Widening Our World fund unlocks opportunities

four types of funding available are: 1) payment of tuition and costs for student attending a non-district program, 2) travel and costs for a student of a summer intern or job program, 3) payment of stipend and/or travel expenses to bring a spokesperson to a classroom or school, and 4) assist with group costs of travel and attendance to a non-school program on an individual basis.

Are you wondering if an opportunity in your area of interest would be accepted for funding? Put in an application and find out. The board has diverse criteria for what it will approve, and scholarships have been awarded for a variety of programs. Part of the approval is made based on what personal growth and positive life experiences might benefit the individual. One recipient took acting classes in New York, and another traveled to Spain to play softball. The applica-

There are countless opportunities out there for students to expand their cultural, technical, and creative knowledge. The challenge that arises with any worthwhile endeavor is, of course, the cost. Time invested and the collateral cost to those in your personal orbit are constant hurdles, but one of the single-biggest barriers to entry is the financial expense. More often than not, these programs and experiences come with a moderate-to-heavy price tag, dissuading interested parties from following through on application. The Widening Our World (W.O.W.) funding program at Chequamegon School District offers a financial cushion for aspiring individuals to take a leap forward in their learning and growing.

The W.O.W. fund comes from a variety of sources and is entrusted to a board comprised of community and school staff members. The board's purpose is to review applications for



funding as well as solicit donations from altruistic parties to maintain and expand the fund. While the program doesn't cover the full cost of the opportunity it goes to support, it will aid families by lightening the financial burden. The








National Tell-a-Fairy Tale Day By CALLIE PETROSKI


Chequamegon Middle School World Culture Club highlights By TRACY KNUTSON

On March 28th instrumentalists performed before state-certified judges at the annual Marawood North District Solo and Ensemble Festival which took place at the Chequamegon High School.



Tracy Lake Ruffed Grouse Project update

The Tracy Lake habitat management project to improve ruffed grouse populations continues to develop. I created a formal project proposal which was sent to community members and people involved in school forest work from previous years for their review. I received positive feedback and additional collaborators.

The plan for this project constantly evolves. After a field meeting with local foresters, a wild-life biologist, and a botanist, we mutually agreed that we could improve and maintain one wildlife opening this spring, which is our timeline. The opening will be mowed, raked, and reseeded with a native seed mix and grass plugs. The opening will also be extended lengthwise by using brush saws to reduce understory brush and chain saws to cut trees.

This has been an engaging growth experience. I've learned how to network and collaborate. I've grown my formal writing skills and knowledge about planting for habitat improvement.
