We hope you'll join us for a wonderful evening of music and history!

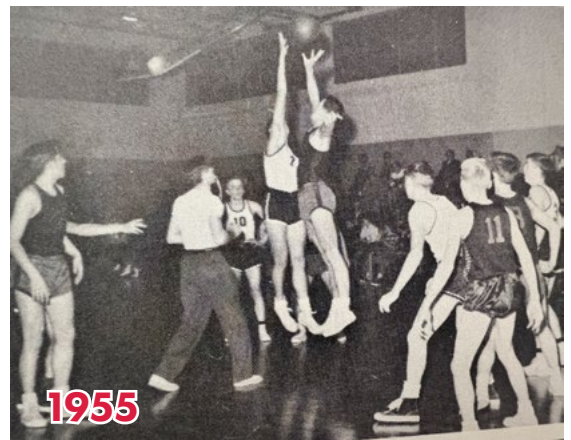

NEW BOWLING TEAM

With a roll of a ball across the hardwood, the Pal-Mac Varsity Bowling teams entered the history books. The Red Raider girls and boys teams began their first season in decades in December 2024.

Home matches were held at Doug Kent's Rose Bowl Lanes, which is owned by 1985 Pal-Mac graduate Doug Kent, a former professional bowler in his own right. The program sent its entire girls team to Sectionals, while Timmy Batterby and Jacob Naugle represented the boys.

The team itself was the result of lots of planning. Pal-Mac offered a Varsity Girls and Boys team in the 60s and early 70s, but hadn't fielded an official team since.

"Bowling is always fun," 7th grader Nora Rowe said. "You can make new friends, and you can also learn a new skill."

The new bowling program was part of the 2024-2025 school budget, which was passed by voters in May 2024.



The District welcomed Village of Palmyra Police Officer **Tim Bryant** as its first-ever School Resource Officer (SRO). Officer Bryant spent time in each building and built connections with students and staff.

PAL-MAC NAMED A TOP WORKPLACE IN ROCHESTER

The Pal-Mac School District was named one of Rochester's Top Workplaces by the Democrat and Chronicle and USA Today.

It ranked fourth among large companies in the region, one of 57 total companies honored. The award is based on an annual employee survey which evaluates categories such as employee engagement and job satisfaction.

This marked the fifth time Pal-Mac has received the honor since 2015.

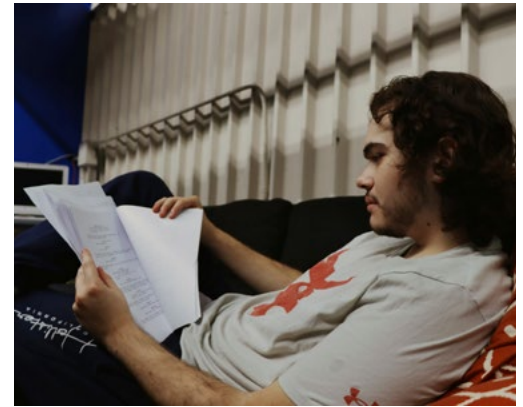
ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Their story was featured by every local TV station!



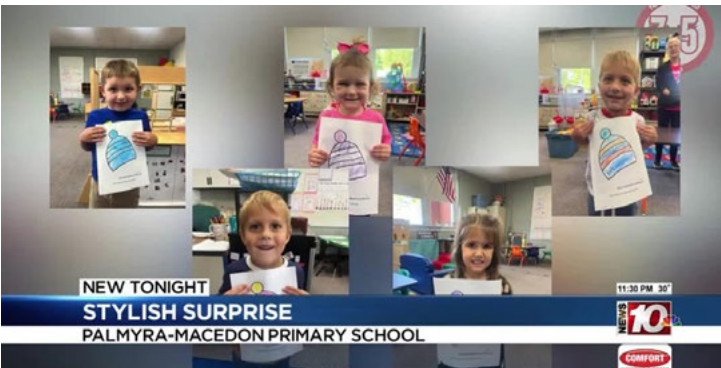
PAL-MAC BASKETBALL HOSTS UNIQUE HOLIDAY TRADITION

He loves to draw and make comics, so he asked Principal Check about starting a zone, and she approved!

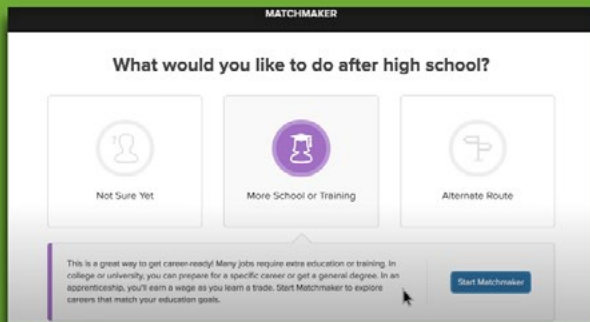
Westin said he hopes the zone can be a space for people who not only like to draw, but also to help themselves feel better if they're having a hard day.

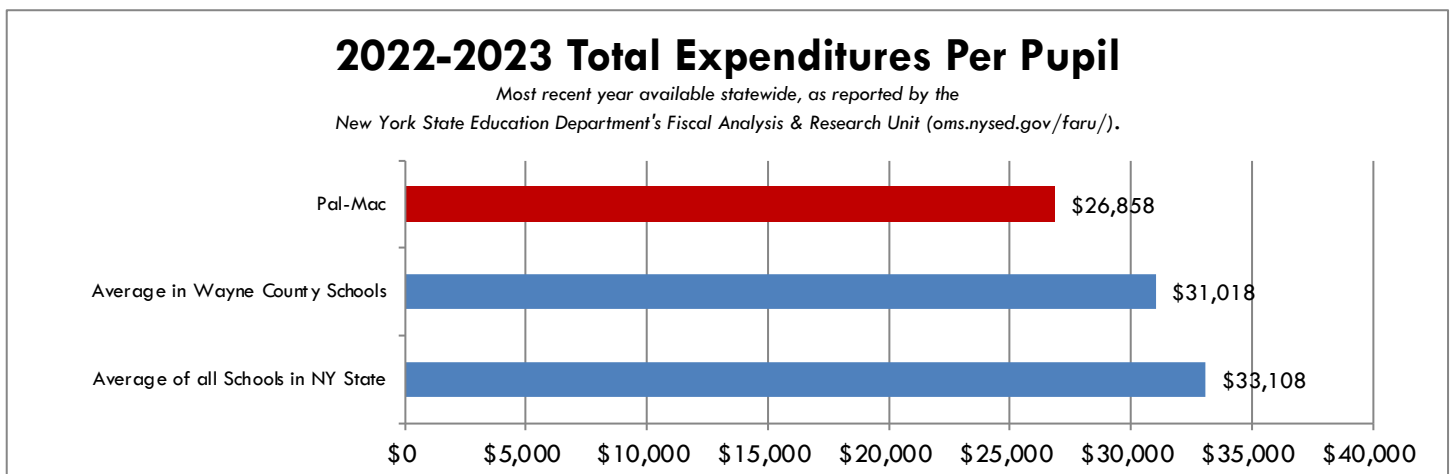
Revenue Sources

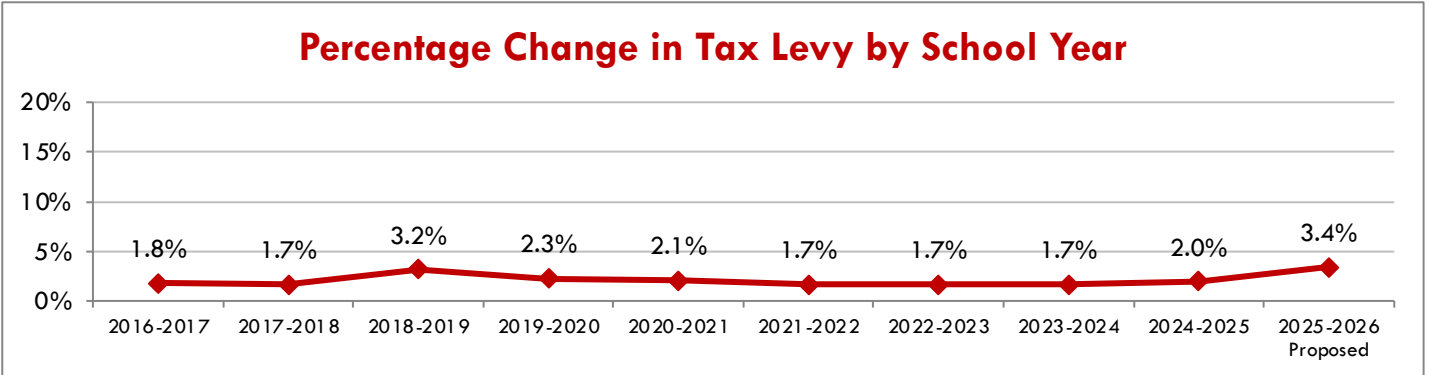
Expenditures Per Pupil

The New York State Education Department’s School Report Cards provide comparative information on a range of school performance indicators including exam scores, graduation rates, and fiscal accountability. The most recent School Report Cards are available at data.nysed.gov. As the expenditure per pupil graph below shows, Palmyra-Macedon continues to provide the quality academic, athletic, and extracurricular programs the community has come to expect at a cost that compares favorably to other schools.



School Tax Levy & Rate

The proposed budget would require a 3.4% increase in the school tax levy, which is less than the district’s allowable 2025-2026 Tax Levy Limit increase of 4.2%. The projected true value tax rate is estimated not to exceed \$18.99 per \$1,000 of property value. Actual tax rates by town are dependent on assessments and State equalization rates which will be finalized this summer.



The **Tax Levy** is the total amount of taxes collected by the school district in a given year. The proposed budget would require a 2025-2026 tax levy of \$21,929,000 — a 3.4% increase from the 2024-2025 tax levy. The proposed tax is less than the school tax levy limit. Tax bill changes greater or less than 3.4% are a function of assessments and equalization rates.

Your town’s **Tax Rate** is calculated in August in order to distribute the levy uniformly among all properties in the school district. Tax rates vary by town and may be higher or lower than the true value tax rate.

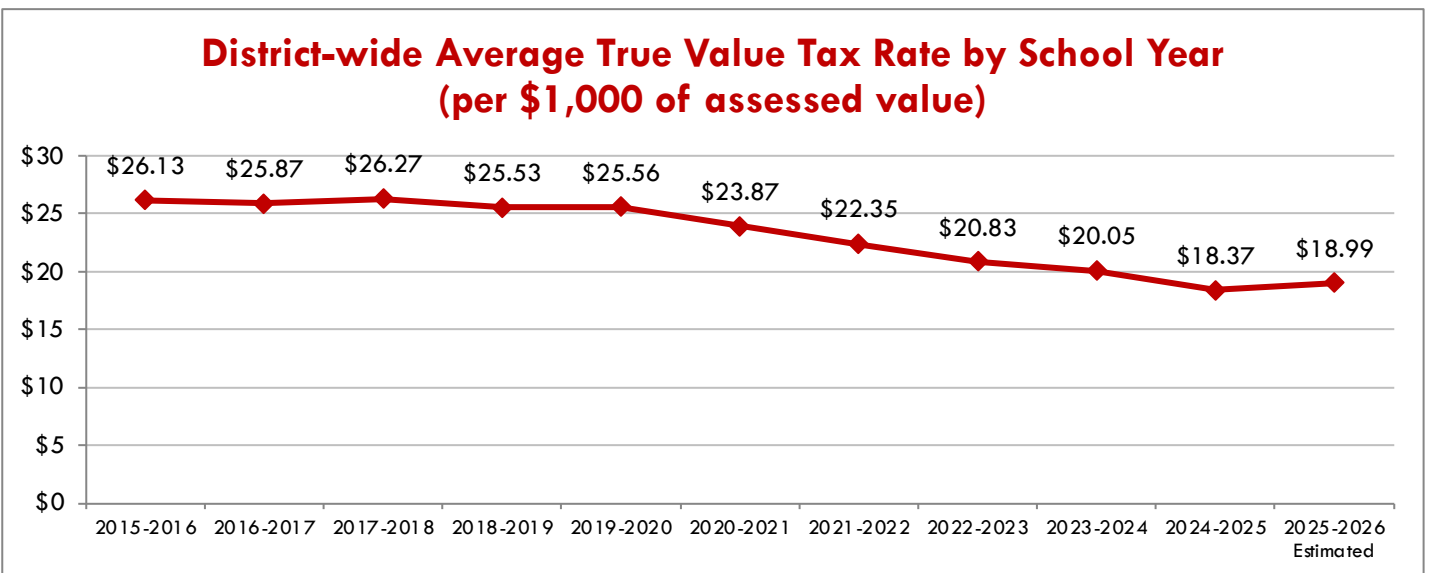
The **True (or Full) Value** of your home is calculated by dividing your home’s assessed value by your town’s equalization rate.

An **Equalization Rate** is New York State’s measure of each town’s level of assessment. An equalization rate of 100% means that properties are assessed at 100% of market value. The equalization rate is used to fairly distribute the tax levy among the five different towns within the district.

The **True (or Full) Value Tax Rate** is a district-wide average tax rate calculated in August by dividing the tax levy by the full value of all taxable properties in the school district. Estimates indicate that the 2025-2026 true value tax rate will likely not exceed \$18.99. The true value tax rate is affected by both the school tax levy and growth in the total value of property in the district.

Since 2012, school districts in New York State are subject to a **School Tax Levy Limit** (sometimes referred to as a **Tax Cap**). The proposed 2025-2026 tax levy is within the New York school tax levy limit.

Summary of Expenditures

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2025-26 by the qualified voters of the Palmyra-Macedon Central School District, Wayne County, New York, will be held at Palmyra-Macedon High School, 151 Hyde Parkway, Palmyra, New York on Tuesday, May 20, 2025 between the hours of 7:00am and 8:30pm, at which time the polls will be open to vote by electronic voting machine.

¹ The basic school tax relief (STAR) exemption is authorized by section 425 of the Real Property Tax Law.

Ballot Propositions

Below as they will appear on the ballot are the annual school budget proposition, a proposition to fully expend the 2009 Bus Purchase Reserve, and a proposition to create a new 2025 Bus Purchase Reserve. Applications for absentee ballots may be applied for at the office of the District Clerk, 127 Cuyler Street, Palmyra, NY (315-597-3400) at least seven days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election, if the ballot is to be obtained personally by the voter.

Proposition #1 2025-2026 Budget

Shall the annual school budget for the year commencing July 1, 2025, in the total amount of \$52,694,000 be approved, a statement thereof being filed in the Office of the District Clerk and available in accordance with Section 1716 of the New York State Education Law?

If this proposition is approved, the proposed 2025-2026 budget outlined in this magazine shall be authorized. If this school budget proposition is defeated, the Board of Education has the option of offering the same or a revised budget to voters for a revote in June or immediately adopting a contingent budget.

Proposition #2 2009 Bus Purchase Reserve

Shall the Board of Education be authorized for the 2025-2026 fiscal year to fully expend the remaining balance of the Bus Purchase Reserve Fund of 2009, totaling \$219,625 plus any interest earned by the fund through June 30, 2025, to finance the purchase of vehicles for student transportation?

If this proposition is approved, the Board of Education shall be authorized to fully expend all of the remaining \$219,625 currently held in the 2009 Bus Purchase Reserve Fund toward the purchase of new school buses in 2025-2026. The district typically purchases replacement school buses using a combination of annual budget funds plus Bus Purchase Reserve funds. If propositions #1 and #2 are both approved, then the district shall be authorized to purchase a combined total of 5 full-size diesel replacement school buses in 2025-2026. Expenses for the purchase of school buses are eligible for State reimbursement in the form of New York State Transportation Aid at the district's transportation aid ratio, which is currently 88.7%.

Proposition #3 2025 Bus Purchase Reserve

Shall the Board of Education be authorized to establish a reserve fund pursuant to Section 3651 of the New York State Education Law to be known as the 2025 Bus Purchase Reserve Fund (hereinafter referred to as "the fund")? The purpose of such fund shall be to finance the purchase of vehicles for student transportation as authorized by the voters from time to time. The ultimate amount of the fund shall be \$8,000,000 and the probable term of such fund shall be ten years. The sources from which funds shall be obtained for the fund shall be as follows: (a) in the 2024-2025 school year and annually thereafter funds of the District in an amount determined by the Board; (b) proceeds from the sale of retired vehicles; (c) State Aid paid to the District on account of vehicles purchased; and (d) other such amounts as the voters may hereafter authorize.

If this proposition is approved, the Board of Education shall be authorized to create a new 2025 Bus Purchase Reserve Fund. The intent of the fund is that it be used to save money towards future school bus purchases. Note that any proposed future expenditures from the new fund would also require separate voter approval.
