OPHS Holds Successful Mock Presidential Election

On October 30, Orchard Park High School's History Club held a school-wide US Presidential Mock Election, continuing a tradition that started in 2004. All students had the opportunity to cast their vote during lunch periods, using a secure ballot system organized by History Club members and advisor Mr. Janas. Each student swiped their ID or entered a unique number to link to a single-use paper ballot, ensuring a fair and accurate count.

The event aimed to engage students in the civic process, giving them a preview of the voting experience before they reach voting age. History Club members, alongside staff and teachers, volunteered their time to staff voting booths, distribute ballots, and hand out "I Voted" stickers. The custodians were instrumental in getting the voting equipment, tables and chairs set up. House III Principal Mr. Reiford provided additional support by supplying stickers and organizing the setup.

The ballots were scanned to allow for a breakdown of results by grade and gender. History Club plans to announce the results on QTV on Election Day and will analyze trends to discuss potential voting patterns. This data will also be shared and analyzed in Mr. Janas' government classes.



Fifth Graders Play Important Role as Safety Patrol Members at Eggert

This year, Officer Wheeler has taken on an exciting role with the fifth graders involved in the Safety Patrol Program at Eggert Elementary. Collaborating closely with fifth grade teachers, as well as Ms. Hall and Mrs. Szczesniak, she helped select the participants and shape the program.

To join the Safety Patrol, interested fifth graders were required to express their interest by writing an essay detailing why they would make excellent members. After careful consideration, 15 students were chosen to take on these important responsibilities. These students play an crucial role during afternoon dismissal, ensuring that everyone is safe and that the process runs smoothly. Additionally, for those who ride the bus, Safety Patrol members assist the bus driver in maintaining a safe environment for all passengers.

This year, the program is introducing some exciting changes. In January, the opportunity to join the Safety Patrol will be extended to other fifth graders, allowing students who were not selected at the beginning of the year a chance to participate. This new initiative encourages all students to strive for excellence and reinforces the values of teamwork and responsibility.

This year Safety Patrol students are now assisting walking pre-kindergarten children into the building. So far, this initiative has been a success, with pre-k students enjoying the support of their

older peers while Safety Patrol members take their new responsibilities seriously and with pride.

The Safety Patrol Program is not only helping to foster a safe environment at Eggert, but is also providing valuable leadership experiences for Eggert fifth graders. Officer Wheeler believes it's a wonderful opportunity for students to develop a sense of responsibility and community spirit.



Listen Up! Exploring Sound in Science 👂

In Ms. Kulczyk's class at Windom, students engaged in an exciting lesson about sound and how it travels. They started by crafting their own kazoos from various materials, which helped illustrate sound production.

The following day, the focus shifted to the anatomy of hearing. Students learned about the eardrum and its role in transmitting sound to the brain. To visualize this concept, they created eardrum models using cups, rubber bands, and rubber sheets, with salt placed on top to demonstrate vibrations.

Using both their homemade kazoos and real kazoos, students made their eardrum models vibrate. They also experimented with a tuning fork and tested different sound-generating methods, such as clapping and singing. This hands-on approach not only deepened their understanding of sound and vibrations but also fostered collaboration and creativity.

Crayola Visits Ellicott to Reunite Former Student with Artwork 🖋


On October 8, Ellicott welcomed a very special guests – Buffalo Bills wide receiver Mack Hollins and representatives from Crayola – to celebrate creativity and its importance in students' lives. The event was part of Crayola's Campaign for Creativity, which focuses on inspiring children to express themselves through art. Hollins, known for his passion for creativity, encouraged students to embrace drawing and dancing as fun ways to show their individuality.

One of the highlights of the celebration was the return of a special piece of artwork created by Kailey Artiles, a former Ellicott Elementary student. Registration Open for Universal Pre-Kindergarten

The Orchard Park Central School District (OPCSD) is currently accepting applications for Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) for the 2025-2026 school year. To participate, children must reside in the OPCSD's attendance area and be four years old on or before December 1, 2025 – meaning, their birthdate must fall between 12-02-20 and 12-01-21. Applications are available online at www.opschools.org/upk and are due by March 19, 2025.

OPCSD is once again able to offer UPK through a grant provided by the New York State Education Department. This grant covers the cost of the program but does not cover transportation. It is the responsibility of each family to transport their child to the UPK site.

There are only a designated number of UPK spots available. A "digital lottery" will determine who will qualify to attend. Children are randomly selected for the program and selection is not based on academic or economic need. All registered children are equally eligible for participation.

All students with complete registration before the March 19, 2025 deadline will have an equal chance for selection in the lottery. More information about the registration process and the UPK program is available online. 
