For the people who don't know what this school is, West Point is The United States Military Academy, also known as West Point, is a U.S. service academy located in West Point, New York. There are five federal service academies, with each focused on a different branch of the military. West Point represents the Army. The goal of the United States Military Academy is to train future Army officers to lead with character, develop academically through its college system, and develop as competent military leaders through advanced military training.

Colin wants to attend here to become an officer in the US Army. His dream job is to be a combat engineering officer, and West Point provides the opportunity to get that job after graduation. Another motivation of his for attending West Point was its world-class education. West Point has one of the best engineering and liberal arts programs in the country, as well as the best leadership development program in the country. "I know that by attending West Point, I will get a great education in both engineering and leadership. (On a side note, attending West Point is entirely free of cost for every cadet, sweetening the deal)."

Colin has given us a step by step breakdown of what he had to do, because West Point is more than a traditional college, so a lot more goes into the application process.

- 1. In the winter of my Junior year, I applied to go to West Point's Summer Leaders Experience (SLE). This is a week-long opportunity in June that allows you to live like a cadet, helping you better understand cadet life and decide if you want to attend. This program is not required for admission. However, I highly recommend attending. I had a great time. Thanks to my experience, I better understood the admissions process, and I was able to meet my admissions officer and get on their radar.
- 2. One essential part of the admissions process is that you must pass the Candidate Fitness Assessment (CFA). This is a requirement

for admission. It includes push-ups, pull-ups, sit-ups, a basketball throw, a 10-meter shuttle run, and a 1-mile run. If you attend SLE, you will have the opportunity to take the CFA at West Point. If you don't attend SLE, you can take it at your own time.



- 3. After attending SLE, I began working on my application for the West Point Class of 2029. The application includes essays, surveys, and information about your extracurricular activities.
- 4. To be considered for admission, you must be medically qualified. To earn this qualification, you will fill out information through DoD MERB and see a Department of Defense doctor for an examination. I began this

in August. The process took a very long time for me because I had a disqualifying condition that required a waiver.

- 5. Another admission requirement is that you must receive a nomination from a congressman or senator. These legislators have applications and interviews held in the fall.
- 6. You must take the SAT or ACT to attend West Point. Unlike other colleges, you are required to submit scores to West Point. To be competitive for an appointment (offer of admission) you should aim to score above 1200 on the SAT and above 28 on the ACT.

Colin plans to study either engineering or applied mathematics. Either one of these disciplines will give him the best chance of getting a job as a combat engineer upon graduation. Traditionally, West Point has had a strong engineering program, which will provide him with great opportunities to learn.

I asked Colin how he feels about attending West Point this summer! He says "I am very excited to attend. From the cadets I have talked to, I learned that it is common to feel nervous, as for many, it is the biggest challenge they have faced in their lives. However, I am confident that my academic preparation at HCS and my physical training at the gym will help me succeed in Cadet Basic Training this summer and in the upcoming fall semester."

Congratulations Colin on this great accomplishment! The HCS community is very proud of you and can't wait to see what great things you do on your next step!

Agriscience Happenings Recap

Recently, the agriscience class has been working hard in class, learning many new things. For example, right before break, they learned more about plants and how they function.

First, the class worked on repotting plants. To do this, they used small plants that had just started to sprout and had grown for a little while in larger pots to give them more room to grow. They squeezed the outer part of the smaller pots to loosen the soil for transferring it to the larger pots. Then they moved the dirt in the larger pot to the side to create a designated spot for placing the plant. Once they finished repotting their plants, they had to make tabs that showed the plant that was in the pot and the date that it was planted. Finally, the students brought the whole tray into the greenhouse so that it could remain healthy and sustained.

The next thing they started to work on was assembling a flower. To do this, the students cut out petals from the packet that they got and started to color them. Once they had finished coloring the petals, they cut them out and taped



two
petals
together
to make a
total of
six petals.
Then the
students
took
floral
wire and
glued or

taped a thing of it to each petal. Then, they connected each wire for a makeshift stem and then had the base of their flower. Then they used a pipe cleaner to add more stability along with floral tape. Finally, they labeled the parts of a flower, such as the stamen, stigma, petals, etc. Once they were done and finished with their flower, they were all set with that and moved on to more interesting things.

The last thing that they were working on was inoculating mushrooms. They started by drilling holes into logs of a tree. Each one was an inch deep and four inches apart from one another. Once they had finished drilling, they started to inoculate. They took the inoculators and "pounded" them into the mushroom and sawdust mixture. Then, they hovered the inoculator over each hole and put the mushroom mixture into the hole. Once the entire log was filled, they brought the log over to the wax station to seal it off. Finally, the logs are brought out to the woods and kept there for about nine months until they sprout.

Overall, this class has been working well on all of the assignments that have been thrown their way. Be sure to check in next week to see what they will be moving on to next! West Hill Lacrosse Incident By Ezra Stahlberg

On April 24th in Syracuse NY, the Westhill lacrosse team's seniors kidnapped 5 Westhill lacrosse first-year students. They set up a trap where they pretended to be masked men, holding guns and knives; they would jump out at the first-year students. They would kidnap the first-year students, put bags over their heads, take them to a wooded area, and drop them off. One of the victims, Fitzpatrick, stated, "People came out of the woods all dressed in black. They were armed with what appeared to be at least one handgun and at least one knife," According to NBC News. The students also videotaped the incident, and, according to Fitzpatrick, "they found the incident amusing." He was later returned home by the group with little to no physical injuries. However, the emotional trauma

he and the other victims experienced is immeasurable. The other cases state that some of the other kids were able to escape the kidnapping



attempt, but who knows how many times they pulled this stunt?

After Fitzpatrick got home, he took it to the sheriff's office, where they had posted a 48-hour warning for the boys involved in the incident. The sheriff's office stated, "You have 48 hours to turn yourself in to the sheriff's... You will not be spending time in the public safety building, you will not have bail set, you will be released to the custody of your parents." Although these boys will be tried in a family court, if some of them do not turn themselves in by this period, they could face serious charges as adults. Fitzpatrick stated that a couple of the individuals were over the age of 18, showing that he knows who they are, making it impossible for the boys to get away without turning themselves in. The potential legal consequences are severe, and the boys involved must face the reality of their actions.

A hazing incident of this seriousness and local impact is a poignant reminder of the dangers of hazing and the trouble it can cause. It not only affects the victims but also those responsible for the acts. The impact on the Boys' lacrosse team is significant, despite the majority of the team not being involved in the incident. The team's season has been canceled, and the program's cultural views will most definitely be revised.

Trump Hit with Over 200 Lawsuits in First 100 Days

Trump Proposes Mining in International Waters

On Thursday, April 24, President Donald Trump signed an executive order to fast-track permits for underwater mining. Potato-sized nodules of rare earth elements and critical metals such as lithium and cobalt that total over 1 billion tons have been found spread across US and international waters in the Pacific Ocean. China currently supplies most of the world with these materials. With trade between the US and China practically nonexistent due to the tariffs both

countries have imposed, America's demand for these materials is not being met. Trump's goal is to have an American mining operation retrieve these metals so



that it is not necessary to change his trade policies to acquire them.

However, Trump is facing a lot of backlash from the international community for this decision. Most members of the United Nations signed the 1982 United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea, a treaty which, among other things, bans underwater mining in international waters. While Trump is not technically violating this treaty, since the US never ratified it, China, the EU, and Britain have criticized Trump for permitting mining before the UN's International Seabed Authority could create firm regulations

on these operations, as they plan to do by the end of this year.

Trump has also been criticized by several climate activist organizations such as Greenpeace. These groups are concerned about the environmental impact that the mining operations could have. Previous research indicates that while some small sand-dwelling creatures would be able to return to the area after the mining operations, larger animals would be impacted by the loss of the nutrients that the nodules provide, and would never be able to repopulate the area.

A Violent Derecho with 90-mph Winds Made a 500-mile Path of Damage

Serial Killer in Connecticut

In the early months of 2025 a series of discovered murders across New England Spark fields of a serial killer. Between the months of March and April over eight bodies, mostly women were found in Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts. The most recent discovery occurred in Massachusetts causing public concern. Law-enforcement agencies have not established any connection among these murders and have shut down claims of the serial killer. They emphasize that these investigations are

going on separately and that they do not have any sort of connection.

In Connecticut 50 year-old Susan Wormer initially fuelled these



fears. Her body was found dismembered in a suitcase near the cemetery on March 19. Donald Coffel was arrested and charged with her murder; he had been living in Wormser since December 2024. Authorities confirmed that this case was a domestic homicide and not connected to any of the other killings.

Because of the lack of evidence linking these cases there is no obvious reason to point to a serial killer. However social media speculations have been flowing. A Facebook group called the "New England serial killer" has over 65,000 members contributing public fear. to officials Law-enforcement caution listening to speculation. They also know that it can cause problems with investigations and spread unnecessary fear if you believe what you read online.

As investigations continue, authorities emphasize the importance of relying on only verified information and caution the public not to draw conclusions without any evidence. They continue to assure the public that all cases are being thoroughly investigated and that their communities are safe.

Who Will Be the Next Pope?

Pope Francis passed away at the age of 88 on Easter Monday after a two month-long battle with pneumonia. In accordance with his wishes,

he was buried on Saturday, April 26 in the Basilica of St. Mary Major, just outside of the Vatican's walls. A public viewing of the tomb was held on Sunday, with more than 13,000 coming to pay their respects.



Now that the late pope has been buried, the conversation in the Vatican has turned to his replacement. On Monday, April 28, Vatican spokesperson Matteo Bruni announced that the papal conclave will begin on May 7.

The conclave is the process through which a new pope is chosen. 135 cardinals from around the world will gather in Rome, where they will each give speeches to the others about their interpretation of the Bible and the direction that they think the Catholic Church's policies should move in. *Detroit Catholic* has identified twelve *papabili*, or cardinals who are likely candidates for the papacy; however, any baptised Catholic man is technically eligible for the papacy, though it is incredibly unlikely that someone who is not a cardinal will be elected. Any of the cardinals could be elected based on their speeches. More information about Pope Francis's successor will come in the next few weeks.

Vancouver Filipino Festival Car Ramming

On Saturday, April 26th, 2025, there was a street festival that was to celebrate Filipino heritage on Saturday, April 26th, 2025 in Vancouver. There were many food trucks lined down the street, and there were many performers who started performing their traditional Filipino dance in the nice spring sunshine, but this family-friendly event turned out to be "Horror".

One person described this event as "a warzone, with bodies seen laying on the street." When someone drove right into the crowd and ended up killing approximately 11 people. Police said it was "the darkest day" in the city of Vancouver's history. The suspect who drove right into the crowd was charged with eight counts of second-degree murder. Police said, "This incident happened at approximately 8 pm local time when a guy drove a black Audi SUV into a large crowd of people who were attending the Lapu Lapu Day Festival, which was near East 43rd Avenue and Fraser Street."

Police said the people who have been killed were in the age range of 5 through 65. On



Sunday, April 27th, 2025, police put out a statement that people helped chase the suspect, and police identified the

suspect as Kai-Ji Adam Lo, a 30-year-old resident of Vancouver who was arrested on the scene and had a history of mental health-related interactions with authorities before. "The suspect

Kai-Ji Adam Lo is in court and will remain in custody", said Vancouver police. Rai, a resident of Vancouver, told reporters on Sunday, "The actions of a single person shattered our collective sense of safety. It is impossible to overstate how many lives have been impacted forever by this lone individual."

History of the Kentucky Derby

May third of this year marks the start of one of the most prestigious sporting events in American culture, held at the iconic Churchill Downs in Louisville, Kentucky. The Kentucky Derby is an annual horse racing event that has been taking place in the United States for 151 years. It is widely regarded as the premier horse racing event in the world, featuring some of the fastest horses on the planet. Each year, this covenanted sporting event attracts over 16.7 million viewers, with millions of dollars wagered on it.



This event is one of the most challenging races to qualify for; these horses must compete in numerous races across the country, finishing in

the top 5 and earning points. And through earning these points, the horses can qualify by placing in the top 20 point earners. Despite this incredible effort from the horses and their crew, the Kentucky Derby is only a short 2-minute race. This brevity adds to the intensity and excitement of the event, as it's a test of pure speed and endurance to declare the fastest horse in the world.

These traditions date back to 1875, when the Kentucky Derby's inaugural race was held by a man named Meriwether Lewis Clark, a prominent Louisville citizen who founded the Louisville Jockey Club. He was examining the success of Derby races in Europe, specifically the Epsom Derby. He observed the class and wealth associated with these events and concluded that it was precisely the sporting event that the United States could utilize. He particularly wanted to keep the same class and tradition of races like the Epsom Derby.

The race, in its first 25 years, was not as successful as he had hoped. It wasn't until Meriwether's death and the business was acquired by Matt Winn that the facility became incredibly successful in 1902, emerging as a major horse racing event for adolescent

thoroughbreds. Matt Winn made a critical choice, which was to maintain the same class and prestige around the event as before, to help carry it to the prestigious race that we all know today.

Today, the Kentucky Derby is not just a race, but an experience that ignites excitement and anticipation among fans. It is considered one of the most exciting and prestigious horse racing events in the world, earning a fan favorite status among people at home. Last year, over 233.03 million bets were placed on the Kentucky Derby, a testament to the thrill and unpredictability of the race. With crowds of over 150,000 people, the Kentucky Derby is undoubtedly a fan favorite and an event not to be missed.
