ATTENDANCE AND OTHER INFORMATION

ONLINE/ELECTRONIC SAFETY

High school students falling victim to online sextortion

O'Fallon Township High School District 203 and the O'Fallon Police Department would like to provide information about sextortion, a growing issue we've observed in the area.

Sextortion is a serious crime where online predators manipulate or threaten minors to share explicit images or perform acts on camera. This often starts on social media, gaming platforms, or dating apps, where the predator may use tactics such as flattery, threats, or offers of money to exploit the victim.

To protect your child, it's important to be aware of the signs and talk about online safety. Remind them to be cautious when communicating with strangers online, and to report any suspicious behavior. The FBI encourages reporting incidents to trusted adults or directly to them at **1-800-CALL-FBI**.
