Course Description:

World History to 1500 (WH1) engages students in the historical development of people, places, events, and patterns of life from ancient times through 1500 AD (CE). Students will be exposed to a variety of resources that will broaden their perspective and strengthen their understanding of world history. World History to 1500 is designed to prepare students to be college and/or career-ready through the development of geography skills, timeline examination, and the analysis of primary and secondary sources.

Course Structure:

World History 1 is divided into 7 broad units broken down by specific SOL standards. The following is the broad outline of how the course will progress (Note: *dates are tentative and subject to change*).

Unit 0 • Quarter 1 • Think Like a Historian (August 7th – August 13th)

Unit 1 • Quarter 1 • Paleolithic and Neolithic Man (August 14th – September 4th)

Unit 2 • Quarter 1 • Ancient River Valleys (September 5th – October 2nd)

Unit 3 • Quarter 1 • Ancient Civilizations (October 3rd – November 12th)

Unit 4 • Quarters 1 & 2 • Greece, Rome, and the Byzantine Empire (November 13th – February 5th)

Unit 5 • Quarter 2 • Middle Ages and the Renaissance (February 6th – March 21st)

Unit 6 • Quarter 2 • Trade Routes, Africa, and Mesoamerica (March 24th – April 28th)

Unit 7 • Quarter 2 • Show What You Know (April 29th – May 28th)
