HCS Students Mourn the Loss of YouTube By Silas Campbell

This is an article interview with Mr. Rogers about why YouTube and other Google products/apps/services are blocked on the school computers for anyone under 18. I asked him these questions, and he had to say.

replied, "Only if YouTube agreed to build a version that followed New York state laws."

My final question to him was, "Are all YouTubers blocked?" Mr. Rogers declared, "Anybody over 18 can watch YouTube, because they're considered adults."

Federal Funding to Harvard University Cut By Michael Hayden

This Monday, April 14, the Trump administration announced it would cut nearly \$2.3 billion in funding to Harvard after the university refused to agree to policy changes. Harvard had been promised \$2.2 billion in grants and a \$60 million multi-year contract by the federal government. However, last week, the university received a letter from one of the Trump administration's task forces outlining the changes they wanted made to the school's policies to "maintain Harvard's financial relationship with the federal government."

The task force that sent the letter was created with the sole purpose of combating anti-semitism on college campuses. A White House spokesperson said in a statement about the incident, "President Trump is working to Make Higher Education Great Again by ending unchecked anti-Semitism and ensuring federal taxpayer dollars do not fund Harvard's support of dangerous racial discrimination or racially motivated violence."

The changes to school policy that the task force proposed included eliminating the school's diversity, equity, and inclusion programs and instead moving toward solely merit-based hiring and admissions processes. It also mandated that

the university ban masks at campus protests and instate potential punishments for faculty and staff engaged in activism. Harvard refused to comply with these mandates, calling them an attempt at "government regulation" of the university; its president, Alan Garber, said, "No government – regardless of which party is in power – should dictate what private universities can teach, whom they can admit and hire, and which areas of study and inquiry they can pursue."

Harvard is not the only university that the Trump administration has made these demands to – Columbia and Princeton have already agreed to make the proposed policy changes. Still, they are the first to refuse to comply. Harvard has the support of Yale and several other colleges, as well as former President Barack Obama, who in a recent statement said: "Harvard has set an



example for other higher-ed institutions – rejecting an unlawful and ham-handed attempt to stifle academic freedom, while taking concrete steps to make sure all students at

Harvard can benefit from an environment of intellectual inquiry, rigorous debate and mutual respect."

The Masters Recap By Dylan George

This past weekend, the biggest golf grnament of the

tournament of the year, The Masters, took place in Augusta, Ga. This year's tournament was filled with excitement and nerves, featuring the best golfers in the world.



On Thursday, the course conditions were very tough, leading to some of the best golfers, like Rory McIlroy and Max Homa, recording double bogeys, which is rare for golfers of this high caliber. The biggest news of Thursday's round was Nick Dunlap breaking the highest single-round score in a decade, where he shot a 90, +18. This record was held by Ben Crenshaw, who shot a 91, +19, in 2015. After Thursday's round, Justin Rose was at the top of the leaderboard after shooting seven under 65.

Stars like Rory McIlroy, Bryson DeChambeau, and Justin Rose highlighted Friday

and Saturday's rounds, which put them at the top of the leaderboard going into Sunday's final round. Rory shot a pair of 66s on Friday and Saturday to sit at -12 through the tournament's first three days. He hopes to win his first career Masters.

Sunday's round was filled with high excitement as Rory McIlroy looked like he was finally winning his first Masters. However, dramatically, Rory needed a par on the 18th, and the final hole would win. He had a seven-foot putt to do so, and he missed, causing a playoff between him and Justin Rose. Rory then played a perfect hole, beating Rose in the playoff, earning his first career Masters. With this Master's win, Rory McIlroy achieved his grand slam, winning all four majors in a golfer's career. Rory McIlroy is only one of six golfers of all time to achieve this remarkable feat; others include Tiger Woods and Jack Nicklaus.
