The 2025 FRC Robotics season has come to a triumphant close, and Team 1287 – Aluminum Assault – has plenty to celebrate. At our firstever end-of-season banquet, students, mentors, and families gathered to reflect on what has been the most successful season in team history.

This year, Aluminum Assault ranked 5th in South Carolina and placed in the top 500 teams worldwide—a remarkable achievement given the thousands of teams competing globally in the FIRST Robotics Competition.

Along the way, the team earned two major honors: the Gracious Professionalism Award at the District Championships, recognizing their team spirit, respect, and integrity; and the Excellence in Industrial Design Award, sponsored by General Motors, for outstanding engineering and design excellence.
