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#### **Calendar Update**

For the past several years, the final scheduled elementary student day has depended on the number of snow days used. Each snow day adds an extra elementary student attendance day to the end of the school year to meet the NYSED 180-day requirement.

Currently, the last elementary school day is set for Thursday, June 26, 2025. The school year is expected to end as originally scheduled for middle and high school students. At the high school level we will remove the early dismissals scheduled for March 14 and April 11. Those will now be full school days. If additional snow days are used, adjustments may be necessary, such as transitioning to a virtual learning environment in order to meet the 180-day student attendance requirement. We will keep our families and community updated on any further changes.

#### A Message from Superintendent Lilleck

We want to provide the Orchard Park CSD community with updated information regarding the possible presence of immigration officials in our schools, reflecting recent changes in federal policy and guidance from the New York State Education Department (NYSED) and the Office of the Attorney General (OAG).

As you may be aware, the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) has reversed its stance on enforcement actions in sensitive locations, including schools. In response, the New York State Education Department (NYSED) and the Governor and Attorney General have reaffirmed protections for immigrant students. New York State law prohibits taking legal action against a student based on their immigration status. Law enforcement's authority to interrogate or detain students on school grounds is limited. To be clear, the laws of the state of New York make it exceptionally difficult and extremely rare for a law enforcement officer to legally detain or remove a student from school due to immigration status. Schools must remain safe places where kids can attend, absent of fear. New York State law guarantees every student, regardless of citizenship or immigration status, the fundamental right to a free public education.

Recently, the New York State Department of Education, in collaboration with the offices of Governor Hochul and Attorney General James, reaffirmed it's commitment to maintaining New York's schools as safe havens where all students are free to learn. I want to share the joint

guidance that was released recently by the Governor, Attorney General, and the New York State Department of Education that outlines the rights of students within public schools in New York.

Ultimately, this guidance aligns with our district's mission, as outlined in our long-range District Comprehensive Improvement plans. Our mission every day is to maximize every student's potential. Ensuring a welcoming and safe environment for all members of our school community is an essential commitment to this mission. We will continue to uphold this commitment for all students within our District.




#### OP Technology Wins Big at Tech Wars 🚖










#### Fashion Class Puts Best Foot Forward &


#### Miss Zimmerman's Class Celebrates A Day of Kindness

## Orchard Park Middle School Presents the 4th Annual STEAM Expo


The Orchard Park Middle School will host its fourth annual STEAM Expo on Thursday, March 6, 2025.

#### Registration Open for Universal Pre-Kindergarten

The Orchard Park Central School District (OPCSD) is currently accepting applications for Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) for the 2025-2026 school year. To participate, children must reside in the OPCSD's attendance area and be four years old on or before December 1, 2025 – meaning, their birthdate must fall between 12-02-20 and 12-01-21. Applications are available online at www.opschools.org/upk and are due by March 19, 2025.

OPCSD is once again able to offer UPK through a grant provided by the New York State Education Department. This grant covers the cost of the program but does not cover transportation. It is the responsibility of each family to transport their child to the UPK site.

There are only a designated number of UPK spots available. A "digital lottery" will determine who will qualify to attend. Children are randomly selected for the program and selection is not based on academic or economic need. All registered children are equally eligible for participation.

All students with complete registration before the March 19, 2025 deadline will have an equal chance for selection in the lottery. More information about the registration process and the UPK program is available online.
