




Our Committee




Table Hosts + Table Leads

Table Hosts = District leaders assigned to multiple tables

- Serves as subject matter expert / available to answer questions
- Helps find the right resources for their assigned tables



Table Leads = Committee member assigned to group

- Ensures committee members have handouts
- Ensures discussions stay on time
- Ensures everyone has a turn to speak
- Ensures a spokesperson is prepared to share during large group discussions
- Can share personal opinions, just like other committee members





Committee + Bond Process



MISD Educates Voters on the Proposal

It's the school district's role to communicate facts about the bond

VOTE

Voters Consider Proposition(s)

School bond propositions must be held with the General elections in May or November

APPROVE

Voters Approve Bond Election

A majority of voters voting in favor of the proposition(s) gives the Board authority to sell bonds

SELL

District Sells Bonds to Investors

District issues bond sales in increments over time to match the schedule of project design and construction

Project Planning

0 to 3 Months

Project design and construction timelines for bond-approved projects will be developed during the planning process. Additionally, project budgets will be finalized and approved.


Design

6 to 9 Months

During the design phase, internal and external input may be sought to develop the design of a project. Several information-gathering activities such as design charrettes, focus groups, surveys, meetings, etc. may be used to create project drawings and/or renderings.

0 to 3 Months

The district will go through an official bidding and selection process to select contractors for design-approved projects.








State Compression has lowered school district tax rates.



Inflationary/Growth Impact Since 2019








2024-25 Operational Expenses




