




Bryan Webb (11) a receiver, grabs the ball and runs for a touch down. The studentbody goes wild!

Touchdowns were made by Jeremy White (12) and Bryan Webb (11). Way to go.


The studentbody and the cheerleaders never quit cheering and changing "we love our team." School spirit was shown all night and it never died down.






Nancy Jewkes (11) and Matt Lott (11) take advantage of the Homecoming activities and watch "Princess Bride" in the gym.

These students showed their Homecoming spirit by really getting into the mud volleyball game, or at least into the mud.






All in all the dance was a success. For most, this will be a night to remember.










There are many parts out there, there is always someone who gets to ride on their high horse for awhile. But it always comes down to one question. Did you get your part?







Wasn't it great to have just a few more choices of winter activities to participate in this year?









In addition to the jitterbug sequence, scores of new lines were added in writing the play, based on the stories of L.



Now we have something new to cheer about. The Washington Redskins victorious win over Buffalo Bills in Super Bowl XVI.




"I love the Senior class. My position is excellent for working with people and getting to know them. I love being involved and getting others involved also.



















It was observed that he became very upset with the counselors and the prinhis class while he was on vacation. It was concluded that his blood pressure went up considerably.




vided aid to the homeless. The Marching Band livened up local parades and entertained the football crowd through its many performances. They honored the armed forces and aroused the patriotism of the stu-



One area is dedication to practice long hours to perfect the pieces to your own expecta-


tions. The time amounts may differ from person to person, but what matters is that each person gives their all to the good of the performance.


Yearbook begins in the summer with the editors and photographers meeting at USU for a planning and training camp. Also during the summer seniors portraits begin. Once school has started the staff begins the long and laborious task of choosing a theme that best depicts the year. Once the theme is chosen

For each staffer there are a series of deadlines that must be met, they are; photo, layout, copy, and final. For the photo deadline each staffer must assign all of the photos for their two consecutive pages called a spread. After that they must copy the design of their spread, called a layout. When this is done they write the feature story, called copy. When the photos are back, everything is finalized, and reviewed by the editors it is sent to the Herff Jones plant for immediate production.

However, yearbook is much more than wandering the halls searching for quotes, staying up all night hovering over a typewriter trying to finish for a final deadline, or coming to school on Sat. to print photos. It is a chance to be able to record the year as it happens a chance to pause for a moment and reflect on the year as you record it.






They also have many parties throughout the vear for those who are involved.


The Math Club requires you to show great interest and success in math. They also have fun parties and socials.






