Local Funding Now Covers Even More as State and Federal Support Falls Short

Over the years, Marysville Schools has worked hard to be financially responsible, stretching every dollar and operating more efficiently than most districts in Ohio. In fact, Marysville spends \$2,669 less per student than the state average. But continued underfunding—combined with rising costs and two recent failed levy attempts—has forced the district to make tough financial decisions.

These decisions include eliminating 30 staff positions, raising participation fees for extracurriculars, cutting elective courses, increasing class sizes, and freezing nearly all hiring. Programs like art, music, physical education, STEM, and the School Resource Officer initiative have been reduced or eliminated.

Heading into next school year, Marysville Schools will be acquiring preschool which was previously supported by the Union County Board of Developmental Disabilities. With the UCBDD no longer able to sustain the program, Marysville Schools will be required to cover the \$3.5 million expense. The current state funding formula would generate approximately \$500k to help offset this cost.

Today, it costs approximately \$13,642 to educate one student in Marysville Schools. The State covers about \$5,400 of that cost. Marysville Schools ranks 19th lowest in the state for per-pupil funding, and while the district remains committed to providing a high-quality education, revenue challenges inhibit the district's ability to sustain current programs and opportunities.

Budget decisions are currently being discussed at the state level, and the district encourages community members to reach out and discuss school funding with their representatives.
