At South St. Paul Public Schools, students don't have to wait until after graduation to start building their futures. From preschool through 12th grade, Packer Pathways helps students discover their passions, connect them to real-world opportunities, and prepare them for life after graduation, whether that's college, career, or both.

One powerful example is the **TriDistrict CAPS (Center for Advanced Professional Studies)** program, part of the **Packer Pathways** experience. CAPS is a real-world learning program for juniors and seniors in South St. Paul. Through CAPS, students explore careers, gain professional skills, and earn real-world experience all before graduation.


WHAT IS TRIDISTRICT CAPS?

CAPS is an innovative, career-focused initiative that connects high school students with professional experiences in fields like healthcare, business, education, and IT. Through hands-on learning, mentorship, and partnerships with local industries, students develop essential skills, earn college credit, and gain a clearer vision for their future careers.

FORGING THEIR OWN PATH: STUDENT SPOTLIGHTS

MAVERICK – TRANSPORTATION AND TRADES

For Maverick, a senior at South St. Paul High School, learning never looked like sitting at a traditional desk. It looked like tool carts, light switches, and a full-time job before graduation.

He joined the **Transportation and Trades Pathway** through CAPS, exploring hands-on trades and completing an internship at North American Trailer in Inver Grove Heights. Today, he works there full-time. “It taught us trade and life skills, things you don't always learn sitting at a desk,” he says. “It helps prepare you for the real world.”

MARIANA – HEALTHCARE CAREERS AND MEDICINE

For Mariana, another SSPHS senior, learning means scrubbing dental tools, organizing instruments, and earning college credit in the **Healthcare Careers and Medicine Pathway**.


Through her internship at Horton Orthodontics, she works as a sterilization technician gaining real experience in a dental clinic while confirming her future path to become a dental hygienist. Her advice for other students? “Apply! There are so many opportunities to learn and meet new people.”

SSP STUDENTS PITCH BIG BUSINESS IDEAS


South St. Paul High School Business students and TriDistrict CAPS participants recently pitched their business ideas for:

- Micro-internships for all students to refine ideas
- “Entrepreneur in Residence” titles awarded to one business at each event

Partnering with Rêve Academy, students presented their concepts to local leaders, school staff, and industry professionals during two pitch events with SSP students.

STUDENTS TAKE ON CHRONIC ABSENTEEISM

Students in the TriDistrict CAPS Healthcare Careers program are turning research into action. They addressed chronic absenteeism from a student perspective.

Through interviews, surveys, and conversations with peers, staff, and public health experts, students uncovered key barriers to attendance, including:

- Mental health challenges
- Lack of sleep
- Transportation issues
- Low student engagement

After identifying these issues, students brainstormed real, student-centered solutions and shared their findings with Dakota County Public Health and district leaders, using their voices to advocate for change in their schools. Read the full story at:

MIDDLE SCHOOL PARTNERS WITH GOAL GETTERS ACADEMY

At South St. Paul Middle School, student success means more than just grades, it’s about building confidence, leadership, and a vision for the future. That’s why, in spring 2024, the school partnered with Goal Getters Academy, an innovative program designed to empower students by nurturing leadership, resilience, and academic excellence.

Through a combination of classroom lessons and weekly small-group sessions, students are given space to explore their goals, reflect on their strengths, and map out personal paths to success. These small groups are intentionally formed based on positive peer relationships, creating a safe, supportive environment where students can dream big and build each other up.



Key program features:

- Weekly small-group sessions focused on leadership, goal-setting, and self-reflection
- Student groups formed based on supportive peer relationships
- Selection process using input from teachers, families, and data from attendance, academics, and social-emotional screenings
- Targeted support for students who will benefit most

The program began with 62 students during its first year, made possible through generous support from the South St. Paul Educational Foundation. Building on that strong foundation, and with early signs of academic growth, the school secured additional funding through the State of Minnesota. This year, 79 students in grades 6–8 are taking part, and the school hopes to keep growing the opportunity for even more students in the future.

Early results show promising impact:

- 92% of participants demonstrated consistent academic progress
- 30% showed measurable improvement in academic performance

SSP Middle School hopes to continue expanding this impactful initiative. When students believe in themselves and their potential, there’s no limit to what they can achieve.

More than three years ago, Kaposia students decided to raise money for more and new ninja warrior equipment in the gymnasium in honor of their friend who passed away from cancer. Since then, students have continued raising money to put towards new equipment. This new equipment is used to host ninja and gymnastics after school camps to raise money for community members in the district whose lives have been impacted by cancer. This year, students raised money to support three Kaposia families currently battling cancer.



Using Creativity to Help Fight Hunger

The Lincoln Center Student Ambassadors (student council) partnered with the City of SSP to decorate bags for Knowlan’s Supermarket to promote the SSP 55075 Food Drive. Lincoln Center also hosted their own food drive in March. The students gathered more than 330 pounds of non-perishable food items for Neighbors, Inc. to help feed families in our community.



HANDS-ON EDUCATION AT ALL AGES




Lincoln 2nd graders used potatoes to generate electricity during their in-school field trip with the Bakken Museum.

We look forward to the continued work ahead and to what we can achieve together as we move into next year. Thank you for your partnership and dedication to our school community. Have a wonderful summer!



KICK OFF TO FIRST SEASON OF GIRLS FLAG FOOTBALL

A NEW ERA OF PACKER PRIDE

What started as a four-team pilot last year has quickly grown into a statewide movement and South St. Paul is all in. This spring, SSPPS joined the fast-growing Minnesota Girls Flag Football league, becoming one of 55 teams to launch the sport in their schools. With support and funding from the Minnesota Vikings, the program hit the ground running.

Nearly 50 girls signed up, allowing South St. Paul to form Varsity, JV, and B-Squad teams. Coaches and students alike have been energized by the enthusiasm and talent on the field.

From tryouts and practices, to team-building and gameplay, the Packers are building more than just a team, they’re helping shape the future of girls’ athletics at SSP.
