WHAT IS A SCHOOL BUDGET?

In THEORY a school budget is about our priorities for our students.

In REALITY a school budget is about money, and decisions are made with finances in mind.

TWO SIMPLE RULES NON-NEGOTIABLES

- Tax revenues must be within cap or cap plus allowances
- Revenues must be equal to expenses.

KEEP IN MIND

Expenses can and do change during the school year while the main revenues for schools (taxes and aid) **DO NOT**!

Should expenses increase during the year, we cannot request an increase in finances, instead we must spend less in other areas (reduce staff, programs, supplies, repairs, professional development, etc.).

THE BUDGET PROCESS

- October December Begin gathering information to input to the District budget software (Genesis).
- October December Administrators, Principals, Supervisors and other District personnel enter their budget requests into the software.
- **December/January** Budgets are reviewed by the Business Office.
- **February/March** The budget is reviewed by the Superintendent and Board Committee Members.
- March 11, 2025 Initial Adoption by the Board.
- March/April 2025 Budget Review by the County Office (State Department of Education).
- April 29, 2025 Public Hearing and Final Adoption.

TAX LEVY LOCAL FAIR SHARE & ADEQUACY DEFINED

WHAT IS LOCAL FAIR SHARE?

In New Jersey, Local Fair Share (LFS) is the amount of money a school district is expected to raise locally through property taxes to fund its schools. The state calculates this amount based on a district's capacity to raise funds, which is determined by its property values and the income of its residents. Local Fair Share, along with state aid, is intended to reach the adequacy budget needed for a thorough and efficient education.

WHAT IS ADEQUACY BUDGET?

For every school district the state calculates what would be the necessary funding level to provide a "thorough and efficient education" to every pupil in that district. This is what is referred to as the Adequacy Budget. The state then calculates the Local Fair Share; or, what it believes the local taxing authority would be able to raise and earmark for the school district's budget.

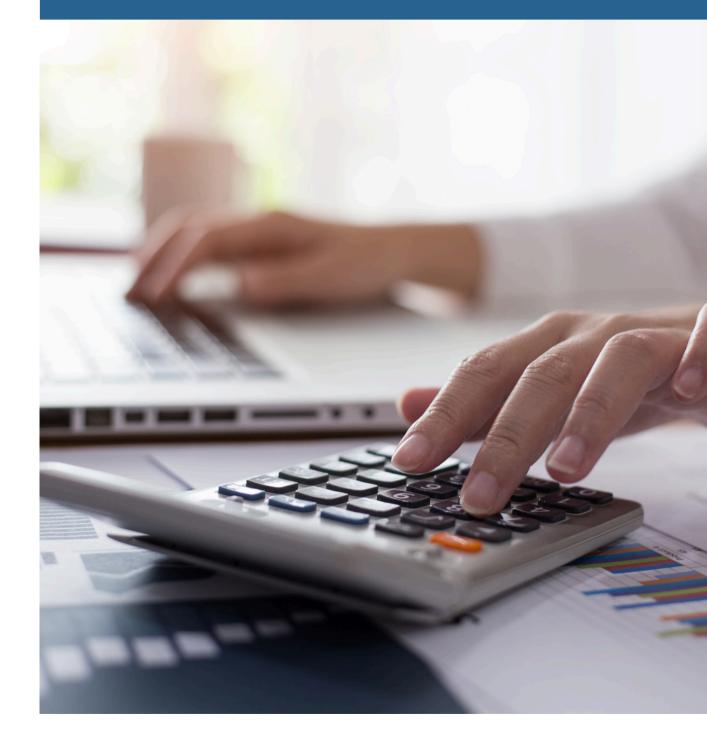

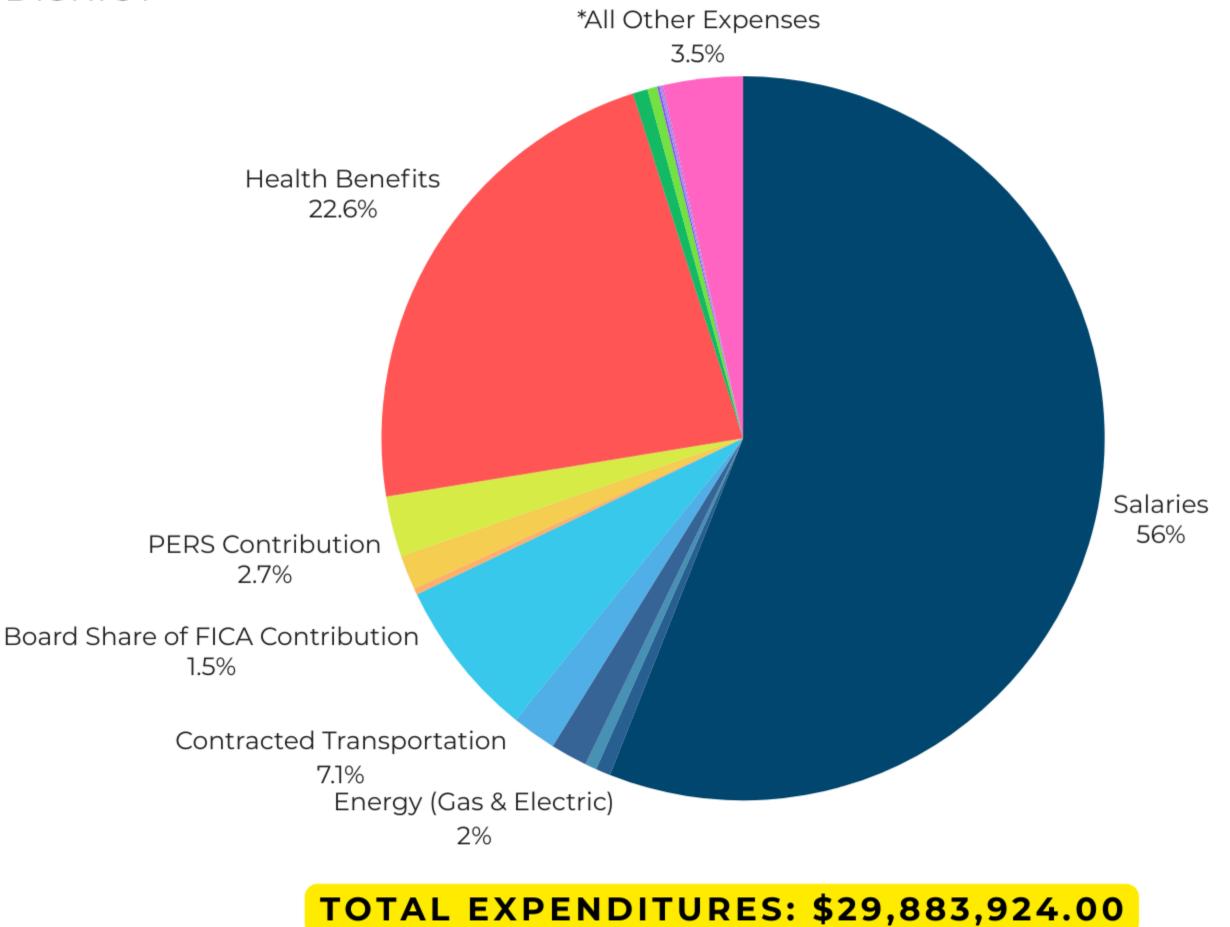

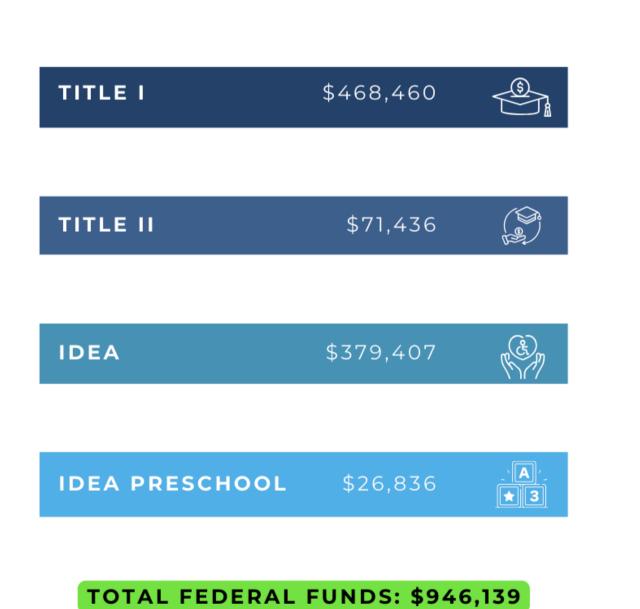

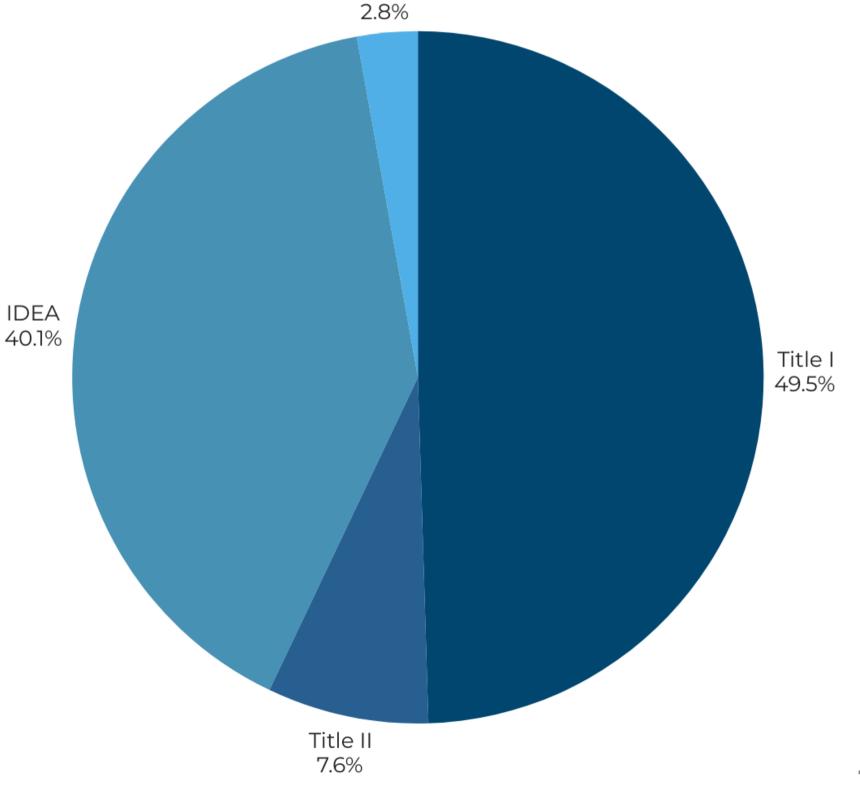

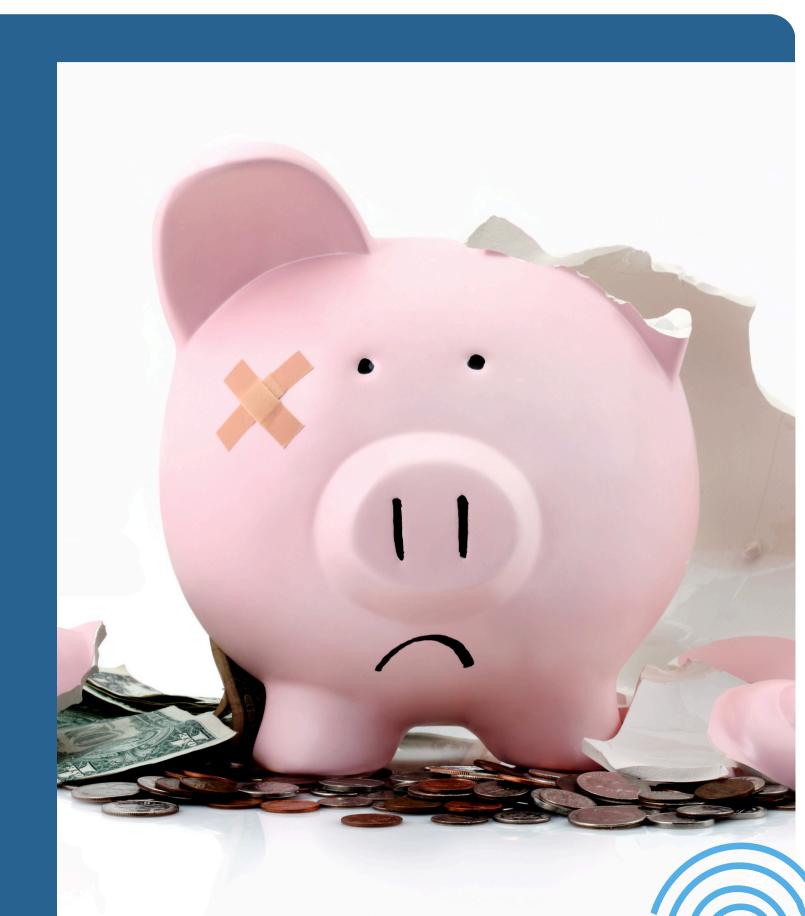

STAFF CUTS

FROM 2023-2024 TO NOW

- Approximately **26 staff** members were lost and not replaced due to RIF, non-renewals, retirements, attrition, or resignations during the 2023-2024 school year.
- During the 2024-2025 school year, roughly 10 staff positions were not replaced.
- Since 7/1/2024, about **36 (~29%) total staff** members were lost and not replaced due to RIF, non-renewals, retirements, attrition, or resignations.
- Anticipated loss of **five (5)*** staff members for 2025-2026.

SENIOR TAX FREEZE ELIGIBILITY

	Eligibility requirements, including income limits, and benefits available for all property tax relief programs are subject to change by the State Budget.
Age/Disability	 You (or your spouse/civil union partner) were: 65 or older on December 31, 2023; or Actually receiving federal Social Security disability benefit payments (not benefit payments received on behalf of someone else) on or before December 31, 2023.
Home Ownership	Homeowners. You owned and lived in your home since December 31, 2020, or earlier (and you still owned and lived in that home on December 31, 2024). Mobile Home Owners. You leased a site in a mobile home park where you placed a manufactured or mobile home that you owned since December 31, 2020, or earlier (and still lived in that home/leased the site on December 31, 2024).
Property Taxes/ Site Fees	Property must be subject to property taxes.
Income Limit	Your total annual income (combined if you were married or in a civil union and lived in the same home) was: • 2023 − \$163,050 or less; and • 2024 − \$168,268 or less See Income Limits History for past years' income limit amounts.
	One-Time Exemption for Exceeding Income Limit If you received a Senior Freeze last year but exceed the income limit this year, you will not be reimbursed. As a one-time exemption, you may retain your base year when applying next year, if all eligibility requirements are met. If income exceeds the limit in future years, a new base year must be established upon reeligibility.
