Dr. Mike Looney has served as the Superintendent for the Fulton County School District in Georgia since June 2019. In the middle of his first year on the job, he became the first school leader in the state to be faced with reacting to the unknown — a confirmed, positive case of COVID-19. He immediately jumped into action and called upon his 28 years as an educator, including 15 years of previous experience as a school superintendent in Tennessee and Alabama, and as a retired marine, father and community leader, to guide the district through two years of COVID-19 protocols and safety measures, all while maintaining a focus on the mission of educating students.

# TO THE BRIDGE TO SUCCESS PLAN



Over the past three years, Fulton County Schools has embarked on a transformative journey through the Bridge to Success plan, leveraging federal ARP and ESSER funds to address the challenges brought by the COVID-19 pandemic. This ambitious plan aimed to ensure the health, safety, and academic progress of our students while fostering innovation and growth across the district.

A hallmark of the Bridge to Success plan was the **Every Child Reads** initiative, which demonstrated the district's long-term commitment to district-wide literacy improvement. This program focused on providing essential literacy support as well as evidence-based instruction and extensive professional development to ensure students had the opportunity to read at or above grade level. The success of this initiative continues to have a lasting impact, with literacy remaining a key focus of the district's academic agenda.

The Bridge to Success plan was designed with several key priorities in mind, including creating safe learning environments, addressing learning disruptions, and supporting academic achievement through targeted interventions. Initiatives such as **Leadership Development, FOCUS**, and **Expanded Programs** were critical in helping students and staff adapt to new learning environments and equipping them with the skills needed for long-term success. Leadership Development focused on fostering strong educational leaders across the district, while FOCUS accelerated student learning through extended learning opportunities and small-group interventions. Expanded Programs introduced innovative career pathways and learning opportunities, including additional Career Technical and Agricultural Education (CTAE) options.

Additionally, the **Textbook Adoption** initiative ensured that students had access to high-quality, standards-aligned instructional materials, supporting both literacy and numeracy skills. The **Student Safety** initiative played a vital role in improving school climate by implementing the Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program as well as fair discipline processes.

To ensure the safety and well-being of students and staff, the **Business Continuity** initiative made investments in personal protective equipment (PPE), sanitation efforts, and health services, which allowed for the continuity of face-to-face instruction.

Throughout the implementation of the Bridge to Success plan, Fulton County Schools remained committed to transparency and accountability. A cross-functional team of district leaders worked together to track progress, allocate resources effectively, and provide regular updates to the community. This collaborative effort ensured that the district maximized the impact of over \$168 million in funding to support the success of students and staff.

As we reflect on the achievements of the Bridge to Success plan, it is evident that the district's efforts have left a lasting impact. Fulton County Schools is now better positioned to continue supporting growth and innovation, ensuring the district is equipped to excel in the years to come.




# **FOCUS: ACCELERATING STUDENT LEARNING**



**Objective:** Accelerate student learning equitably.

**Overview:** The FOCUS initiative, developed early in 2021, targeted academic recovery by expanding effective educational practices. With a \$45 million budget (60% of the CARES II funds), it involved implementation in schools across the district, with participation in extended learning programs and significant improvements in student outcomes. Feedback from students, parents, and educators highlighted the program's effectiveness.



## **Key Elements:**

- Extended learning time through summer school and after-school programs.
- High-dosage, small-group instruction tailored to students' needs.
- Frequent assessments to monitor progress.
- Curriculum mapping to align instruction with critical areas of learning recovery.
- Increased parent engagement for support at home.

## **Success Indicators:**

- Improved student achievement scores.
- Reduced learning gaps across demographics.
- Positive feedback on small-group instruction.

# **EVERY CHILD READS: LITERACY TRANSFORMATION**



**Objective:** Ensure 95% of students read at or above grade level.

## **Key Elements:**

- Teacher professional development in literacy instruction.
- Enhanced curriculum and resources aligned with the Science of Reading.
- Early intervention programs for struggling readers.

The **Every Child Reads** initiative was a multi-year literacy strategy developed by Fulton County Schools to achieve the district's ambitious goal of having 95% of all students reading at or above grade level. The initiative was built on five key pillars: **Community Partnership, Talent** 



Acquisition, Professional Development, Resources, and a Multi-tiered System of Student Support. These components worked together to reform literacy instruction across the district, ensuring that students received the comprehensive support they needed to succeed. From introducing a district-wide dyslexia screener to hiring a new Literacy Director and K-2 literacy coaches, Every Child Reads strategically invested in both human capital and instructional resources to foster a culture of literacy excellence.

Professional development was a cornerstone of the initiative, with extensive **LETRS** training (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling) provided to



teachers and administrators to master essential reading skills. Literacy training and new English/Language Arts (ELA) resources were implemented district-wide, with positive trends in student reading levels..


To further enhance learning, middle and high school students benefited from targeted small-group instruction, while vocabulary resources were provided to support word learning across various subjects. These combined efforts ensured that literacy remained a priority, setting students on a path to long-term academic success.

# **TEXTBOOK ADOPTION: ALIGNING INSTRUCTIONAL RESOURCES**


The **Textbook Adoption** initiative aimed to align instructional resources with state standards and provide teachers and students with high-quality materials to enhance literacy and learning across all grade levels. This initiative was grounded in the Science of Reading and focused on ensuring that every student received explicit, rigorous instruction tailored to their developmental needs.

As part of this initiative, Fulton County Schools adopted K-12 Reading/ English Language Arts (ELA) resources for the 2022-2023 school year, which were closely aligned with the Georgia Standards of Excellence curriculum standards. These resources emphasized the five pillars of reading: phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. Key materials included **Heggerty** for phonemic awareness in grades K-2, **Core 95 Phonics** for grades K-3, and **Vocabulary Surge** for grades 4-5. A core reading/ELA resource was also adopted at all levels. **Wonders by McGraw Hill** was adopted for elementary levels and **Savvas myPerspectives** was implemented for grades 6-12.



# **EXPANDED PROGRAM OPTIONS: DIVERSE LEARNING PATHWAYS**



**Objective:** Offer diverse learning pathways.

**Overview:** This initiative opened new doors for our students by offering Career Technical and Agricultural Education (CTAE) programs, virtual learning opportunities, mobile learning innovations, and a programmatic focus on dropout prevention.

- Career Technical and Agricultural Education (CTAE) expansion
- Dropout Prevention
- Virtual Learning Expansion

## **Success Indicators:**

- Summer learning programs grew to record levels, serving over 16,000 students in 2023, through face-to-face and virtual options.



The **Expanded Programs** initiative significantly broadened educational pathways for students by incorporating a variety of learning opportunities. This initiative included expanded Career Technical and Agricultural Education (CTAE) options, dropout prevention strategies, virtual learning expansion, cultural enrichment experiences, and mobile learning centers to reach underserved communities.

The **CTAE Expansion** provided both in-school and out-of-school career exploration opportunities. Highlights included the purchase of zSpace materials for eight elementary schools offering CTAE as part of their specials program,

stipends for teachers completing the Computer Science Certification cohort, and the opening of **The Promise Career Institute (TPCI)** in August 2024. TPCI's launch followed 2.5 years of preparation, including the purchase of CTAE equipment and materials for certification pathways, and a shuttle bus to transport students to Atlanta Technical College. These efforts increased the number of students completing CTAE pathways and receiving industry certifications.

# **EXPANDED PROGRAM OPTIONS: DIVERSE LEARNING PATHWAYS**







**Dropout Prevention** strategies included **In-School Academies** aimed at reducing dropout rates and increasing graduation numbers and the expansion of **Student and Family Engagement (SAFE) Centers**. Originally launched at Banneker High School, the expansion now includes North Springs and Tri-Cities high schools and provides academic, social, and emotional support services.



The **Virtual Learning Expansion** extended the district's digital curriculum, covering

90% of courses for students in grades K-11. Middle and high school teachers received Canvas Learning Management System training to enable seamless integration of online learning. The expanded development of digital courses and technical support has ensured long-term sustainability.

The **Cultural Kaleidoscope** program provided over 41,000 elementary students with arts and cultural experiences, field trips, and study guides during the 2023-2024 school year. The initiative also introduced the **Museum Georgia Geography exhibit** and **Untying the Knot exhibit**, which engaged students in hands-on cultural and historical learning experiences.

Additionally, two **Mobile Learning Centers** were deployed to extend elementary science and STEM activities to students in the district and provide access to enhanced educational experiences in the community.

By embracing these diverse and innovative approaches, the Expanded Programs initiative has significantly enhanced access to high-quality education, reduced dropout rates, and increased student engagement across the district, positioning Fulton County Schools as a leader in educational innovation.

# **LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT: BUILDING CAPACITY**



**Objective:** Develop high-quality leaders across the district.

## **Key Elements:**

- Coaching and mentoring for school leaders.
- Professional Learning Communities for peer support.

## **Success Indicators:**

- Enhanced leadership capacity.
- Improved school performance.
- Retention of skilled school leaders.

The **Leadership Certification Program** initiative was designed to cultivate and enhance leadership capacity across the district. With the growing need for highly qualified school leaders, this initiative offered a comprehensive program to develop current and aspiring leaders through coaching, mentoring, and high-quality professional learning opportunities.

The **Leadership Certification Program** was developed in partnership with Georgia State University (GSU) to provide a pathway for district educators to advance into assistant principal, principal, and even superintendent roles. Participants engaged in a rigorous curriculum taught by both GSU professors and district leaders, ensuring alignment with the school system's best practices. To support professional growth, Fulton County Schools covered all expenses, including tuition, textbooks, and practicum materials.

A standout feature of the program was the mentoring component, where participants were paired with experienced leaders to guide them through their certification journey. By investing in leadership development, the district ensured its schools were led by capable and visionary leaders, ready to drive student success and school performance. This not only strengthened the

district's leadership capacity but also contributed to the long-term retention of highly qualified staff, setting the stage for ongoing success.



# STUDENT SAFETY: PROMOTING POSITIVE SCHOOL ENVIRONMENTS

The **Student Safety** initiative was designed to foster a safe and supportive learning environment for students by enhancing school climate and culture. This multi-faceted initiative aimed to improve student behavior through the Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program and ensure fair discipline processes across the district.

Behavior interventions played a critical role in this initiative, offering support to students with disabilities and other behavioral needs. Academic interventionists worked closely with middle and high schools in Academic Zones 1-3, providing intense support through multi-tiered



systems of support and collaborating with graduation coaches to implement the district's **Dropout Prevention** plan.



By addressing behavioral challenges and enhancing the overall school environment, the **Student Safety** initiative helped create a more positive and secure atmosphere for both students and staff. These combined efforts not only improved behavior management but also contributed to a more successful and engaging learning experience across the district.

# **BUSINESS CONTINUITY: ENSURING STABILITY**



**Objective:** Maintain district operations amid disruptions.

## **Key Elements:**

- Financial stability and program monitoring.
- Innovative solutions for continuous educational functions.

### **Success Indicators:**

- Seamless continuation of programs during the pandemic.
- Efficient use of financial resources.
- Positive stakeholder feedback.

The **Business Continuity** initiative ensured the seamless operation of district services amid the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. This initiative focused on maintaining financial stability, supporting district-wide operations, and implementing innovative solutions that allowed Fulton County Schools to continue providing high-quality education and services without disruption.

Key components of the initiative included the provision of **personal** 

protective equipment (PPE) for schools, clinics, and administrative buildings to help mitigate the spread of COVID-19 as well as investing in employee wellness, which focused on the mental, physical, nutritional, and financial health of district staff. Programs such as mobile health units, annual health expos, and the creation of wellness rooms at school and administrative sites were expanded to promote well-being and boost morale.

The initiative also enhanced operational efficiency by introducing **school bus simulators** to train drivers, reducing accidents and providing funding for additional staffing and substitutes to support schools during reopening.

Throughout the pandemic, Fulton County Schools consistently monitored expenditures and ensured compliance with federal requirements. By addressing



the challenges of the pandemic head-on, this initiative allowed the district to safeguard the health of its students and staff, maintain essential services, and ensure the district's long-term operational stability.

# SUSTAINING THE PROGRESS AND INITIATIVES BEYOND FEDERAL FUNDING



As Fulton County Schools transitions out of the Bridge to Success plan and into the district's long-term strategic framework, sustaining the progress made through this initiative remains a key priority. The vision of the Bridge to Success plan served as a stepping stone and laid the foundation for the future. The success achieved using funding from the American Rescue Plan has provided invaluable experience and lessons that will guide the district moving forward.

Building on the Bridge to Success, Fulton County Schools' new strategic plan highlights its values of **Teamwork, Integrity, and Accountability**. These values serve as guiding principles as the district works to maintain the momentum created over the past three years. The cross-functional teamwork employed to manage and implement these initiatives — breaking down silos between departments — will remain a central feature of how the school system operates. Guided by data from program evaluation, the district will continue to support and build on the initiatives that focus on literacy, accelerate student learning, and prioritize student safety.

Ultimately, the Bridge to Success plan has set Fulton County Schools on a path to not only recover from the pandemic's impacts but to thrive in the years ahead. With strategic planning, careful resource allocation, and a continued commitment to core values, the progress made over the past three years will continue to benefit students, staff, and the broader community well into the future.
