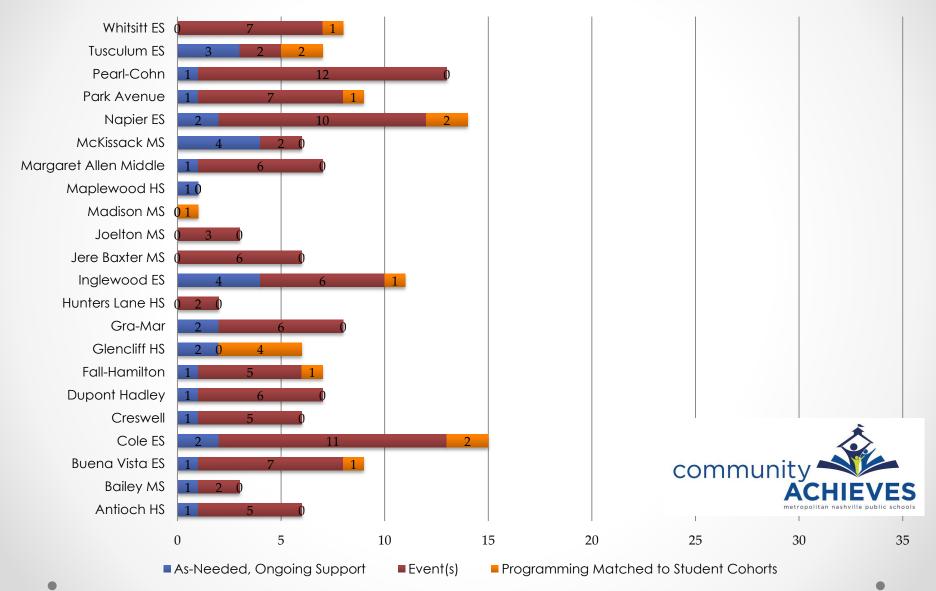

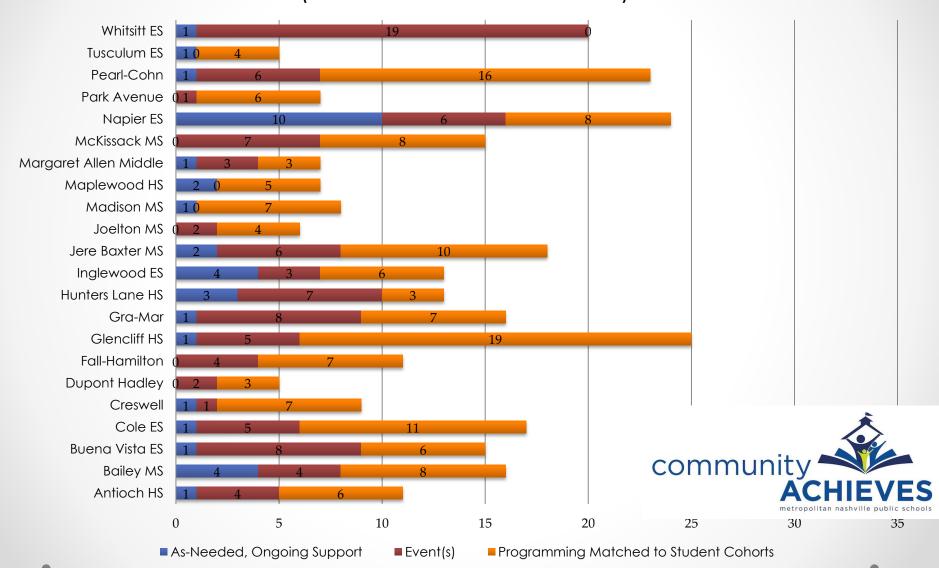

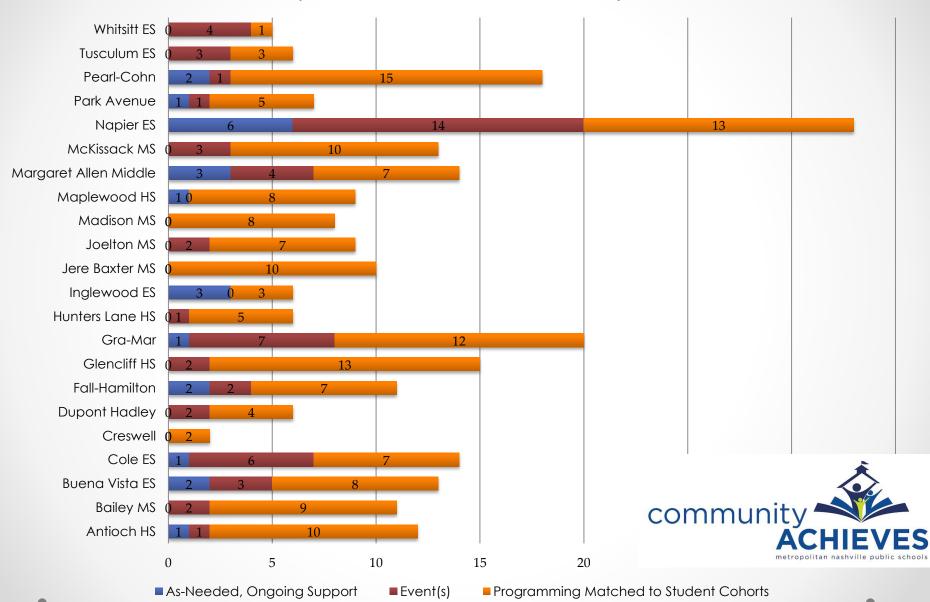
Family Engagement Supports in Community Achieves Schools (2015-16 Mid-Year Estimates)



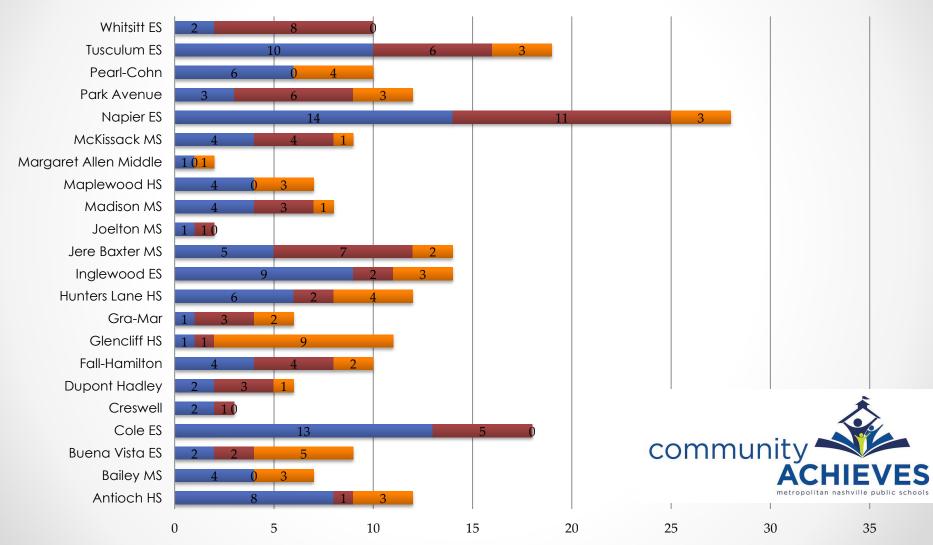

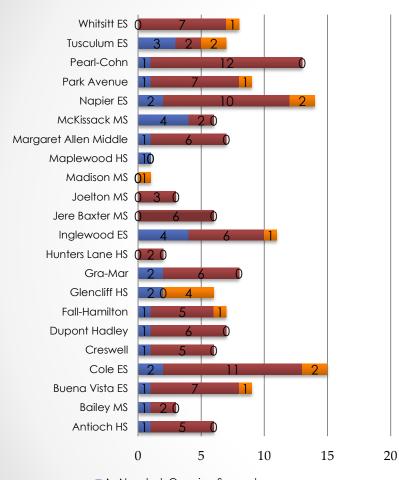

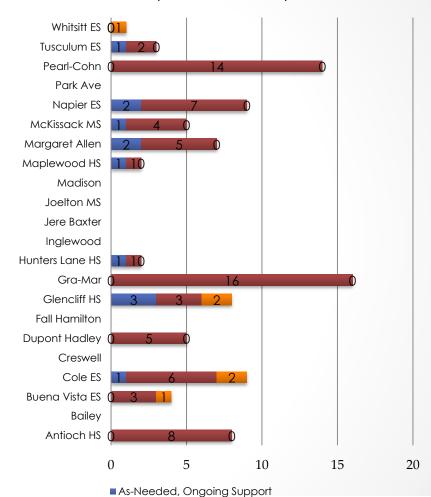

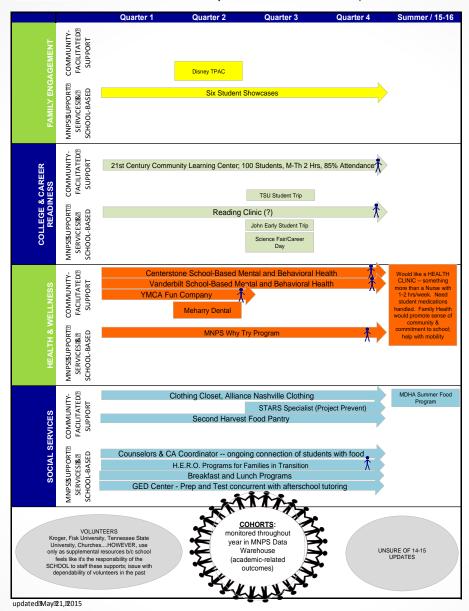


Pearl-Cohn Entertainment Magnet High School Community Schools Model for Collective Impact 2015-16

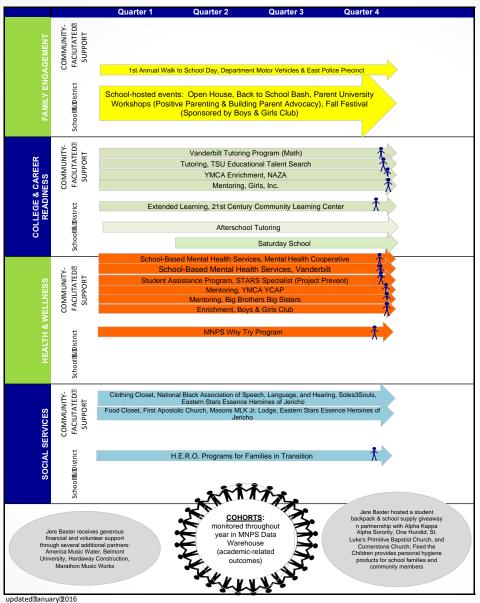

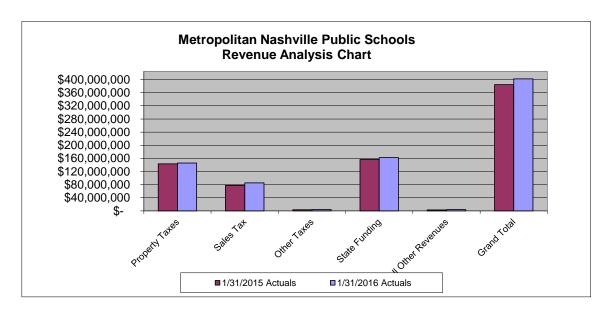

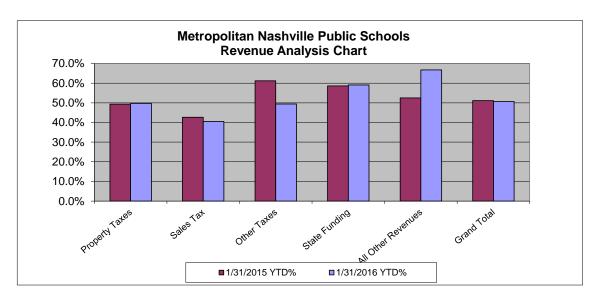

Subject: MNPS Driver Shortage Update

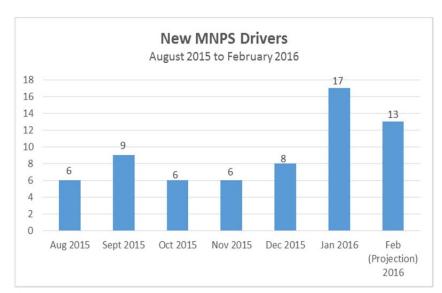

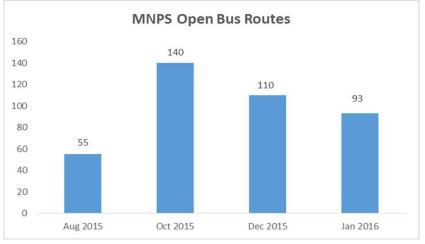
Driver Compensation Plan

The reaction to the new driver compensation plan released on December 3, 2015 has been very positive. Drivers continue to share their feelings of appreciation and thankfulness for being recognized as a valuable team member in supporting the MNPS vision and mission. The attendance bonus has already produced positive results in bus driver attendance.

Driver Numbers

During the holidays, drivers who left the district earlier in the year are starting to return back to MNPS because of the new compensation plan. We have almost 60 drivers in various stages of the employment process (background check/fingerprinting, drug testing and training). The new driver counts and open bus routes are shown here on the right. In addition, School Bus Consultants temporary staffing has 21 drivers (retired drivers, policeman and firemen) available to MNPS on an as needed basis and will be processing additional drivers over the next several weeks. We are still doubling and combining some routes, but arrival times are much improved and we expect continuous improvement as we fill our full complement of drivers and continue to add sub drivers.

RFP Process

Vendor demonstrations are complete. The committee will meet this Friday to determine final scores and select best fit. The contract with the selected substitute vendor takes effect July 1, 2016.

Recruitment

Since our last update, we contacted Deans of Education at area colleges and universities to inform them of substitute opportunities with MNPS. Two of the strategies to help advertise substitute opportunities with the student body are to host information sessions and/or on-campus substitute orientation sessions. We held our first of the information sessions at Lipscomb University January 28. There were 35 students in attendance; most of whom are now in various stages of the onboarding process. Vanderbilt University shared the substitute flyer with their students and several have made contact to express interest in substitute employment.

Fill Rates by School

The current substitute teacher fill rate is 83%. Many of our schools are still making individual gains as evidenced below. We will continue visiting schools and collaborating with principals to see how we can improve processes and ultimately the substitute fill rate. Please see chart below for comparison:

Re: Update on The Office of Priority Schools

Hiring Process

We completed the hiring process of one Executive Lead Principal and a Senior Manager of School Turnaround. We are in the process of finalizing the second Executive Lead Principal. Below is a brief introduction of the new members of the Priority Schools Office Team. This week we are in the process of interviewing for the position of Administrative Assistant. A decision will be made this week and hire date is estimated to be March 4, 2016.

Dr. Adrienne Koger will serve in the role of Executive Lead Principal for Priority Schools. Dr. Koger has served as a middle school teacher, an Academic Assistant Principal at Glencliff High School, Executive Principal of Antioch High School, and Network Lead Principal. Under Dr. Koger's leadership, Antioch High School has made strong academic gains. According to the Tennessee Value Added Assessment System (TVAAS), student performance has made substantially more progress than the standard for academic growth in the state with level 5 ratings for literacy, numeracy, and overall composite over the last three years. During Dr. Koger's tenure she has transformed what was designated a low performing school in 2010 to a high performing school over the last three years. Through her commitment to academic excellence, Antioch High School was designated a 2014 Tennessee Reward School, which acknowledges the top 5% of schools for progress in the state for year-to-year progress. Through Dr. Koger's leadership, the Academies of Antioch have increased in number and obtained the National Model Academy Accreditation. Dr. Koger brings focus and academic rigor as one of her major strengths to support priority schools. She is a native of Nashville and proud alumni of Overton High School. She holds a Masters of Education, an Education Specialist Degree in Administration and a Doctorate of Education from Tennessee State University. She will begin her new role on February 29.

Laura Middleton will serve in the position of Senior Manager of Priority Schools. Ms. Middleton has served in the role of teacher, turn around school leader, non-profit executive director, university statewide literacy administrator, and senior director for a national non-profit focused on strategic district/school improvement. She has over 12 years experience as a principal in three separate public schools in Texas. The last school Ms. Middleton led was categorized as a Persistently Low Performing School (five or more years of underperformance). After one year of leadership, the school attained the state's second highest rating, posting double-digit gains in the first year of her leadership. The prior school she led attained the state's highest academic rating after one year of leadership and was profiled as a 90-90-90 school. These are schools that are 90% economically disadvantaged, 90% ethnic minority and 90% of students met or exceed high academic standards. Ms. Middleton has experience guiding and coaching district and school leaders across the state of Texas in implementing effective practices resulting in improved outcomes for school stakeholders while serving as the State Literacy Liaison for the University of Texas at Austin, Institute for Public Schools Initiatives. Additionally, in her role as the State Director for the National Center on Time and Learning, she has worked with districts in Tennessee and across the nation in a strategic redesign process to improve outcomes for stakeholders. Ms. Middleton is a systems thinker where she creates and executes strategic plans as she coaches school management teams. She actively works to create and maintain strong relationships in the work place. She holds a Masters Degree in English, and Curriculum and Instruction from Baylor University. She is a native of Nashville. Ms. Middleton began her new role with MNPS on February 10.

Targeted Supports

1. Priority Schools Collaboration Meetings

- A fact sheet detailing support to be provided in future collaboration meetings is being drafted. The fact sheet will
 assist principals in determining how to maximize current resources, prioritize learning goals, improve school
 culture, identify and execute the elements of highly effective collaboration meetings, and implement the
 continuous improvement process.
- Discussions will begin on utilizing one common assessment for all Priority Schools to assess student achievement for next year. Recently, the Office of Priority Schools received a waiver from the TDoE releasing them from administering the 3rd benchmark assessment due to the decision to administer TNReady by pencil and paper.

2. Social and Emotional Climate Survey

The Student Services department has been conducting a social and emotional climate survey/walkthrough to
assist principals in identifying areas of strength and areas needing refinement around social and emotional
learning. Principals began receiving feedback from their walkthroughs this week.
