

"ALL THE WORLD'S A STAGE"

All the world's a stage, And all the men and women merely players: They have their exits and their entrances; And one man in his time plays many parts.

Shakespeare wrote this statement, concisely summarizing the entire pattern of mankind; and no person can ever escape this inevitable stage of life. The curtain opens on the day of birth and the individual's part in the play begins - maybe in the maternity ward of the hospital, a room in a nursery home, or a humble stable. The actor first appears as an innocent infant in his mother's arms; but soon develops into a mysterious child with an inquisitive mind and absurd actions. The youngster quickly picks up the cue lines from his older fellow stars and is promoted to the curious role of the adolescent. The dramatis personae dislikes dissociating with his part of youth; but his more mature attitudes of life and his adult physical features force him to play the role of the soldier, the husband, the worker, and the father. For fifty years he proudly struts across the stage, with the vigor and health of one young at heart, body, and mind; but one day while the aging actor attempts a rugged, masculine part, he becomes vividly aware of his weakening strength. The hours creep into days, the days into months, and the months into years, until one brisk winter morning his leading lady wakes to find the curtain closed on the life of the performer and the world applauding his great or simple deeds and accomplishments.

Of all the repertoire in the drama of living the high school student is most concerned with his role of youth. He has mastered the childish task of tying his shoe laces and his mother doesn't have to remind him to wash behind his ears very often. The schoolboy hasn't yet been bothered with plucking a few stray silver strands of hair from his blond beta cut. He isn't worried about retirement checks or whether or not the family will be together for Thanksgiving; and he can't be troubled with establishing an explicit affiliation with modern adult society. The adolescent's role, however, is a difficult one, crowded with many arduous and emotional scenes which must be vanquished before enjoyable living can be attained. Youth is constantly attempting to achieve success in his or her masculine or feminine role, in emotional and economic independence, in preparing for an occupation and marriage, in developing intellectual skills, and in acquiring a set of values and an ethical system as a guide to behavior.




ADMINISTRATION










STUDENTBODY OFFICERS


POLARIS STAFF



Approximately two weeks before one issue of the school newspaper, "The Norcachian," was to be released Maxine called her staff together and calmly informed them that they were again behind schedule. After expressing her feelings about the situation, she proceeded to outline the topics that were to be included in the next issue. The thoroughly confused page editors vigorously debated whether or not the topics were classified as "editorial," "feature," or "sports." 


ACTIVITIES II

HANDBOOK EDITORS






LIGHT-STAGE CREW


