



Trudge, trudge, trudge, Norcachians pace the miles





Joyce Jenkins Secretary



program. (8.) Special duties. Both counselors felt that North Cache is an average school in the need for counseling and both counselors enjoy the work very much. Mr. Hendricks states, "Counseling encourages all students to attempt to understand themselves and their ability and interests and to seek occupational educational goals. Which would be compatible with these abilities and thus satisfying to themselves."

The counselor influences the students he deal with more than any other faculty member. He finds himself cast as advisor, father-confessor and guide. He needs every ounce of patience, psychology, understanding, and skill that his background and training can provide. He is a dealer in human hope and despair, in the promise of the future.

Faculty members are the backbone of school life. They

are, to a great extent, responsible for the type of education their students receive. A teacher's personality permeates the classroom; the success of that knowledge depends a great deal upon his own knowledge, enthusiasm, and ability. His influence can change a student for better or worse.

Faculty memebrs must also be responsible for unity and co-operation among themselves. They must present the best possible example of tolerance, character, and understanding. The students watch and remember all to well. If faculty members do so, the "old vesper bell" will not sound nearly so sweet to their grateful students, as does the school bell.

chapter Sweetheart and then anticipated the best results for her in the state competition.




Key Club





Every fall the gridiron is filled with football players, toughening up for this football season. These boys, built like stone walls, plow the other teams under, and come barreling through like tanks.


The winter welcomed in our fast shooting, double dealing, basketball team. These boys slipped in and out,
