nearly 100 of the best high school journalists from across Pennsylvania. Competing against a number of juniors and seniors, Emma was able to earn top marks and bring a state championship back to The Avonews for the first time since 2018. Junior Zion Schenk also attended, competing in the Literary Magazine Poetry competition, and earned a top six finish in the state.

Students attended a press conference with a graduating senior who wore the Nittany Lion mascot costume the last three years, asked questions, took detailed notes, and then completed a 300 word newspaper story in one hour.

Student Earns National Academic Honors

Congratulations to our own Breanna McNeil, who was one of 62,000 students from across the country to earn academic honors from the College Board's National Recognition Program! She is awarded the National Hispanic Recognition Award.

These National Recognition Programs grant underrepresented students with academic honors that can be included on college and scholarship applications and connect students with universities across the country, helping them stand out during the admissions process. Colleges and scholarship programs use these honors to identify students from underrepresented groups through College Board's Student Search Service.





Prestigious Award Recipient

One of Avonworth High School's English language learners, Nolvin Buezo Gutierrez, won the prestigious Luminari Award, a merit-based scholarship for students who are in grades 7 to 11.

Two winners are selected based on essay submissions. Nolvin placed first in the competition. He received an all-expense-paid admission to Luminari's I Want to be an Ambassador! Camp. The scholarship has a value of \$1,200.

This camp was a unique opportunity for Nolvin and the other participants to travel to Washington D.C. where he engaged first hand with ambassadors and foreign diplomats. Before departing, he prepared, here in Pittsburgh, with major business leaders and educators who taught him the skills necessary to master the art of diplomacy.

Nolvin's winning essay reflects the fact that he is a thoughtful person, who is already demonstrating great diplomacy skills in his daily life. The camp was a seven day program that took place in June 2023.

The Beattie Road Show

The "Beattie Road Show" visited Avonworth in early February, 2023!

Students in the 8th grade spent the day learning about programs offered at A.W. Beattie Career Center. Students rotated through 5 programs: Emergency Response, Cosmetology, Health & Nursing Sciences, and Sports Medicine, and heard a talk about Aero Engineering and Drone Piloting.



JA Biz Town Brings Real Life Lessons

For six weeks, fifth-grade students had the opportunity to discover and investigate career readiness through a program from Junior Achievement called JA BizTown.

JA BizTown encompasses important aspects of work readiness, entrepreneurship, and financial literacy, providing students with a solid foundation in business, economics, and free enterprise education.

The culminating activity required students to work in a simulated environment called BizTown. Students explored their own strengths and interests, applied for a job, experienced the interview process, and on March 1st and 2nd, 2023, worked with other students to operate the business they were assigned.



Teacher Receives Statewide Award

Congratulations to Avonworth's 6th grade math teacher Melissa Costantino-Poruben for being a 2022 Pennsylvania state finalist for the Presidential Awards for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST)

This award is one of the highest honors bestowed by the United States government specifically for K-12 science, technology, engineering, and mathematics teaching. PAEMST was established by Congress in 1983.

Mrs. Constantino-Poruben (pictured here with the Secretary of Education) traveled to Harrisburg for a celebration and to receive the award. She is a four time state finalist.



Fifth Graders Visit the Past

In October 2023, the fifth grade visited Meadowcroft Village to build their knowledge of life in both a 19th-century and a Native American village. In the 19th-century village, students experienced life in the past at a one-room schoolhouse, a blacksmith shop, and a log cabin.

While in the Native American Village, they tried their hand at using an atlatl. We learned about how, in the Monongahela culture, they used all of the gifts of the land. This field trip tied in perfectly with our ELA and Social Studies curriculum.



#BeTheKindKid Campaign Makes a Difference

Avonworth Primary Center celebrated National Food Bank Day by creating birthday cake boxes for the Mt. Nebo Church Food Bank. It's part of the #bethekindkid kindness campaign at school.

Students in classrooms worked together to create the kit which had ingredients to make a birthday cake and party items.



Experience Workshops

In November 2023, 8th Grade Civics students spent a day honoring our nation's veterans by attending the annual Veterans Day Experience Workshop at the Heinz History Center. Twenty-eight students developed questions to ask veterans prior to their field trip to gain eligibility for this unique experience.

At the History Center, veterans from Iraq, Vietnam, Korea, and World War II answered students' questions, shared personal stories, and brought artifacts from their time in the military. Students met in small groups to have more personal interactions with each veteran and learned about their remarkable stories. The heroic actions of these individuals were an inspiration to both students and teachers.



Veterans in attendance included: Lee Wagner (Iraq), Dave Borland (Korea), Larry Woods (Vietnam), Warren Goss (World War II), and former Avonworth teacher, Bob Taylor (World War II - Homefront).

Reimagining Education

The Avonworth School District is proud to be a part of the Western Pennsylvania Learning 2025 Alliance, a cohort of 34 public school districts, that advances student-centered, equity-focused, future-driven school systems that prepare every learner for tomorrow.



Co-led by Pittsburgh-area superintendents and AASA, the School Superintendents Association, the Alliance convenes for workshops and professional development facilitated by world-class experts. With support from The Grable Foundation, these 34 districts are reimagining education and showing the world what school could be.

Academic Excellence

Avonworth Middle School has been re-designated for the fifth time as a Pennsylvania Association for Middle Level Education Don Eichhorn Schools to Watch 2023-24. They are one of 11 in the state this year.



This is part of a recognition program developed by the National Forum to Accelerate Middle-Grades Reform. PA Schools to Watch leaders selected the schools for academic excellence, developmental responsiveness, social equity, and organizational structure and processes. Each school was also noted to have strong leadership, teachers who work together to improve curriculum and instruction, and a commitment to assessment and accountability to bring about continuous improvement.



Lady 'Lopes Win Big

Congratulations to the Lady 'Lopes basketball team for clinching the 2023 WPIAL Championship for the first time since 2005! They beat No. 2 Laurel Highlands with a 48-40 victory on Friday March 3rd in an aggressive matchup at Pitt's Petersen Events Center. This is only the 7th WPIAL Championship in Avonworth history.

Boys' Golf Sees Success

In Fall 2023, Boys' Golf clinched the WPIAL AAA Section 5 title for the second year in a row. The title was secured against Beaver Area High School with a 203-214 win. The team has recorded an impressive +6 over par as a team three times this season, with Sam Neal becoming the 3rd player on the team to have 3 rounds under-par this season, along with Brandon Sapolsky and Kai Carlson. In addition, the team has had 5 players score in the 30's twice this year, making these feats firsts in our program history. Kai Carlson and Brandon Sapolsky both earned bids to the WPIAL AAA Individual Championships.





Volleyball Wins Section Title

For the first time since 2015, the girls volleyball team earned the section title with a win over Freedom. Congratulations girls!



Girls Soccer Celebrates Historic Championship


Congratulations to our 2A WPIAL Champion Girls' Soccer team, as they captured their third overall WPIAL title on Saturday, November 4th against Shadyside Academy. This win puts the 'Lopes in the company of only two other Avonworth programs to have won at least 3 WPIAL titles (Girls' Basketball (5) and Softball (3)) and only the second team in school history to earn a 3-peat (Girls' Basketball – 1992, 1993, 1994).

Avonworth became the 5th ever girls' soccer program in the WPIAL to achieve a 3-peat, joining the ranks of programs like Mars, South Park, Sewickley Academy, and Mt. Lebanon.

'Lopes Baseball has Great Season

The baseball team clinched a Section Title in spring 2023 and made their way into the PIAA Semi-Final game for the second year in a row. The team suffered a tough loss to Neshannock in extra innings at Pullman Park, but had an impressive win in the WPIAL Consolation game against East Allegheny (9-1).


Congratulations to Rowan Carmichael on achieving 1,000 career points!

Coordinator for Hello Neighbor. And, Jia Li and Ahmad Yousofzay shared their own immigration stories as well. Additionally, in partnership with Teen Screen, students viewed two short films about the US-Mexico border crisis and a feature-length documentary about a Syrian Refugee camp.

We were also fortunate to host two veterans from Joseph D. Caskey American Legion Post 80 in the North Hills. Eber Tripp (Finance Officer) and Paul Kennedy (Alternate NEC for Department of Pennsylvania) talked with students about the US Flag, its history and meaning, as well as the importance of citizenship in this country. Then, students joined the veterans outside for a lesson on proper flag folding techniques and a demonstration of a flag retirement ceremony.






Honoring Our Veterans
