Budget Proposal Addresses Increasing Enrollment

Remaining Under "Tax Cap" for 13th Year

Dear Syosset Community:

The Board of Education and Central Administration have worked diligently to develop a 2025-2026 school year budget that for the 13th consecutive year includes a property tax levy increase that remains under the state tax cap. The proposed property tax levy increase for the 2025-2026 school year is 2.77%.

Despite inflation, rising health insurance and transportation costs, and increased enrollment, the budget remains balanced and:

- maintains existing programs and services;
- expands special education opportunities;
- provides Artificial Intelligence (AI) training for educators; and,
- includes select capital projects to enhance student experiences.

While student enrollment across Nassau County has decreased by 4% over the past decade, Syosset's has grown by 10%—a 14% increase relative to the county. To manage this growth, we continue to innovate to provide every student with the extraordinary education that defines Syosset.

As part of this innovation, we're training educators to use AI tools to enhance instruction—while preserving the student-centered experience central to a Syosset education. We're also expanding our special education program to support more students with intensive needs on-site, allowing them to learn in their home community alongside peers and neighbors.

Capital projects include renovating HBT's existing tennis courts and adding two more to meet growing interest in middle school tennis. The budget also supports upgrades to sound and lighting in secondary auditoriums, and ADA-compliant renovations of staff bathrooms. General maintenance will continue in preparation for major construction next summer.

We invite you to attend the public budget hearing on Monday, May 12th to learn more. The annual budget vote will take place on Tuesday, May 20th. In addition, voters will also select three members for the Board of Education.

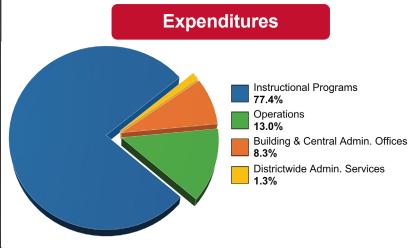

FAQ

Q: What is the estimated tax levy increase of the proposed budget?

A: The proposed budget would increase the school tax levy by 2.77%. This is below the state-mandated tax cap set at 2.80%. The total proposed budget of \$295,822,420 carries a budget-to-budget increase of 3.53% for the 2025-26 school year.

Q: Does the proposed 25-26 budget maintain all programs and services?

A: Yes. The proposed budget manages our District's growth, while maintaining educational opportunities for students, extracurricular activities, and co-curricular programs. This budget will also continue maintenance and repairs of our facilities in preparation for larger bond projects in the summer of 2026.

Q: What happens if the budget is defeated?

A: If the budget is defeated on May 20th, the District will be faced with three options. The Board could choose to submit the same budget for a revote, submit a revised version of the defeated budget, or adopt a contingency budget. If a proposed budget is defeated twice, a contingency budget must be adopted, and state law would mandate that the District revert to a 0% tax levy increase for the 2025-26 year. That would require the District to make approximately \$6.3 million in reductions to the proposed budget.
