This plan is being used by Burlingame High School for meeting the following ESSA planning requirements in alignment with the LCAP and other federal, state, and local programs:

Schoolwide Program

Burlingame High School is celebrating 100 years of serving students with academic excellence and strong community relations. BHS is one of six comprehensive high schools in the San Mateo Union High School District, which is open enrollment. Approximately 1500 students come to us from the entire district boundary area, having attended thirteen different feeder schools, both public and private. Students are served by 83 credentialed personnel. Burlingame High School offers a broad curriculum to support students as they explore academic, personal and career goals. In addition to college preparatory classes, BHS offers over 18 open access advanced placement courses, two honors courses, three two year CTE pathways and visual and performing arts as well as other elective offerings. Special programs include AVID, Leadership and Service Commission while academic support offerings such as guided studies are also in place. BHS utilizes a Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) consisting of a three-level approach in supporting students academically, behaviorally, emotionally, and socially.

Burlingame High School has aligned the School Plan for Students Achievement (SPSA) with the WASC self-study goals established in Fall of 2023. This plan includes Equity and Achievement for all students; Professional Development and Growth; Behavior and Wellness Program Implementation and Communication; and a more Inclusive and Inspiring program. Burlingame High School strives to support all students to become proficient in English and reach high academic standards in reading/language arts and mathematics. Our AVID program supports first generation students with developing the of skills and knowledge needed to be successful academically at BHS and beyond through providing relevant study skills, college tours, mock interviews, and college/career research opportunities. Many of the teachers at BHS participate in professional development activities sponsored by the district, including Constructing Meaning (CM), and Universal Design for Learning (UDL). Additionally, the Burlingame High School Family Engagement Coordinator works to promote parent, family, and community engagements in the education of English Learners. Our FEC works closely with our ELAC and Latino Parent Groups to support student learning and parent needs; our FEC works closely with FECs and follows district directives to meet goals and initiatives. Parents who attend the ELAC and LPG meetings on a monthly basis are well-informed of the EL program at BHS and receive customized trainings in small groups in the areas of testing, college application and admission, graduation requirements, scholarship, and financial aid.

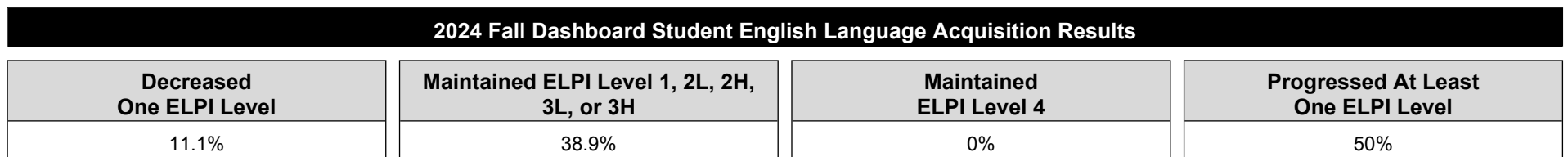

3. Be based on a school-level needs assessment (*Sections: Goal, Major Student Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Annual Review and Update, as applicable*); and
4. Identify resource inequities, which may include a review of LEA- and school-level budgeting, to be addressed through implementation of the CSI plan (*Sections: Goal, Major Student Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Planned Strategies/Activities; and Annual Review and Update, as applicable*).

Authority Cited: Sections 1003(e)(1)(A), 1003(i), 1111(c)(4)(B), and 1111(d)(1) of the ESSA.

Single School Districts and Charter Schools Eligible for ESSA School Improvement

Single school districts (SSDs) or charter schools that are eligible for CSI, TSI, or ATSI, shall develop a SPSA that addresses the applicable requirements above as a condition of receiving funds (*EC Section 64001[a]*) as amended by Assembly Bill 716, effective January 1, 2019).

However, a SSD or a charter school may streamline the process by combining state and federal requirements into one document which may include the LCAP and all federal planning requirements, provided that the combined plan is able to demonstrate that the legal requirements for each of the plans is met (*EC* Section 52062[a] as amended by AB 716, effective January 1, 2019).

Planning requirements for single school districts and charter schools choosing to exercise this option are available in the LCAP Instructions.

Additional Targeted Support and Improvement

A school eligible for ATSI shall:

1. Identify resource inequities, which may include a review of LEA- and school-level budgeting, which will be addressed through implementation of its TSI plan (*Sections: Goal, Major Student Need, Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes, Planned Strategies/Activities, and Annual Review and Update, as applicable*).

Single School Districts and Charter Schools Eligible for ESSA School Improvement

Single school districts (SSDs) or charter schools that are eligible for CSI, TSI, or ATSI, shall develop a SPSA that addresses the applicable requirements above as a condition of receiving funds (*EC Section 64001[a]* as amended by Assembly Bill [AB] 716, effective January 1, 2019).

However, a SSD or a charter school may streamline the process by combining state and federal requirements into one document which may include the local control and accountability plan (LCAP) and all federal planning requirements, provided that the combined plan is able to demonstrate that the legal requirements for each of the plans is met (*EC Section 52062[a]* as amended by AB 716, effective January 1, 2019).
