






## THE POLARIS

The Parents' Day was the greatest achievement this year. The theme of the organization was carried out throughout the day and that evening the grand finale was the successful dance centered around the theme.









### Junior Pep Club


The threefold purpose of the Junior Pep Club is: To create school spirit in all activities, to uphold ideals of school, and to create a feeling of friendship and unity among girls.




MAN ON THE FLYING TRAPEZE




