Vol State / Robertson County District Collaborative Overview

Academic eligibility

- Be a rising junior in a Robertson County public high school
- Have appropriate college-level placement scores (at least **one** of the following):
 - Final Sophomore High School GPA 3.6 (note: students who use GPA for this purpose during the spring application period can only receive conditional admission until the final sophomore year GPA is posted)
 - o ACT scores: 18 English, 19 Reading, 19 Math, or
 - o ACCUPLACER: 250 Writing, 250 Reading, 250 Math, or
- Notify their high school counselor that they are interested in applying to the Robertson County District Collaborative
- Complete all components of the Vol State admissions application process

Cohort

- The cohort is capped at 30 students (total from all Robertson County high schools)
- If 30 or fewer eligible students apply to the program, then all can be accepted
- If more than 30 eligible students apply to the program, the RCS will apply a lottery process to admit 30 students
- Each semester, two courses will be in person and the remaining courses will be online.

Process

- Eligible students apply to Vol State
- Eligible students apply for TSAC financial aid
- (Lottery process if more than 30 eligible students)
- Students are academically advised, and courses are selected
- Once student's application process is complete and student is accepted to the district collaborative, Vol State's Dual Enrollment Office will enroll the student into Fall 2025 courses
- Parent/Guardian consent and financial acknowledgement will be solicited
- GPA verified at end of Sophomore year
- Classes begin in August
- Ongoing advising from semester to semester

Courses Specified in the Collaborative:

CITC 1300 (3) Beginning HTML and CSS

This is a beginning course in HTML that provides instruction in creating Web pages. Students learn to write HTML code. Topics include using HTML tags, CSS formatting, and appropriate scripting languages.

COMM 2025 (3) Fundamentals of Communication

This course is an introduction to the communication process, interpersonal communication, group discussion, and public speaking. Students are required to prepare and deliver speeches.

ENGL 1010 (3) English Composition I

This course includes writing expository compositions based primarily on analysis of essays and literary works, with an emphasis on rhetorical modes, documentation skills, and revision.

ENGL 1020 (3) English Composition II

This course includes writing argumentative compositions based on issues raised in essays and literary work with emphasis on research skills, support, and revision.

HIST 2010 (3) Early United States History

This course is a survey of the political, economic, social, cultural, and diplomatic phases of American life in its regional, national, and international aspects up to 1877.

HIST 2020 (3) Modern United States History

This course is a survey of the political, economic, social, cultural, and diplomatic phases of American life in its regional, national, and international aspects since 1877.

MATH 1530 (3) Introductory Statistics

This course is an introduction to elementary methods and techniques. Topics include sampling, frequency distributions, elementary probability, binomial distributions, normal distributions, uniform distributions, tests of hypotheses, significance of data, and simple correlation.

MATH 1710 (3) Precalculus Algebra

This course is designed as a course for students who plan to major in mathematics and/or science and are not prepared to take calculus. Topics include polynomials, factoring, fractions, radical expressions, rational exponents, complex numbers, linear and quadratic equations and their applications, polynomial and rational functions, exponential and logarithmic functions, systems of equations, and the Binomial Theorem.

GEOL 1030 (4) Survey of Geology

This is a one-semester survey including topics in physical and historical geology, earth materials, plate tectonics, geologic structures, landforms, geologic time, fossils and earth history.

BIOL 1030 (4) Essentials of Biology

This is a one-semester course covering selected topics in Life Science. Topics include: the scientific method, the chemistry of life, the cell and functions of cellular organelles, photosynthesis, cellular respiration, protein synthesis, genetics, DNA, cell reproduction, evolution, microbes, fungi, plants, animals, and ecology.

POLS 1030 (3) American Government

This course is an analysis of the democratic values, constitutional framework, and political dynamics of the U. S. political system with emphasis upon an evaluation of the Congress, Presidency, and Supreme Court.

ECON 2100 (3) Principles of Macroeconomics

This course introduces the economic dilemma, supply and demand, and the roles of major sectors within the economy. The course explores the process of national income and output determination and the use of monetary and discretionary fiscal policies to control inflation and unemployment. Keynesian economics, the Monetarist School, and modern classical macroeconomics are examined and compared.

ECON 2200 (3) Principles of Microeconomics

This course explores the role of markets in capitalistic economies in generating information and allocating resources, the theory of consumer choice, and production cost. The course also includes the economics of the firm, an examination of government regulation of business, the operation of resource markets and the determination of income distribution, and international trade.

MONEY FOR COLLEGE MIDDLE COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP

Overview

The Middle College Scholarship is awarded to high school juniors and seniors enrolled full-time at an eligible postsecondary institution for the purpose of earning an associate degree by the time of high school graduation.

Award Information

\$2,000 per semester (\$4,000 per year)

Eligibility

Complete and submit the **Middle College Scholarship application** by November 1

- Be a Tennessee resident as classified by the Tennessee Board of Regents
- Obtain a minimum 3.0 high school GPA at the end of the high school

- Beginning with the Junior year of high school, enroll full-time in each semester at any of the following institutions:
 - Chattanooga State Community College
 - Cleveland State Community College
 - Columbia State Community College
 - Dyersburg State Community College

To remain eligible:

- Reapply each year by submitting the online Middle College Scholarship application by the deadline dates
- Maintain a minimum 3.0 semester college GPA
- Maintain full-time enrollment in each semester

Application

The application is found within the **TSAC Student Portal**. Applicants must complete and submit the Middle College Scholarship application by November 1.

Termination Criteria

- Student is no longer enrolled in Middle College
- Englishudent fails to maintain a minimum 3.0 semester college GPA

- Student fails to maintain full-time enrollment
- Student has earned an Associate degree
- Student has graduated from high school
- Two years have passed from the date of enrollment as a middle college student

Additional Information

Transitioning from the Middle College Scholarship to the HOPE Scholarship

- Meet the academic HOPE Scholarship requirements
- Meet the HOPE Scholarship GPA requirements
- Enroll within 16 months in an eligible four-year institution after graduating from the Middle College
- Submit the FAFSA application by the HOPE Scholarship deadline dates
- Time enrolled as a middle college student will not count towards the HOPE Scholarship terminating events

Important Notes

1. Students who do not receive the Middle College Scholarship in the Fall semester of the junior year are not eligible for the scholarship thereafter.

2. Students cannot receive the Middle College Scholarship and the Dual Enrollment Grant at the same time.

3. Students cannot regain the Middle College Scholarship once the award discontinues for any reason.









MONEY FOR COLLEGE

DUAL ENROLLMENT GRANT

Overview

The Dual Enrollment Grant program is for students who are attending an eligible high school and who are also enrolled in college courses at eligible postsecondary institutions for which they will receive college credit.

The Dual Enrollment Grant program provides opportunities for students to earn an initial technical credential or a semester of college credit free of tuition and fees, while still pursuing a high school diploma.

Award Information

Dual Enrollment Grant Requirements:

To be eligible, a student must:

• Be a Tennessee resident as classified by the Tennessee Board of Regents.

- Meet the admission requirements of the institution the student plans to attend and apply for the grant as a high school junior or senior if enrolled at a twoyear or four-year institution **OR**;
- be at least a high school freshman if enrolled at a Tennessee College of Applied Technology (TCAT)
- May enroll at a two-year or four-year eligible postsecondary institution and continue receiving the Dual Enrollment Grant for up to 10 courses by maintaining all eligibility requirements and achieving a minimum cumulative 2.0 GPA for all postsecondary semester courses attempted as a recipient of the grant.
- Enroll in a TN College of Applied Technology clock hour program may continue receiving the Dual Enrollment Grant by maintaining all eligibility requirements and achieving a minimum cumulative 2.0 GPA for up to 1296 clock hours.
- Meet the above requirements and the student may receive an award amount at a 2-year or 4-year institution for the first five courses which is the cost of tuition plus a 5% access fee as determined by the TN Board of Regents for community colleges. For a student's sixth through tenth dual enrollment semester courses, the award amount is \$100 per credit hour, not to exceed \$600 per course. At a TN College of Applied Technology, the award amount is the cost of tuition as determined by the TN Board of Regents.

Eligibility

To be eligible, the student must:

1. Be classified as a high school junior or senior if enrolling in Dual Enrollment courses at a two-year or four-year postsecondary institution; or be classified as a high school freshman or higher if enrolling in a Dual Enrollment program at a TCAT;

2. Complete and submit the Dual Enrollment Grant application on-line by the deadline date as indicated below;

3. Meet admissions criteria for dual enrollment for the postsecondary institution to which the student will enroll as a dual enrolled student;

4. Maintain a minimum 2.0 grade point average for all postsecondary courses attempted under the Dual Enrollment Grant.

• June 30 deadline for all semesters (fall, spring, and summer)

Termination Criteria

The grant is terminated once the student has no longer achieved a minimum 2.00 GPA while participating in the program or when the student has met the high school graduation requirements.
