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Introduction



DISTRICT PROFILE

Gulfport School District’s central office is located at 2001 Pass Road in Gulfport, Mississippi. In January of 2025, the district housed five thousand nine hundred twenty-three (5,923) students in prekindergarten through twelfth grades (PK-12). The district has five elementary schools serving prekindergarten through fifth grade (PK-5), one elementary school serving kindergarten through fifth grade (K-5), two middle schools serving sixth through eighth grade (6-8), and one high school serving ninth through twelfth grade (9-12). The district also runs an alternative education program and a virtual academy.

The district is recognized for its commitment to academic excellence. With an impressive 89.2% graduation rate and an A rating, the district takes pride in its mission of inspiring each student to become a problem solver, lifelong learner, and productive member of society.

The school district has been ranked as one of the top districts in Mississippi by Niche.com. As stated on its website, “Within the Gulfport School District, our schools remain committed to providing educational excellence and a multitude of educational experiences for all of our students. The majority of our students are challenged across a broad spectrum of classes and well-planned extracurricular activities. As a district, we push children academically, we expect them to behave properly, and we are willing to invest ourselves in helping them understand everything from the basic rules of grammar to the complexities of human rights.”

COMMUNITY CHARACTERISTICS

Situated on the Gulf Coast in southern Mississippi, Gulfport gets its name from its port located on the Gulf Coast. In the early 20th century, Gulfport was the largest export city for lumber in the country. Today, Gulfport thrives as a tourist destination, with its beaches and casinos attracting many visitors each year. The city has been hit by two of the strongest hurricanes on record, Camille and Katrina. Gulfport is the co-county seat of Harrison County, sharing that role with Biloxi. In 2024, Gulfport had a population of 70,602 people with a median age of 36.7 and a median household income of \$55,916. Demographically, the population was 50.3% White, 38.1% Black, 1.5% Asian, and 5.9% Hispanic. Between 6% and 7% of the people in Gulfport speak a non-English language, and 96.4% are U.S. citizens. Major industries include health care and social assistance, retail trade, and accommodation and food services. Gulfport is home to the Naval Construction Battalion Center, Gulfport Combat Readiness Training Center, and Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, as well as the Port of Gulfport, one of the busiest in the Gulf of Mexico.

The U. S. Census Bureau estimates the poverty rate for Gulfport to be 27%, with 39% of children birth to 17 years old living in poverty and 37% of children ages 5 to 17 living in poverty-related households.



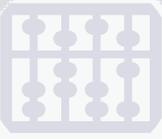


DISTRICT CHARACTERISTICS

The Gulfport School District is in Gulfport, Mississippi. All schools within the district are located within the city limits. Many students are eligible and participate in the district-wide free and reduced lunch program. Office and administrative support occupations, sales occupations, and food preparation and serving related occupations are the primary employment sectors in the community. Hurricanes and tropical storms have had an impact on the district in years past.

Within Gulfport School District, as reported by the *Small Area Income and Poverty Estimate* from the U. S. Census Bureau, about 33% of children between ages 5 and 17 live in poverty-related households.

Figure 1: District Enrollment

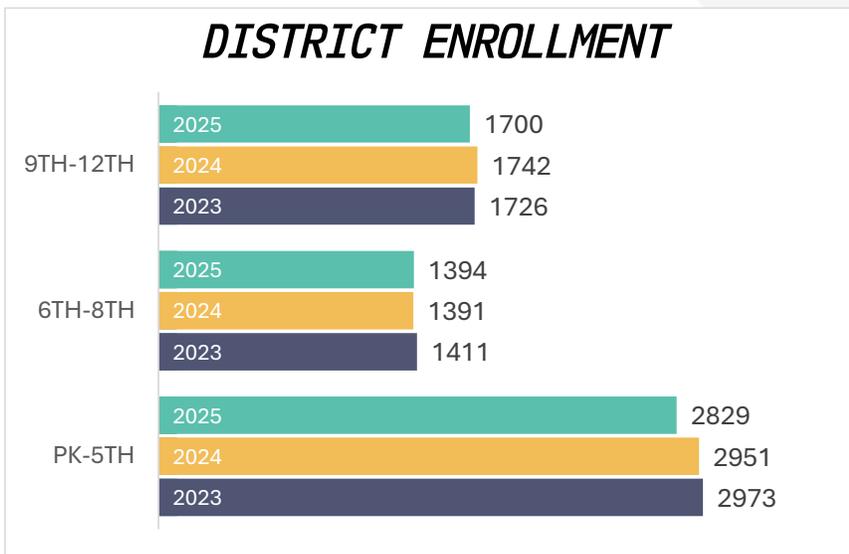


Figure 2: District Enrollment by Grade Group

TAKEAWAY

District enrollment is declining, taking away -3.1% over three years. Decline for the elementary schools was highest at -4.8%.

Demographically, enrollment shifted slightly between 2022 and 2024, resulting in about 1% more students of two or more races. Changes in other racial categories were less than 1%.

Average daily attendance increased to 92.5% of total enrollment between 2022 and 2024. ADA is not counted for prekindergarten.

The district's chronic absence rate was slightly elevated, rising from 20.5% in 2022 to 21.5% in 2024.

NOTE: Because MDE is currently transitioning to a new student information system, enrollment figures for 2025 do not include demographic data or enrollment for special education.

CHRONIC ABSENCE

ACCORDING TO THE MISSISSIPPI DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, any student enrolled in a school for at least 10 days and missing 10% of the school days for which they are enrolled is considered chronically absent. In addition, a student who misses 50% or more of a school day will be counted as absent for that day.

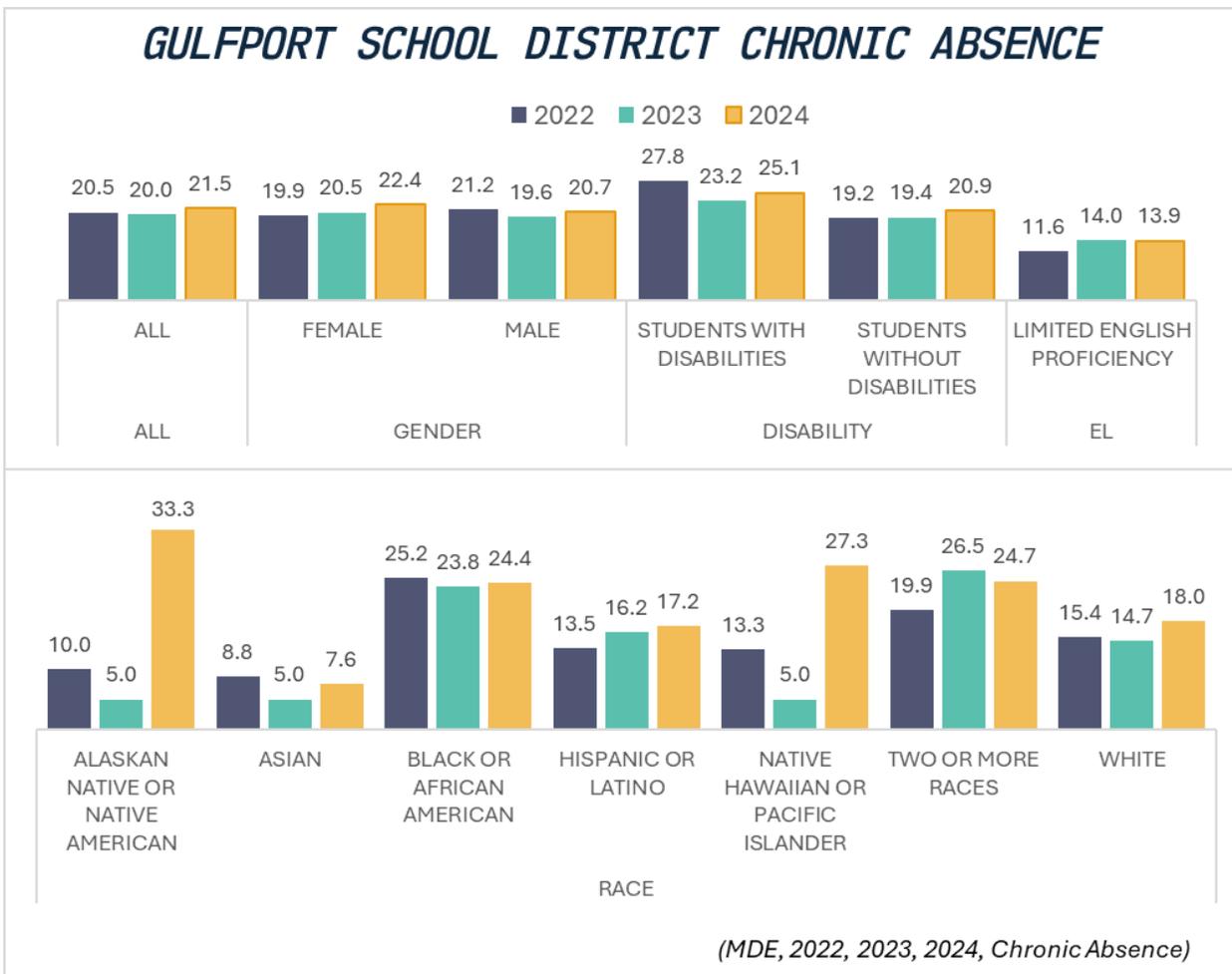
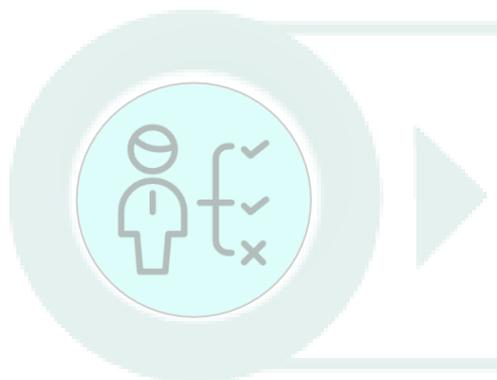


Figure 6: District Chronic Absence



ACCOUNTABILITY

TAKEAWAY

With the district retaining its “A” accountability rating in 2024, it saw increases in all accountability measures except proficiencies for English Learners. Student participation in accelerated courses dropped significantly, while college and career readiness was up.

Proficiency in reading was up across almost all demographic groups from 2023 levels; math scores were higher, as well, for all except students of two or more races. Graduation rates were equal to the state. The dropout rate decreased by 1.1 percentage points but remains just above the state level.

Most demographic groups have reached the 70% proficiency goal MDE set for 2027 in history, science, and math. A little less than half have reached the mark in reading.

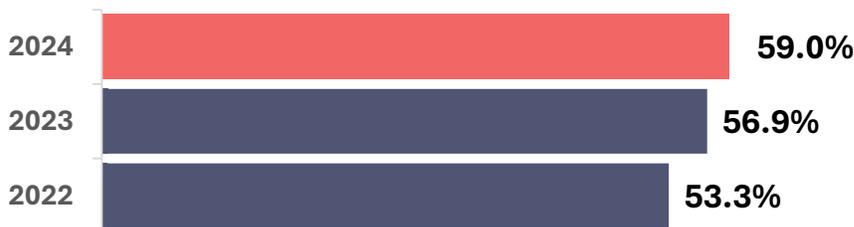

Figure 8: District Accountability: Reading

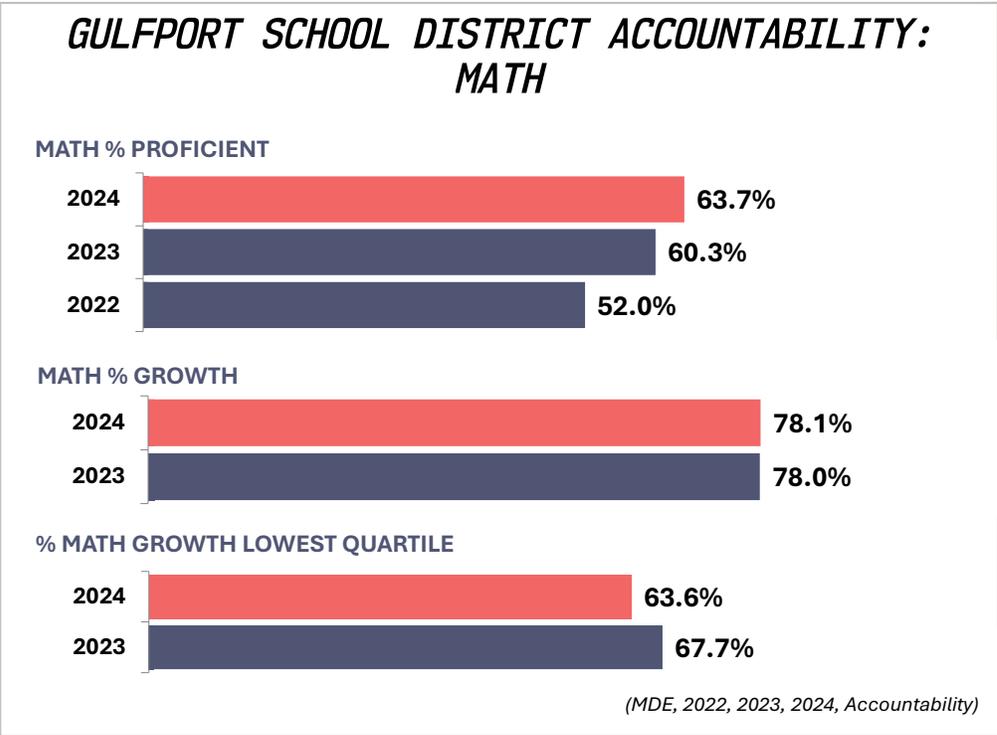


Figure 9: District Accountability: Math

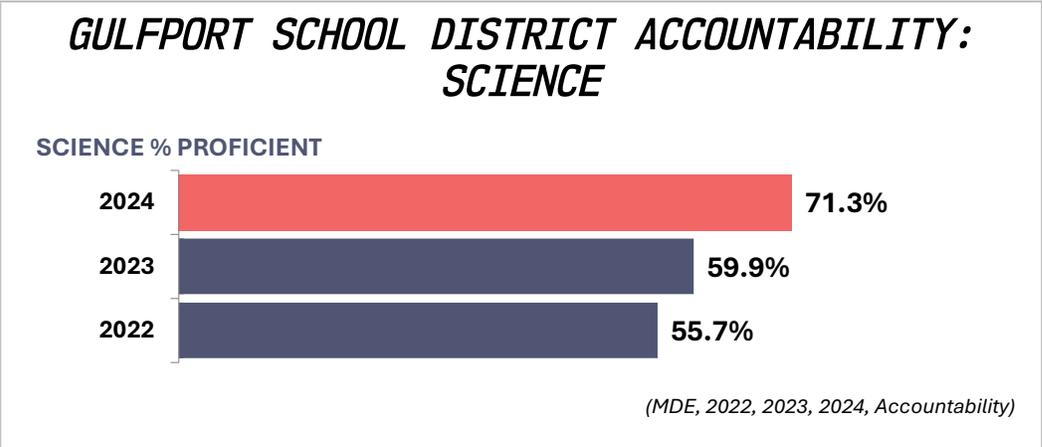


Figure 10: District Accountability: Science

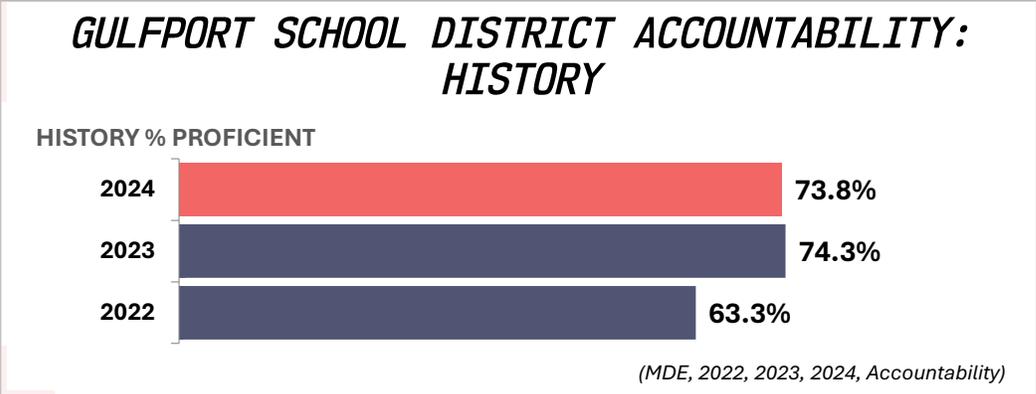


Figure 11: District Accountability: History

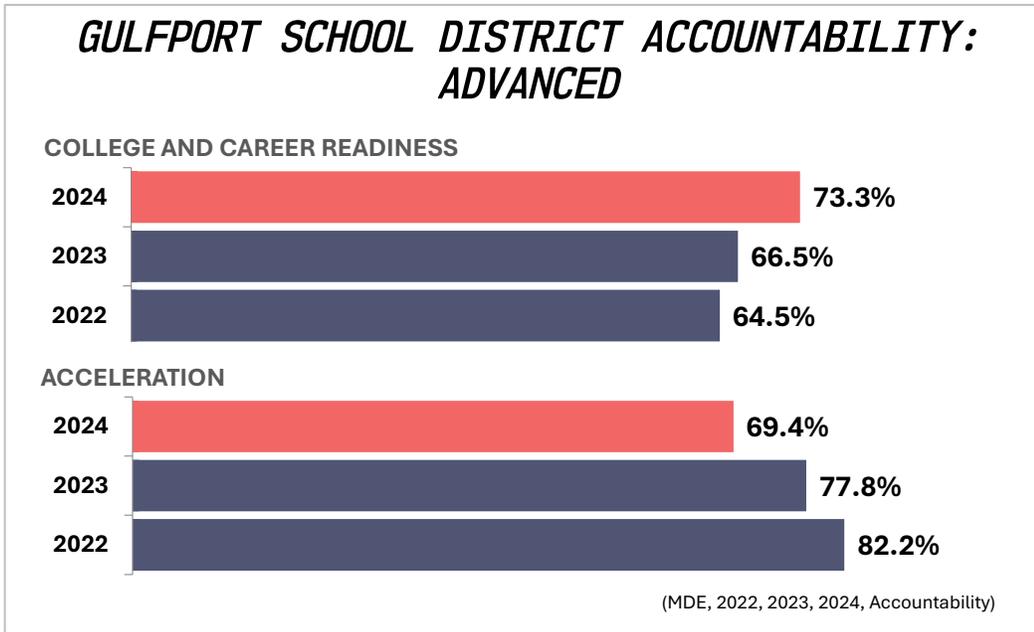


Figure 12: District Accountability: Advanced

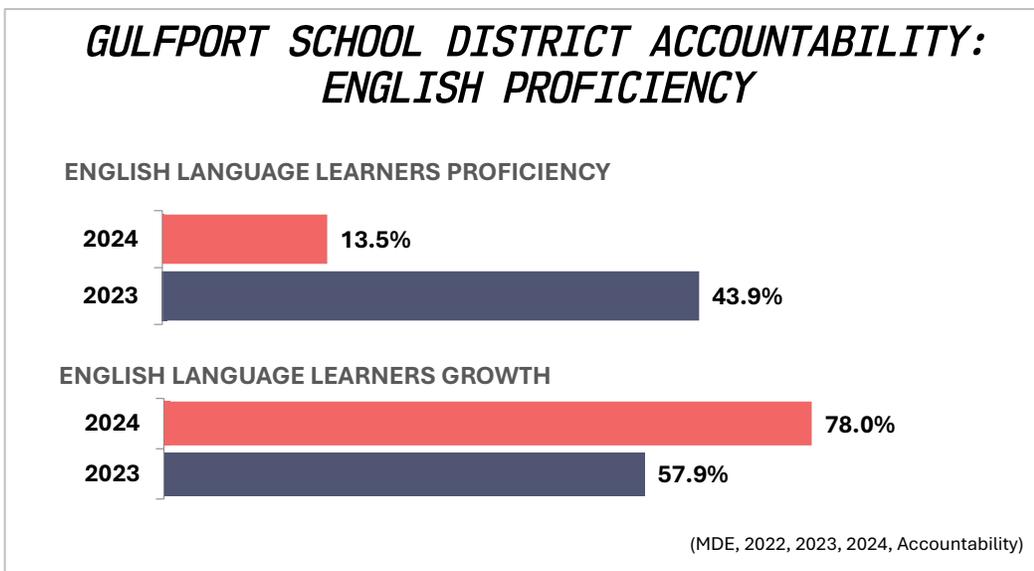
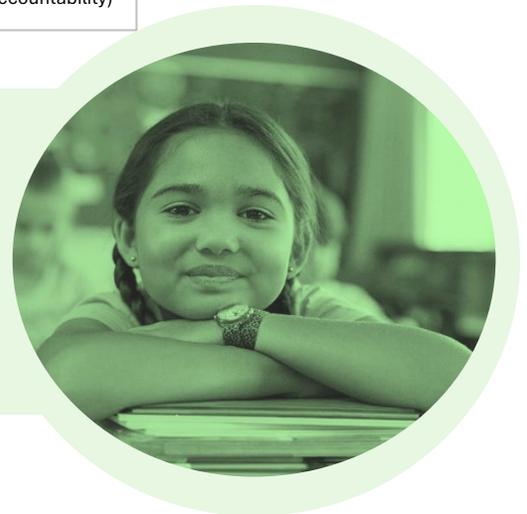


Figure 13: District Accountability: English Proficiency

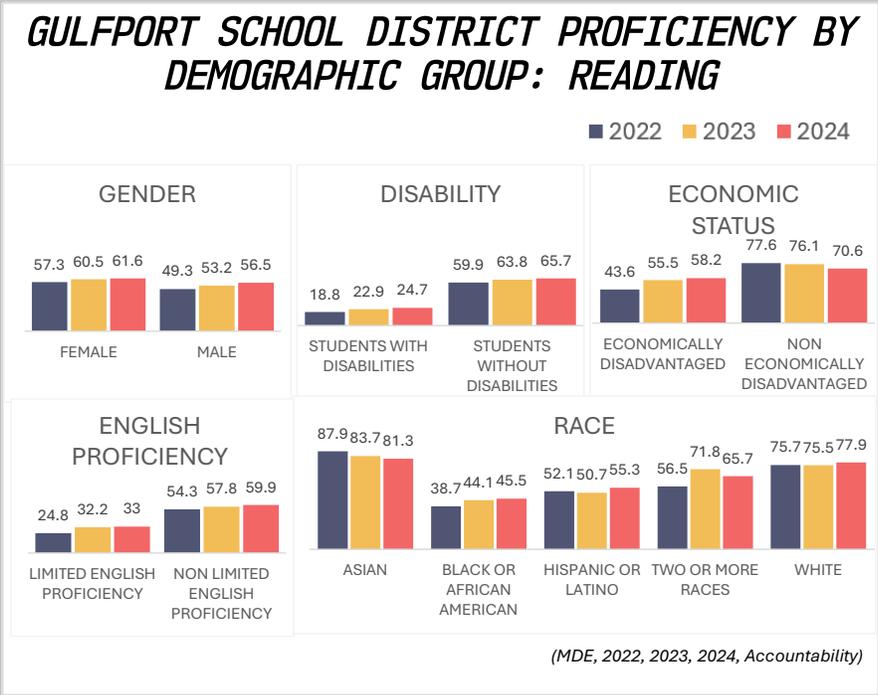
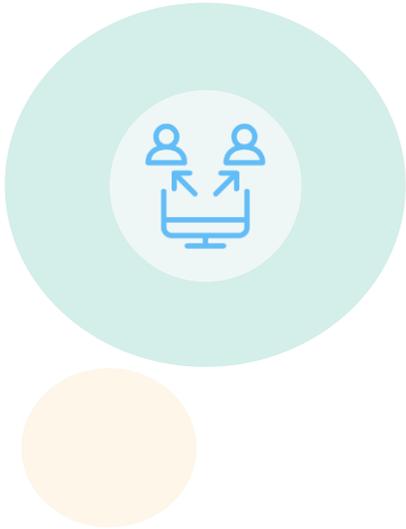


Figure 14: District Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

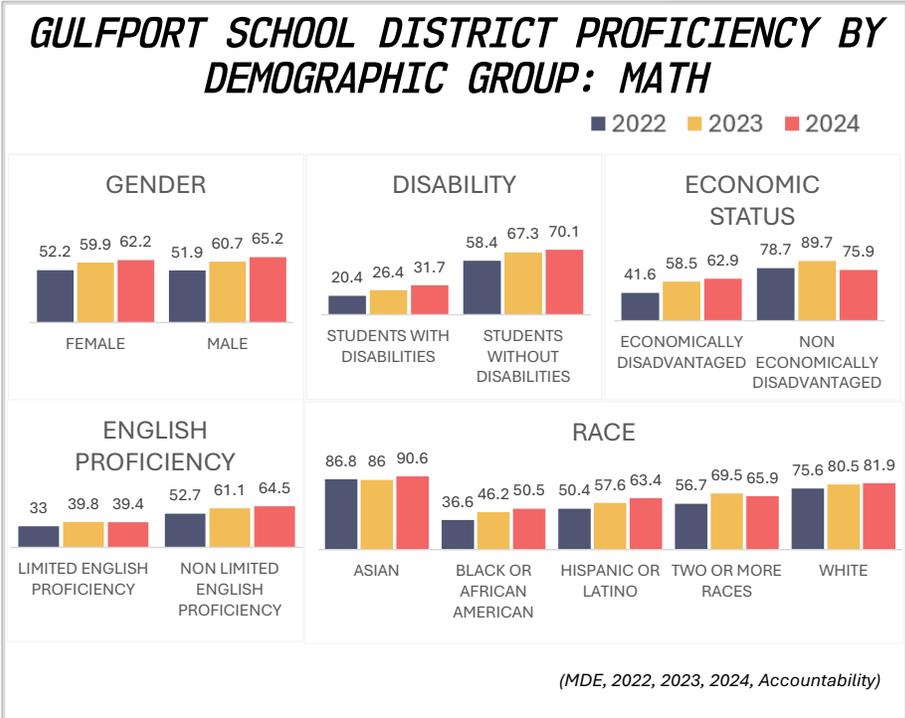


Figure 15: District Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

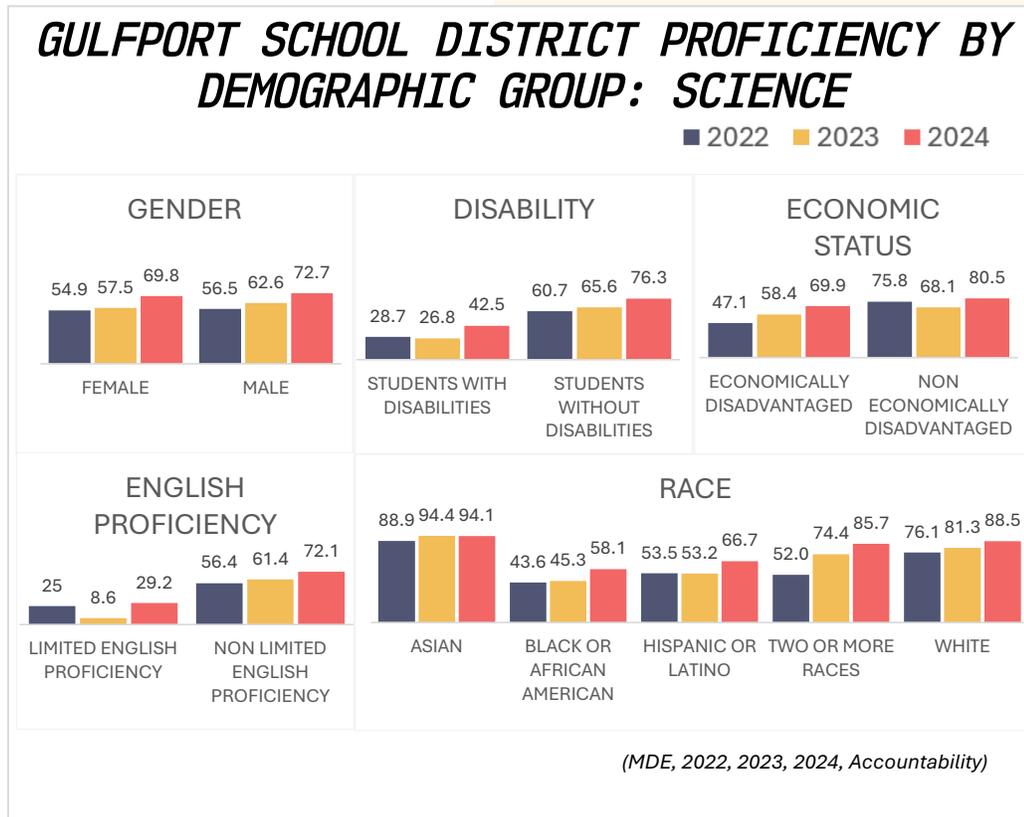


Figure 16: District Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

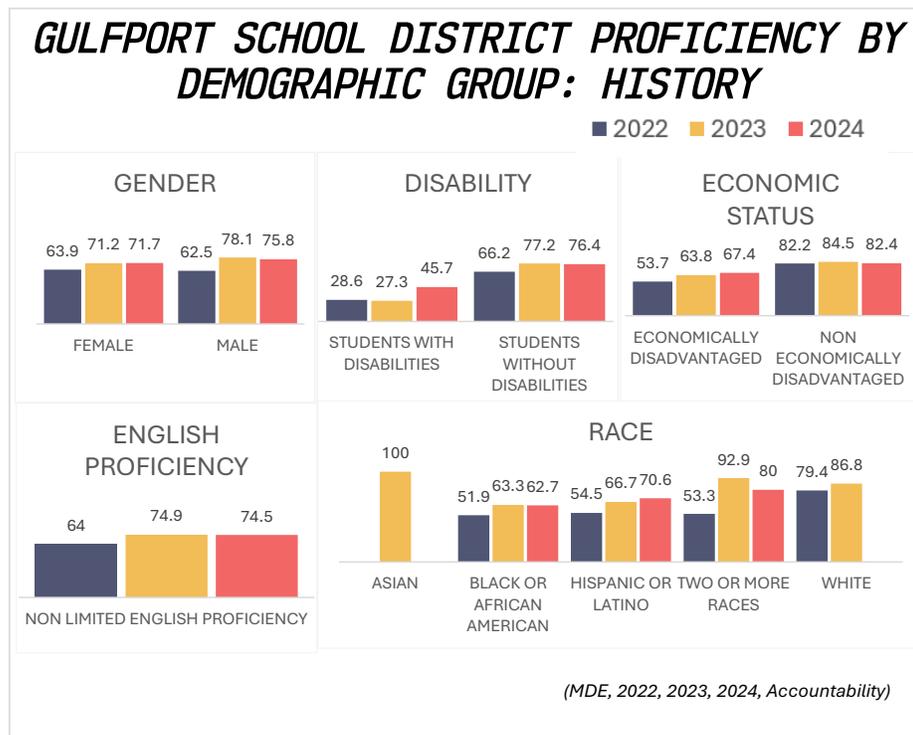


Figure 17: District Proficiency by Demographic Group: History

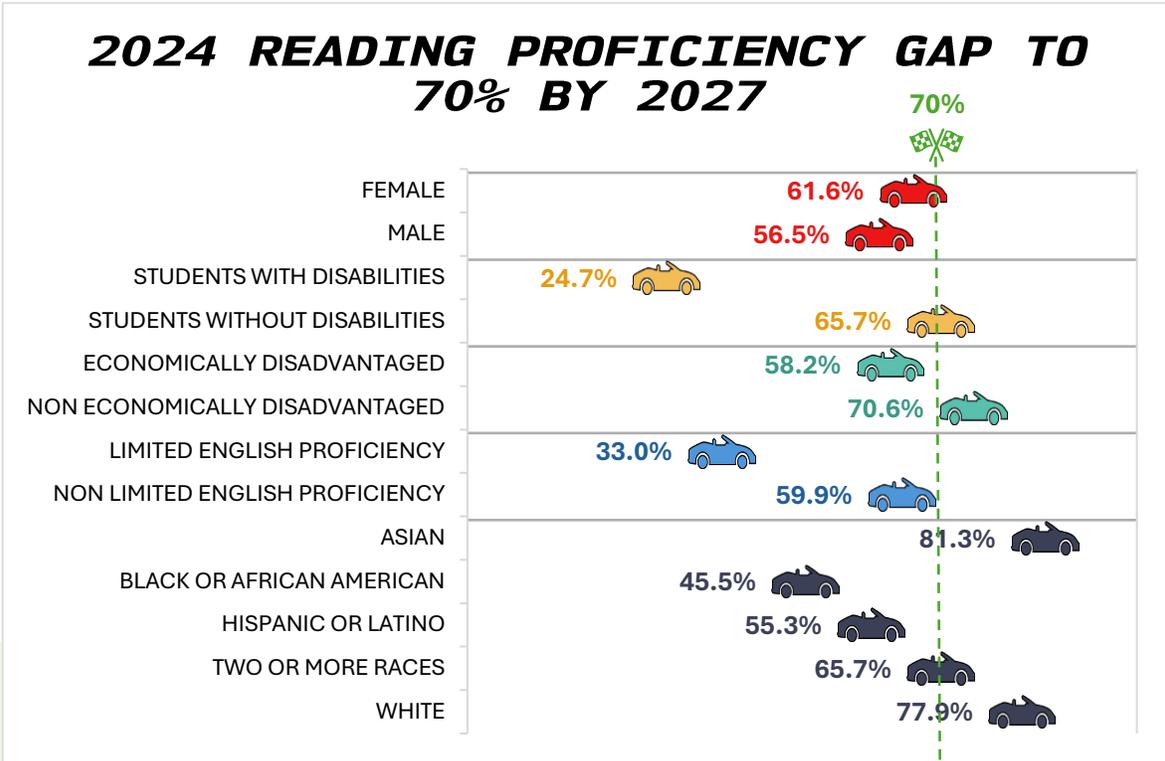


Figure 18: District Reading Proficiency Gap to 70% by 2027

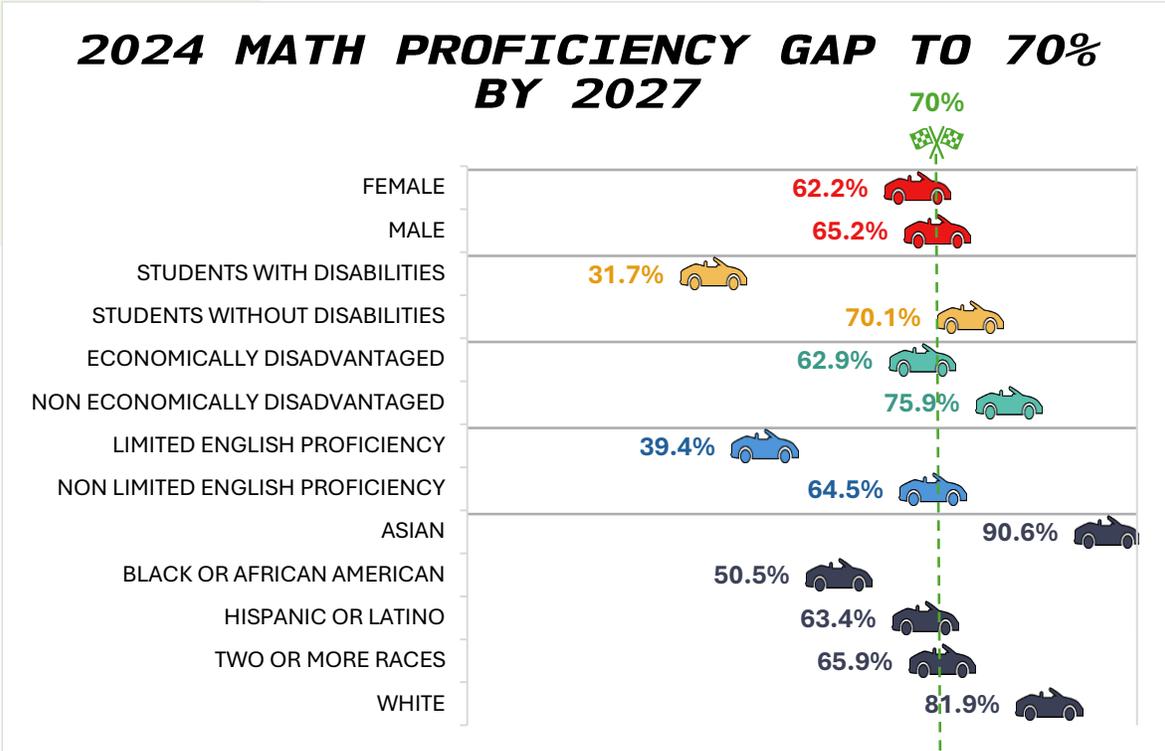


Figure 19: District Math Proficiency Gap to 70% by 2027

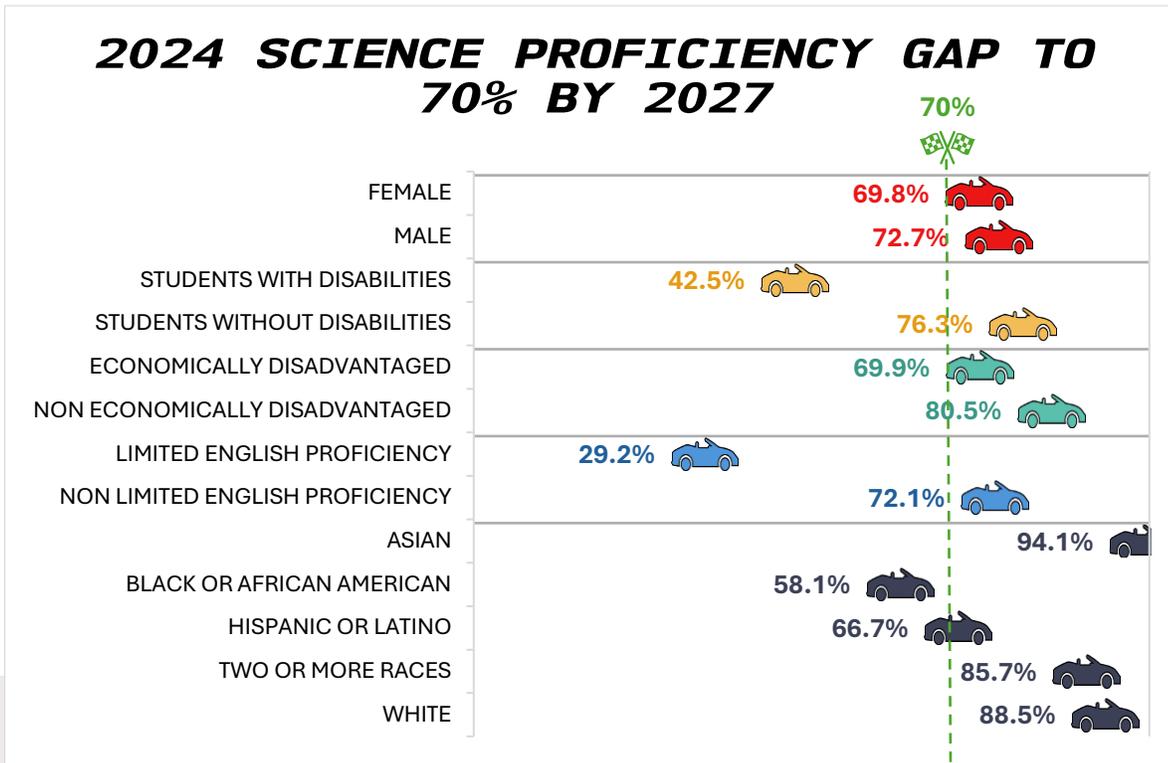


Figure 20: District Science Proficiency Gap to 70% by 2027

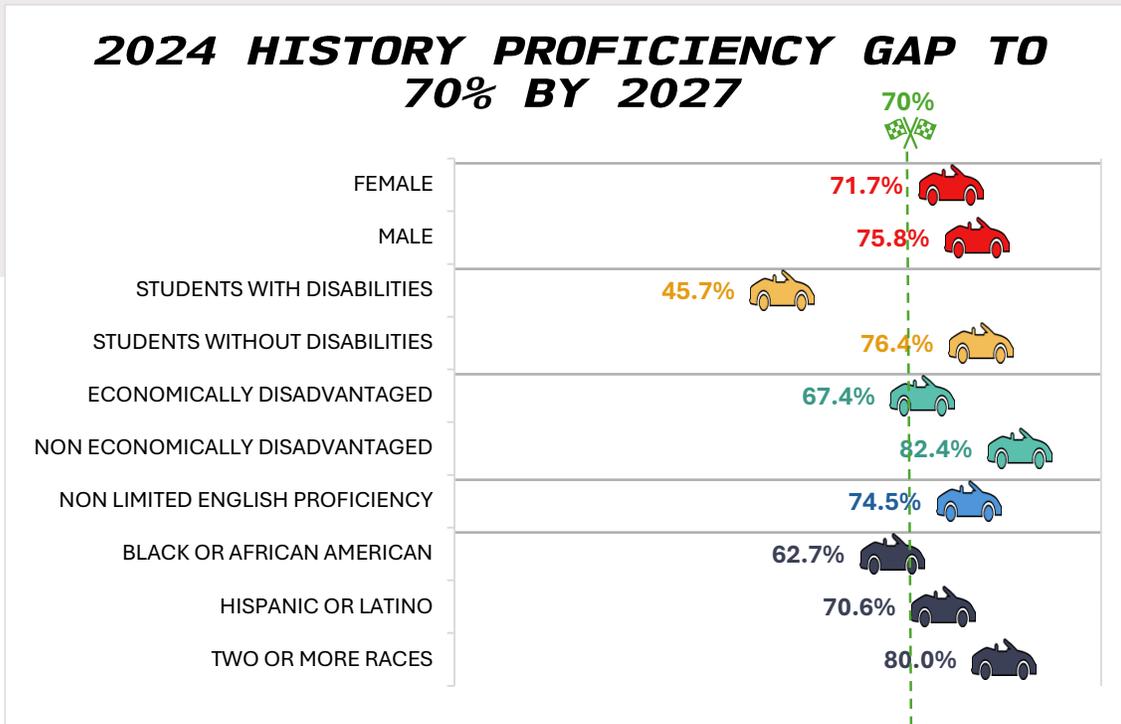


Figure 21: District History Proficiency Gap to 70% by 2027

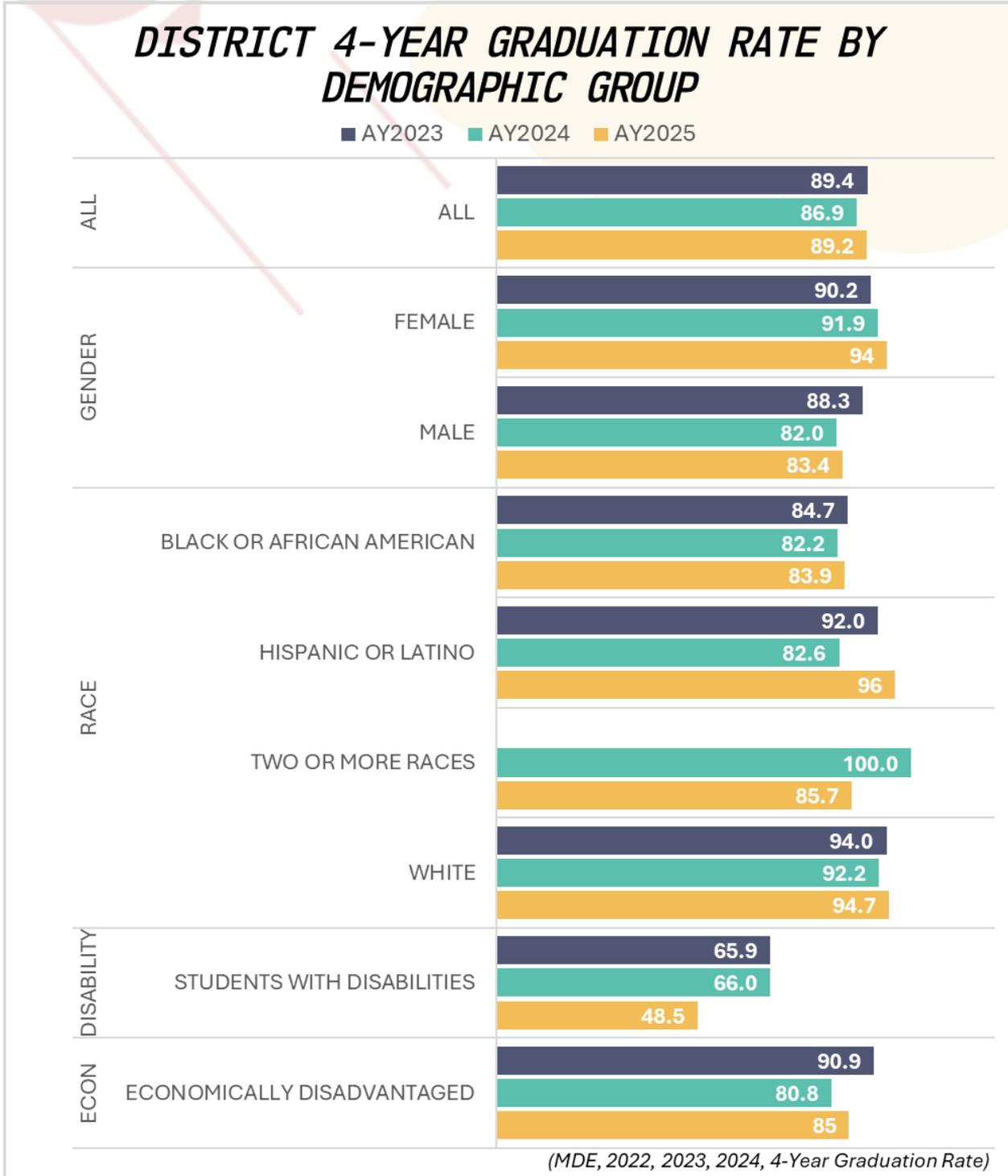


Figure 24: District 4-Year Graduation Rate by Demographic Group

ASSESSMENT

TAKEAWAY

In 2024, district Junior ACT scores declined slightly in English, math, and science, while increasing marginally in reading; scores were still above state averages in all subjects.

Kindergarten Readiness scores show gains at both the prekindergarten and kindergarten levels; Third-Grade Reading Assessment scores decreased in the fall of 2023.

MAAP proficiency increased slightly in ELA in all grades except 8th, which saw a minimal decline between 2023 and 2024. Over half of all grades fared better in math, with 8th grade posting a 16.2 point gain; 3rd grade, however, took an 11 point loss. Fourth grade proficiency and Algebra I also decreased somewhat.

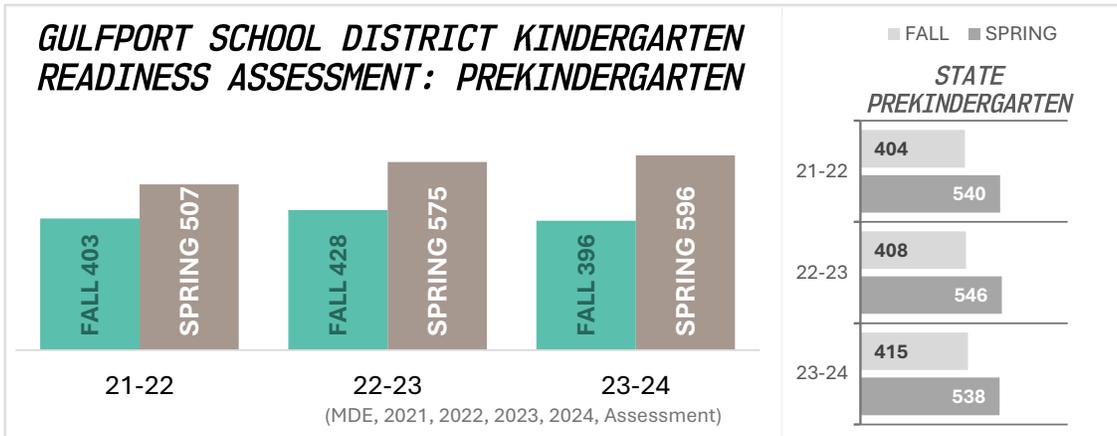


Figure 30: District Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Prekindergarten

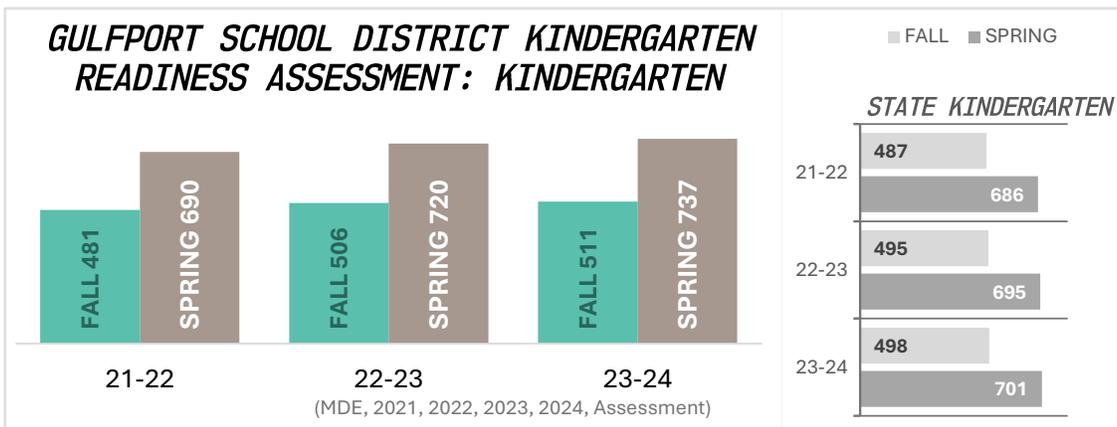
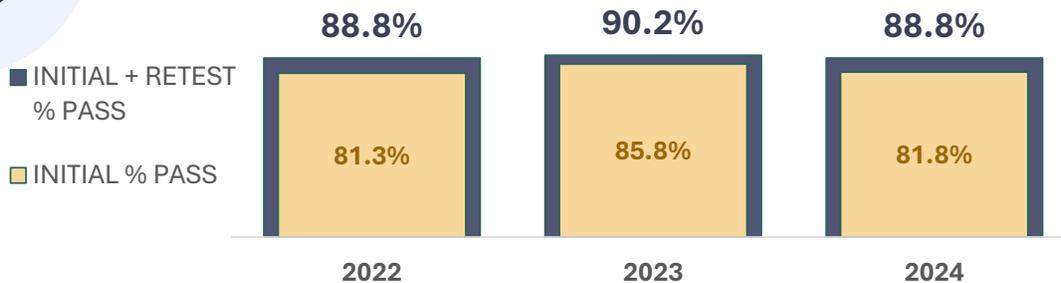


Figure 31: District Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Kindergarten

Figure 32: District Third-Grade Reading Assessment

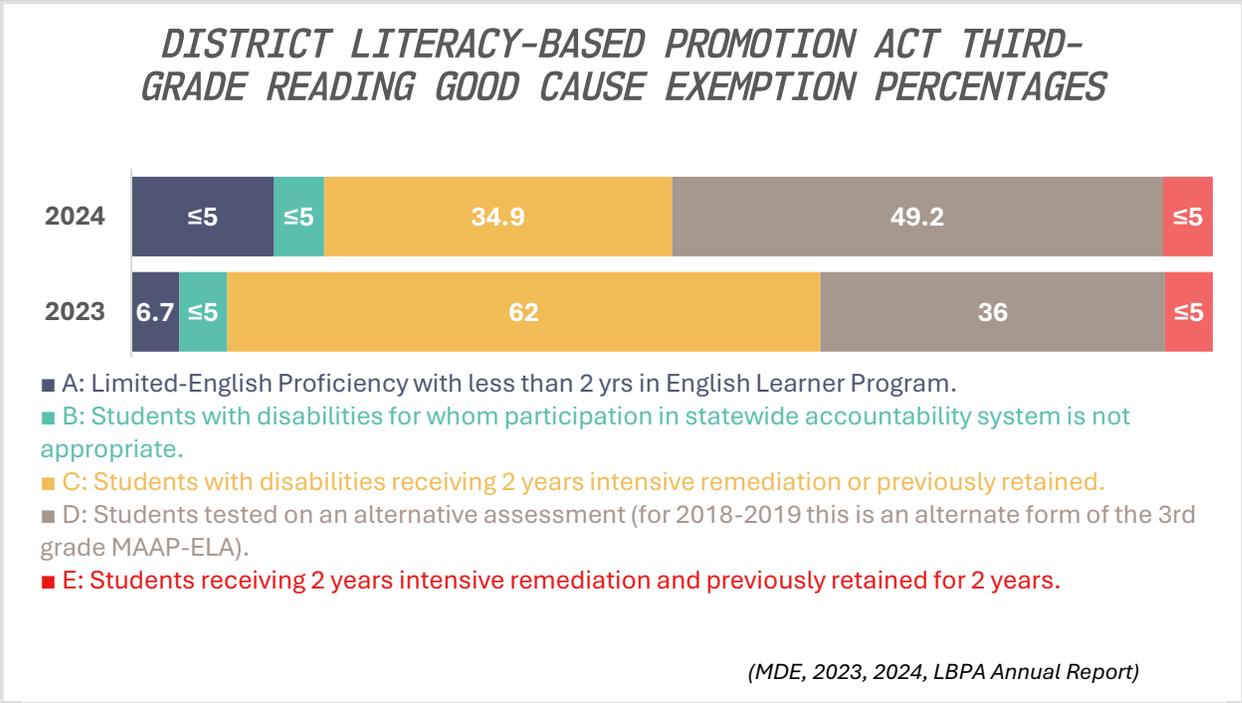


Figure 33: District Literacy-Based Promotion Act (LBPA) Third-Grade Reading Good Cause Exemption

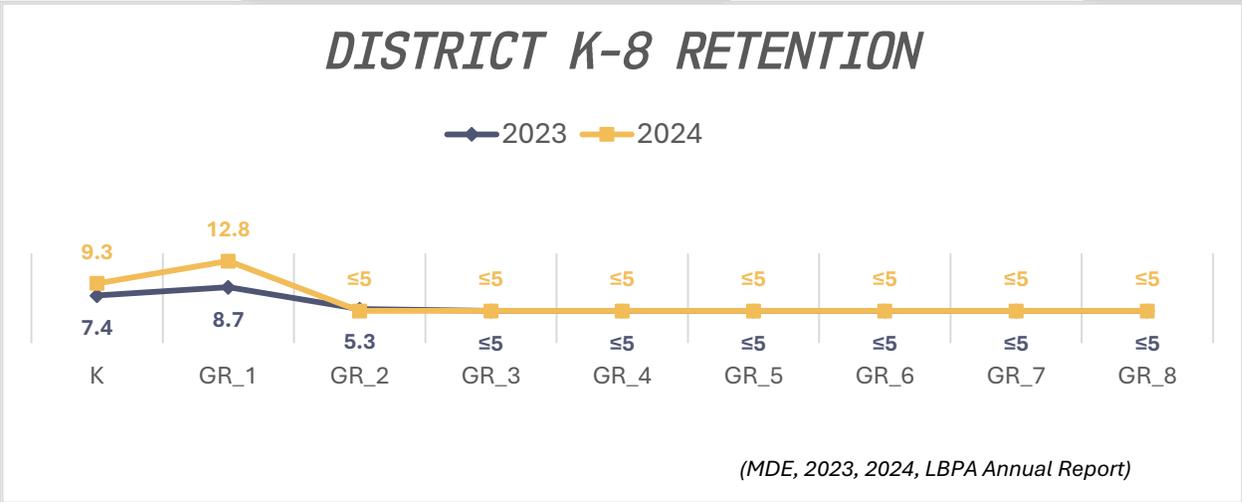
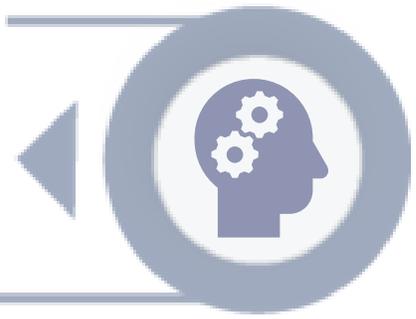


Figure 34: District K-8 Retention

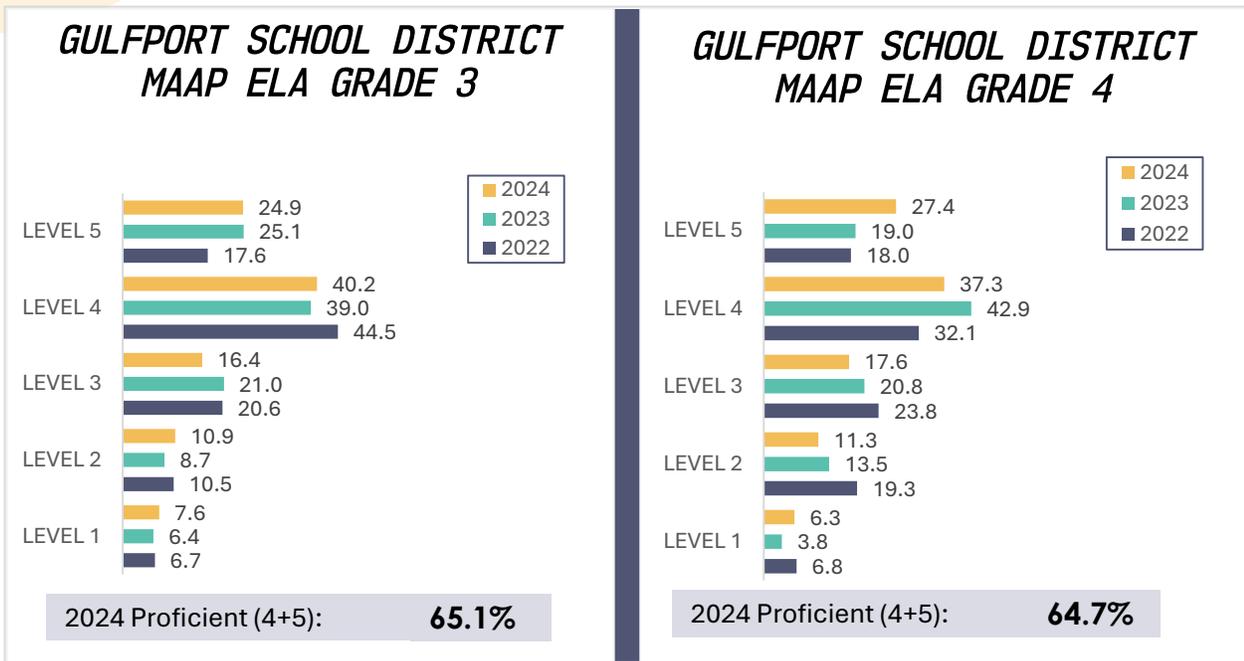


Figure 35: District MAAP ELA Grades 3 and 4

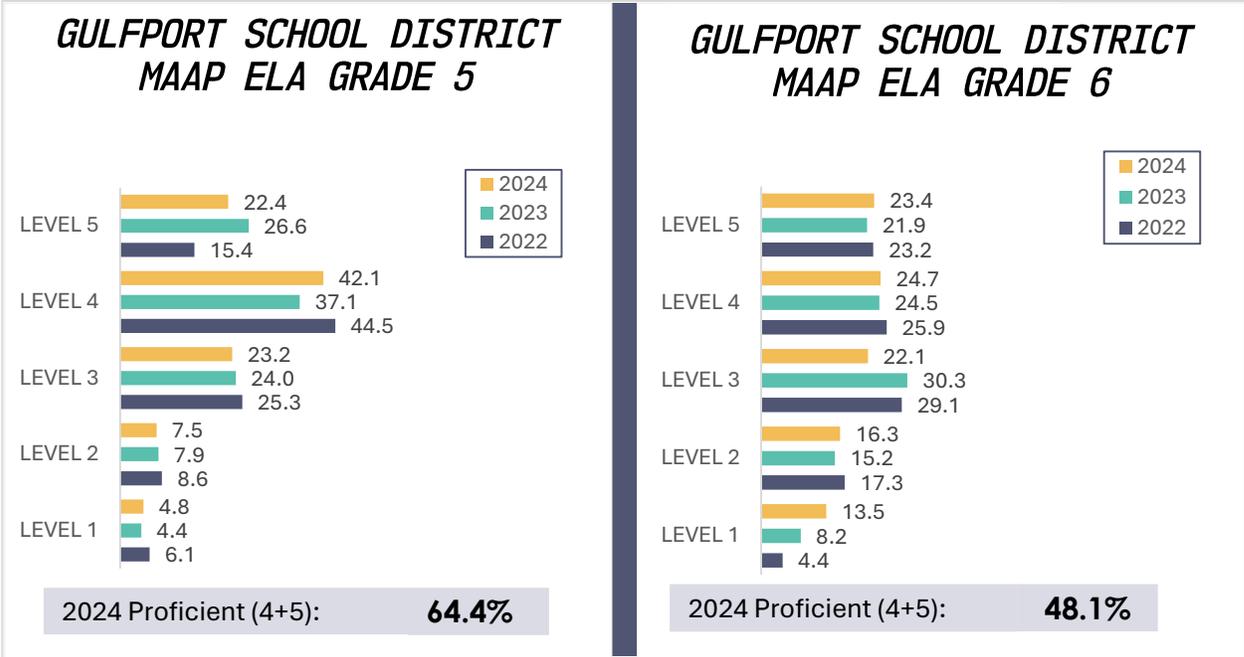


Figure 36: District MAAP ELA Grades 5 and 6

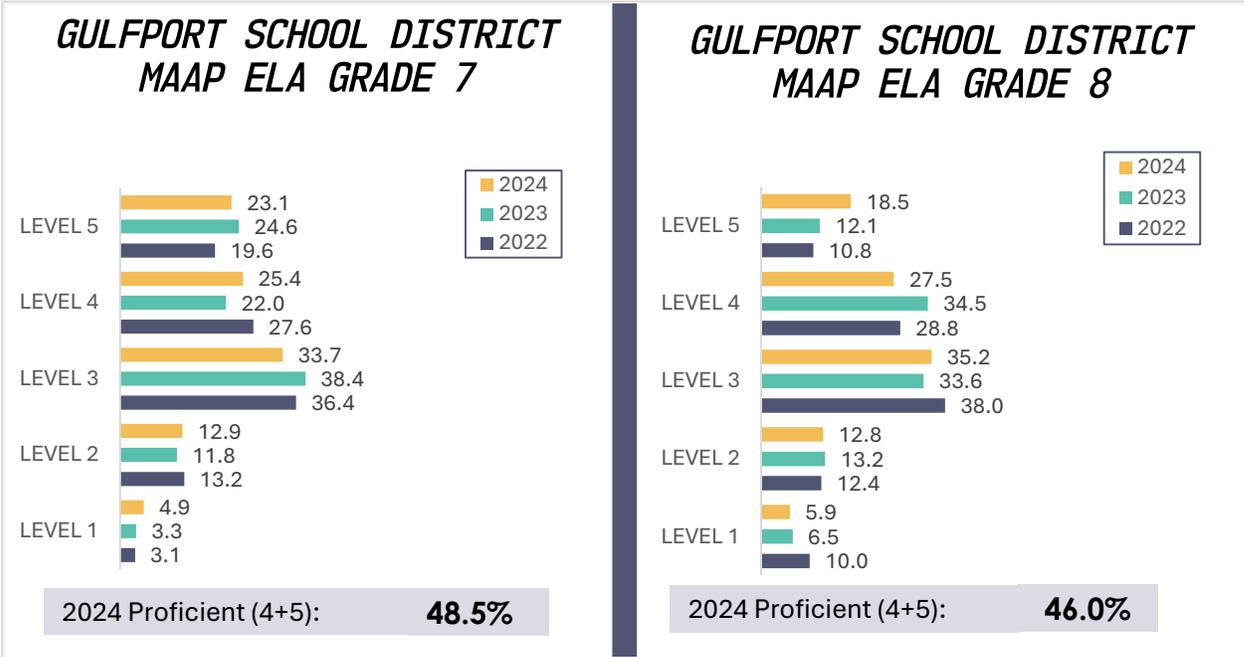


Figure 37: District MAAP ELA Grades 7 and 8

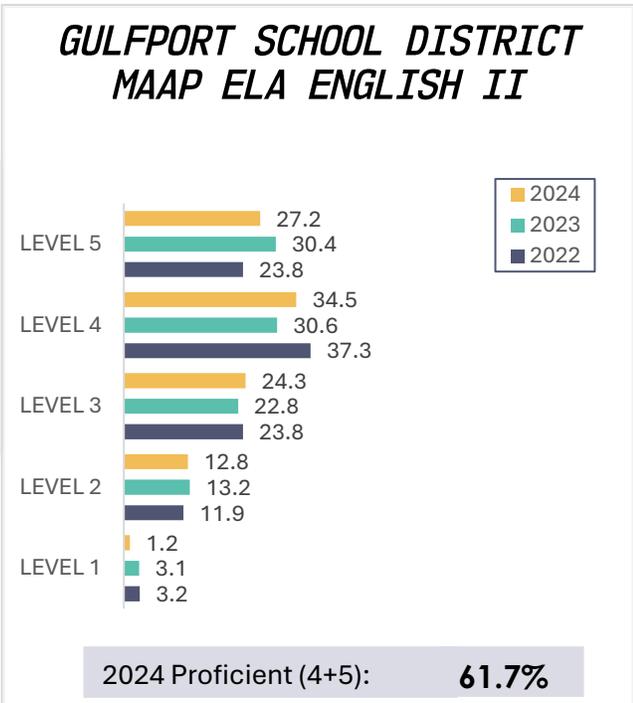


Figure 38: District MAAP ELA English II

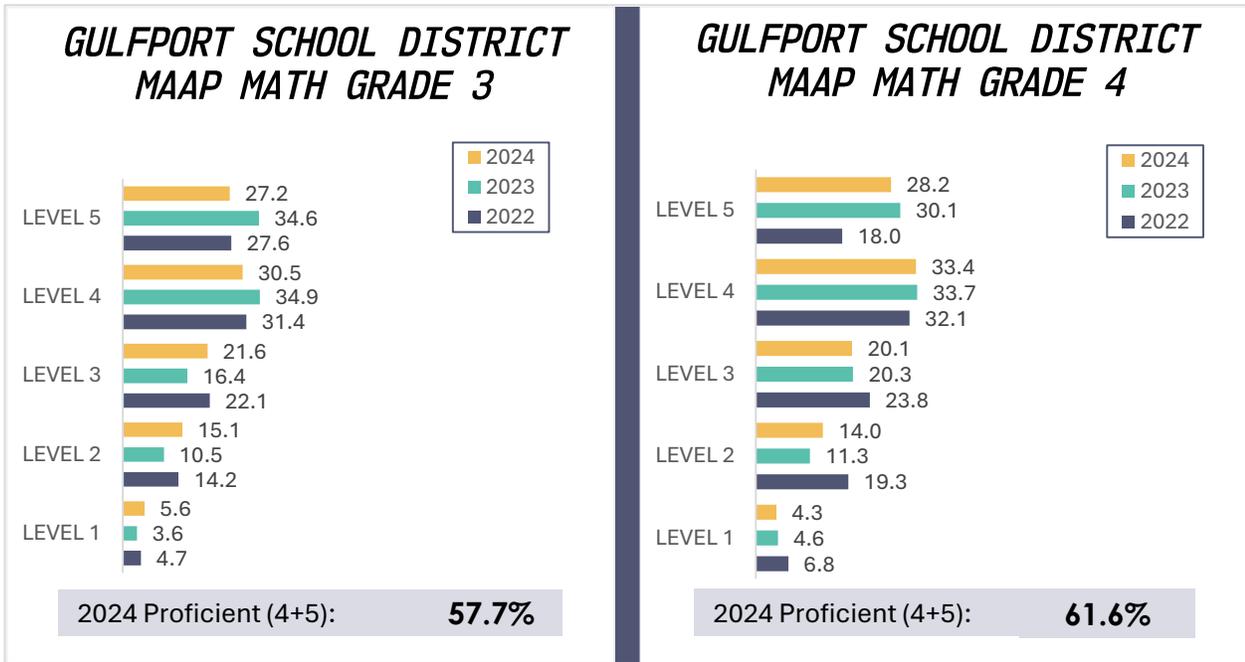


Figure 39: District MAAP Math Grades 3 and 4

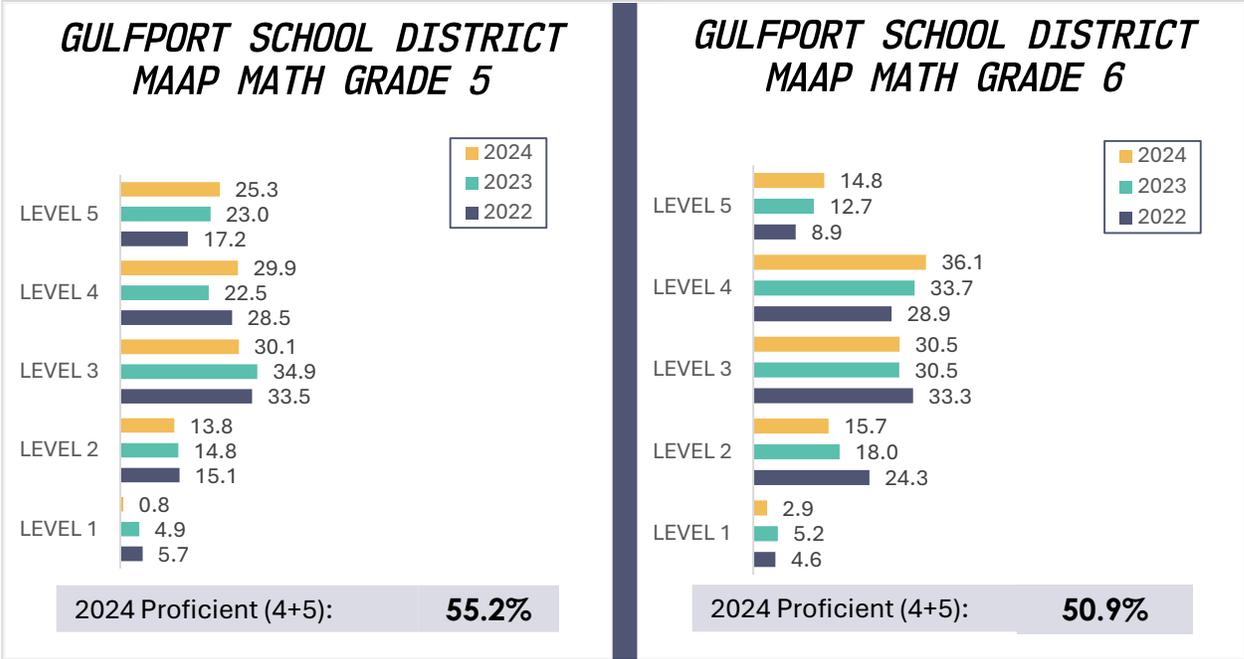


Figure 40: District MAAP Math Grades 5 and 6

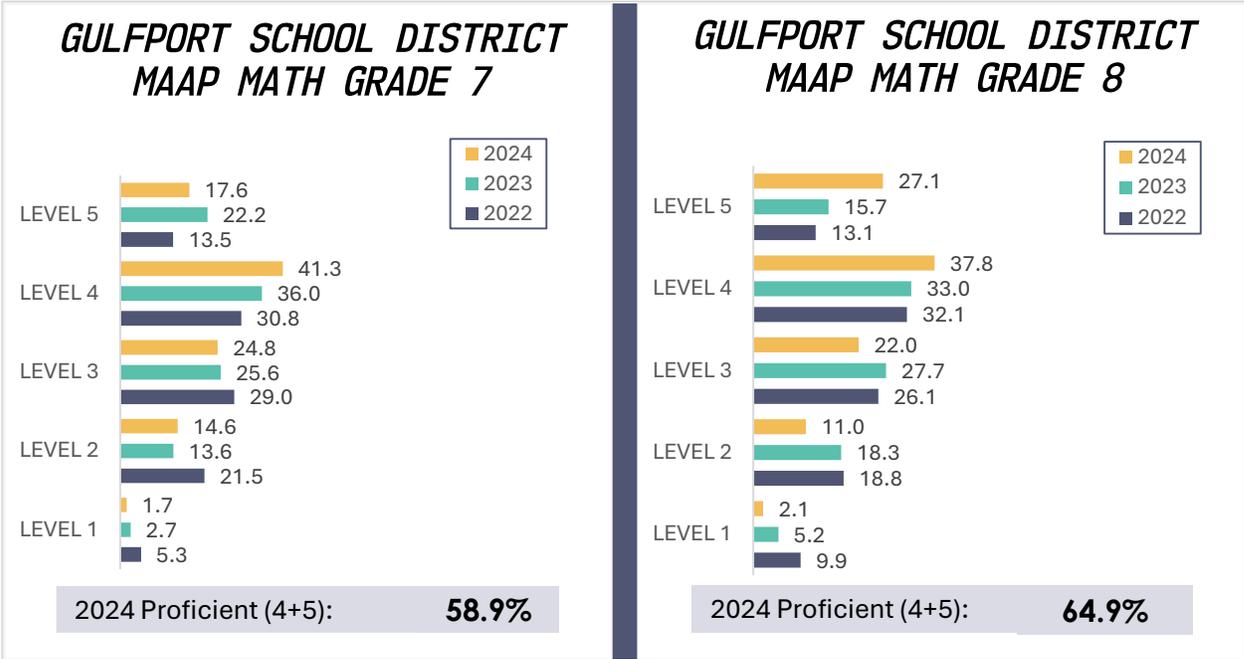


Figure 41: District MAAP Math Grades 7 and 8

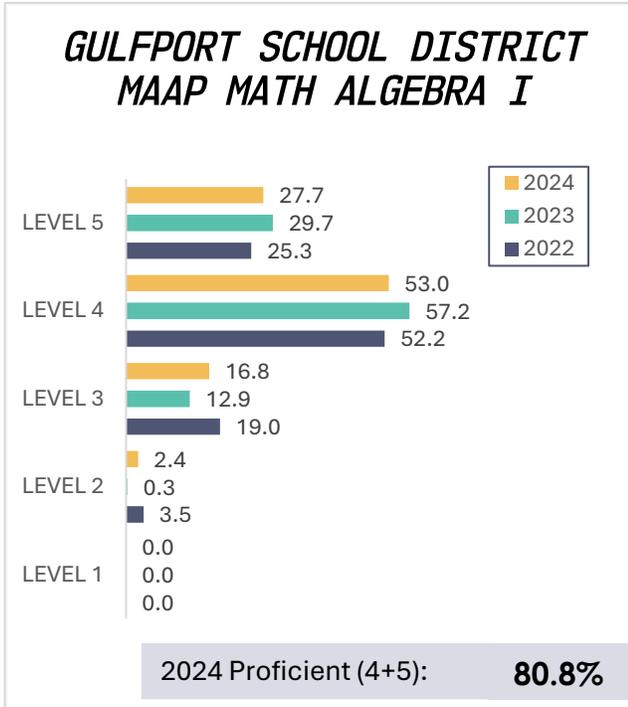
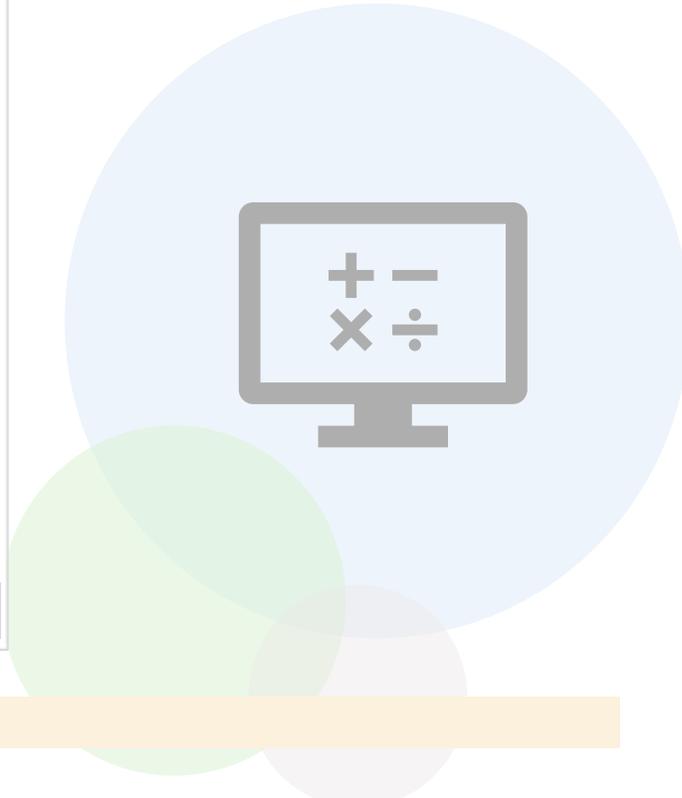


Figure 42: District MAAP Math Algebra I

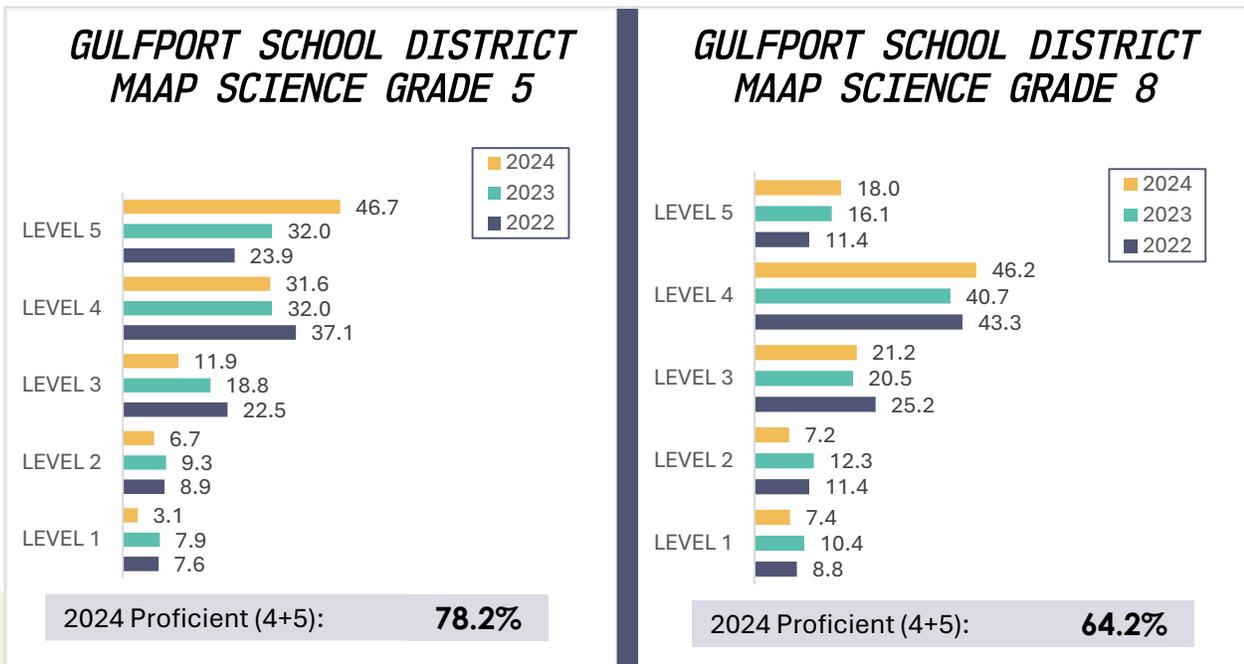


Figure 43: District MAAP Science Grades 5 and 8

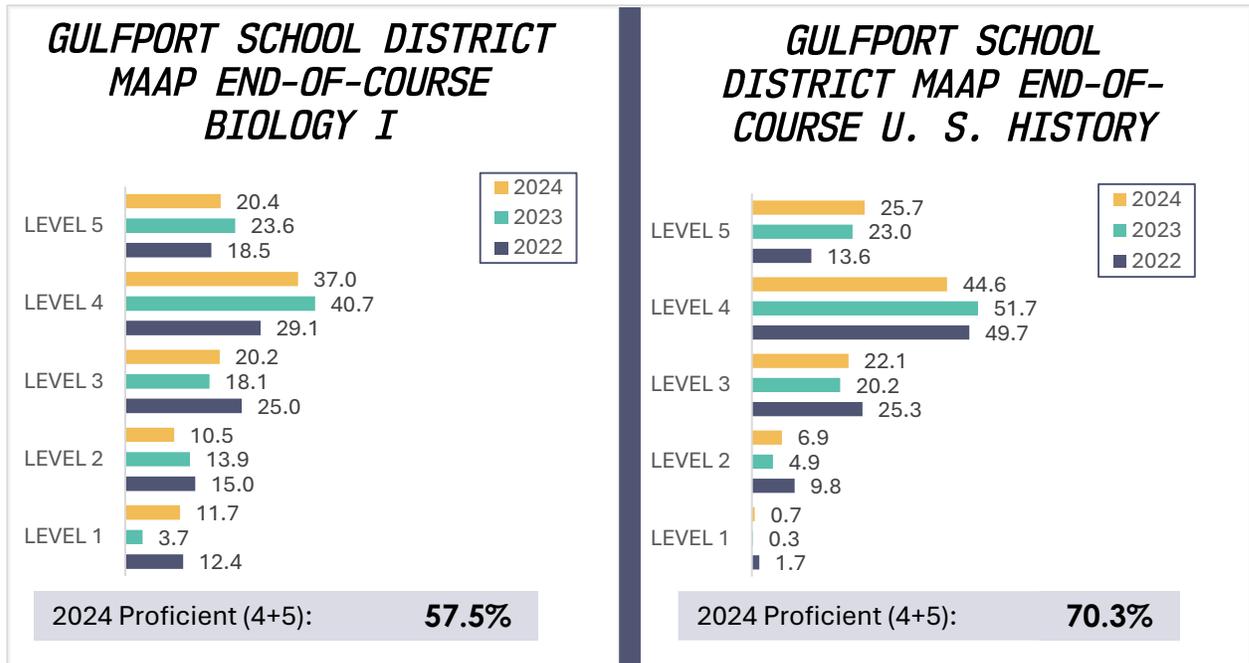


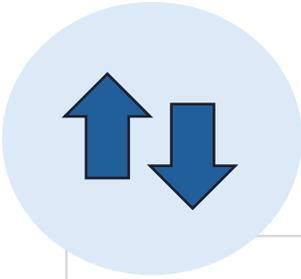
Figure 44: District MAAP EOC Biology I and U. S. History

Mississippi Student Achievement Reaches All-Time High In Mathematics, English Language Arts (ELA) And Science

Overall, for 2023-24, the percentage of students scoring proficient or advanced on the MAAP assessment in Mississippi reached a record high of 47.8% in ELA, 56.3% in mathematics and 63.4% in science. U.S. History decreased slightly from 71.4% in 2022-23 to 70.9% in 2023-24.

“The continued rise in student achievement across Mississippi is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our students, teachers and school leaders,” said Dr. Lance Evans, state superintendent of education. “Our focus now is on building more momentum to guarantee that all our graduates are prepared for the challenges and opportunities they will encounter in college, their careers, and life.”

MAAP GAIN/LOSS OVER TIME

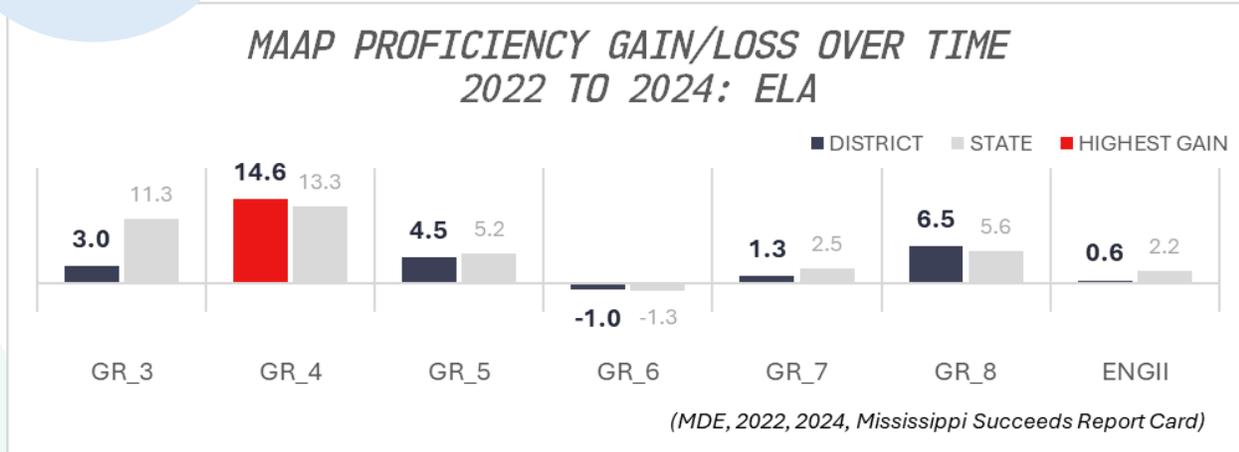


Figure 45: District MAAP Proficiency Gain/Loss Over Time: ELA

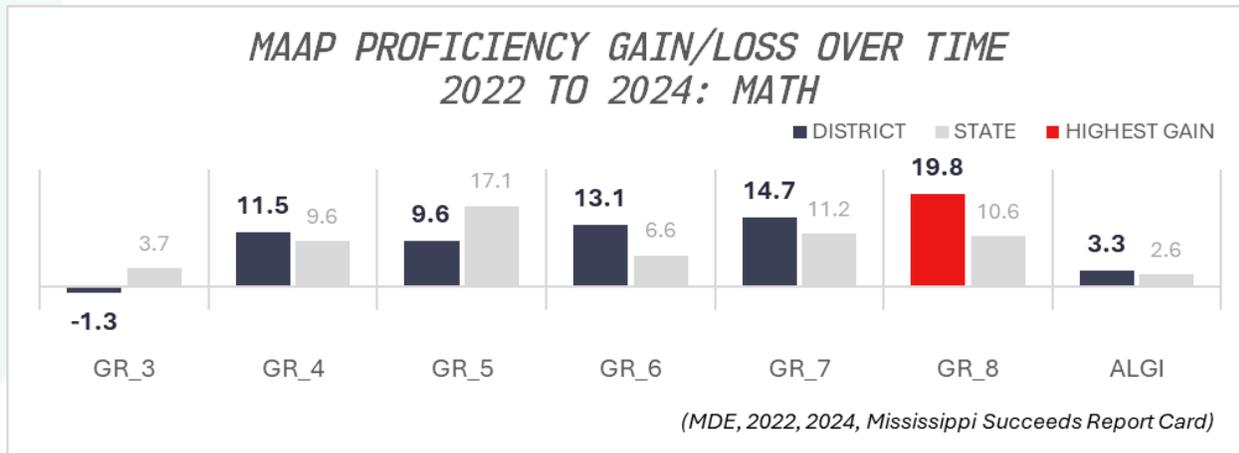


Figure 46: District MAAP Proficiency Gain/Loss Over Time: Math

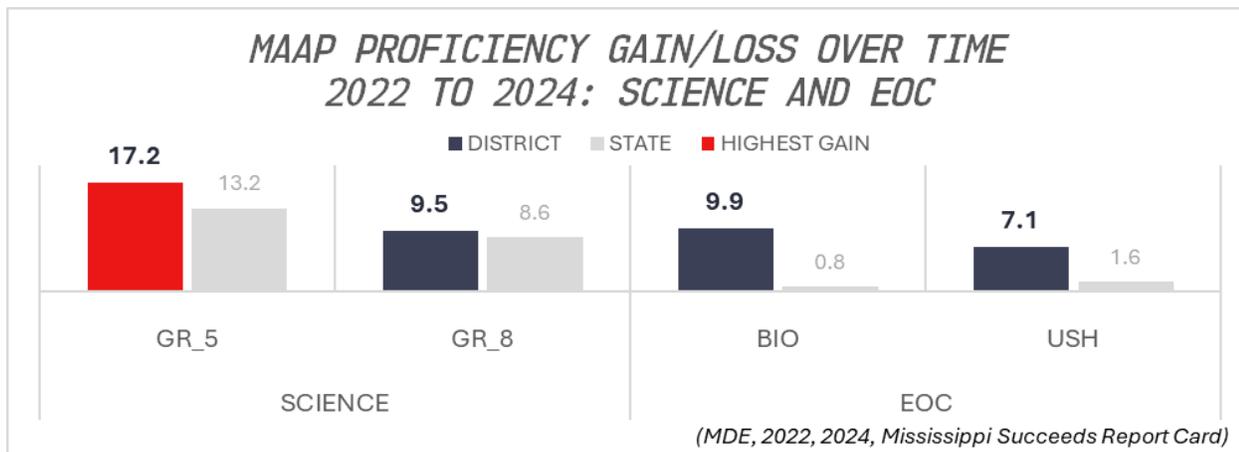


Figure 47: District MAAP Proficiency Gain/Loss Over Time: Science and EOC



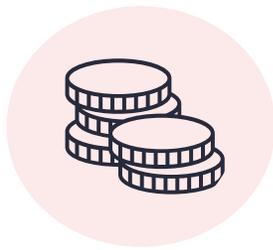

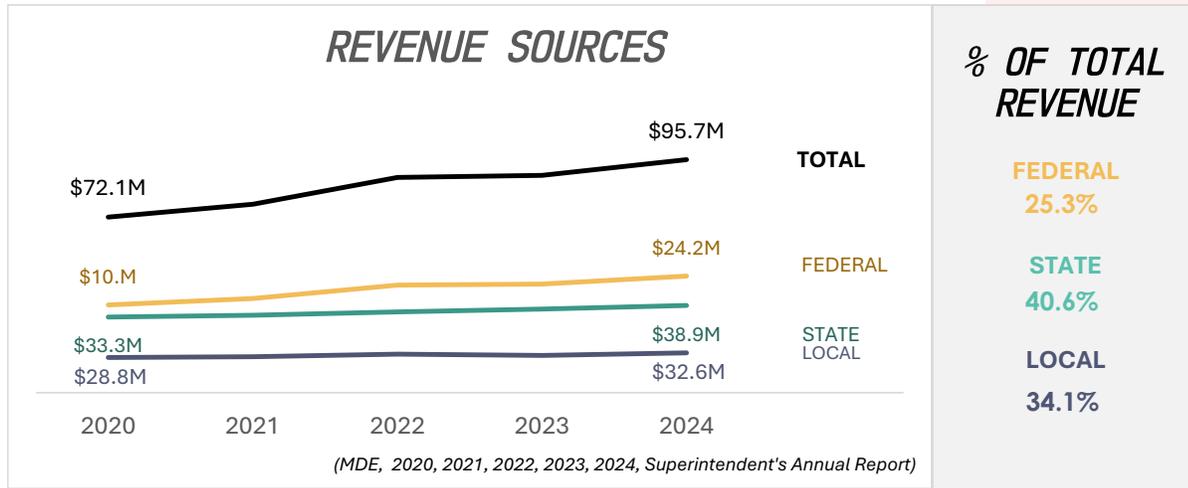
Total district revenue increased by \$23.6M between 2020 and 2024. The biggest increase was in federal funding, which grew by a little over \$14M, increasing its proportion of total revenue to 25.3%.

MAEP funding for 2024 decreased by \$572.7K from 2023 levels based on enrollment and attendance. However, under the new funding mechanism, the Mississippi Student Funding Formula provides about \$2M more for 2025, growing from an estimated total budget for 2024 of \$36.8 million to \$41.83M. The new amount, however, also includes the legislature's allocation of additional money to cover teacher raises and rising health insurance costs.

Total expenditures, including capitalized equipment, rose \$16.7M between 2020 and 2024. While per-pupil expenditure has risen 41.4% in the last five years, with 6.8% of that increase occurred between 2023 and 2024. Proportions of expenditure by function have remained fairly steady over five years.

2025 FUNDING

The Mississippi Student Funding Formula (MSFF), signed into law in May of 2024, replaced the Mississippi Adequate Education Program (MAEP). MSFF is a weighted funding formula based on net enrollment and a base student amount (BSA), with additional weights for various student categories including low-income students, English-language learners, special education, gifted, and career and technical education students.

Starting in FY25, the base (BSA) will be \$6,695.34; combined with the weighted categories, MSFF resulted in an estimated \$2.96 billion in state funding for public schools, an increase of over \$200 million from the current fiscal year under the MAEP formula.

MSFF includes an “objective formula” to recalculate the BSA every four years, starting in FY29. In the intervening years between recalculations (including the three fiscal years between FY25 and the first recalculation in FY29), the BSA will be subject to an inflationary component.

Net Enrollment

Unlike MAEP, the MSFF will base funding on the net enrollment, a count of students enrolled in each district rather than ADA, or average daily attendance, a count of students present at school each day. Due to student absences, counting students using net enrollment will yield a higher count—though the exact amount will vary by district.

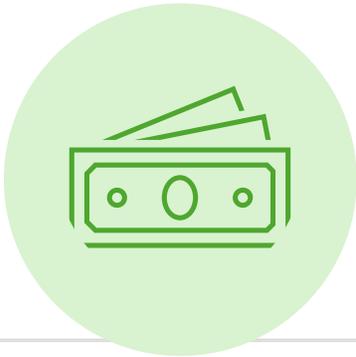
Weighted Criteria

Counts of students who meet certain criteria are weighted. For instance, a low-income student carries an additional weight of 30%. In other words, each applicable student is counted as 1.3 students. Criteria can also be cumulative; that is, a student who falls into two weighted categories receives a bonus for both. For instance, a student who is both low-income and an English language learner would count as 1.45 students (0.3 for low-income and 0.15 for EL) (Mississippi First, 2024).

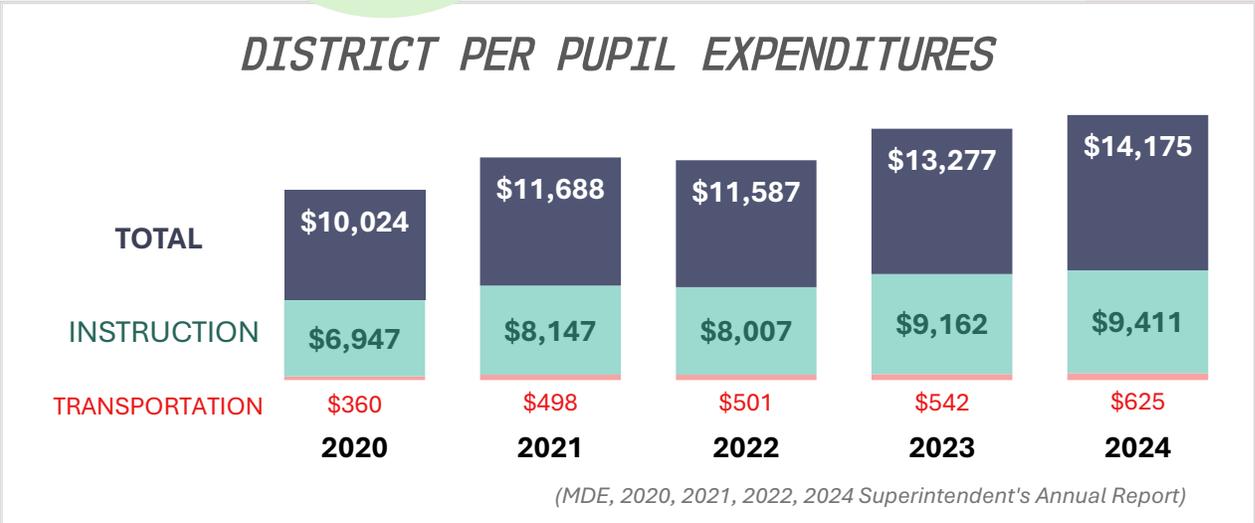


Figure 51: District Per Pupil Expenditures

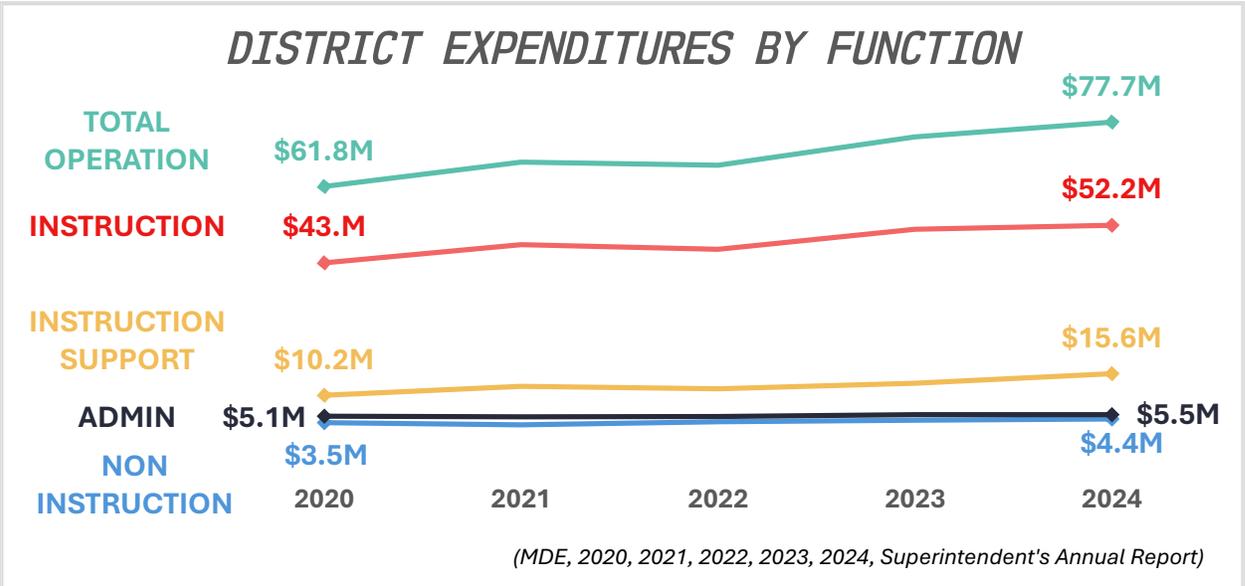
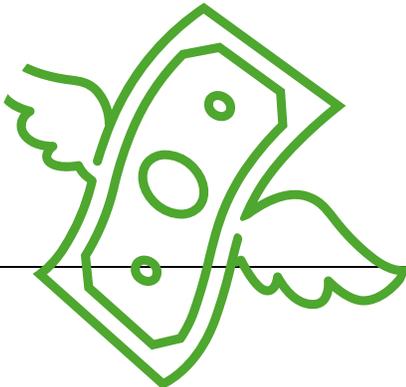


Figure 52: District Expenditures by Function

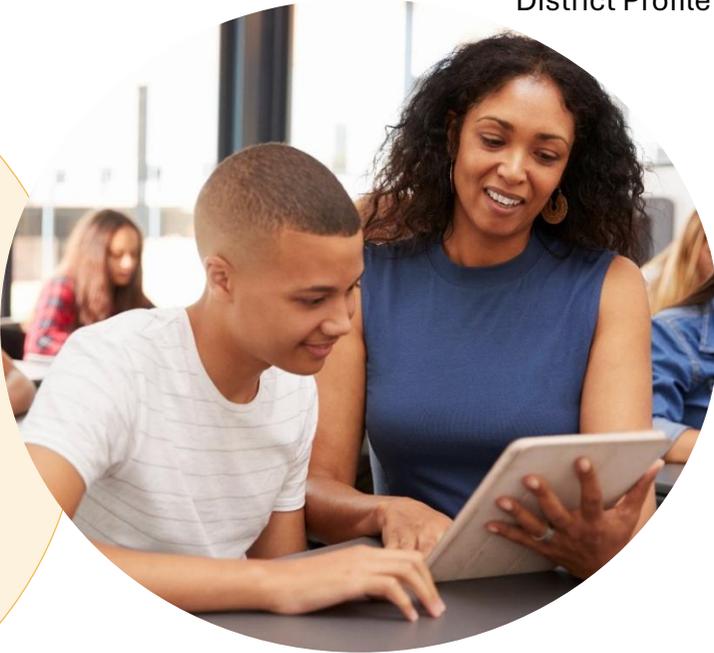

The percentage of experienced teachers has increased slightly since 2022, with the percentage of teachers who are teaching in their appropriate field down minimally. The per-pupil ratio has decreased to 13.0. Average teacher salaries have increased, as have administrative salaries. Average salaries for guidance counselors have decreased slightly.

DISTRICT CLASSROOM TEACHERS AND PER PUPIL RATIO

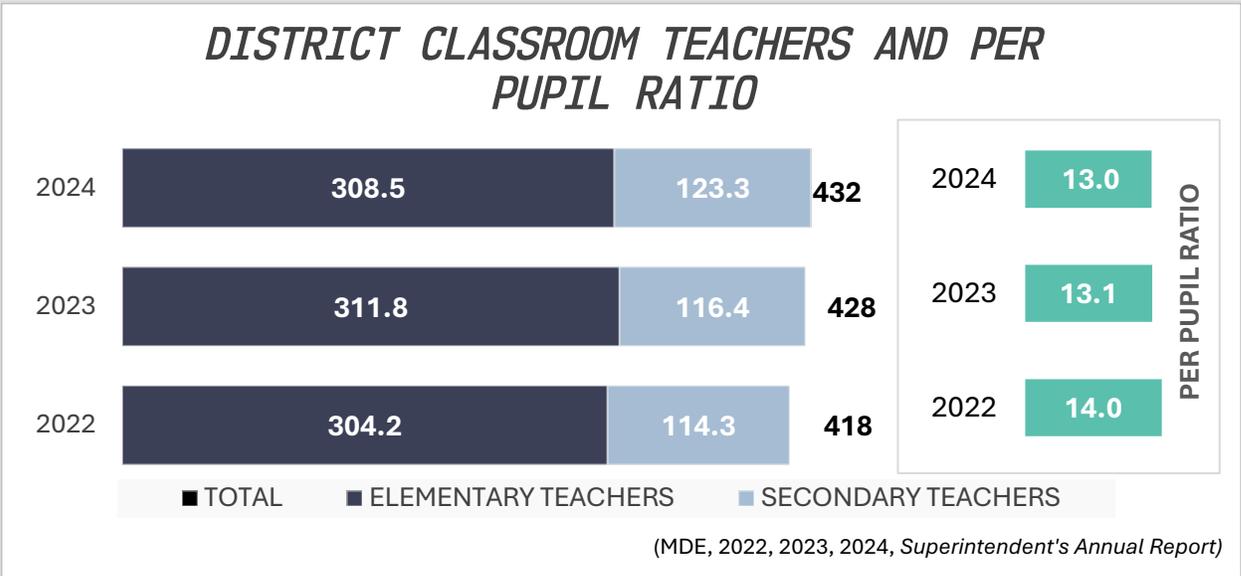


Figure 55: District Classroom Teachers and Per Pupil Ratio

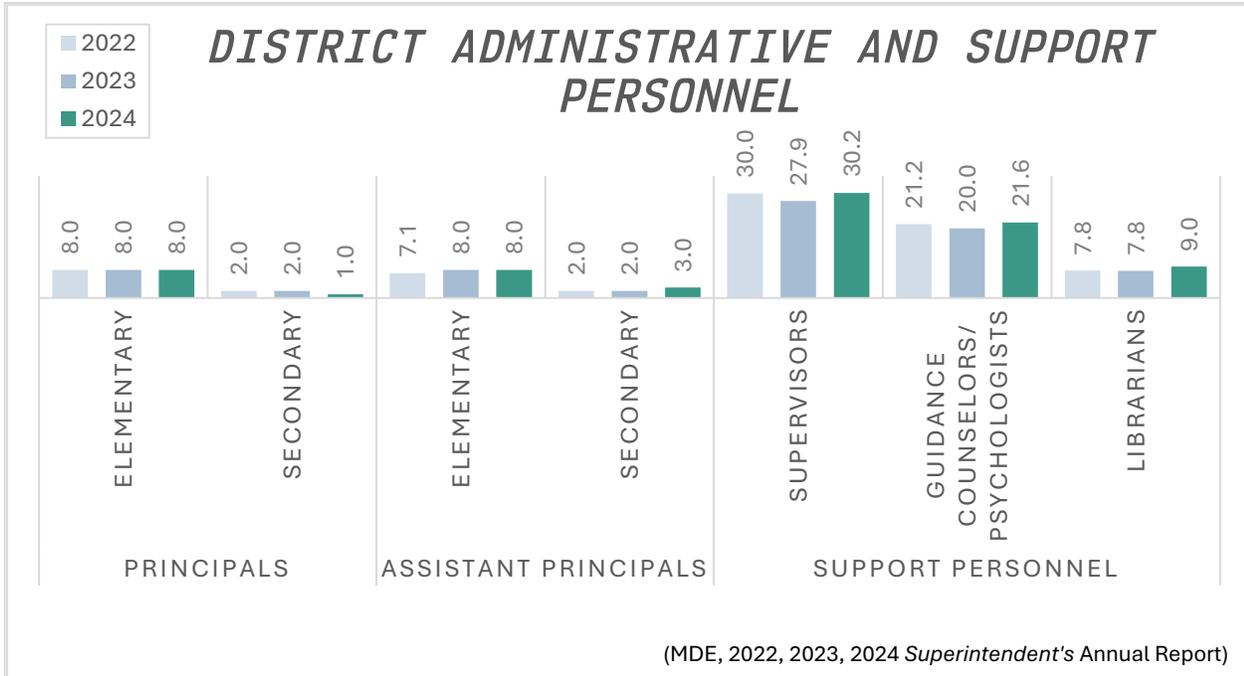


Figure 56: District Administrative and Support Personnel

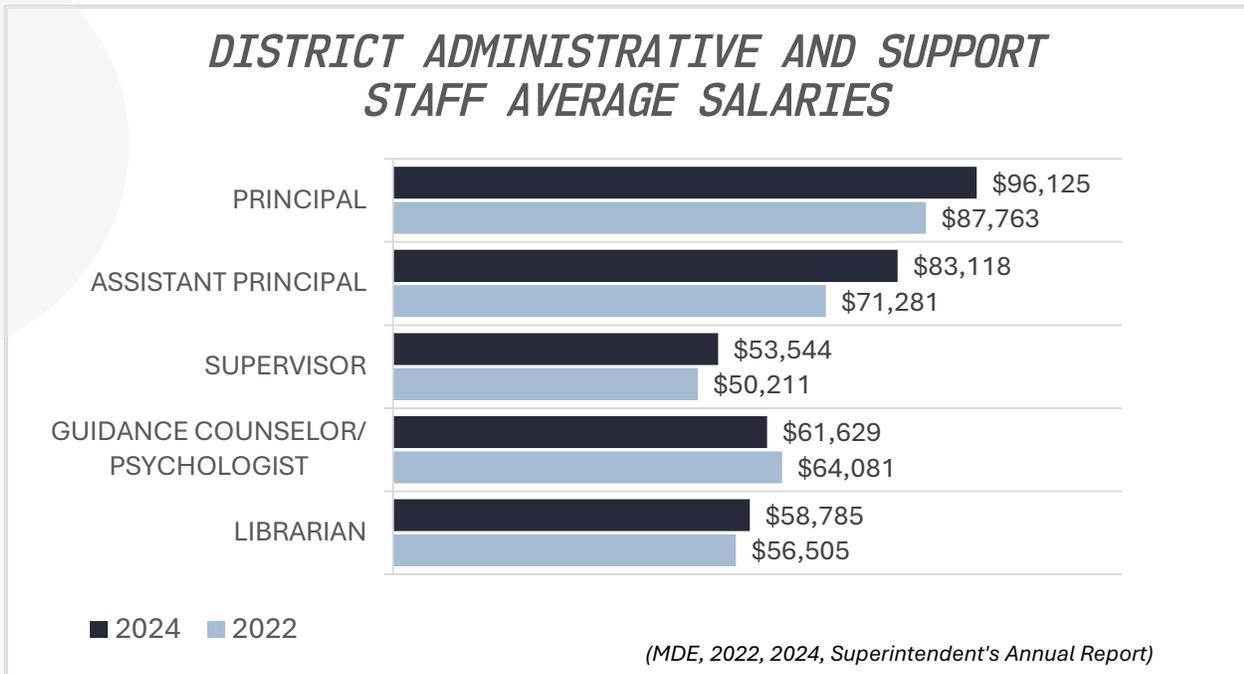


Figure 57: District Administrative and Support Staff Average Salaries

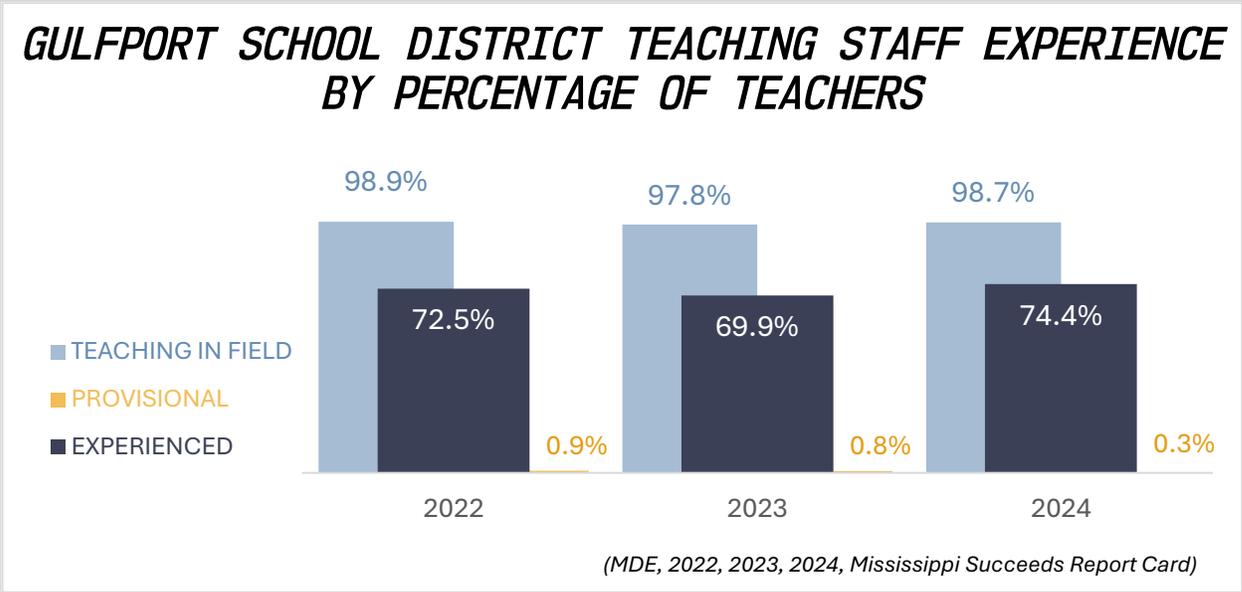


Figure 58: District Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers

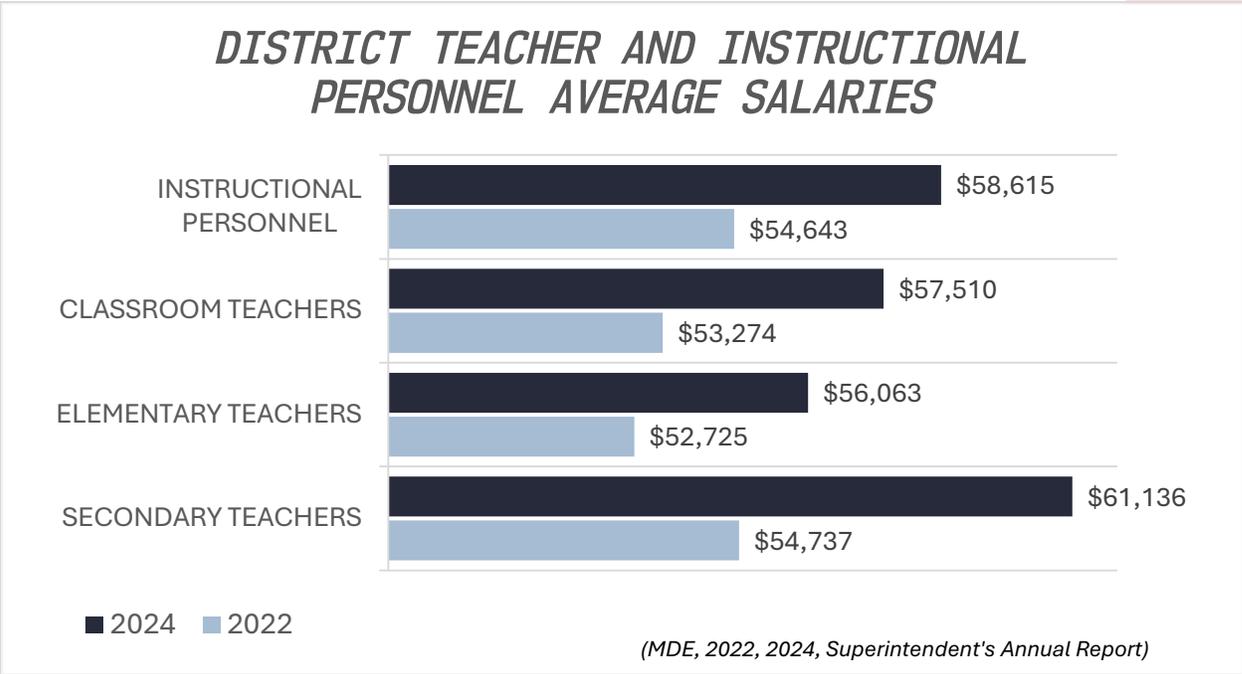
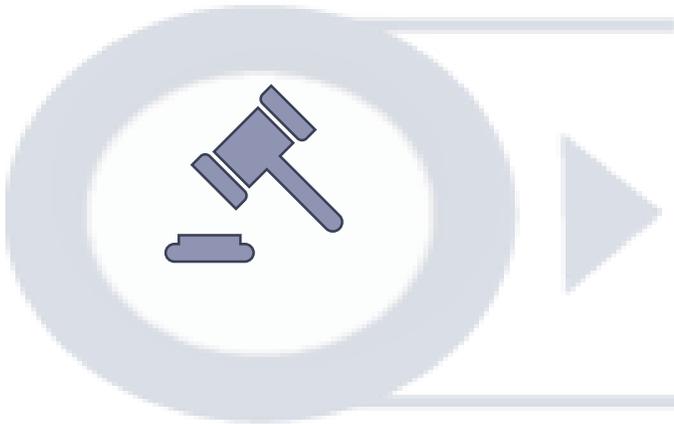


Figure 59: District Teacher and Personnel Average Salaries

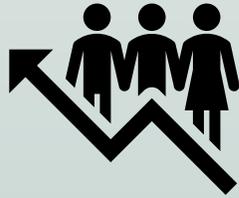

DATA COLLECTION

Some information for this report was gathered through a district-wide Comprehensive Needs Assessment Survey administered online. Respondents were asked to express an opinion on statements using a 5-point Likert scale, indicating “Strongly Agree,” “Agree,” “Disagree,” “Strongly Disagree,” or “Not Applicable or No Information.” Some questions asked respondents to choose among a variety of options, to rank choices, or to write in responses to open-ended statements. Some overall open-ended questions were also included. Data were compiled by school and by stakeholder group, then combined to create a district summary.

Test scores and demographic data were obtained from the Mississippi Department of Education and Gulfport School District.

ONE THOUSAND SEVEN HUNDRED EIGHTY-EIGHT (1,788) respondents from

six stakeholder groups and nine schools responded to the Comprehensive Needs Assessment Survey in 2025. The figure below reflects the distribution of responses by stakeholder group, which together comprise the district data reported in the subsequent graphs and charts. Responses from all groups were totaled and divided by the number of survey respondents to calculate district-wide percentage distributions. Additional graphs detail the responses disaggregated by stakeholder group, school, and grade where appropriate.

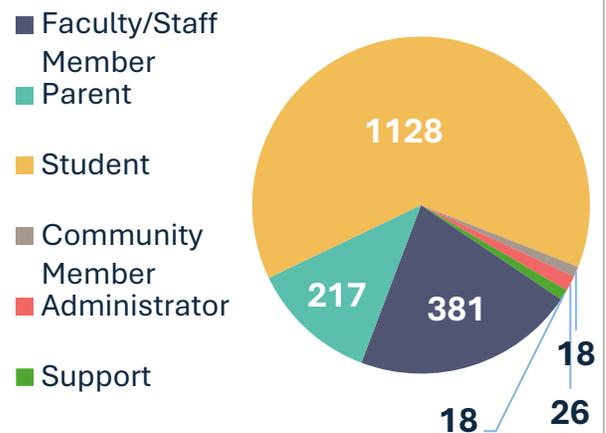


Figure 61: Distribution of Stakeholders

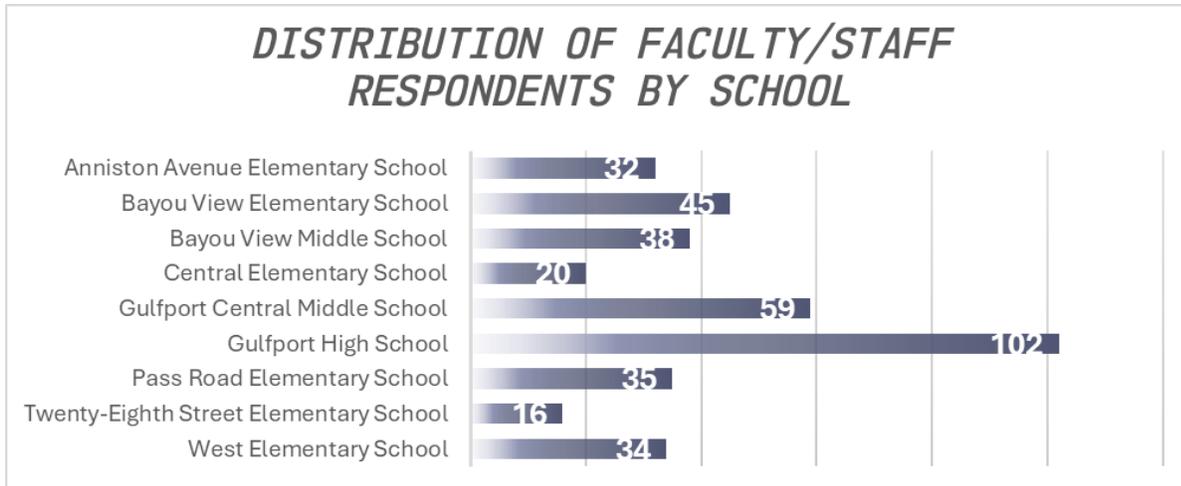


Figure 62: Distribution of Faculty/Staff Respondents by School

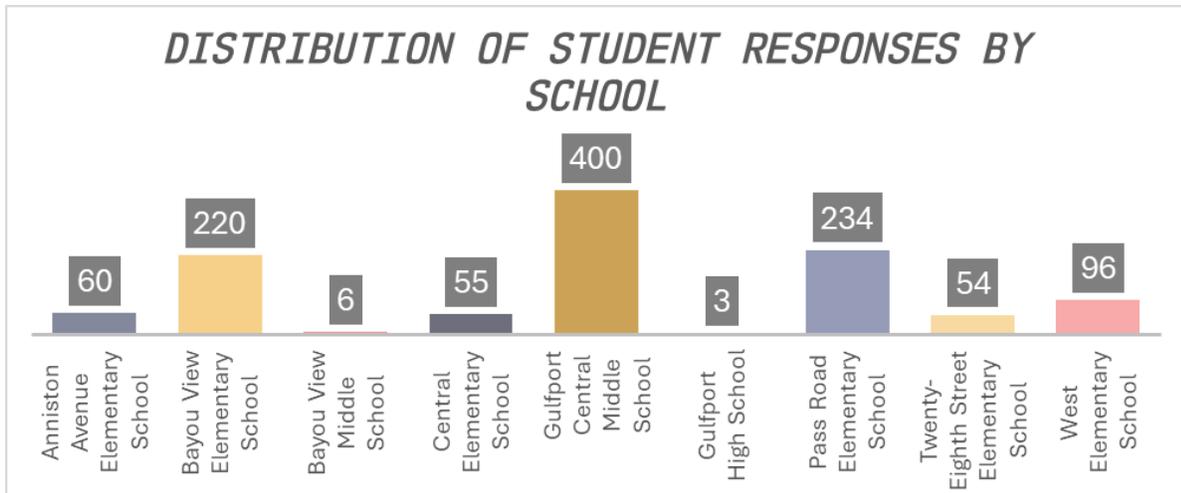


Figure 63: Distribution of Student Respondents by School

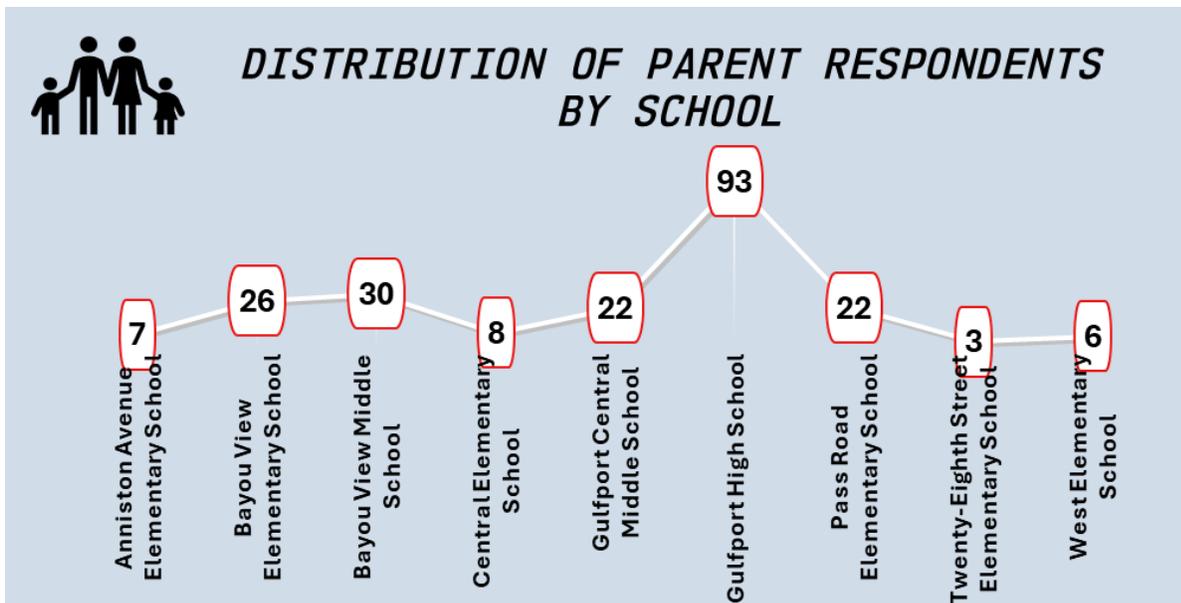


Figure 64: Distribution of Parent Respondents by School

DISTRICT STRENGTHS AND CHALLENGES

One thousand seven hundred eighty-eight (1,788) stakeholders from nine schools responded to the 2025 Gulfport School District Comprehensive Needs Assessment survey online. Students comprise 63.1% of the total. Faculty/staff members represent 57.7% of the adult response, with parents accounting for 32.9%. Community members and support personnel make up 2.7% of the adult response. Administrators make up 3.9% of the adult response.

Gulfport School District is a successful district focused on teaching and learning.

District enrollment has decreased -3.1% since 2022. The district held to its “A” accountability rating in 2024 for the fifth year in a row. The district experienced a -0.2% change in average daily attendance between 2023 and 2024, and chronic absence rose to 21.5%. The district's graduation rate rose to 89.2%; the dropout rate decreased to 9.2%. Graduation rates for students with disabilities dropped by 17.5 percentage points.

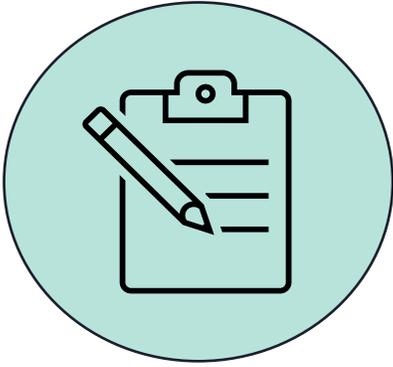
In response to statements on the comprehensive needs survey about federal programs and Title IV-A, stakeholders strongly agree that teachers in the district are state certified and effective. About 90% believe that the district provides students and teachers with a safe and orderly environment for learning.

Regarding statements about curriculum and instruction, 84% affirm that the programs of this district meet the requirement of students with special needs (handicapped, learning disabled, gifted and talented, etc.). Statements about parent, family, and community engagement were very positive. Over 90% believe that the district actively promotes parent/teacher communication. Figure 67: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Average Daily Attendance

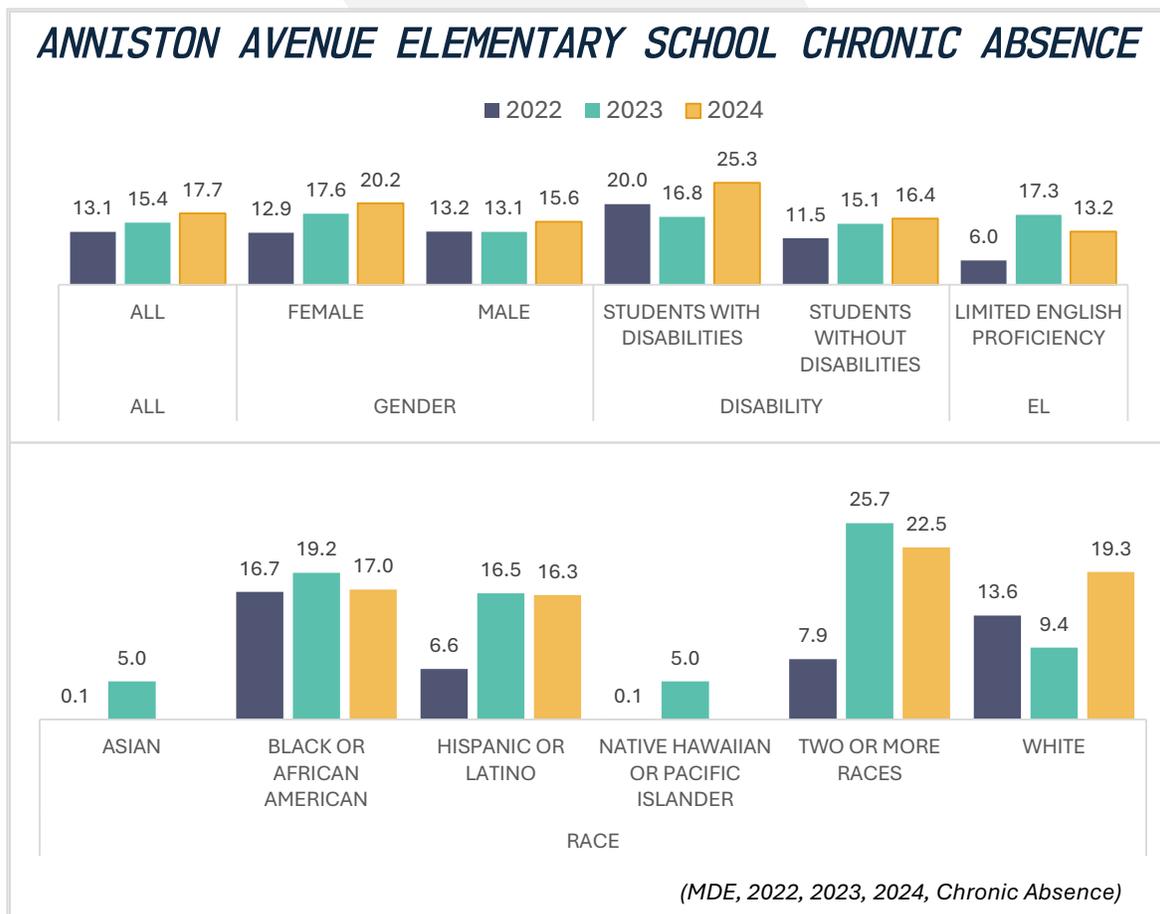


Figure 68: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Chronic Absence

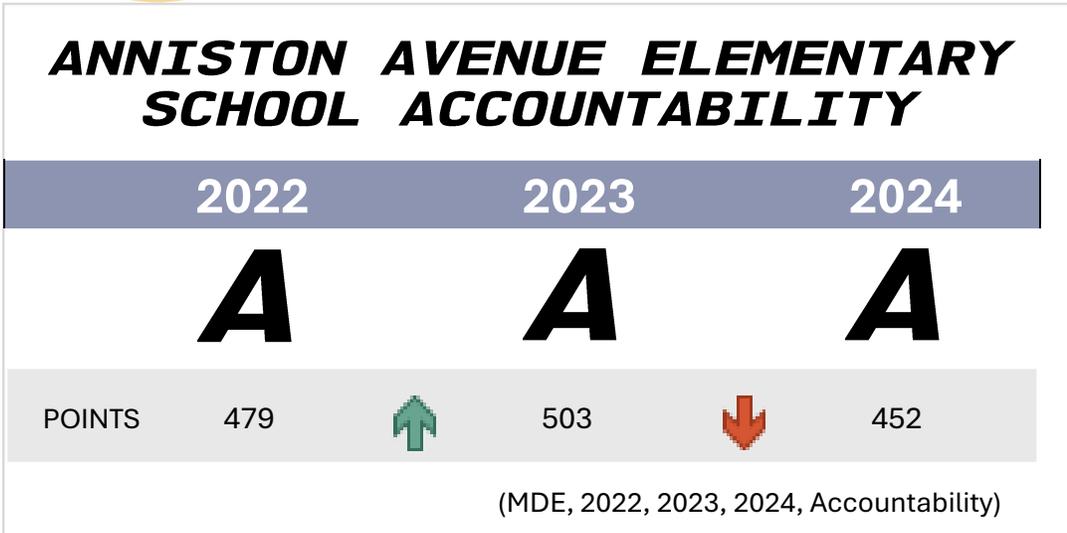


Figure 69: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Accountability

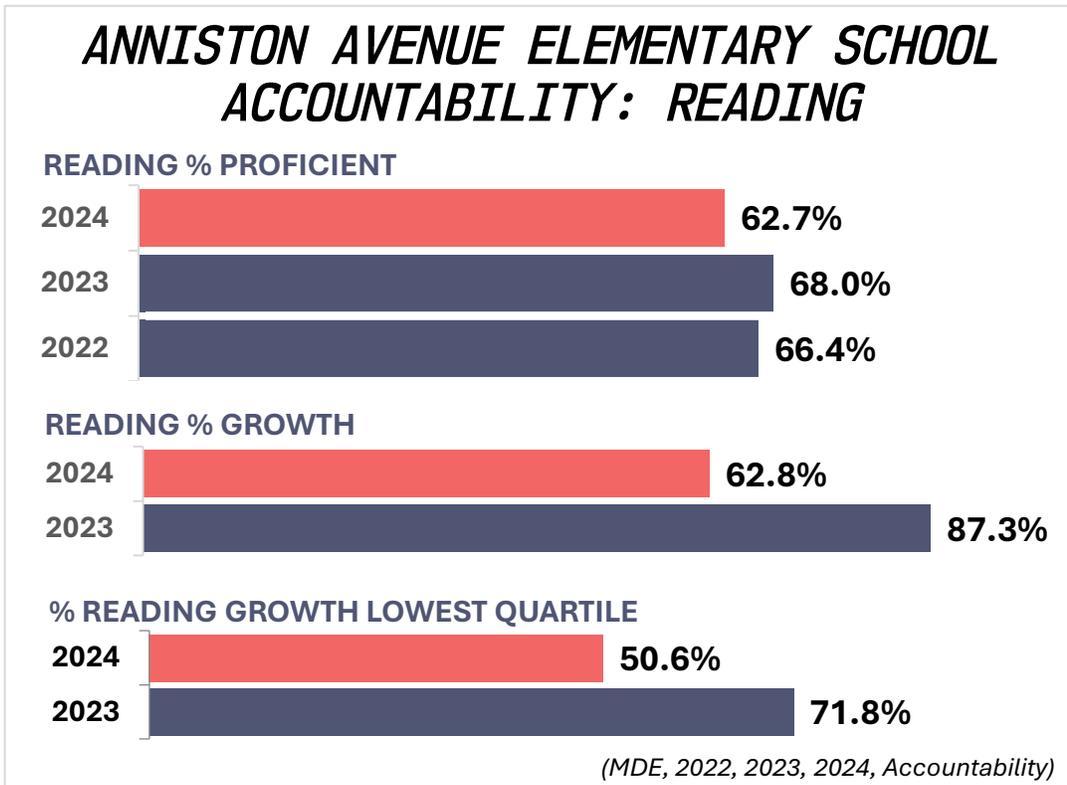


Figure 70: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Accountability: Reading

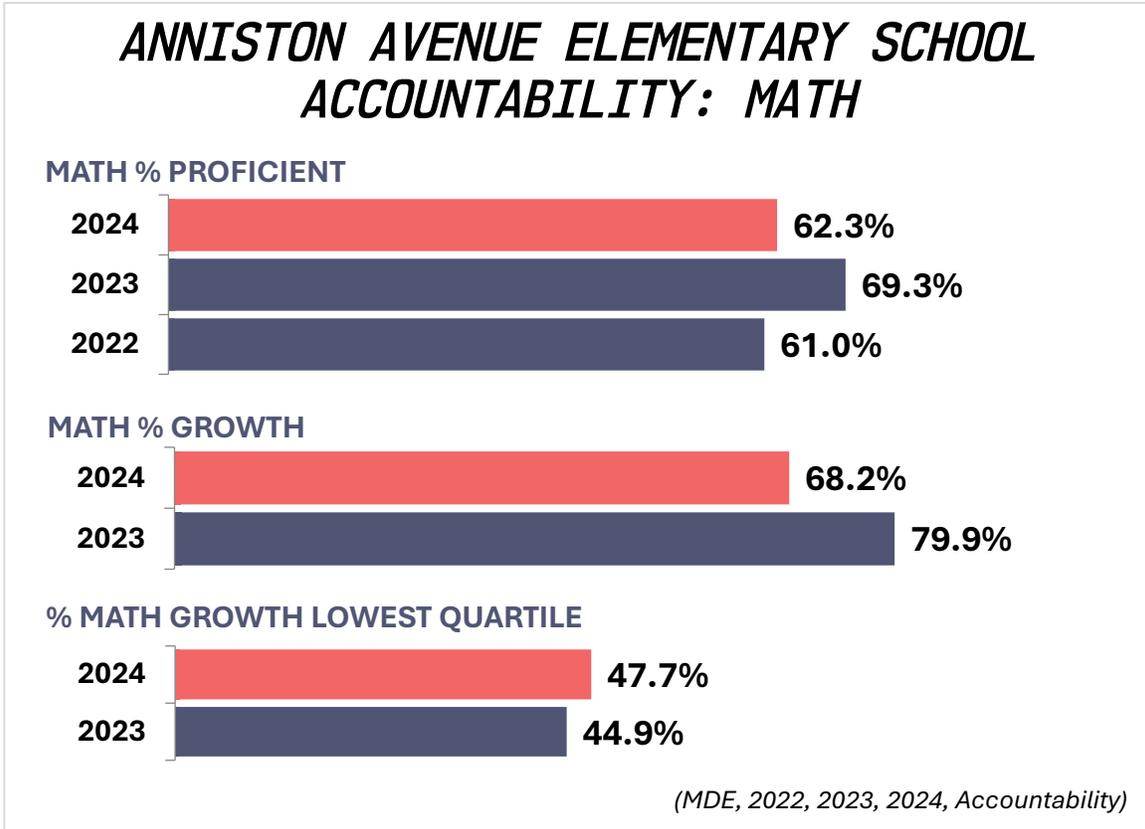


Figure 71: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Accountability: Math

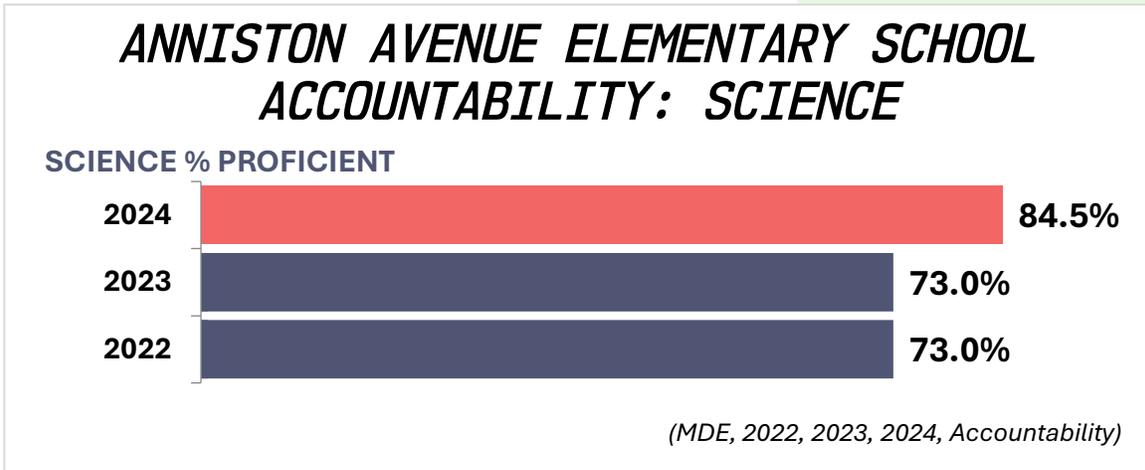


Figure 72: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Accountability: Science

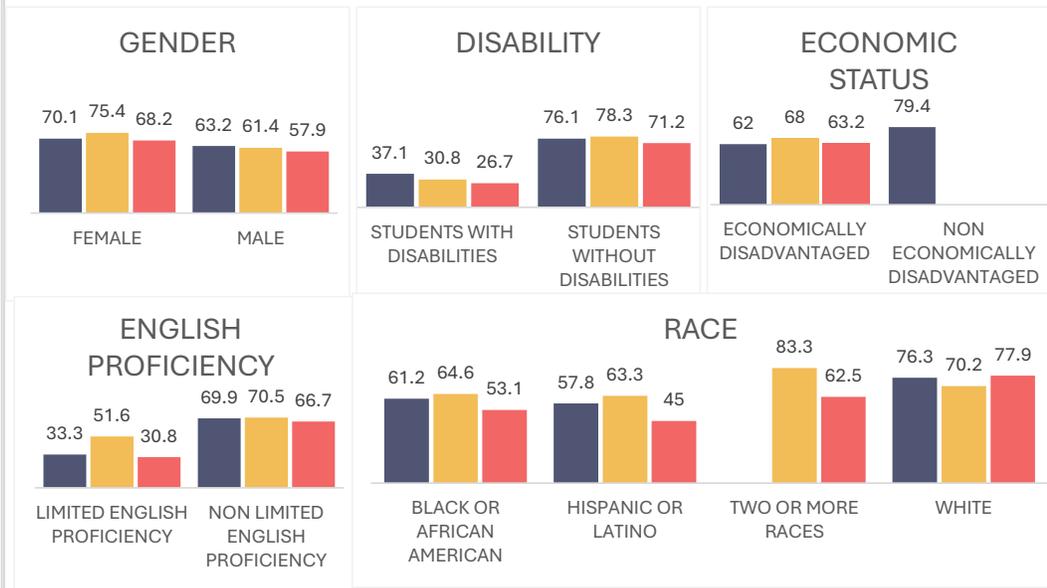

Figure 74: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

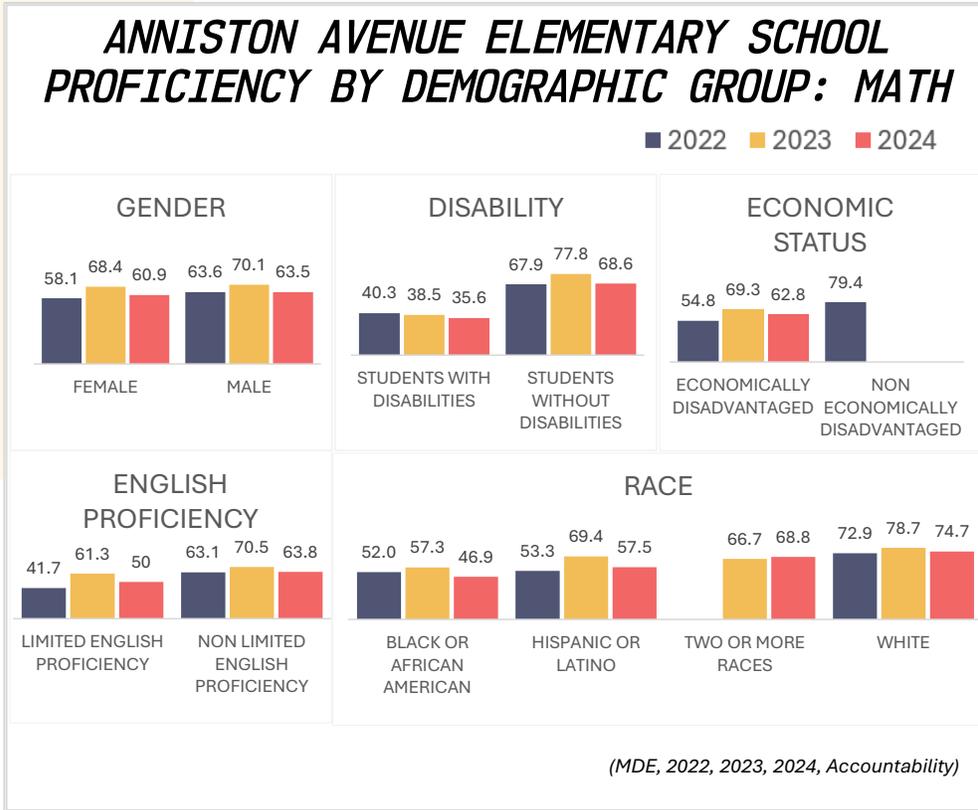


Figure 75: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

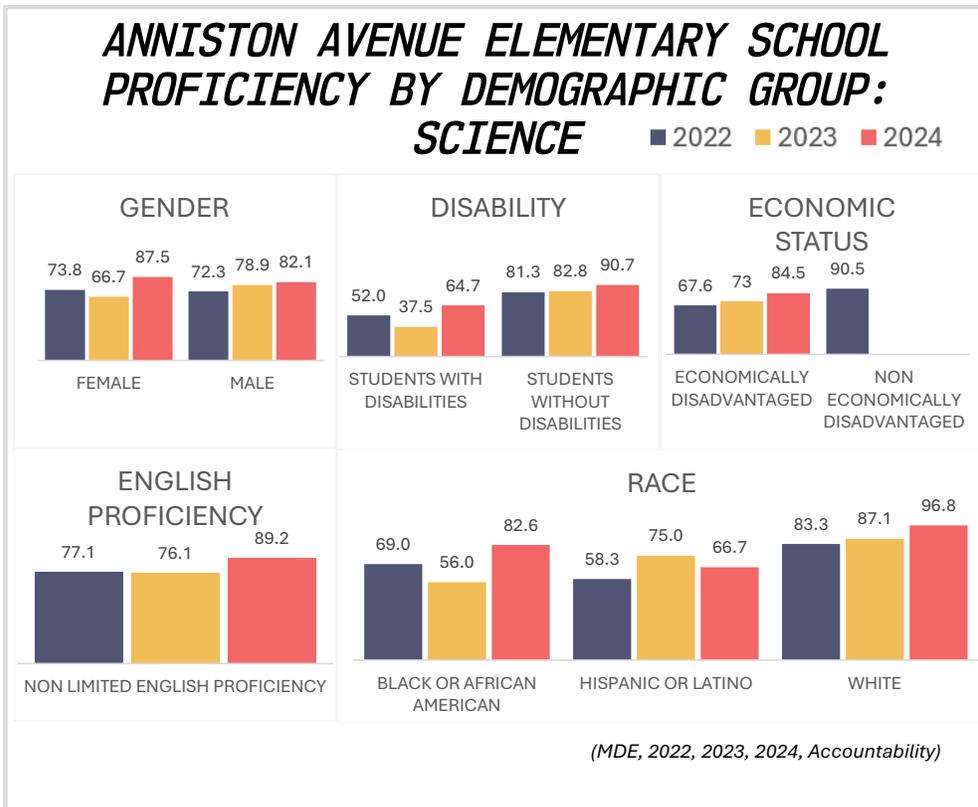


Figure 76: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

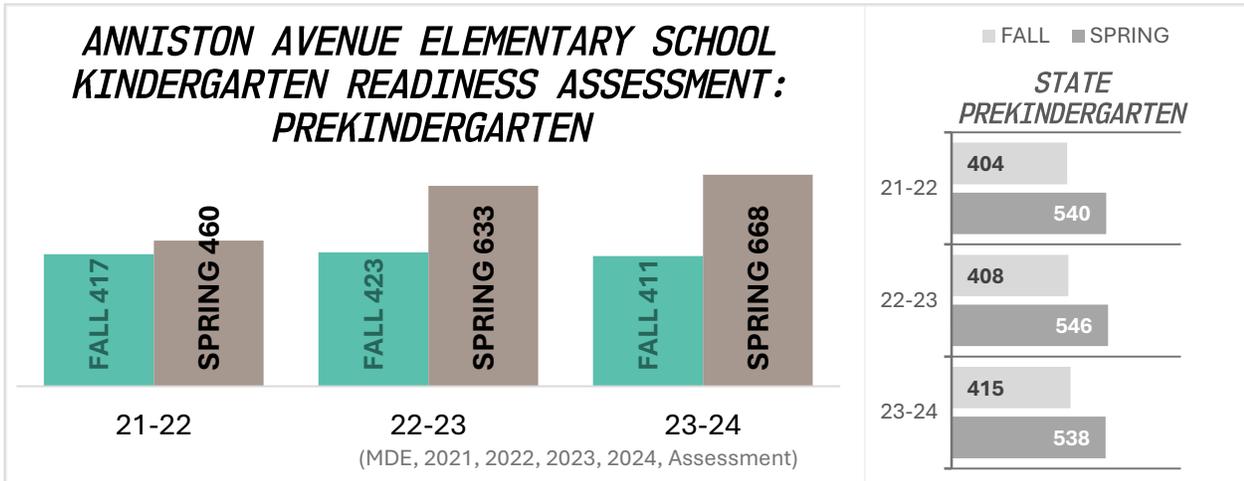


Figure 77: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Prekindergarten

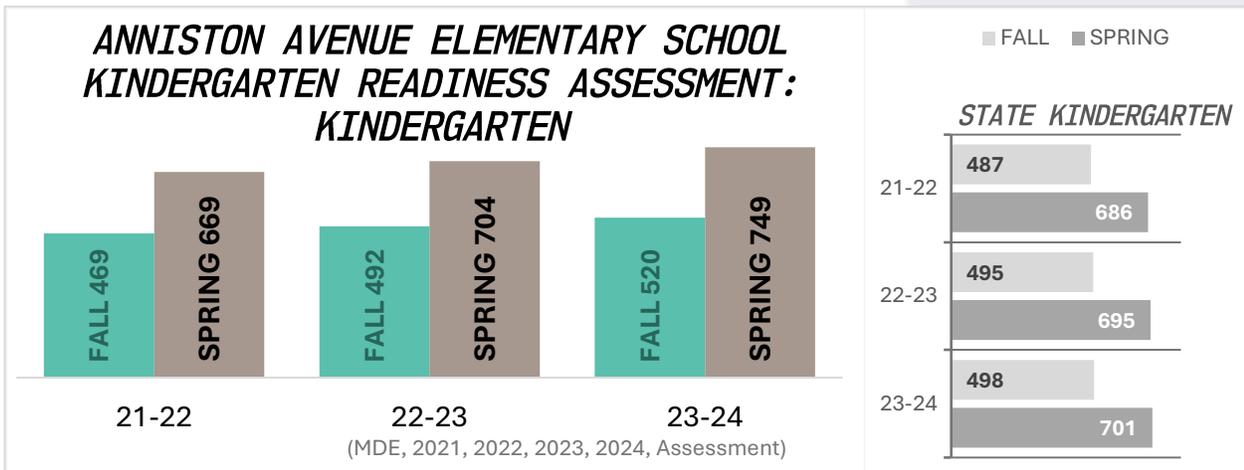


Figure 78: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Kindergarten

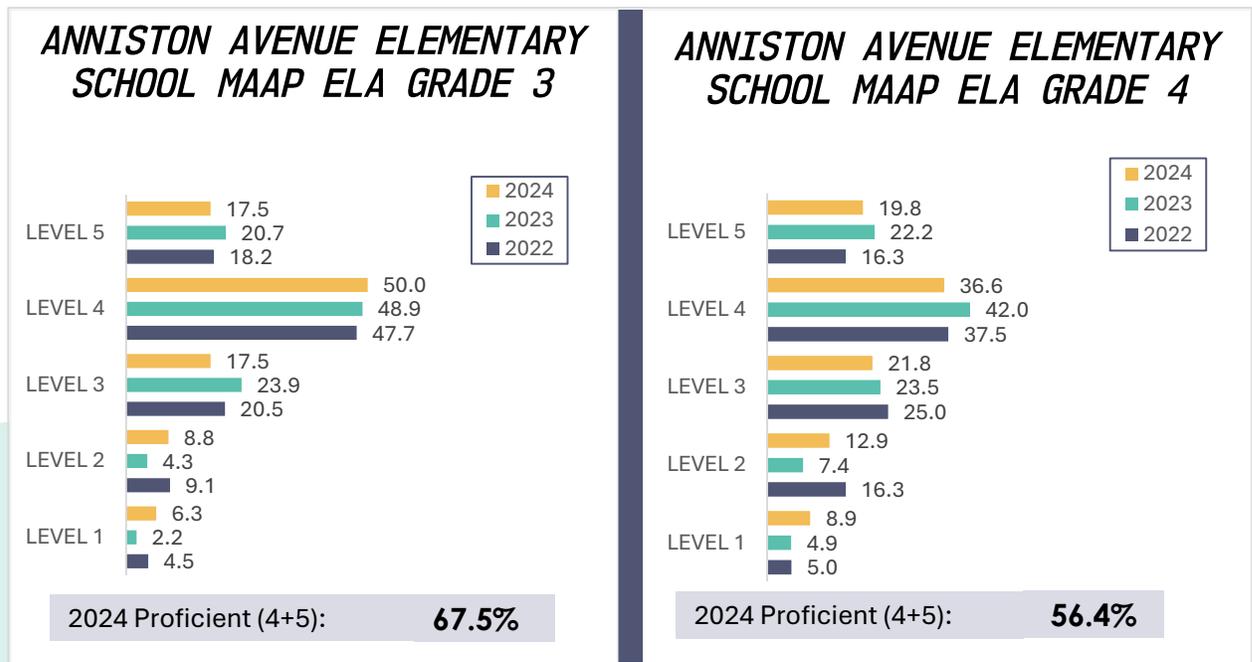


Figure 80: Anniston Avenue Elementary School MAAP ELA Grades 3 and 4

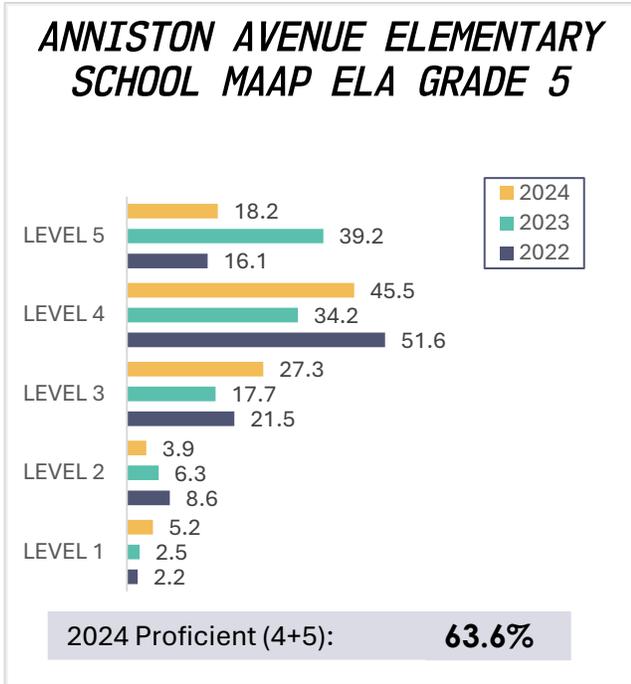


Figure 81: Anniston Avenue Elementary School MAAP ELA Grade 5

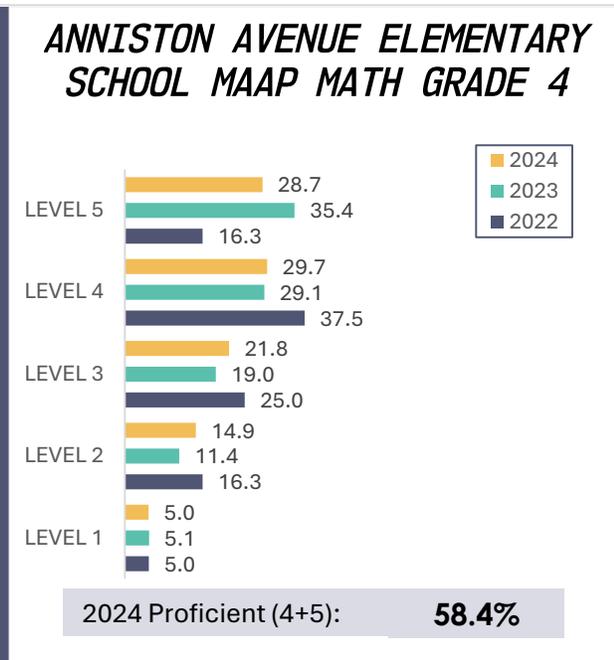
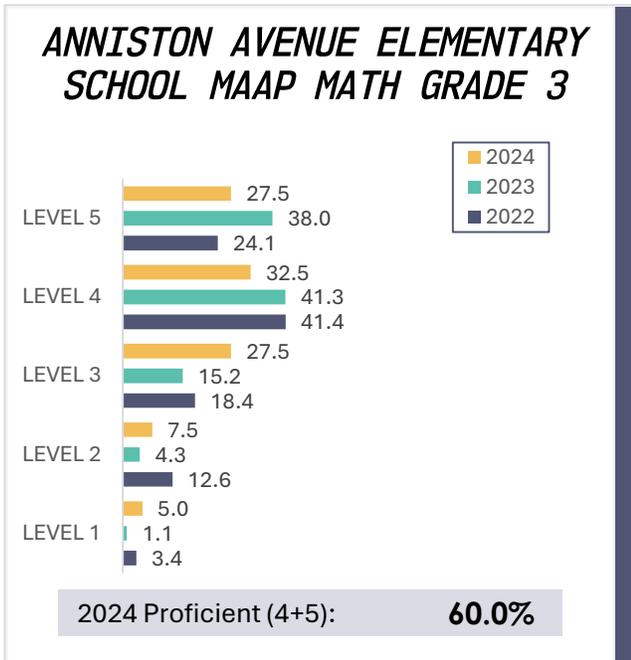


Figure 82: Anniston Avenue Elementary School MAAP Math Grades 3 and 4

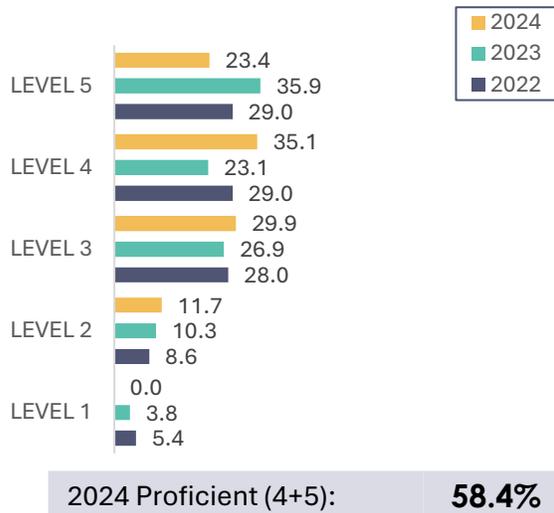
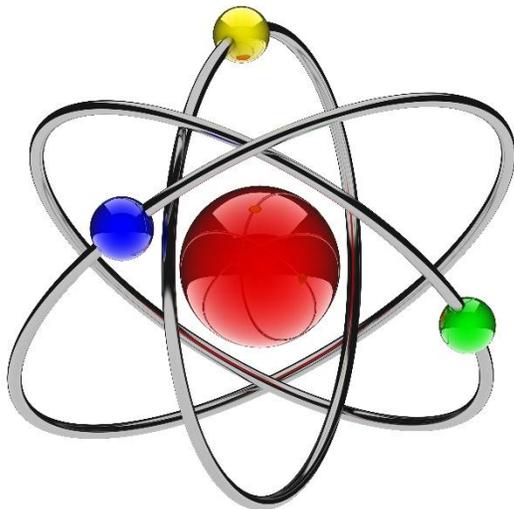


Figure 83: Anniston Avenue Elementary School MAAP Math Grade 5

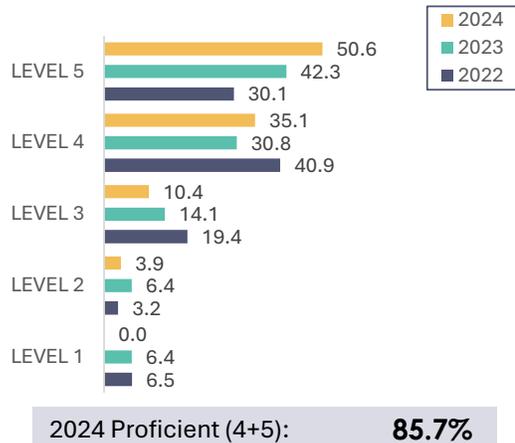


Figure 84: Anniston Avenue Elementary School MAAP Science Grade 5

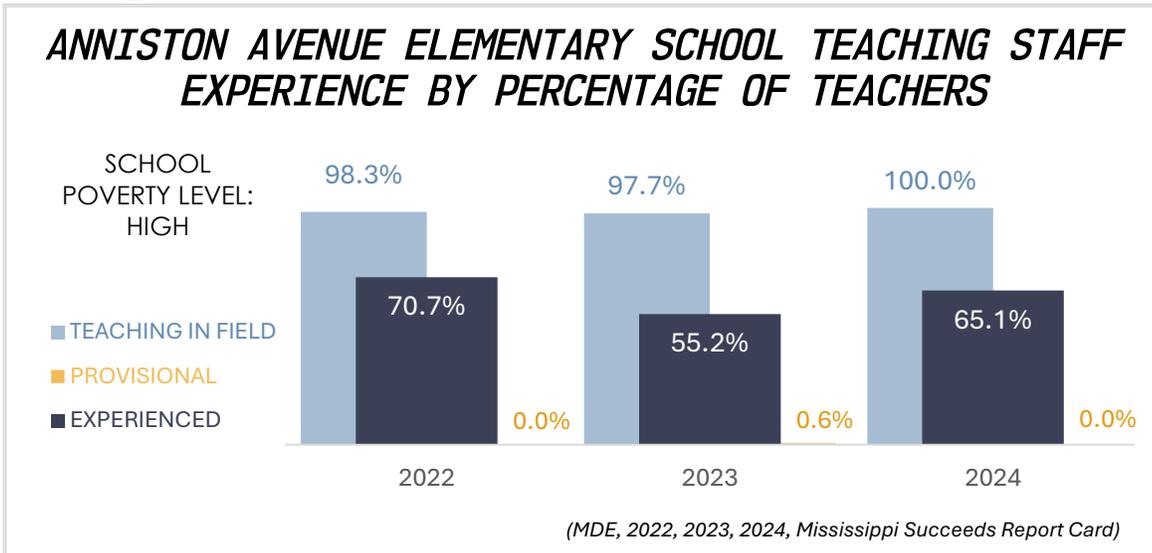
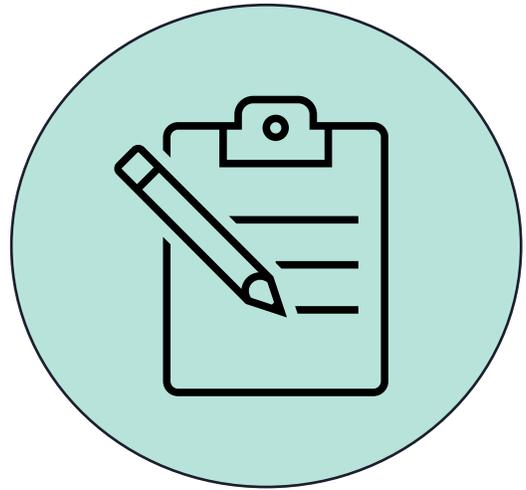


Figure 85: Anniston Avenue Elementary School Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers

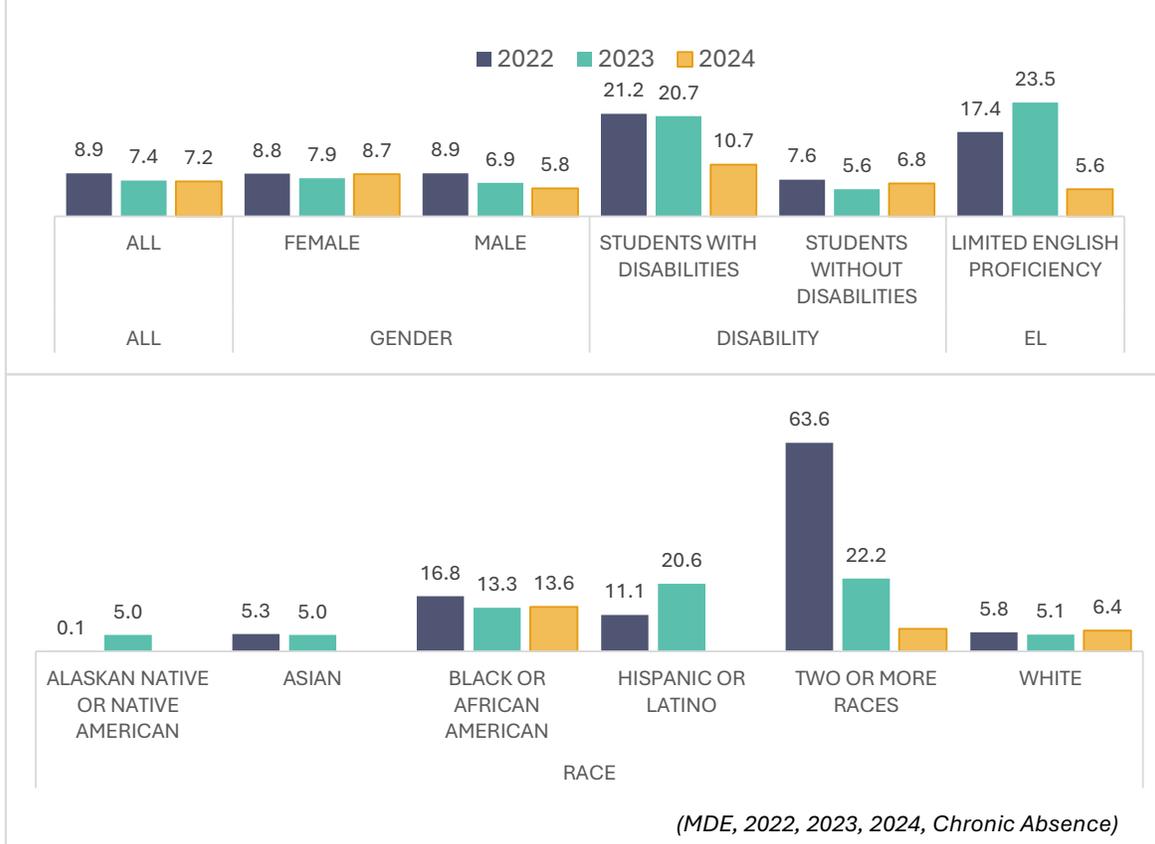


Figure 89: Bayou View Elementary School Chronic Absence

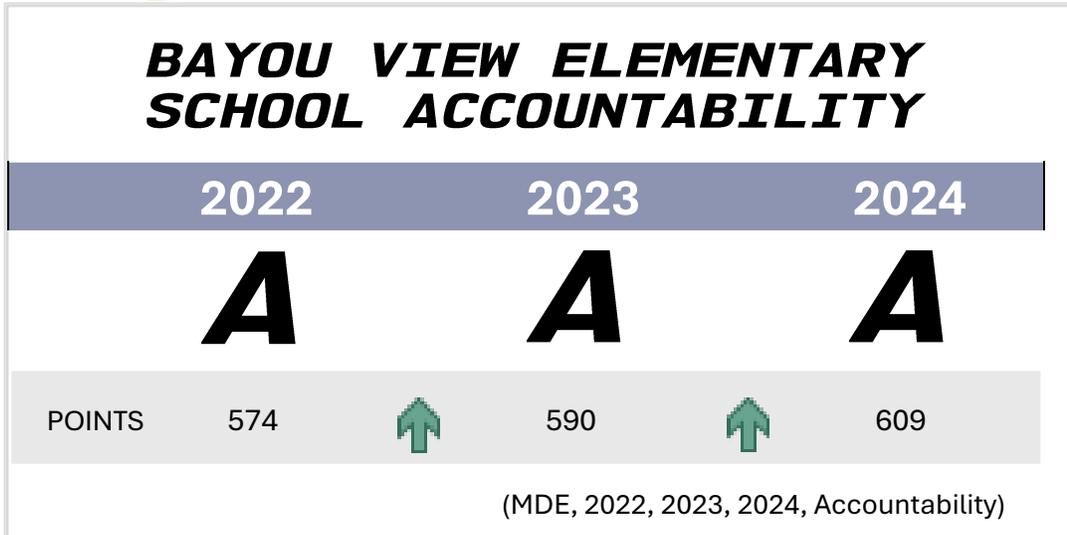


Figure 90: Bayou View Elementary School Accountability

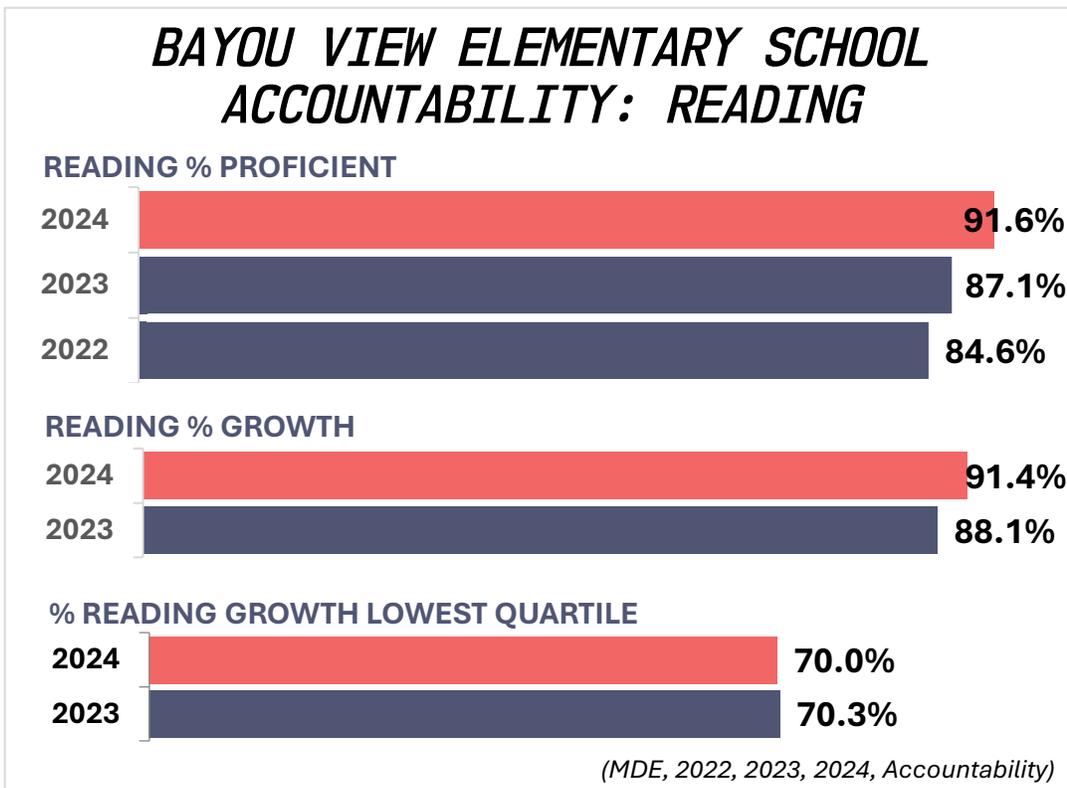


Figure 91: Bayou View Elementary School Accountability: Reading

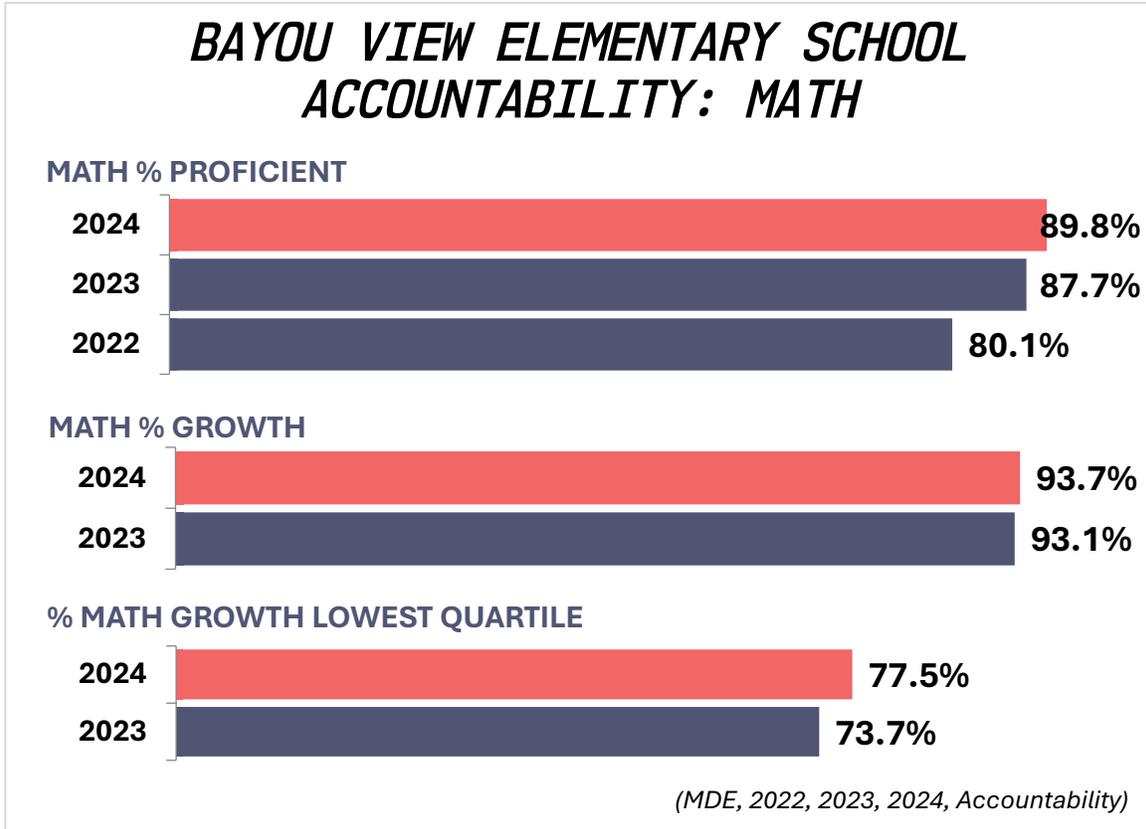


Figure 92: Bayou View Elementary School Accountability: Math

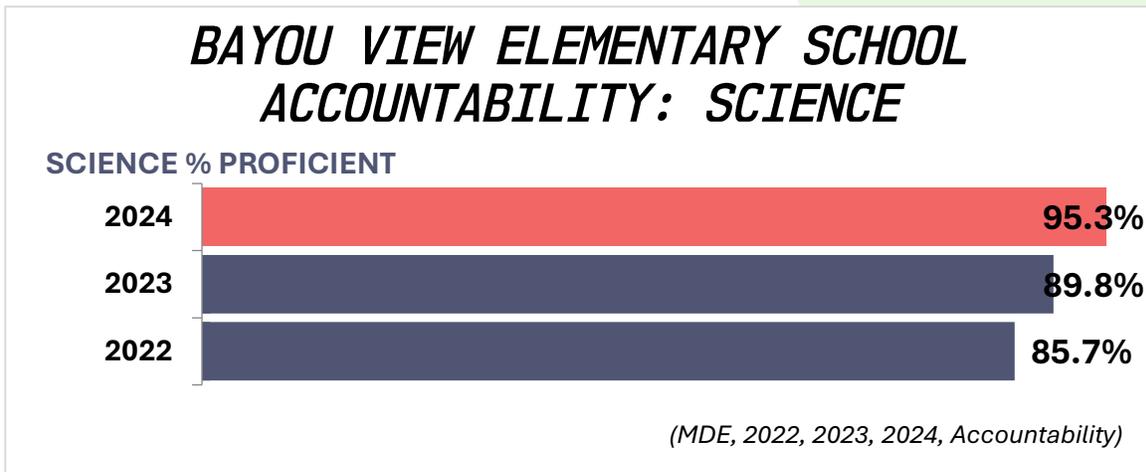
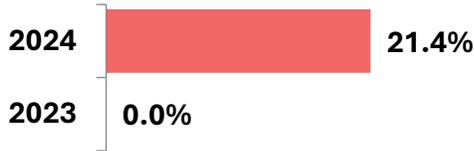


Figure 93: Bayou View Elementary School Accountability: Science

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS PROFICIENCY

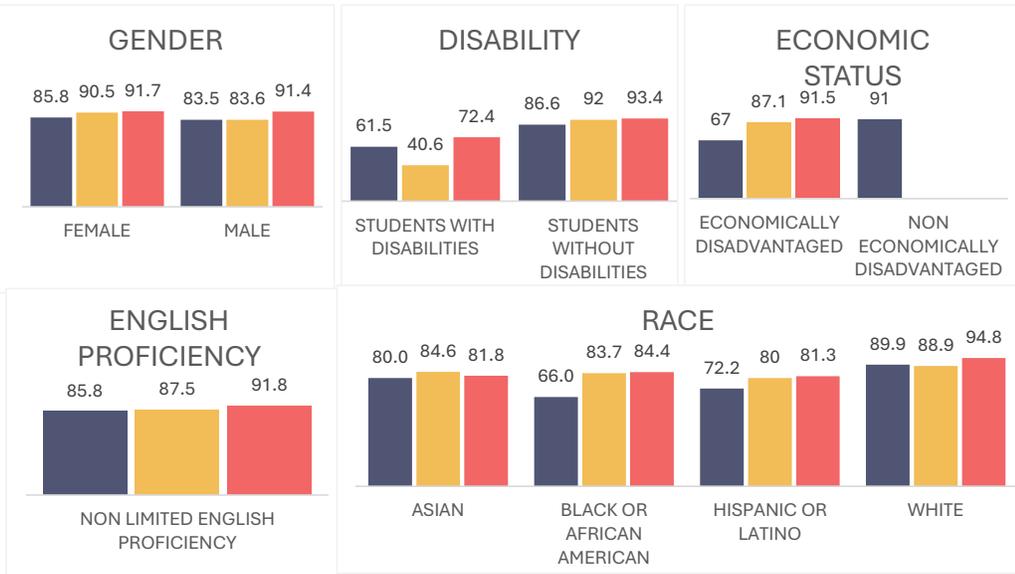

Figure 95: Bayou View Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

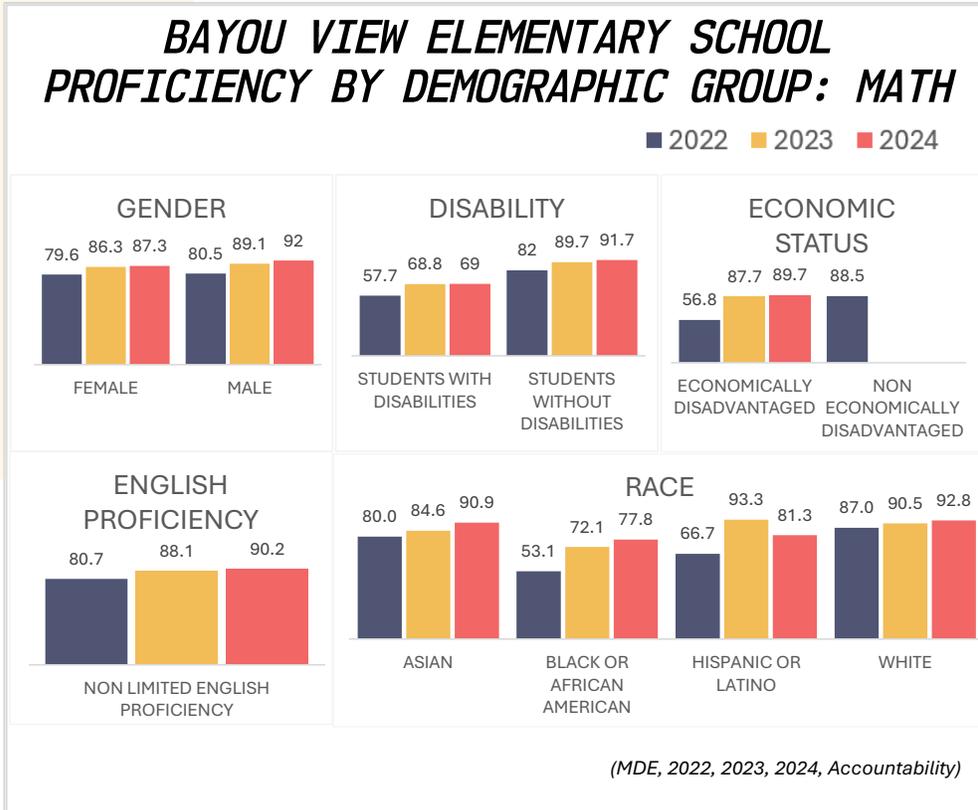


Figure 96: Bayou View Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

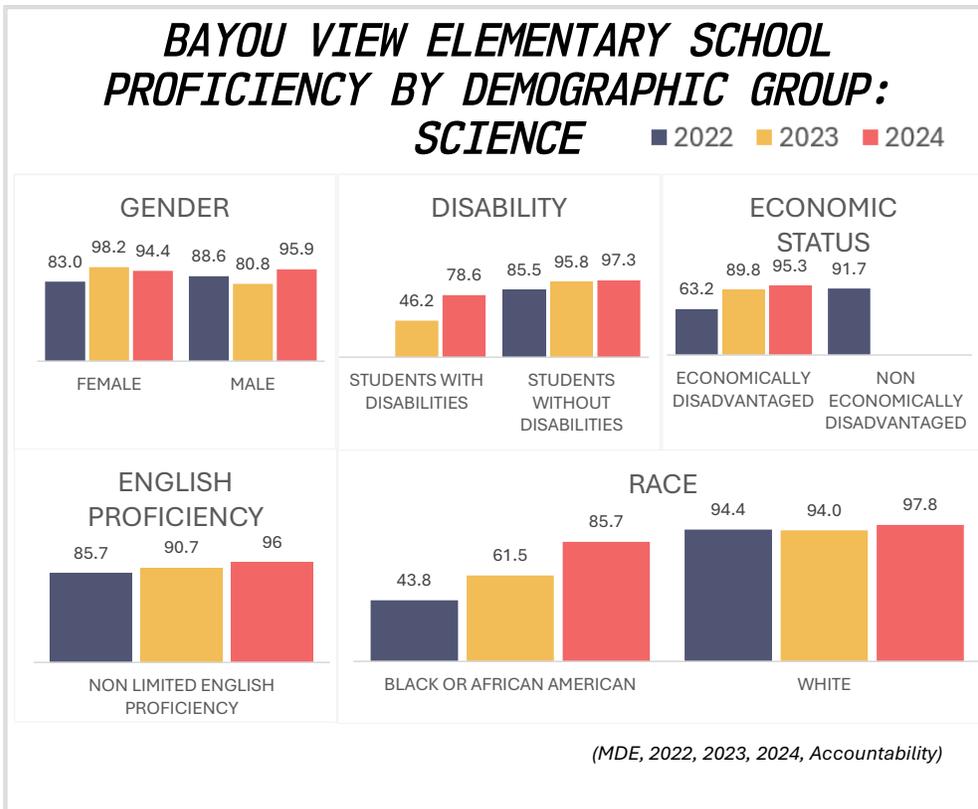
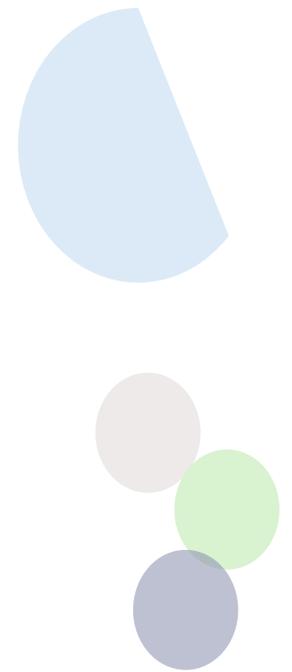


Figure 97: Bayou View Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

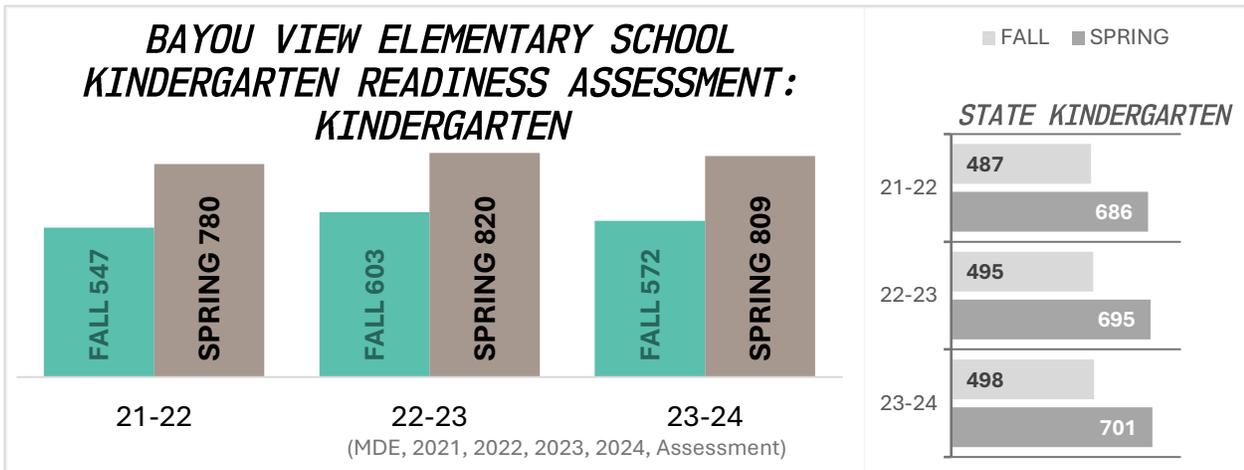


Figure 98: Bayou View Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Kindergarten

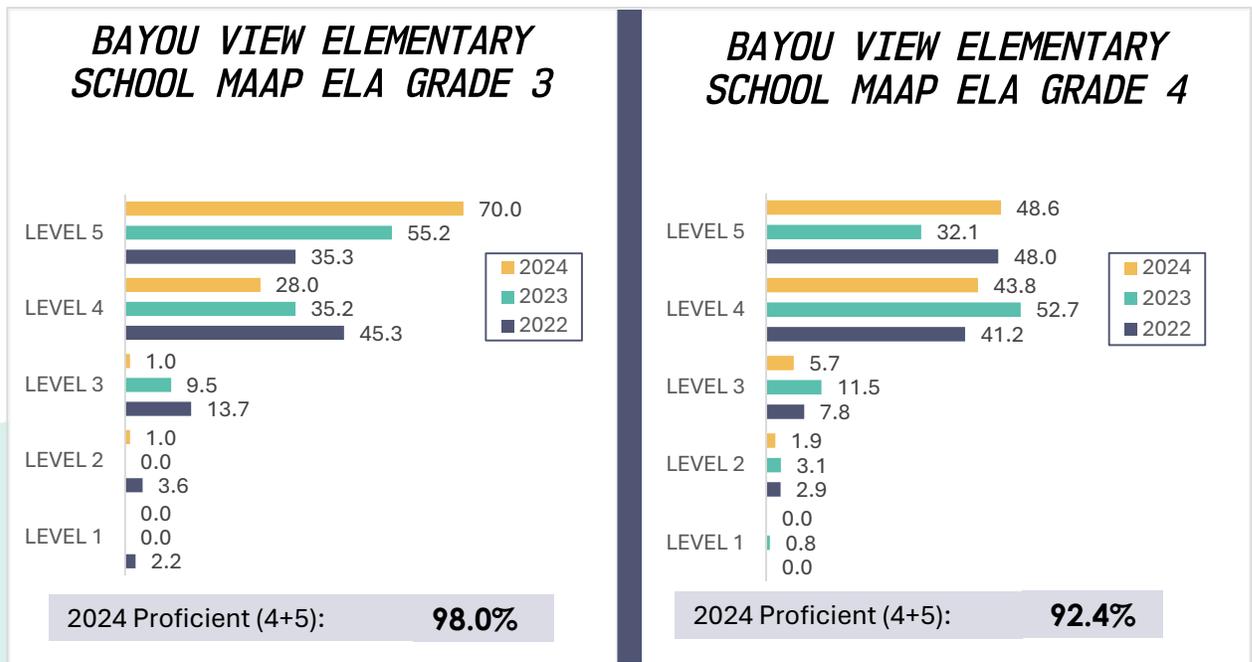


Figure 100: Bayou View Elementary School MAAP ELA Grades 3 and 4

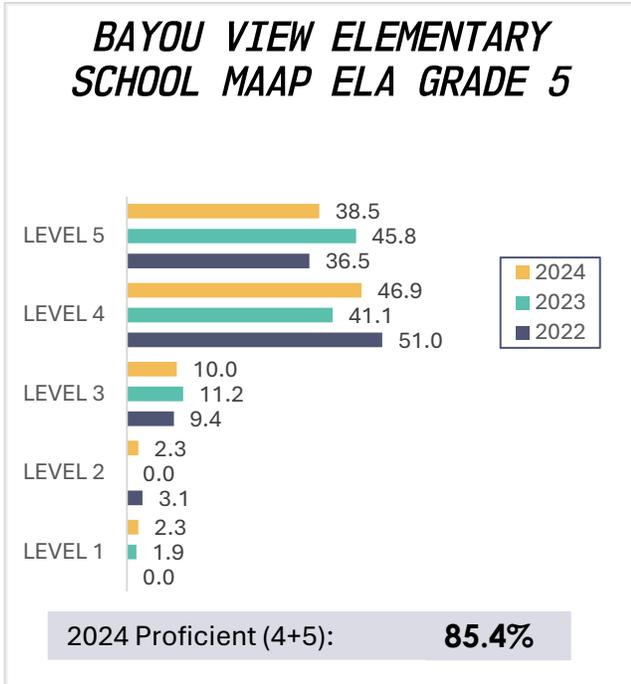


Figure 101: Bayou View Elementary School MAAP ELA Grade 5

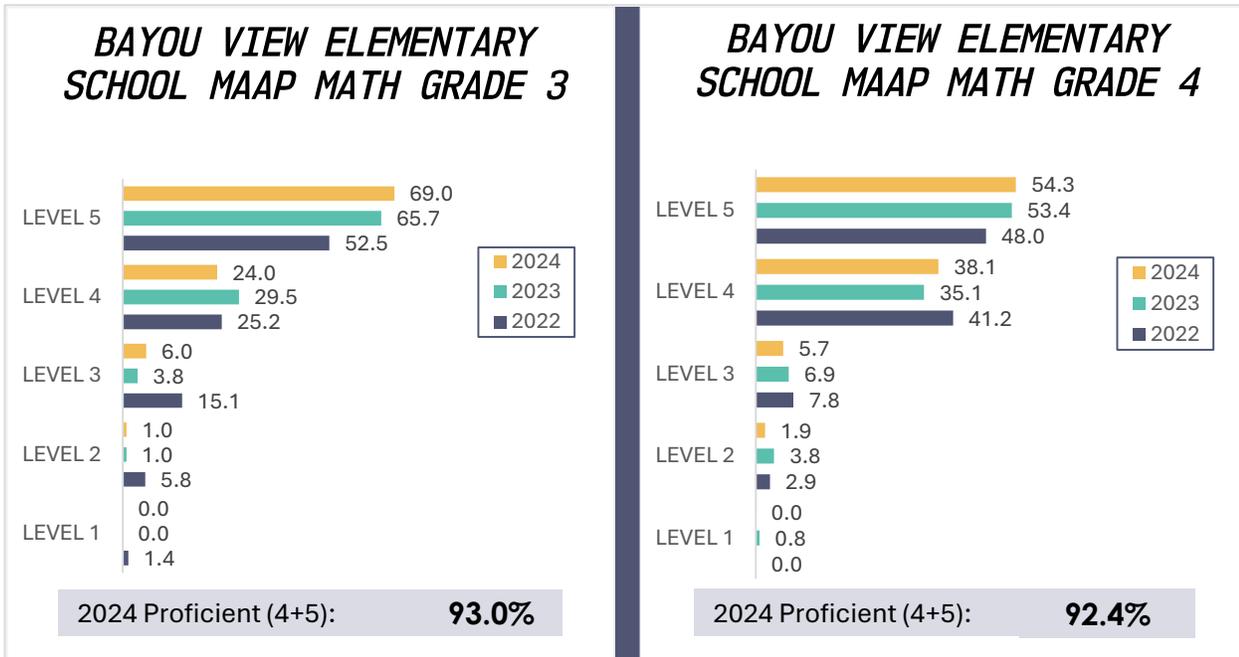


Figure 102: Bayou View Elementary School MAAP Math Grades 3 and 4

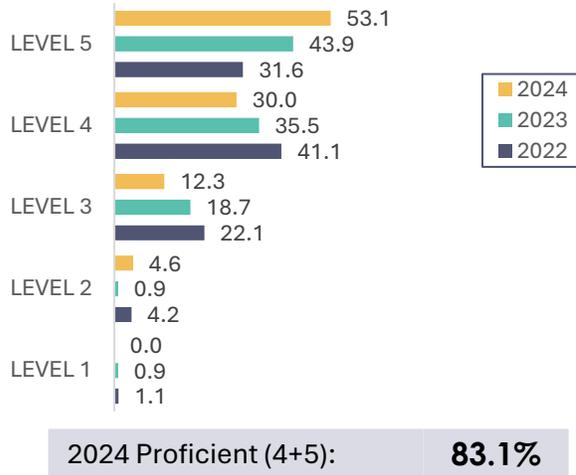
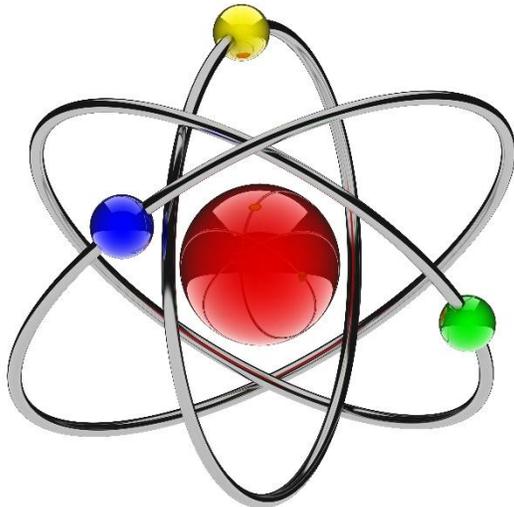


Figure 103: Bayou View Elementary School MAAP Math Grade 5

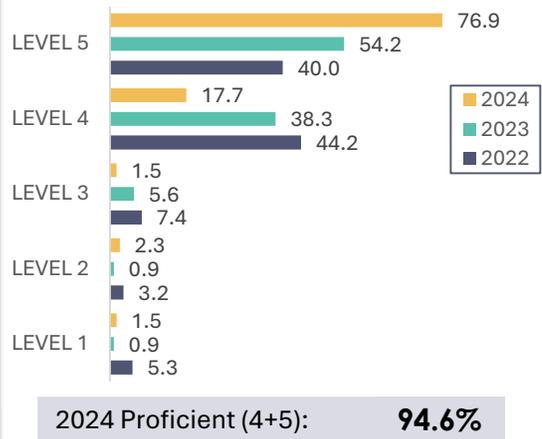


Figure 104: Bayou View Elementary School MAAP Science Grade 5

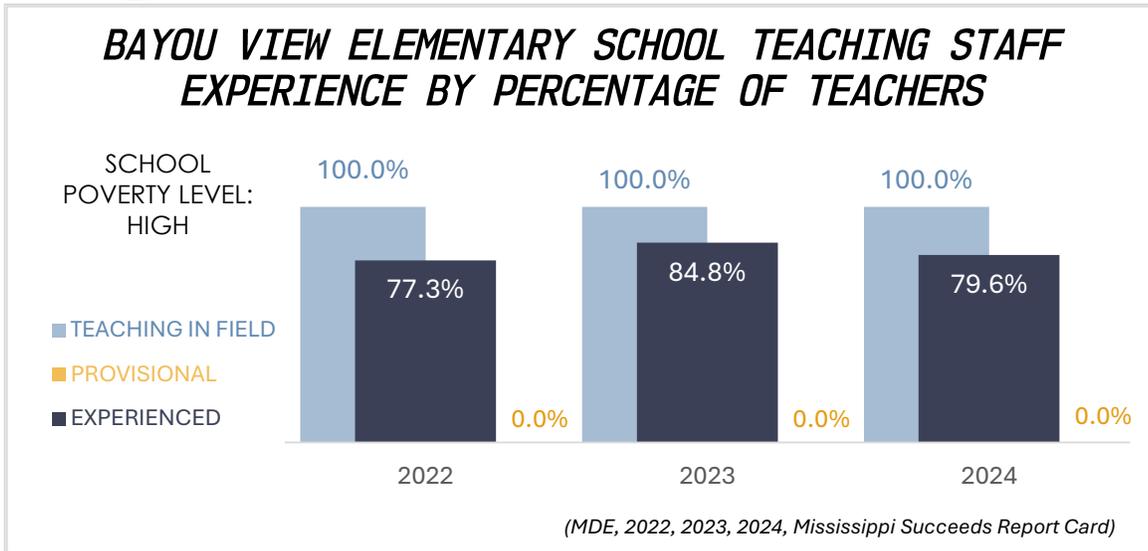


Figure 105: Bayou View Elementary School Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers

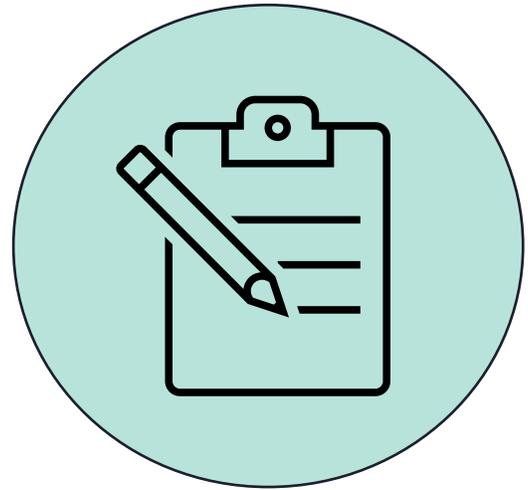

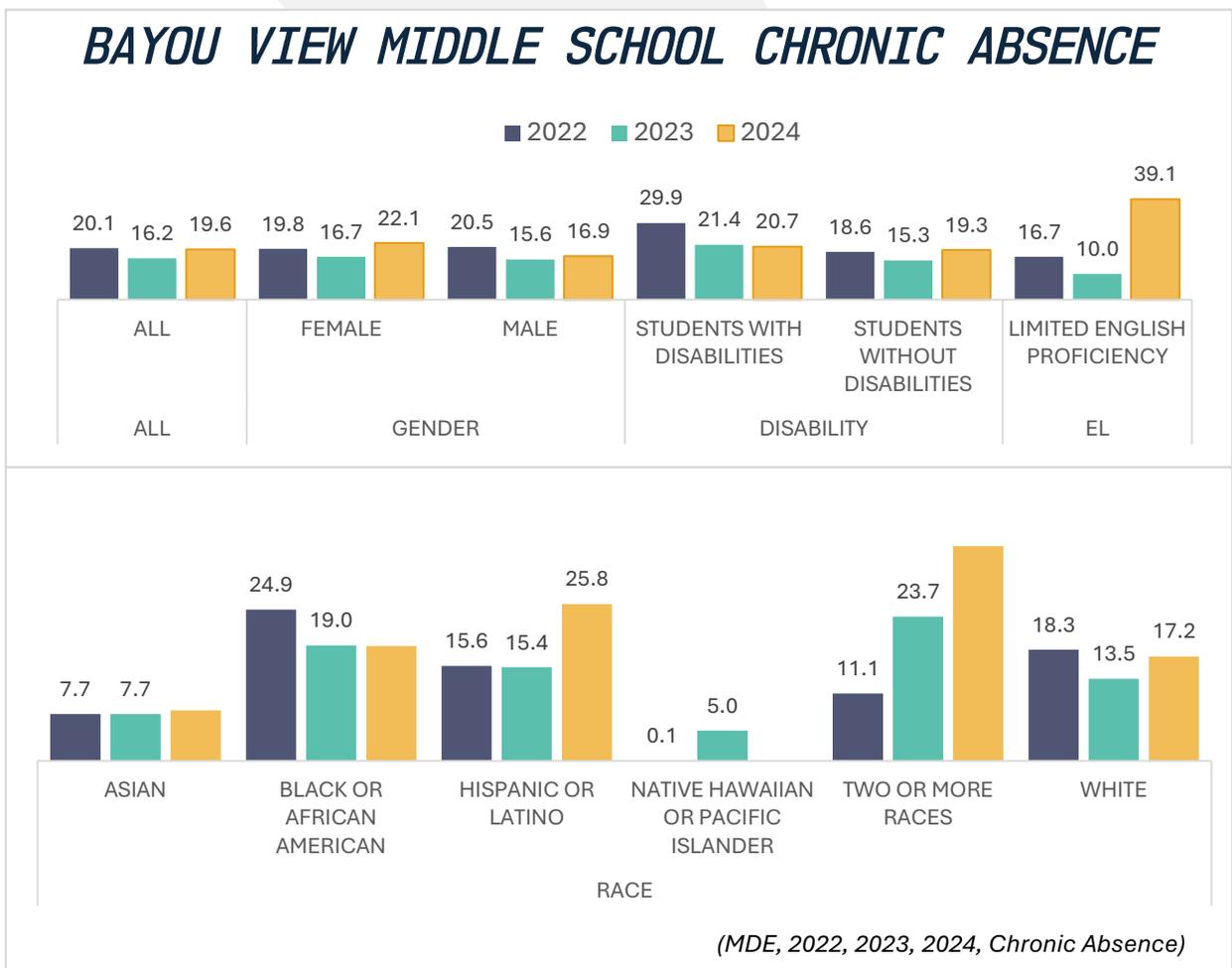


Figure 110: Bayou View Middle School Chronic Absence

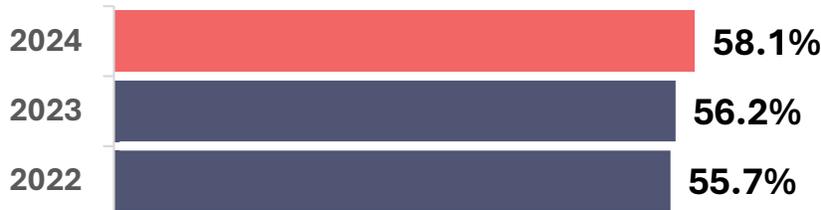

Figure 112: Bayou View Middle School Accountability: Reading

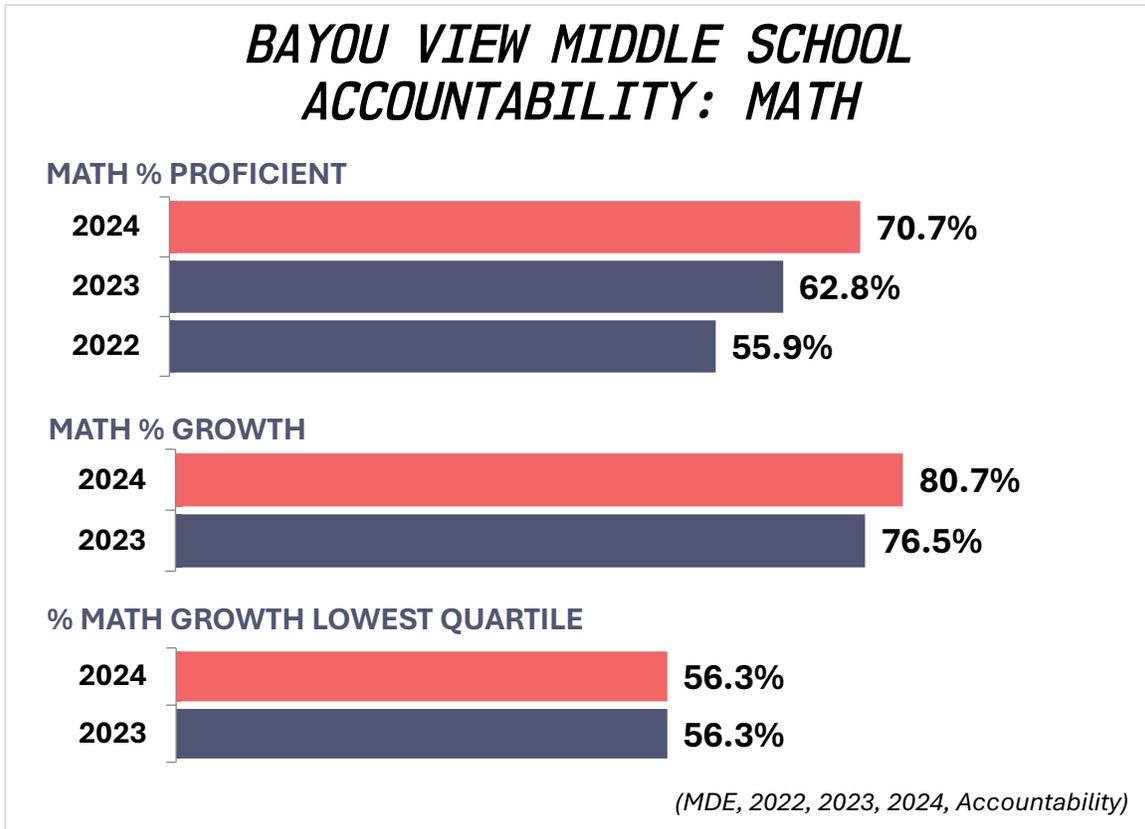


Figure 113: Bayou View Middle School Accountability: Math

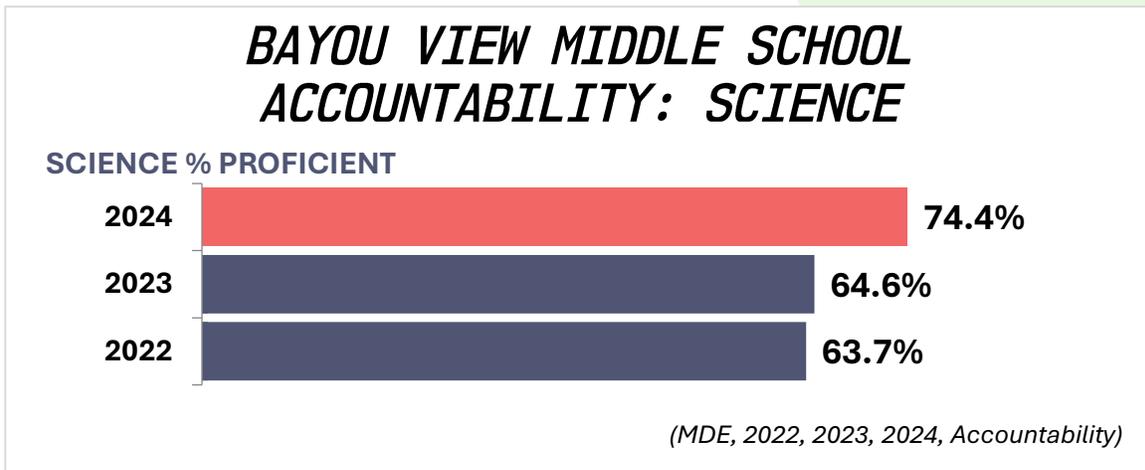
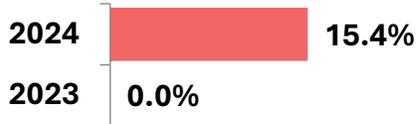


Figure 114: Bayou View Middle School Accountability: Science

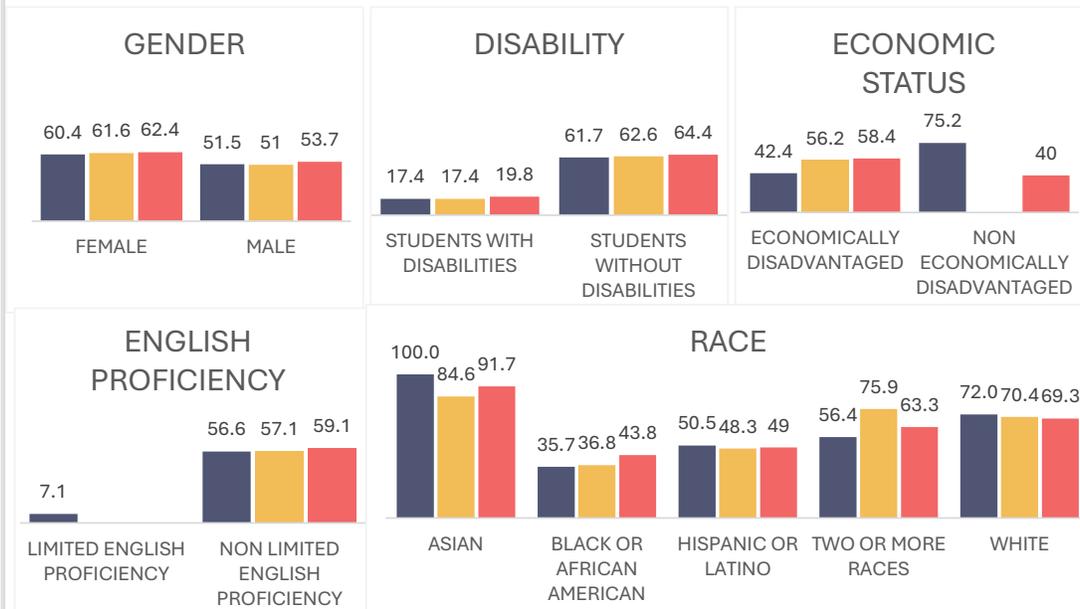

Figure 116: Bayou View Middle School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

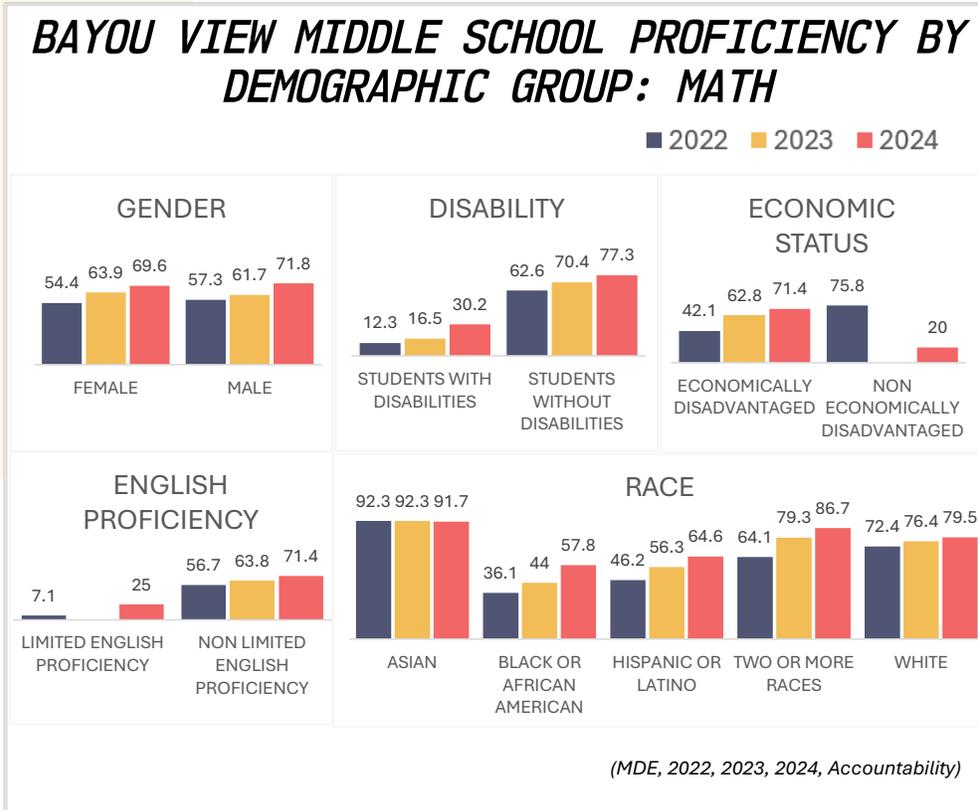


Figure 117: Bayou View Middle School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

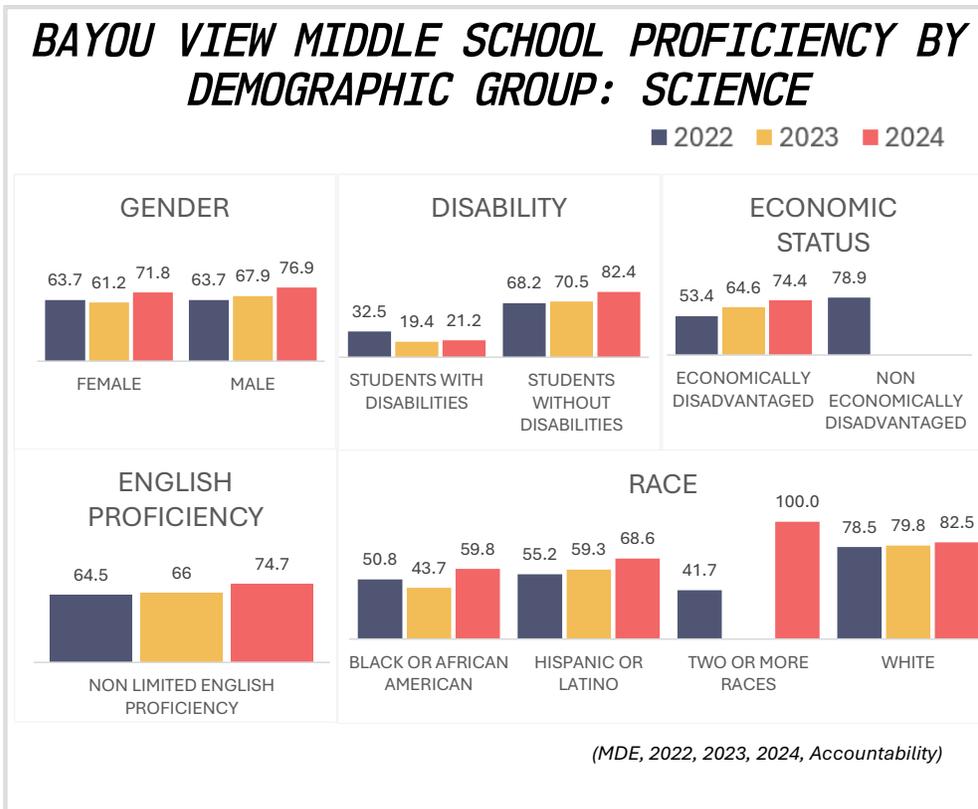
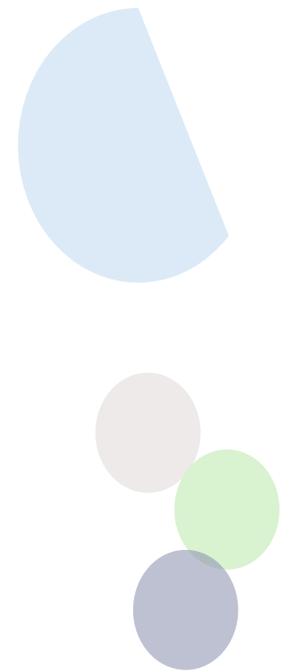


Figure 118: Bayou View Middle School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

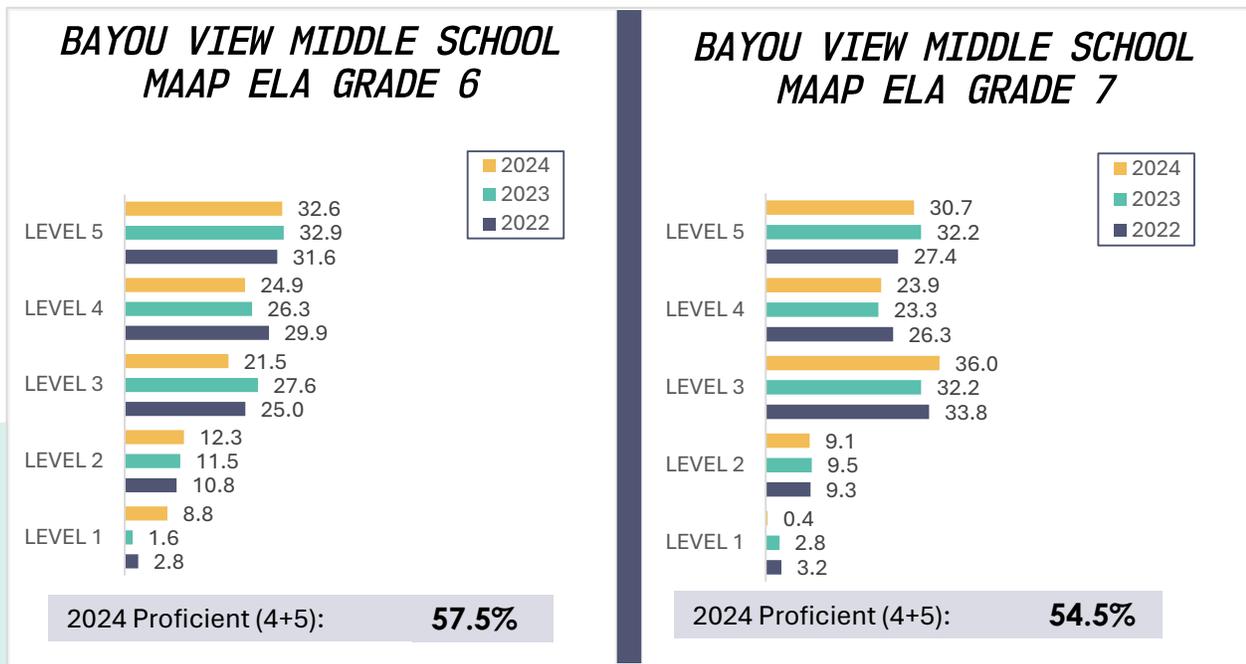


Figure 119: Bayou View Middle School MAAP ELA Grades 6 and 7



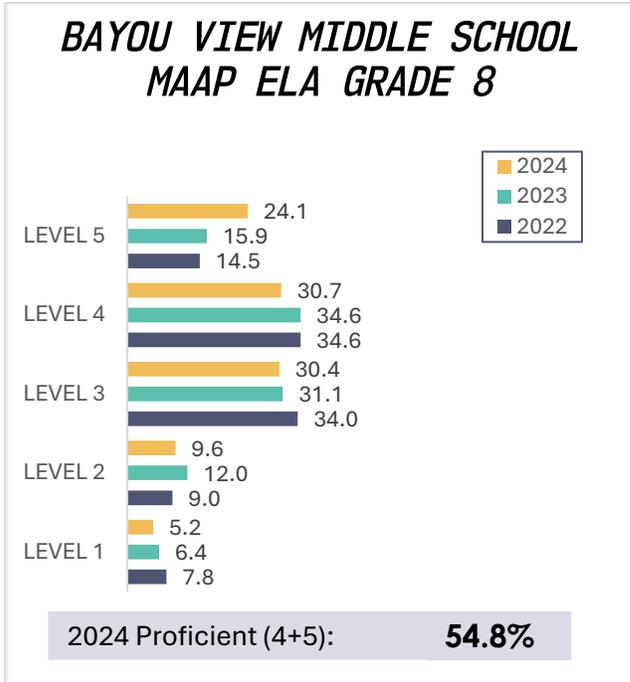


Figure 120: Bayou View Middle School MAAP ELA Grade 8

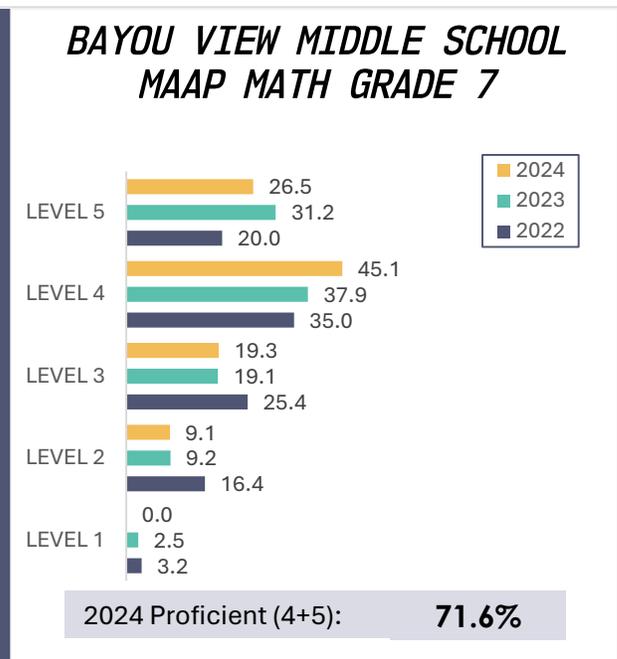
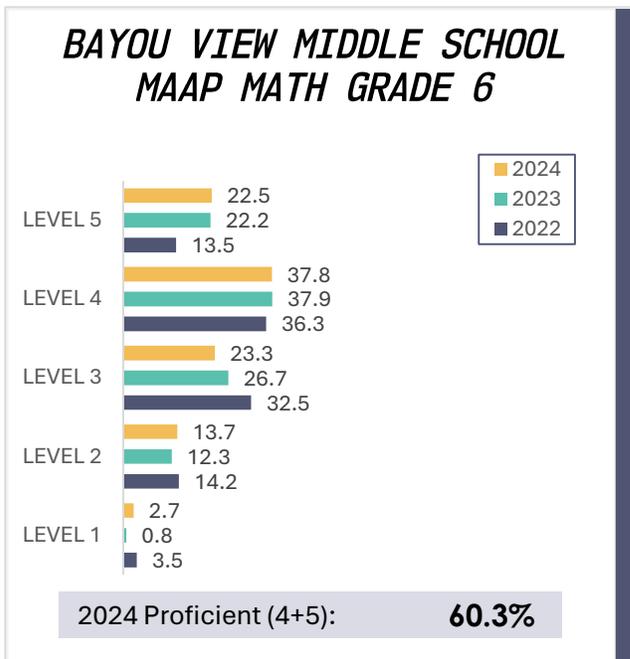


Figure 121: Bayou View Middle School MAAP Math Grades 6 and 7

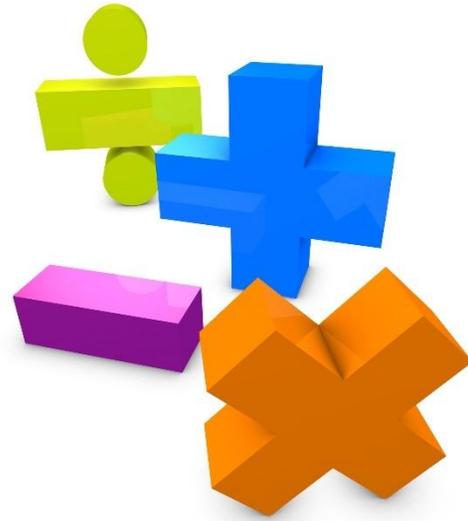
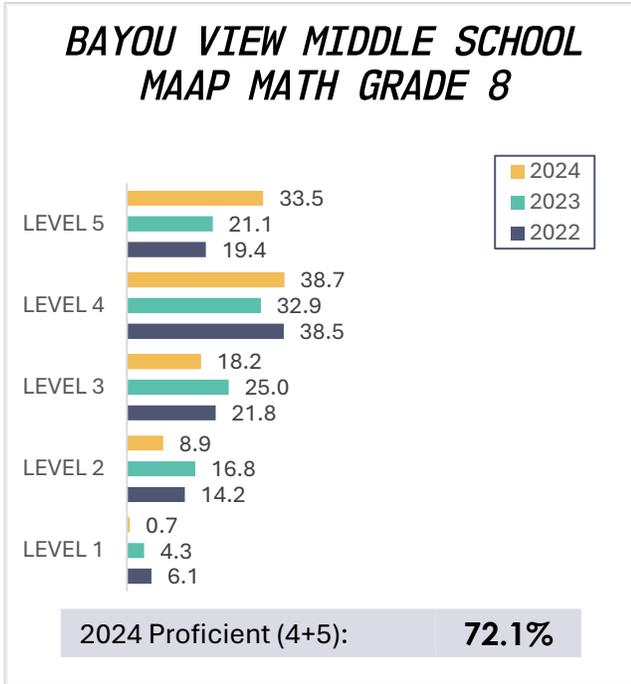


Figure 122: Bayou View Middle School MAAP Math Grade 8

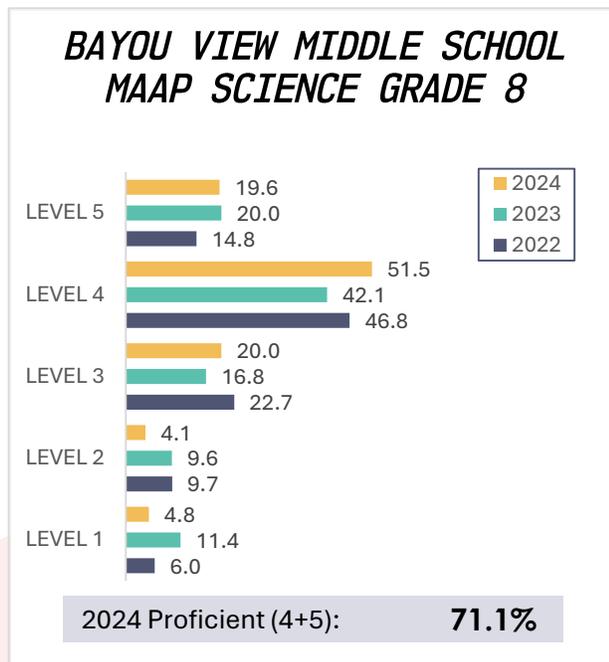
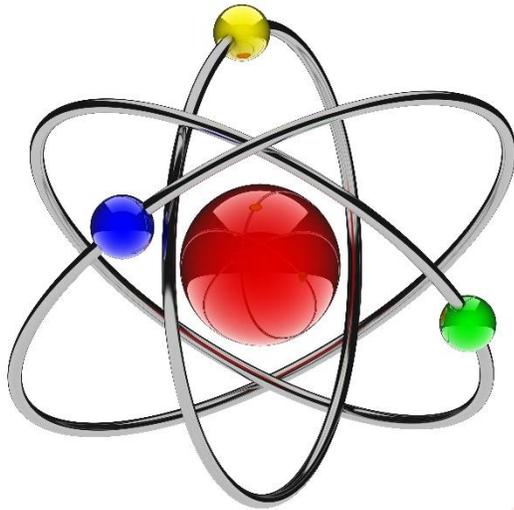


Figure 123: Bayou View Middle School MAAP Science Grade 8

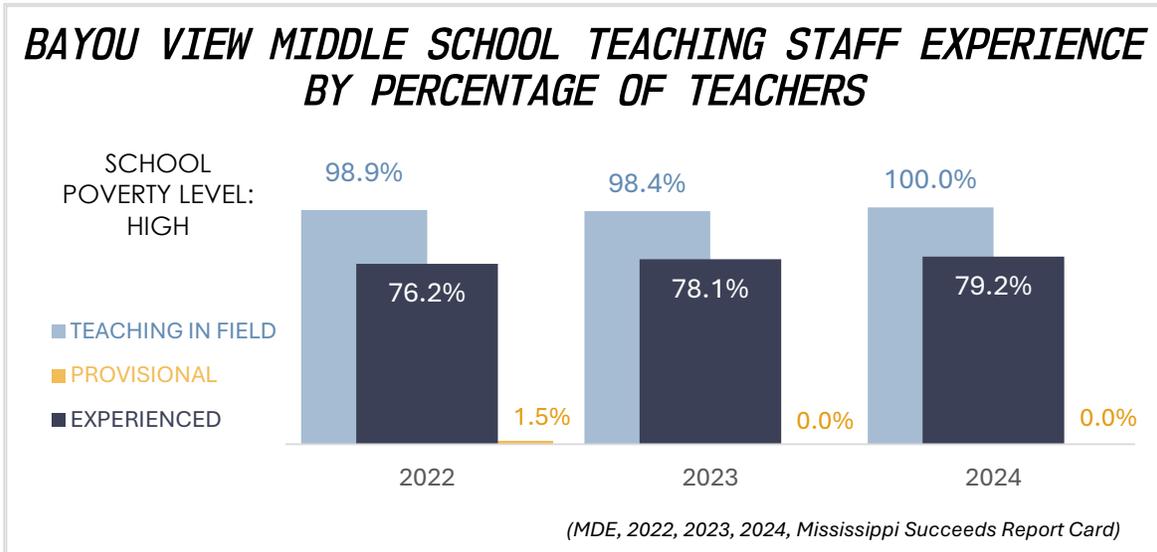


Figure 124: Bayou View Middle School Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers

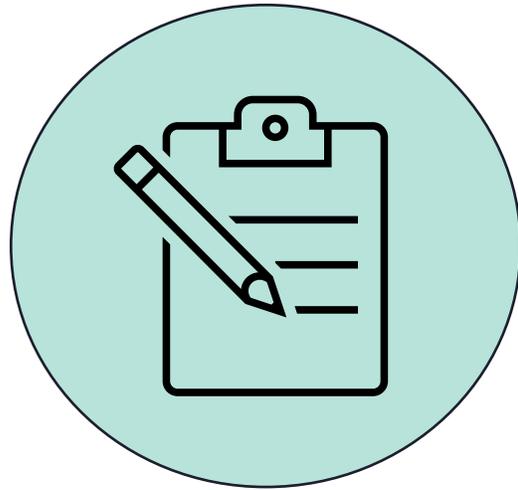

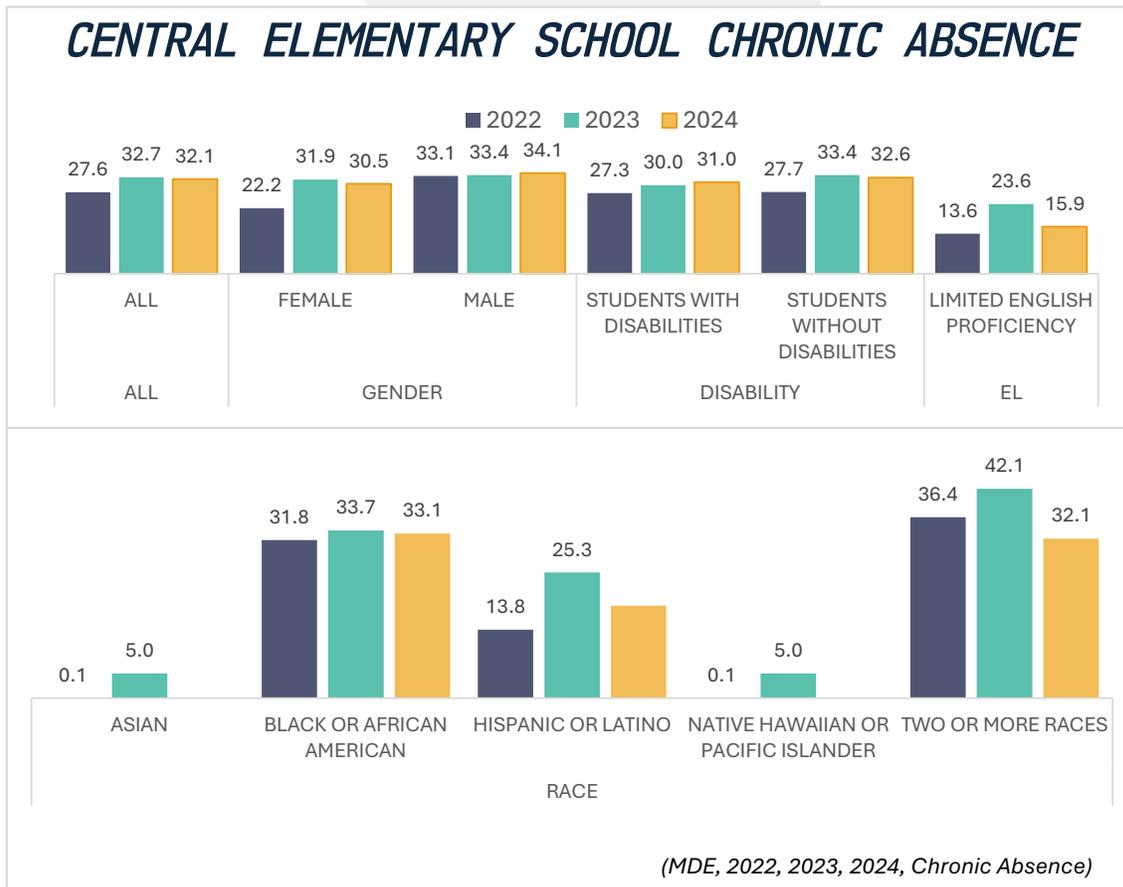

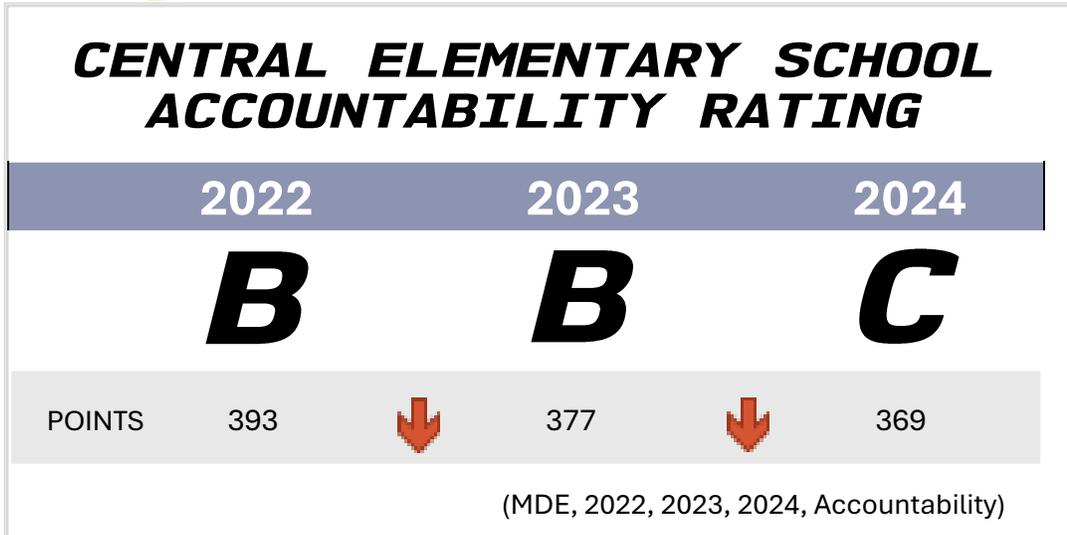


Figure 130: Central Elementary School Accountability

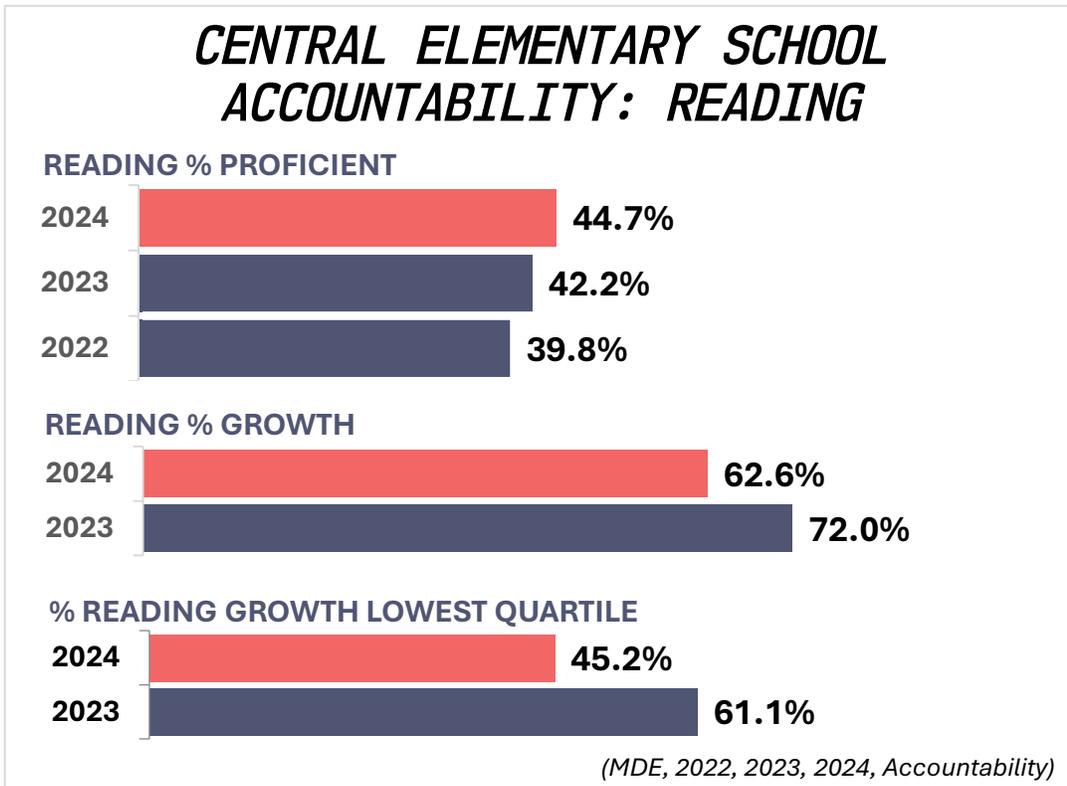


Figure 131: Central Elementary School Accountability: Reading

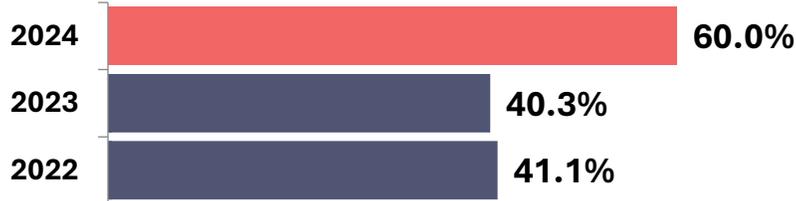

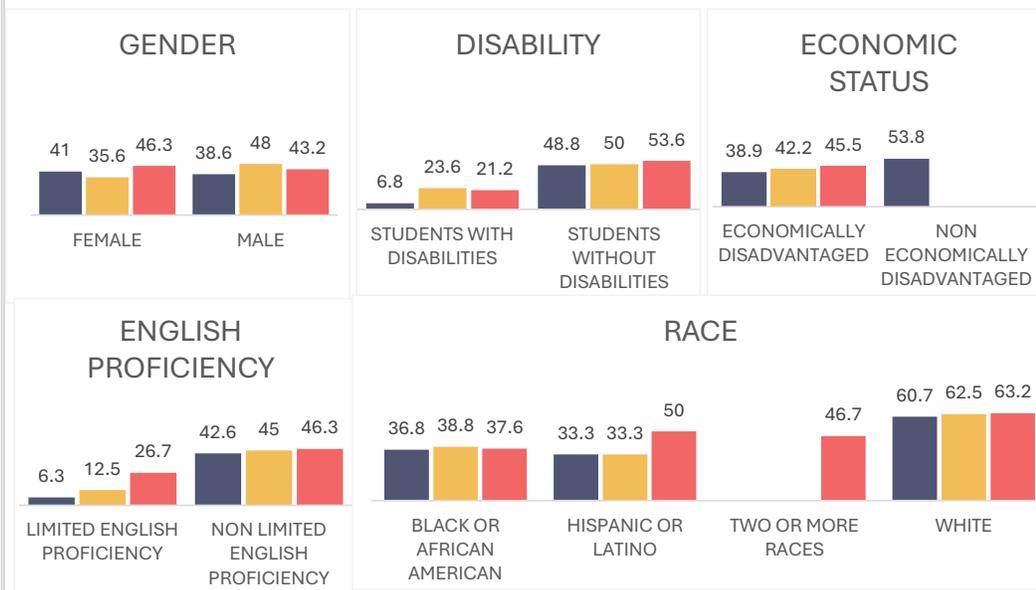

Figure 135: Central Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

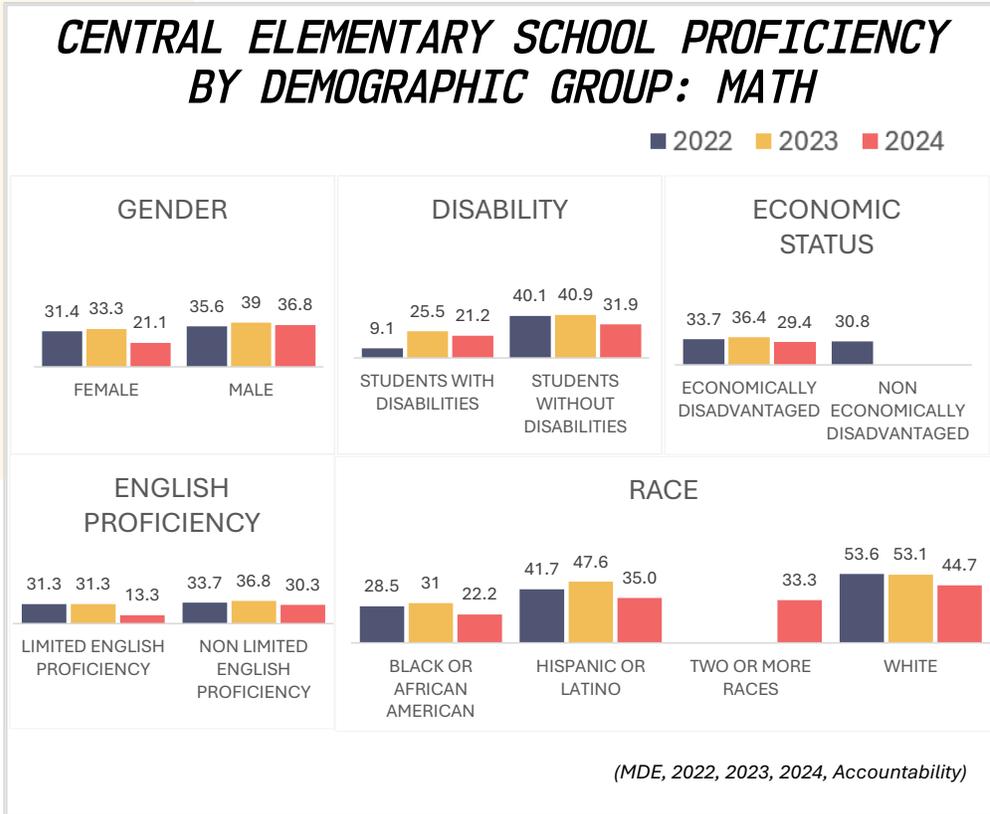


Figure 136: Central Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

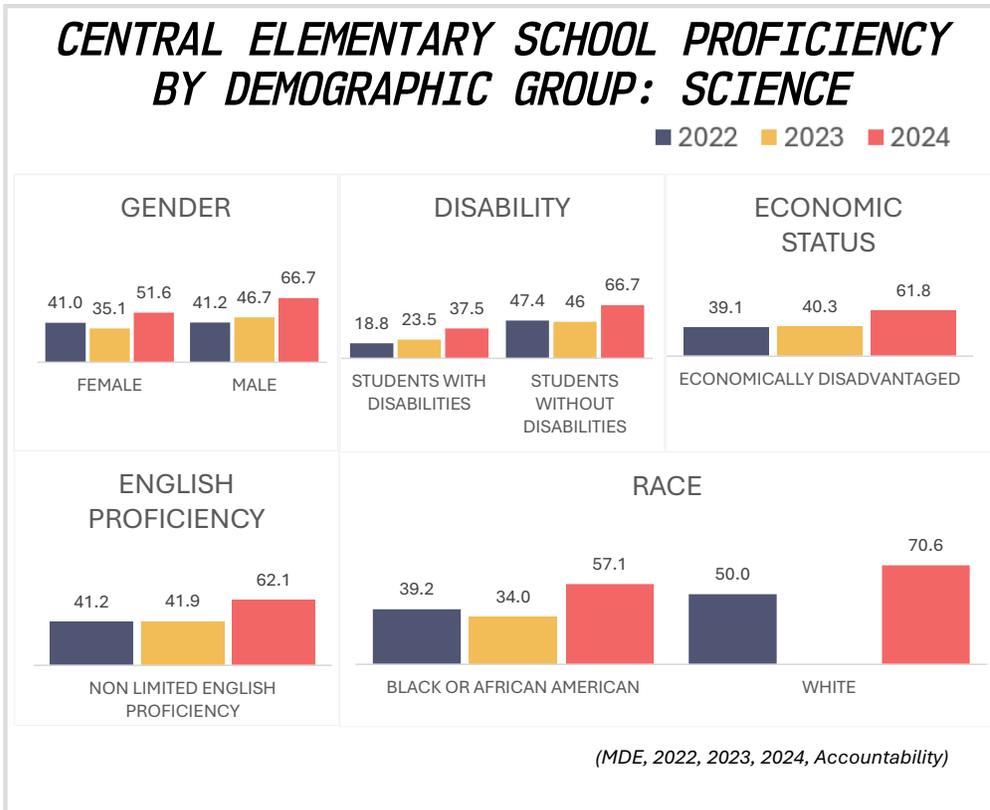
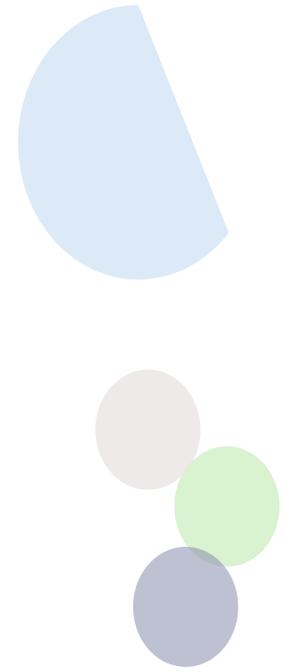


Figure 137: Central Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

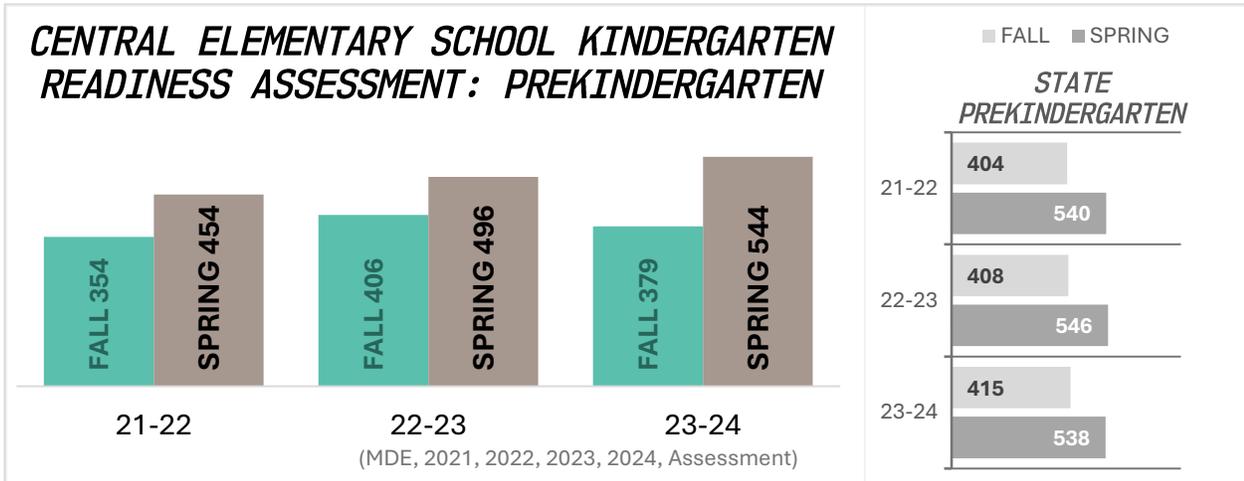


Figure 138: Central Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Prekindergarten

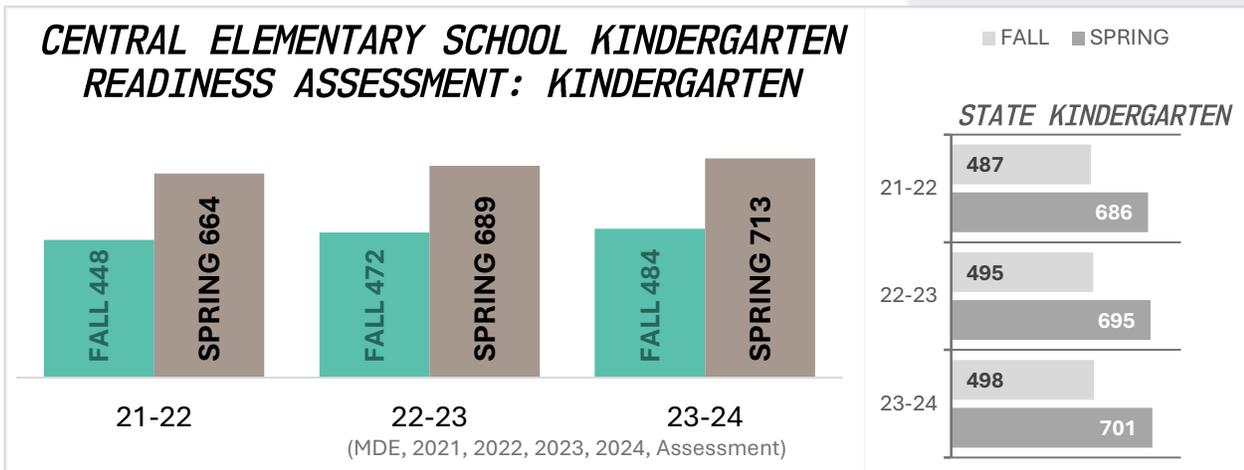


Figure 139: Central Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Kindergarten

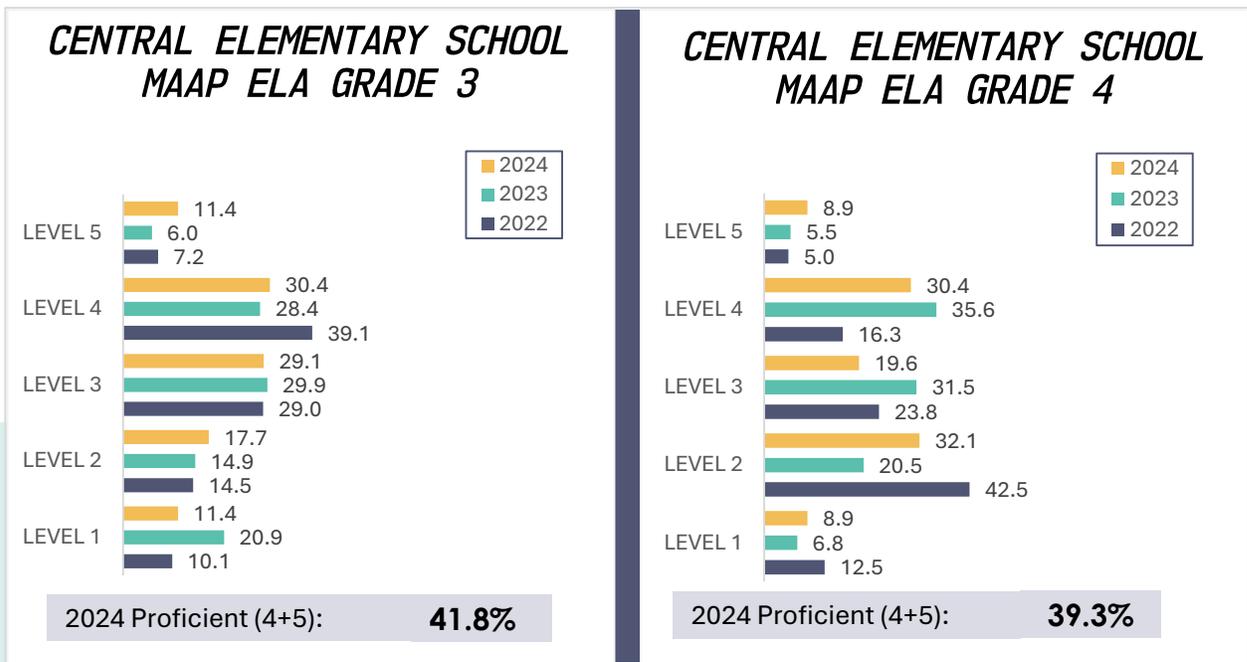


Figure 141: Central Elementary School MAAP ELA Grades 3 and 4

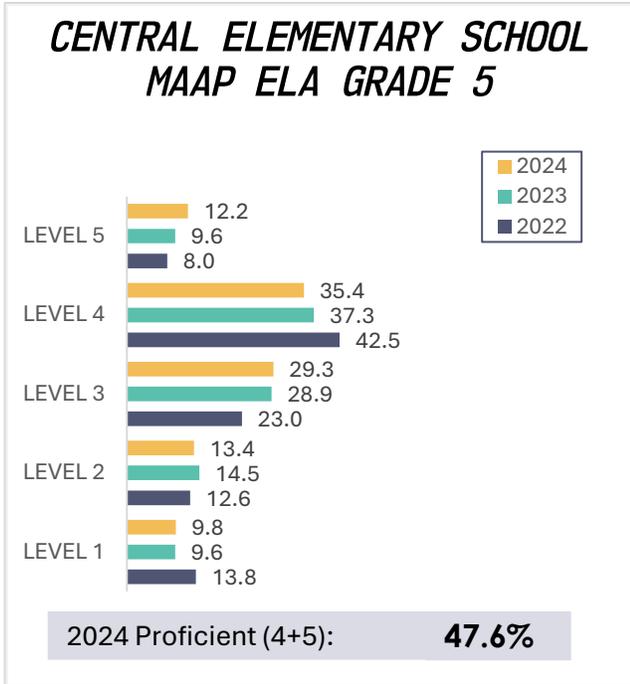


Figure 142: Central Elementary School MAAP ELA Grade 5

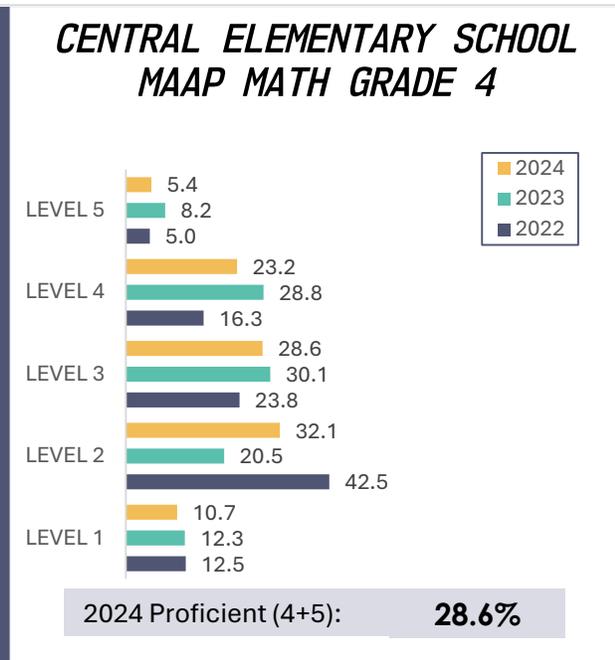
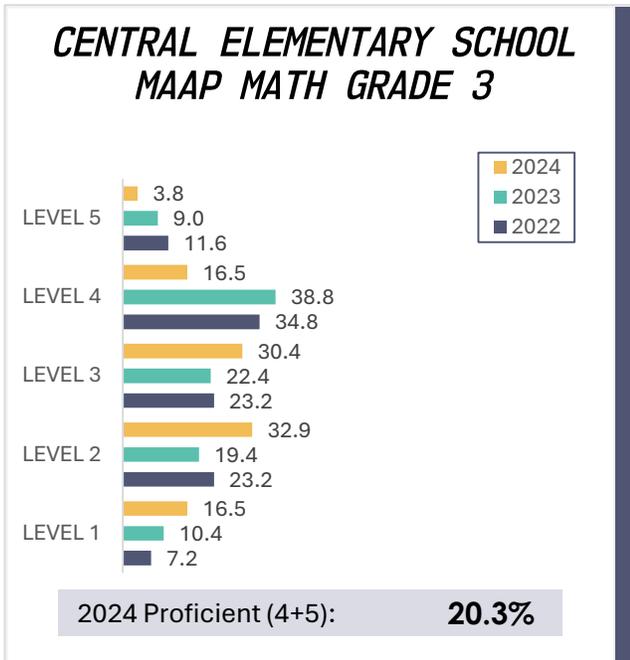


Figure 143: Central Elementary School MAAP Math Grades 3 and 4

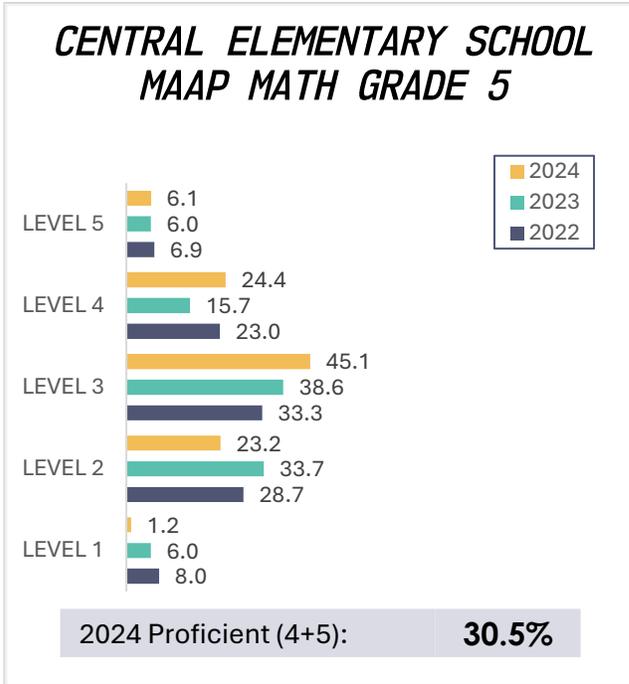


Figure 144: Central Elementary School MAAP Math Grade 5

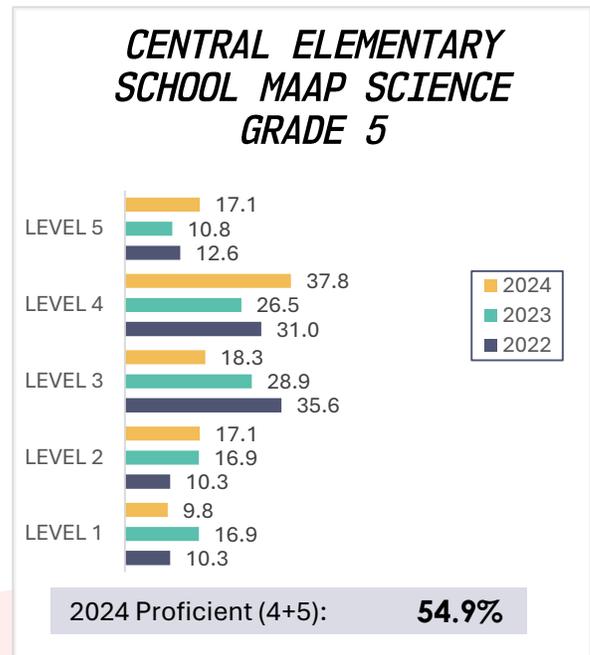
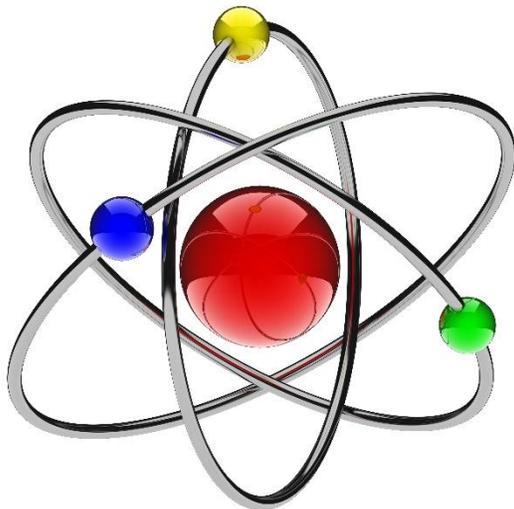


Figure 145: Central Elementary School MAAP Science Grade 5

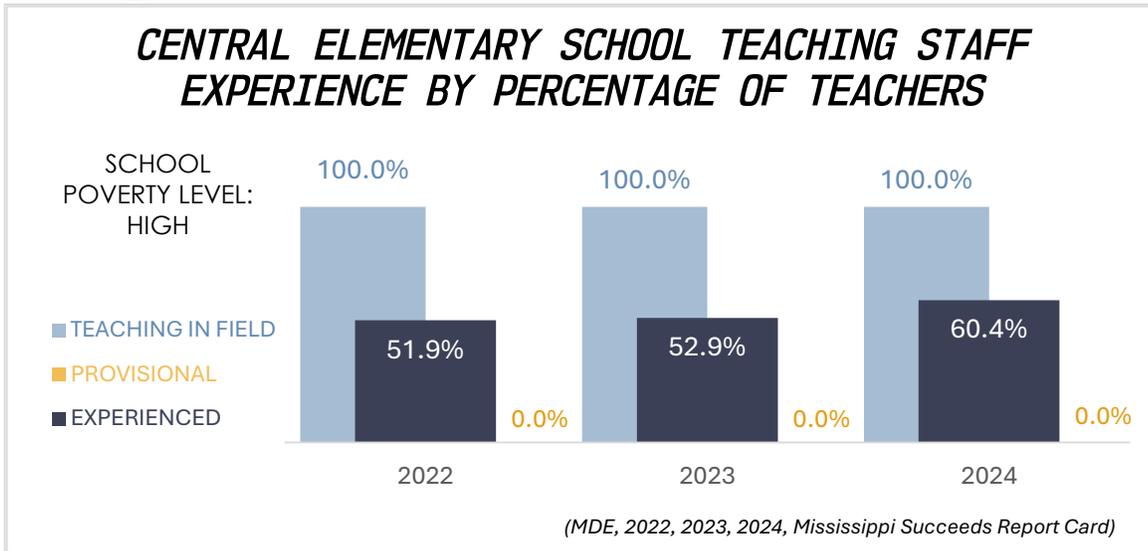


Figure 146: Central Elementary School Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers

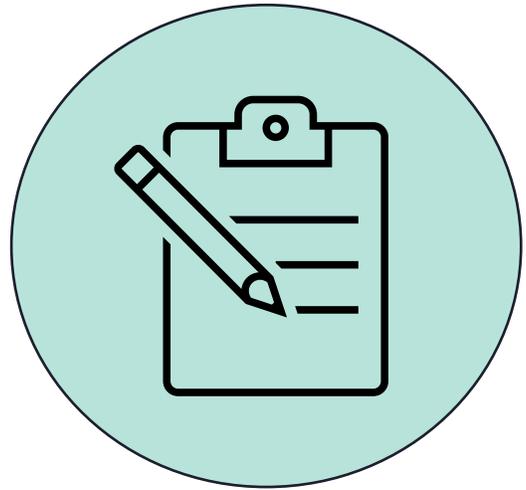

Figure 150: Gulfport Central Middle School Average Daily Attendance

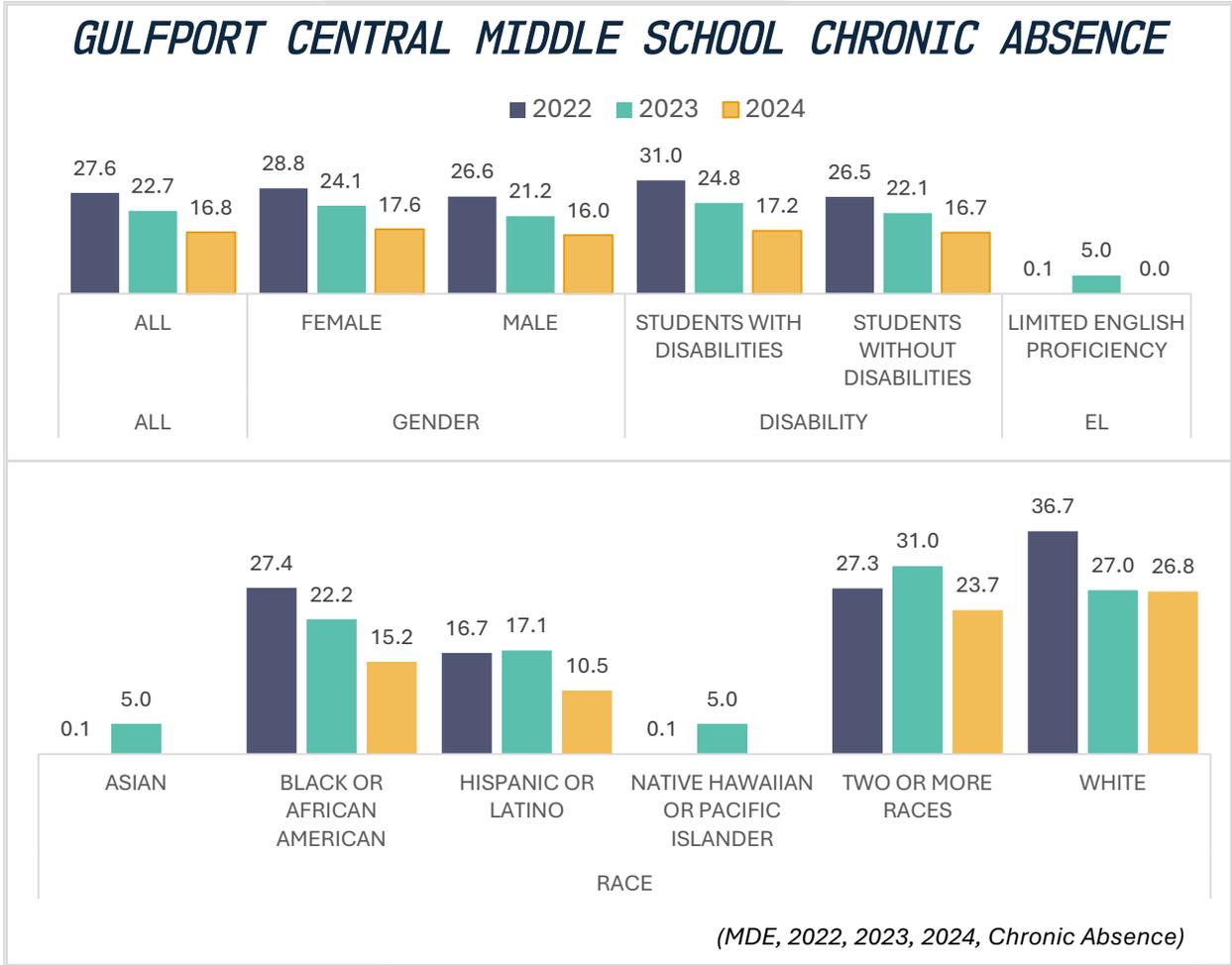


Figure 151: Gulfport Central Middle School Chronic Absence

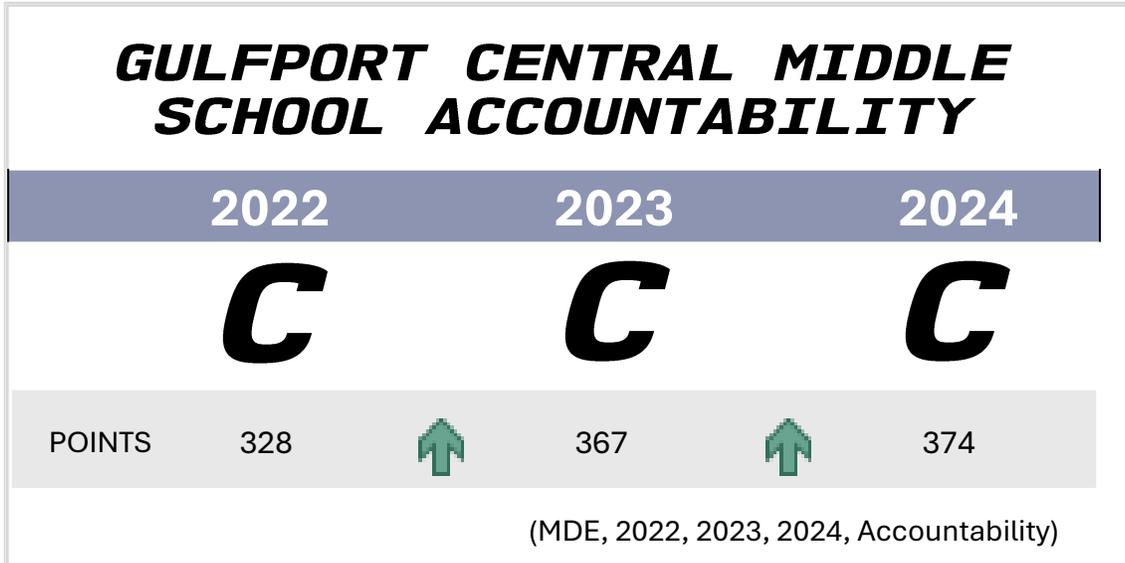


Figure 152: Gulfport Central Middle School Accountability

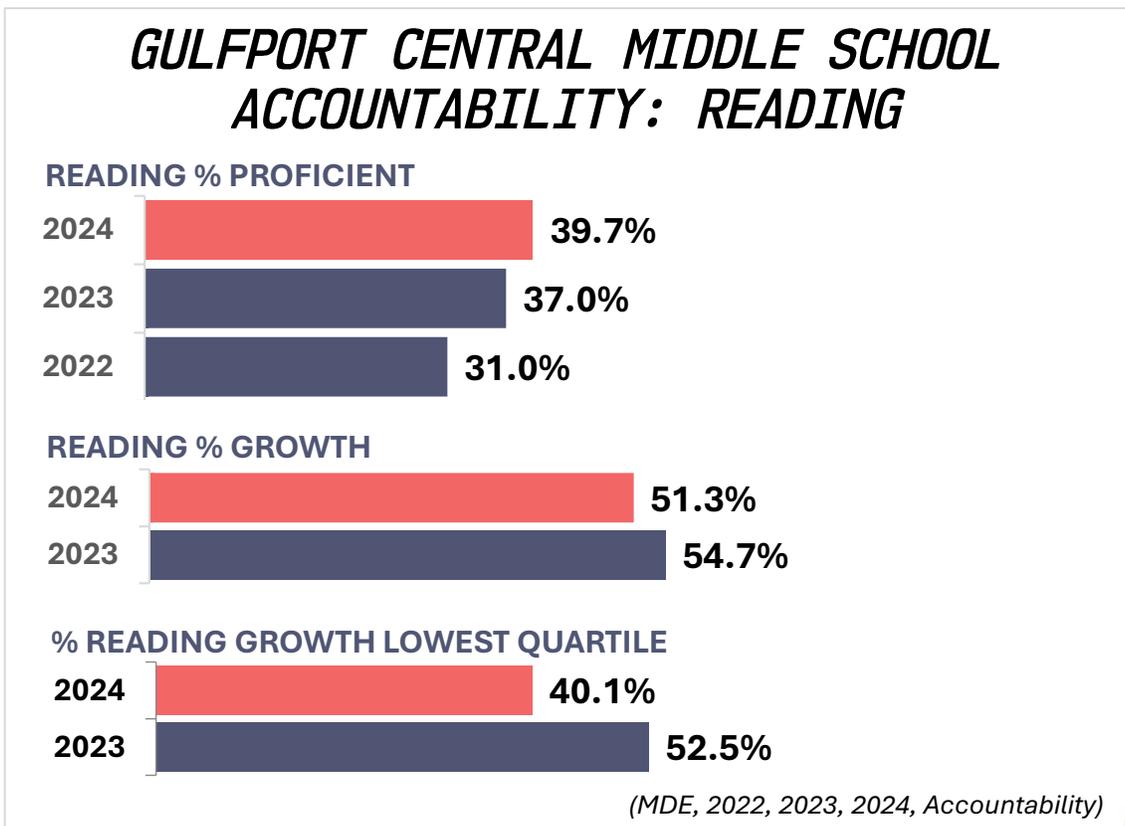
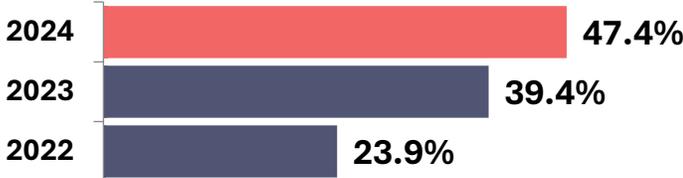


Figure 153: Gulfport Central Middle School Accountability: Reading

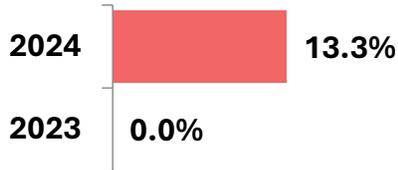

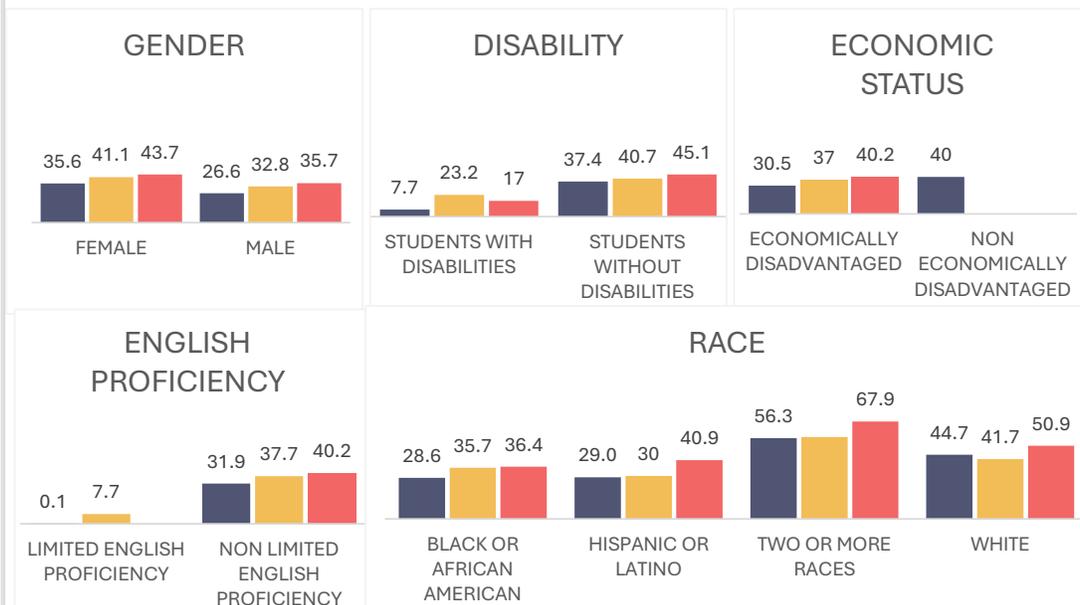

Figure 157: Gulfport Central Middle School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

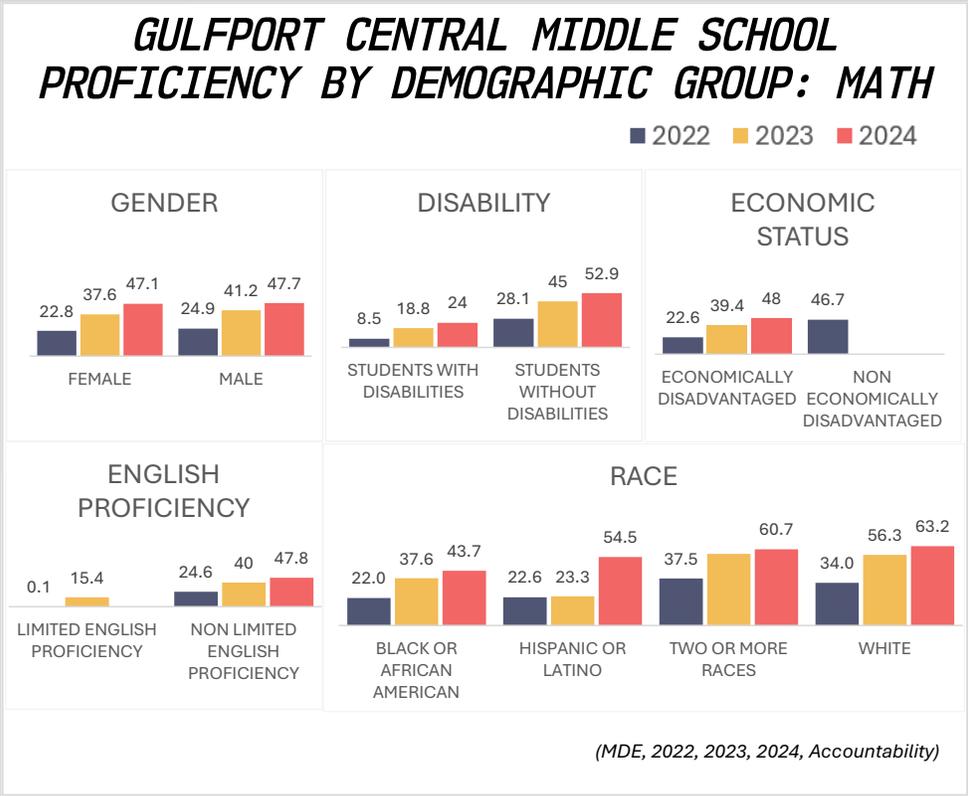


Figure 158: Gulfport Central Middle School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

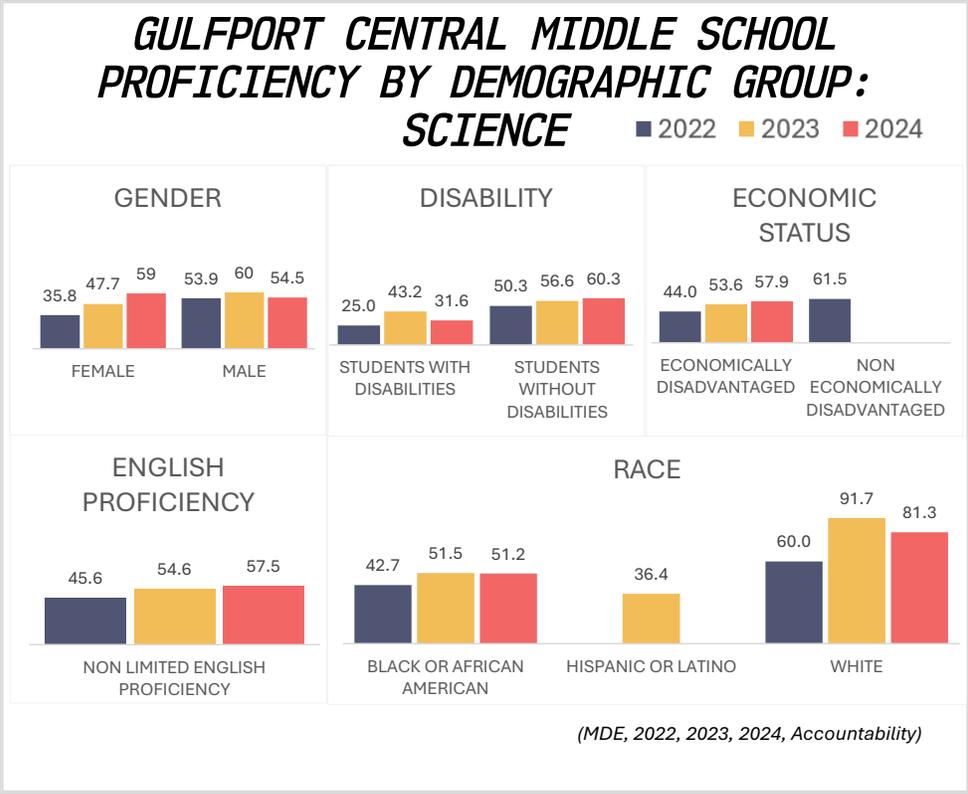


Figure 159: Gulfport Central Middle School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

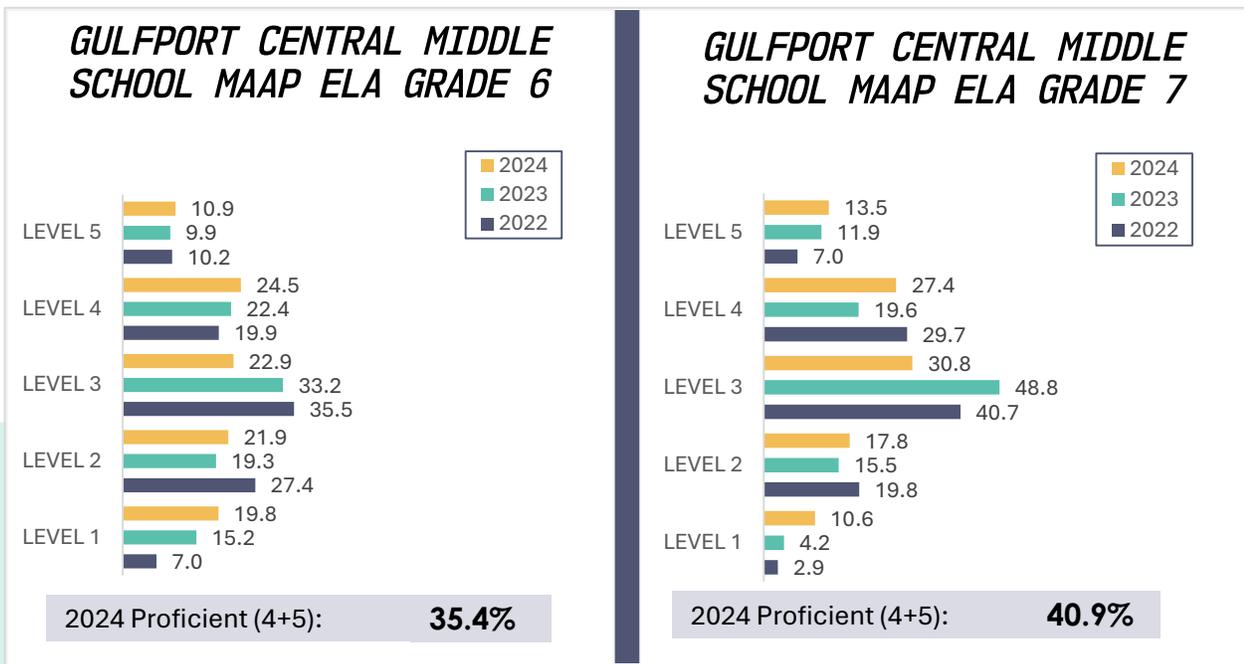


Figure 160: Gulfport Central Middle School MAAP ELA Grades 6 and 7



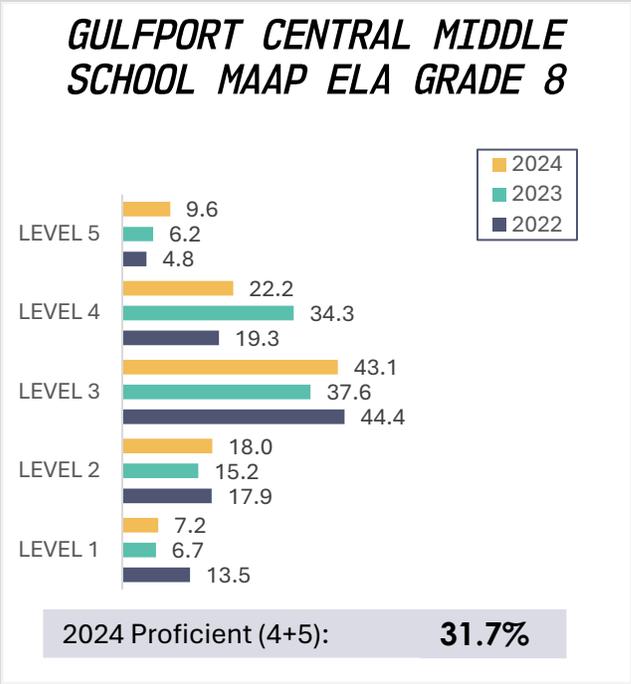


Figure 161: Gulfport Central Middle School MAAP ELA Grade 8

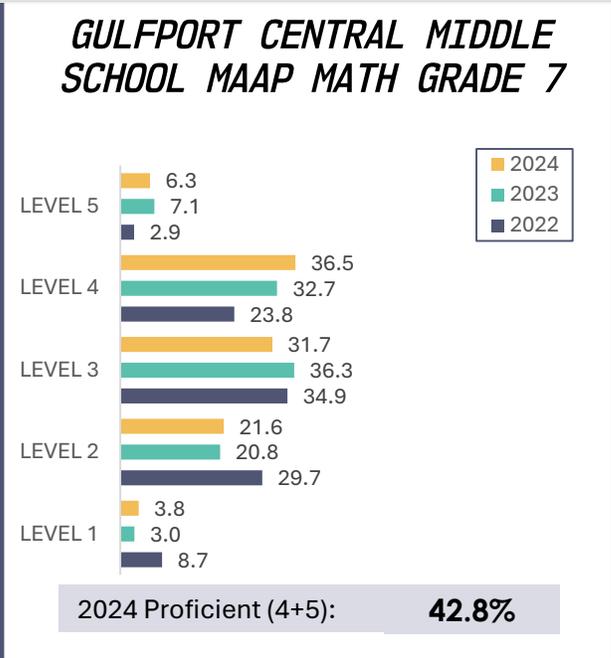
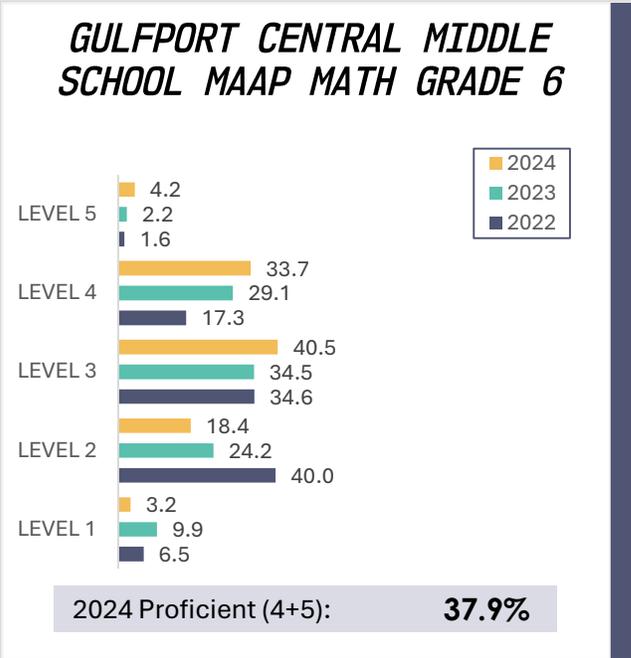


Figure 162: Gulfport Central Middle School MAAP Math Grades 6 and 7

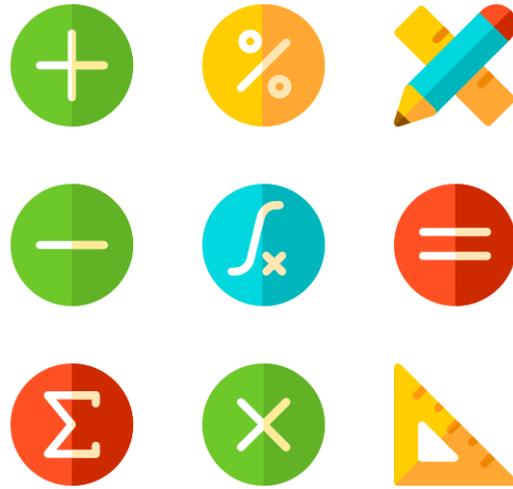
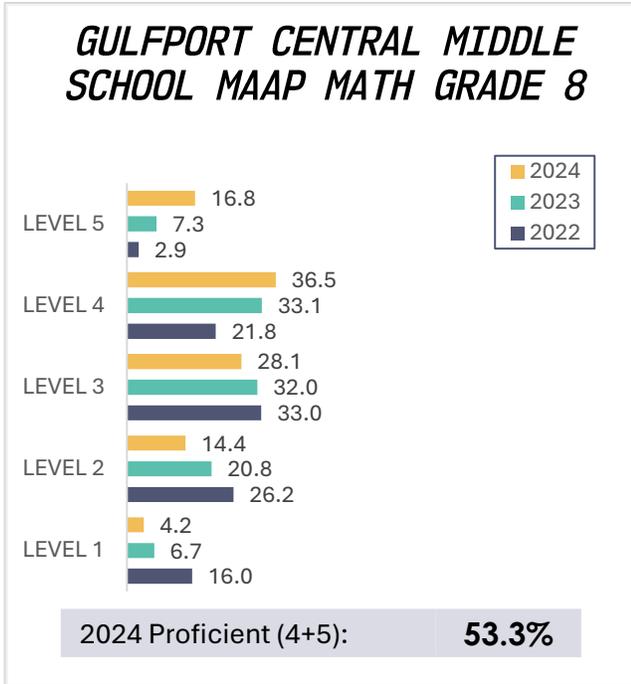


Figure 163: Gulfport Central Middle School MAAP Math Grade 8

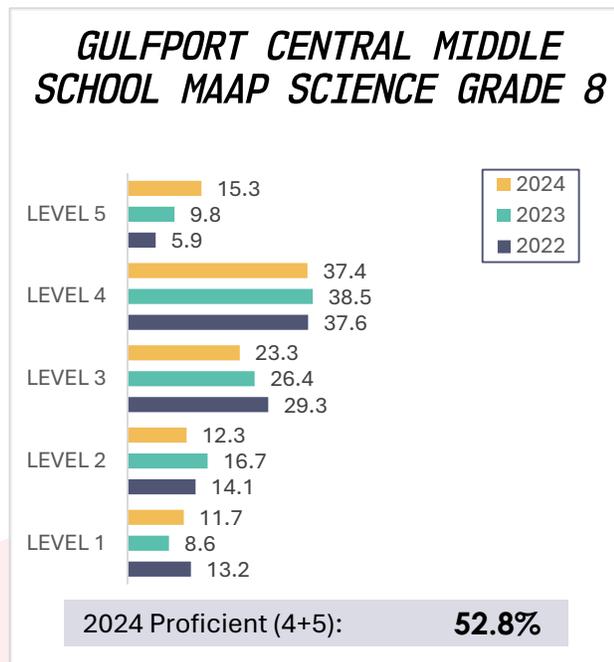
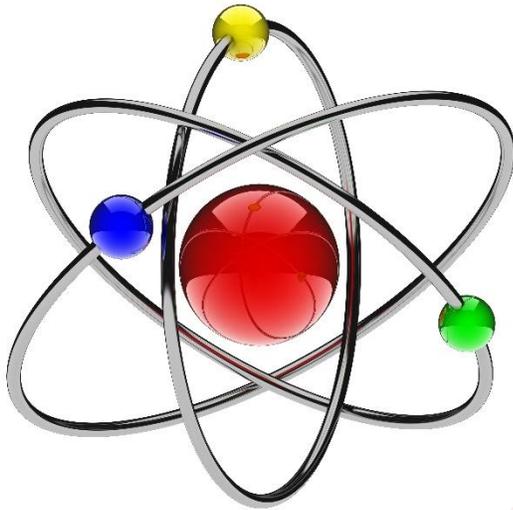


Figure 164: Gulfport Central Middle School MAAP Science Grade 8

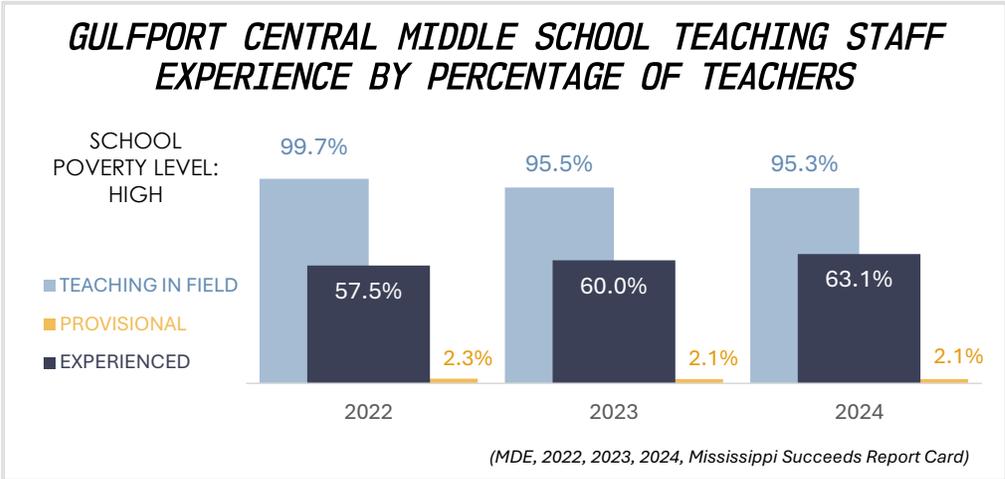


Figure 165: Gulfport Central Middle School Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers

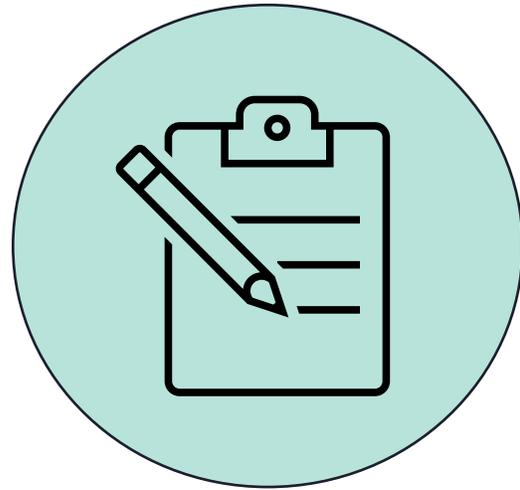

GENERAL OPINION

In response to open-ended questions, stakeholders were invited to comment about what the school or district does well and what improvements the school or district should make.

Faculty/staff members from Gulfport Central Middle School believe that the school ensures student engagement, provides for adequate planning time for teachers, and maintains high morale. One responder stated, “The support and love shown here is unmatched. I love how the staff goes out of their way to support the students and give them a sense of normalcy, especially when a lot of their home lives may not be stable.” Responders see the need for improvements in cleaning the facilities and buildings, changes to discipline practices, and more security measures. Another responder said, “Continue working to increase parental involvement. I believe we are on the right track.”

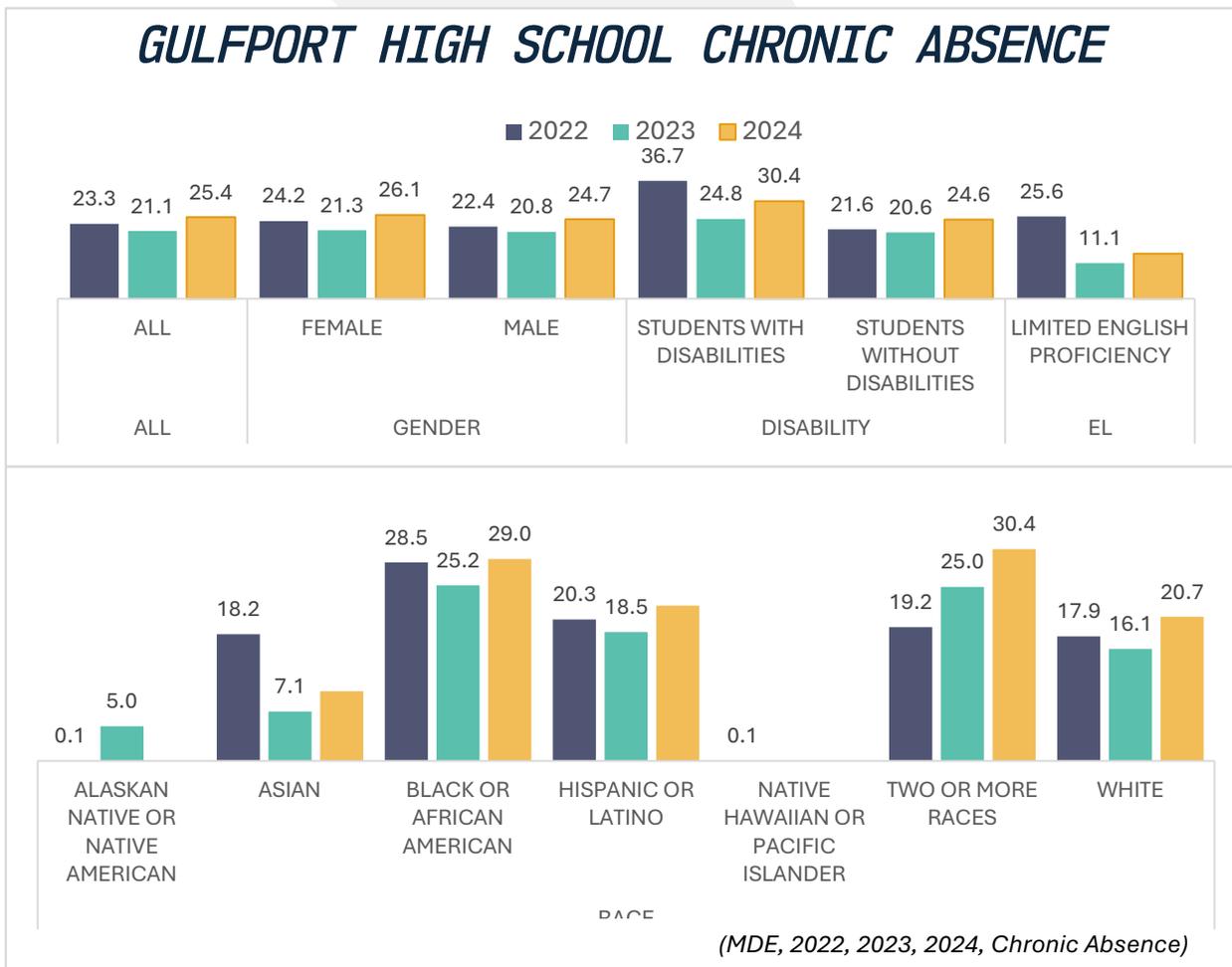

Figure 172: Gulfport High School Accountability: Reading

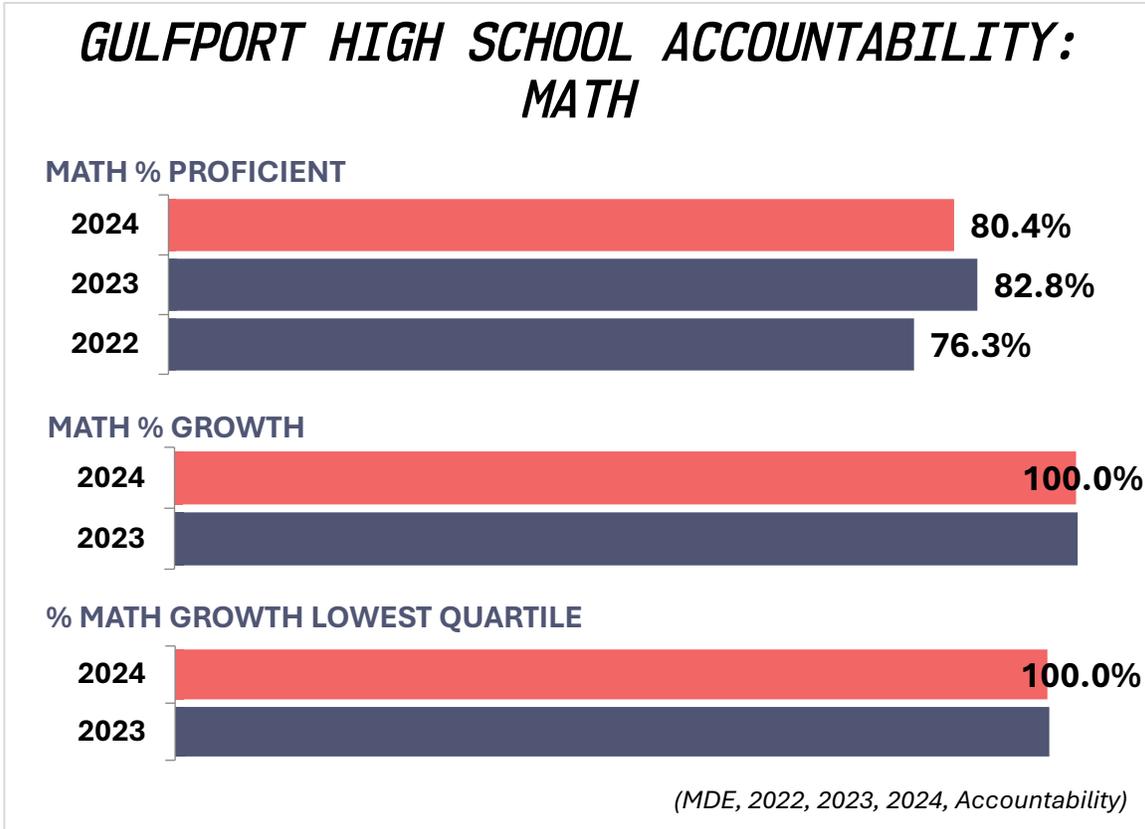


Figure 173: Gulfport High School Accountability: Math

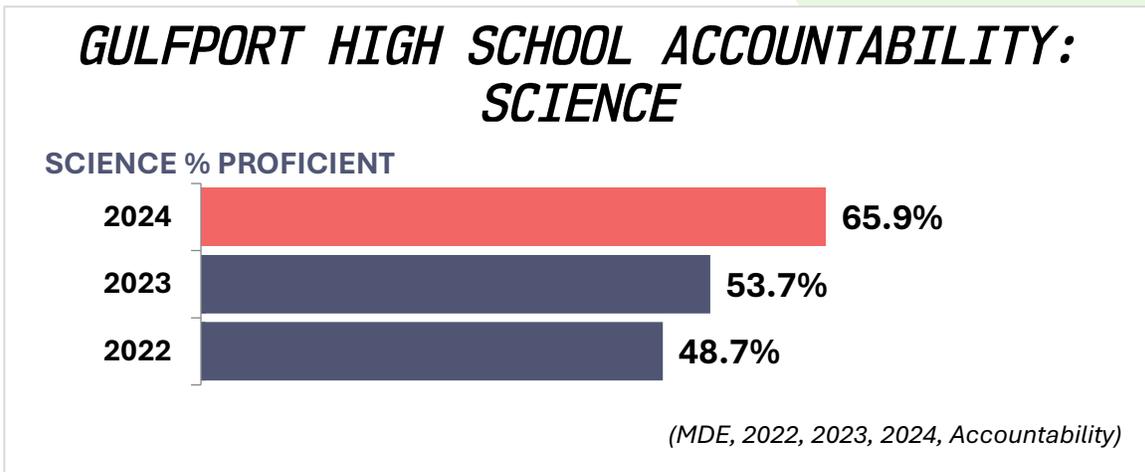


Figure 174: Gulfport High School Accountability: Science



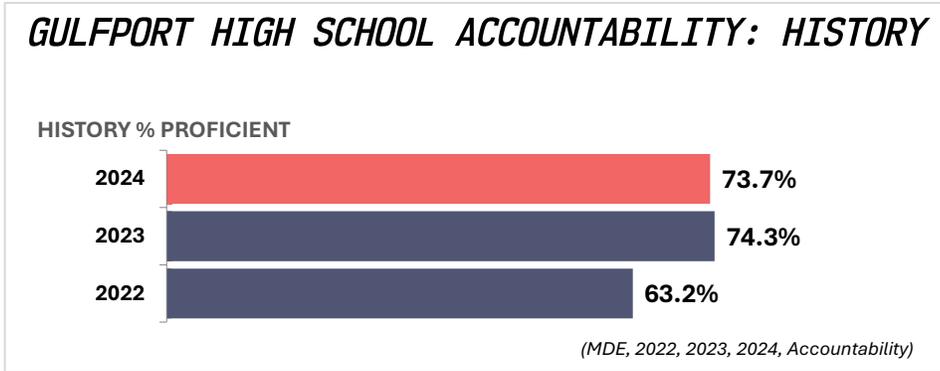


Figure 175: Gulfport High School Accountability: History

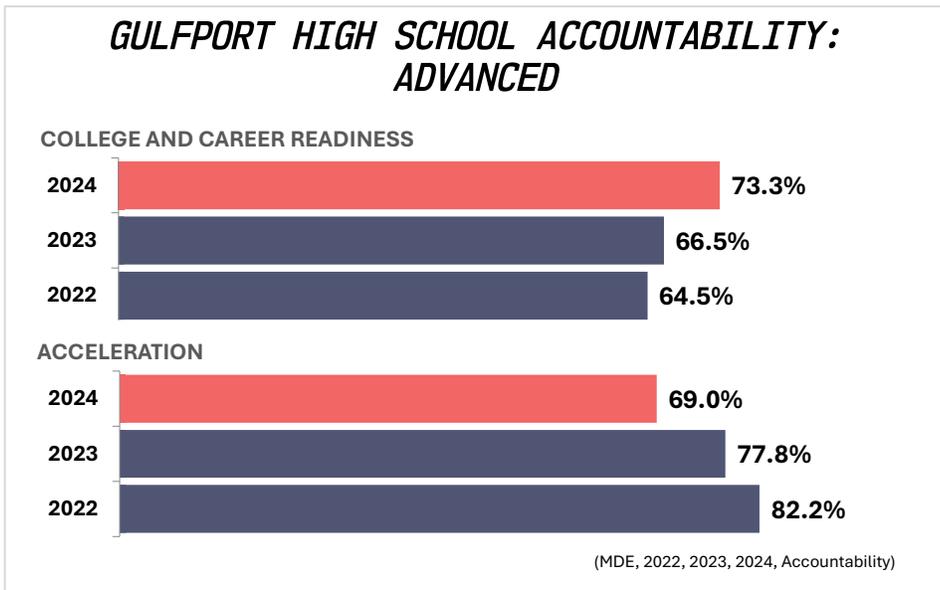


Figure 176: Gulfport High School Accountability: Advanced

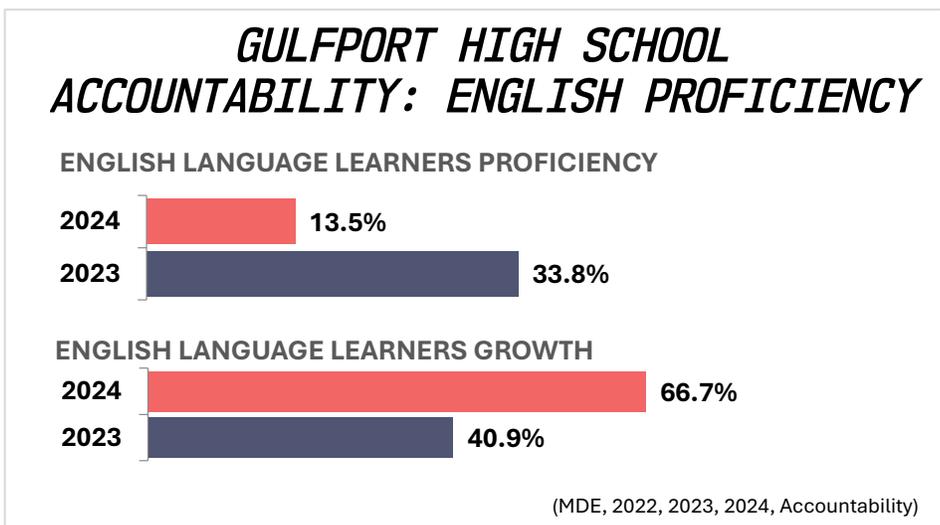


Figure 177: Gulfport High School Accountability: English Proficiency

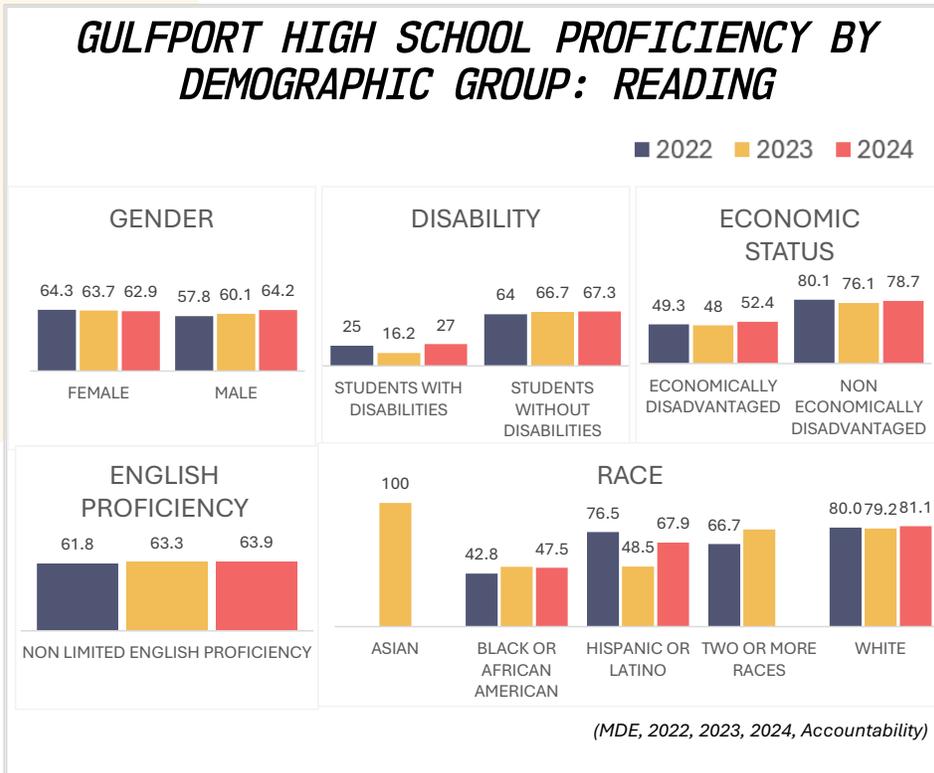


Figure 178: Gulfport High School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

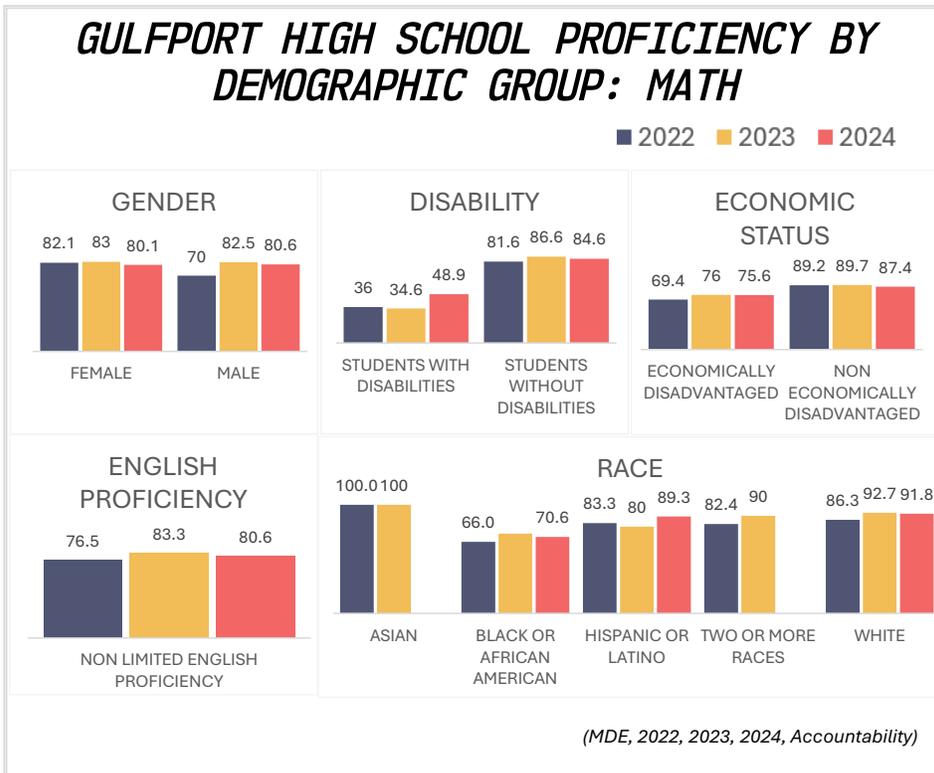


Figure 179: Gulfport High School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

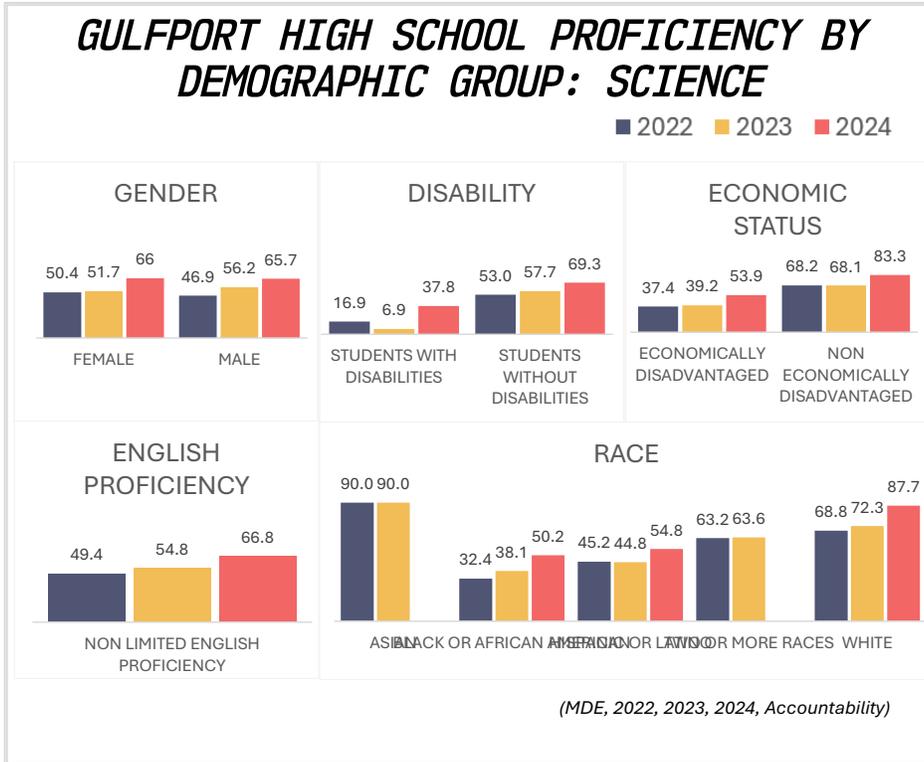


Figure 180: Gulfport High School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

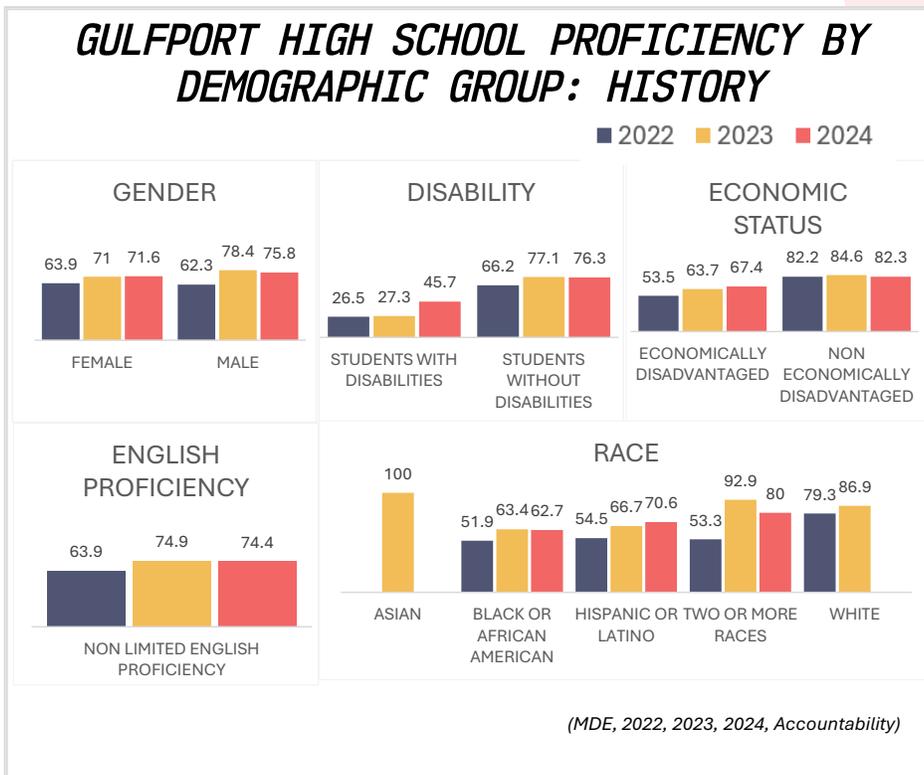


Figure 181: Gulfport High School Proficiency by Demographic Group: History

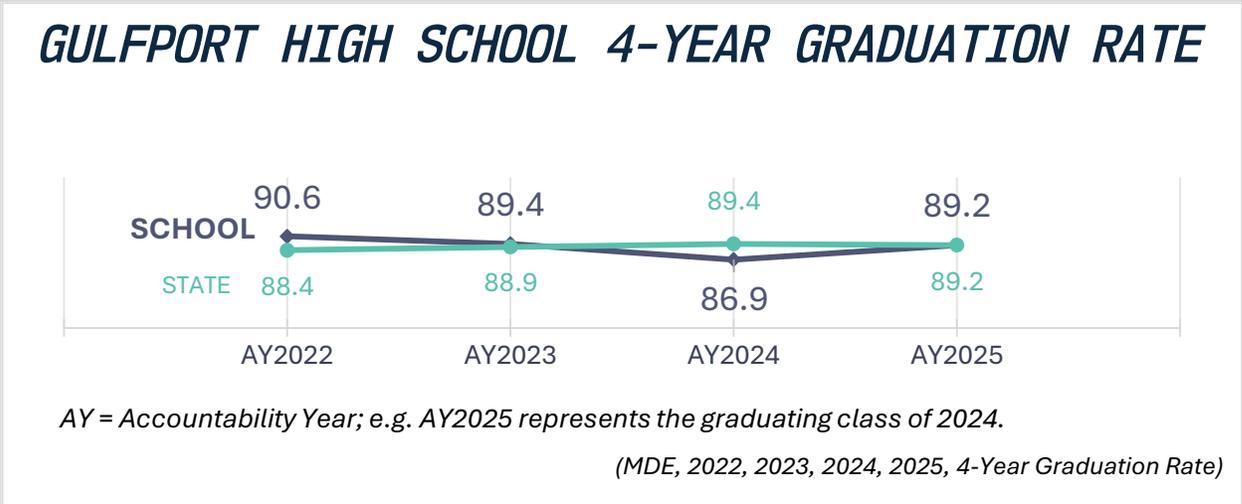


Figure 182: Gulfport High School 4-Year Graduation Rate

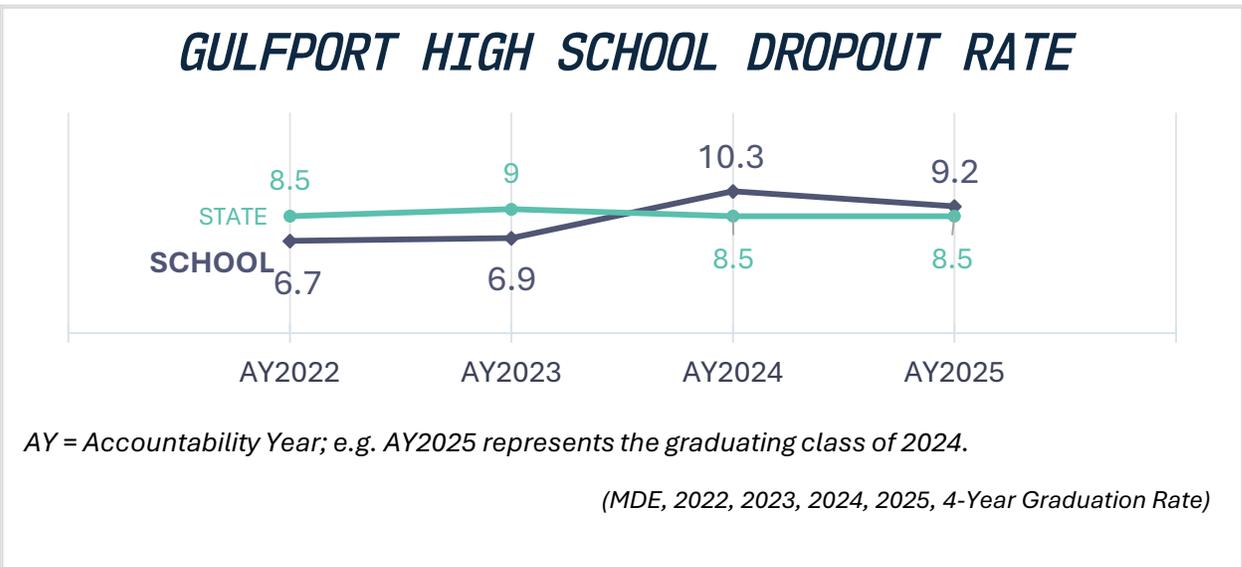
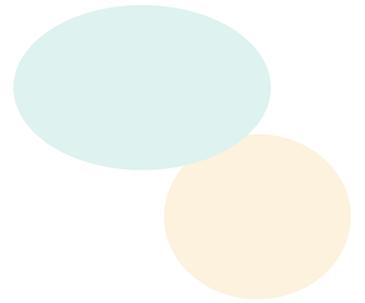


Figure 183: Gulfport High School Dropout Rate

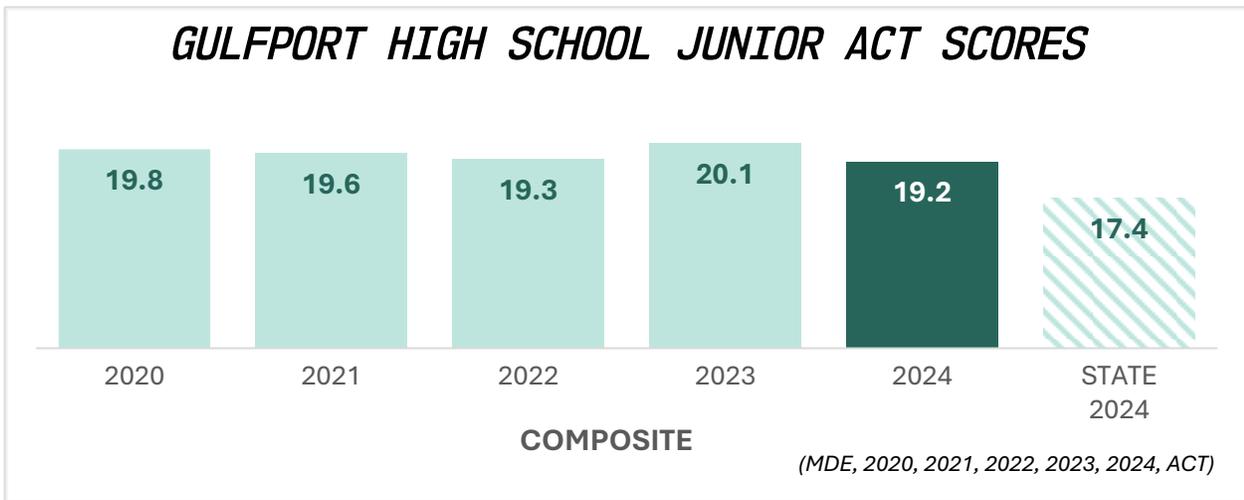


Figure 184: Gulfport High School Junior ACT: Composite

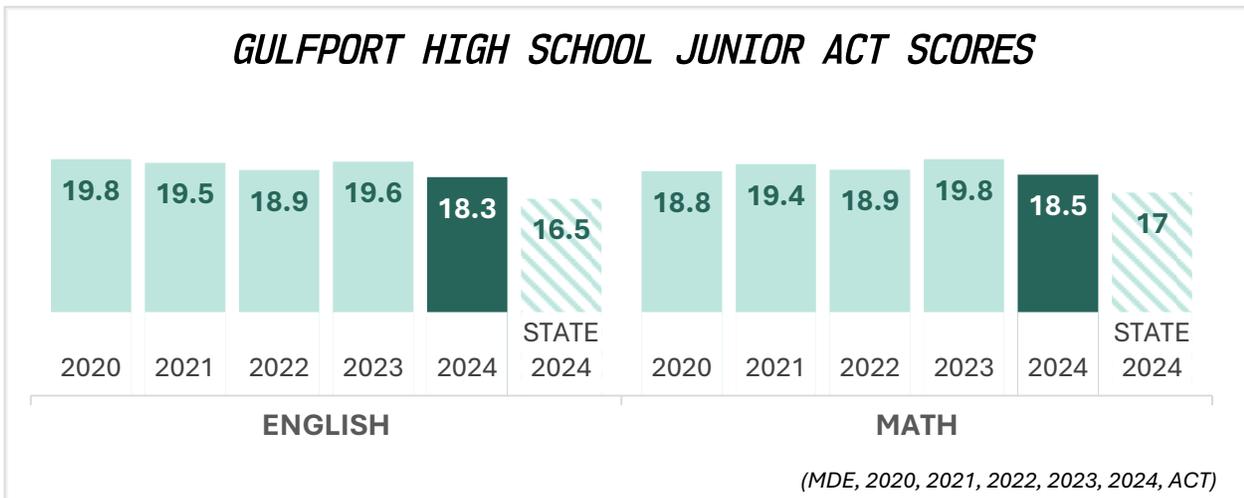
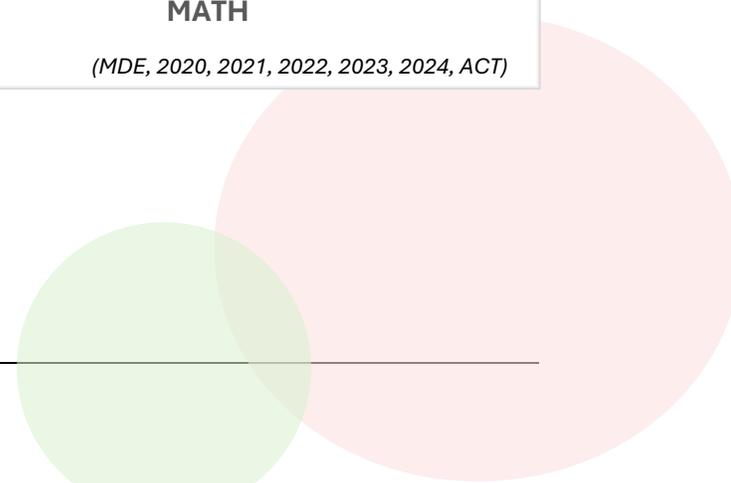


Figure 185: Gulfport High School Junior ACT: English and Math



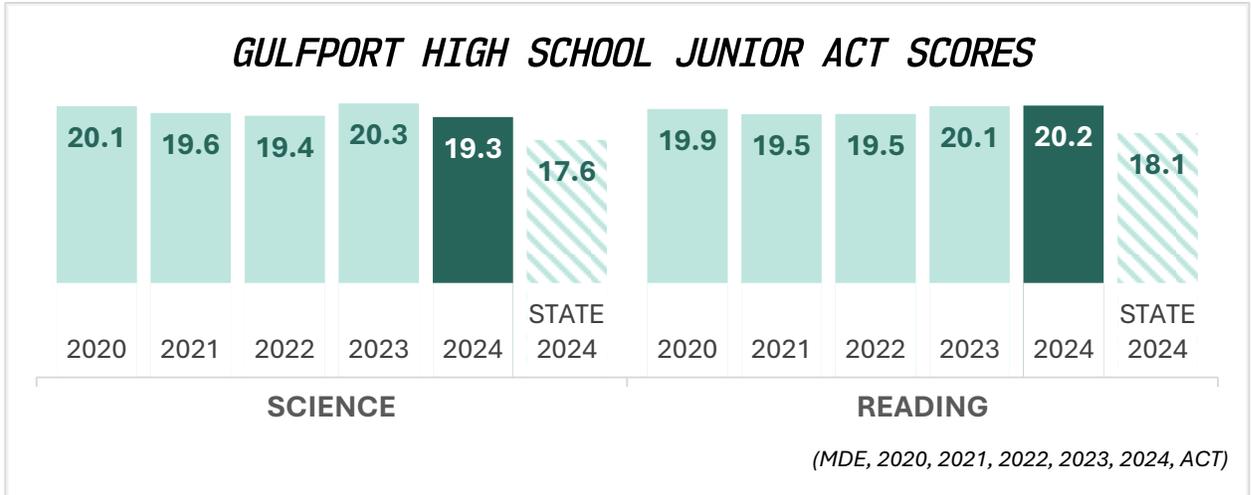


Figure 186: Gulfport High School Junior ACT: Science and Reading

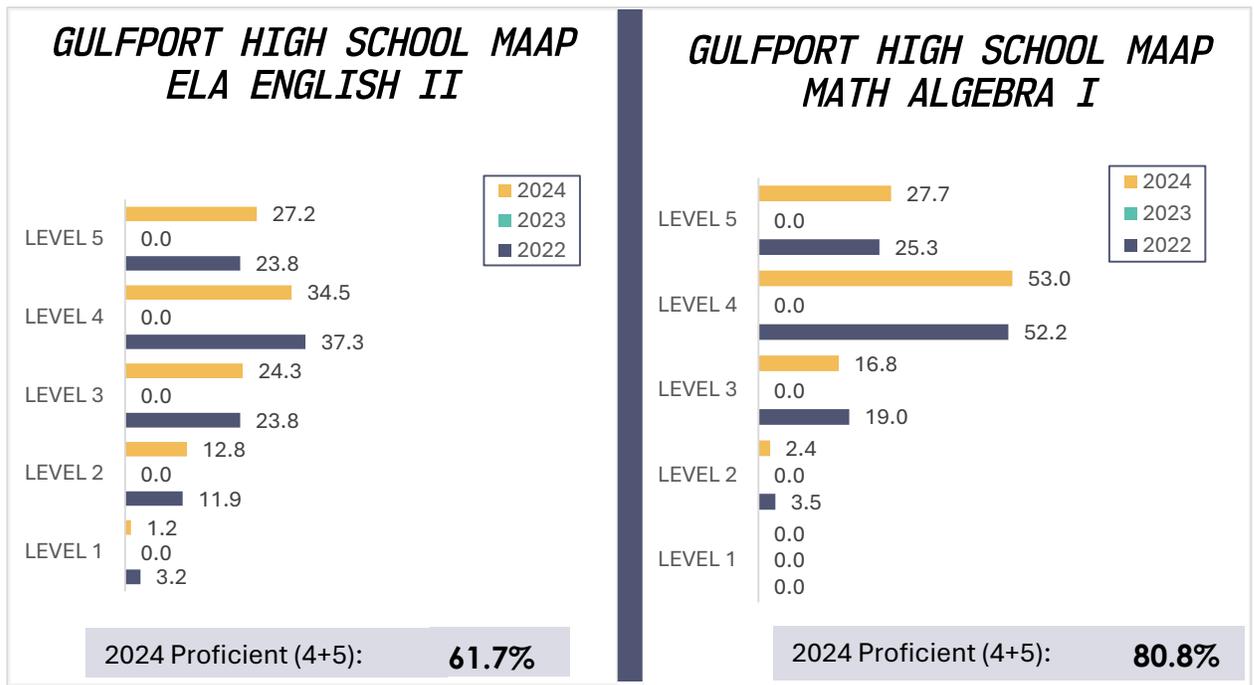


Figure 187: Gulfport High School MAAP English II and Algebra I

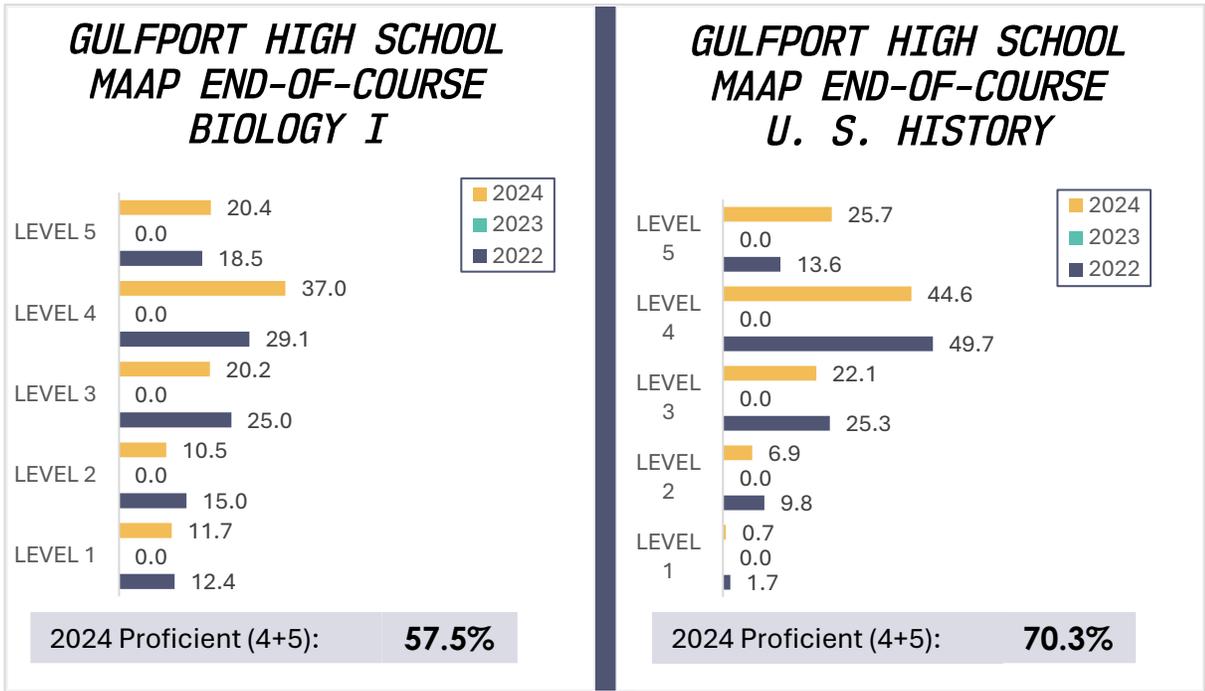


Figure 188: Gulfport High School MAAP Biology I and U. S. History

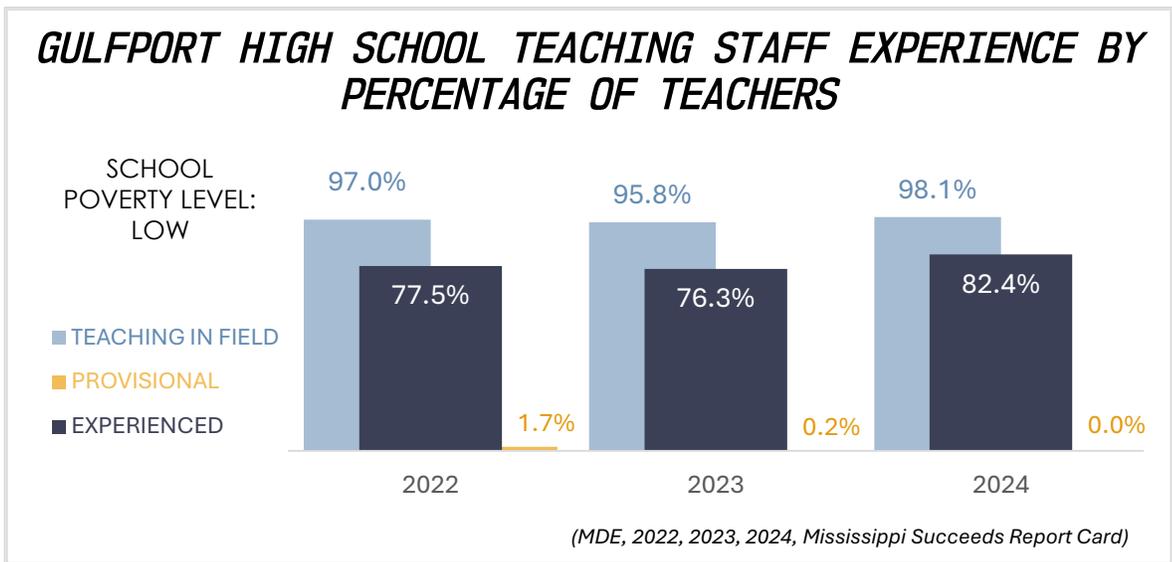


Figure 189: Gulfport High School Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers

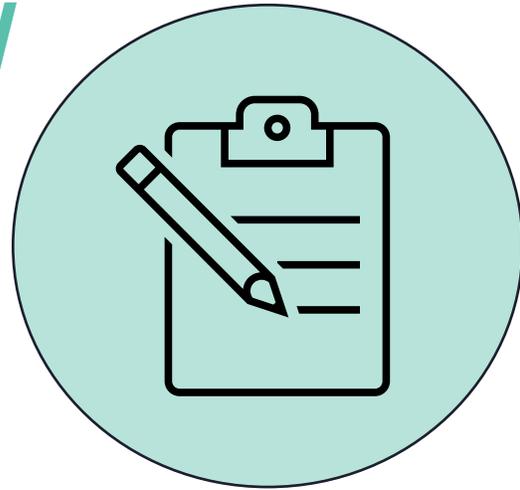

Figure 193: Pass Road Elementary School Average Daily Attendance

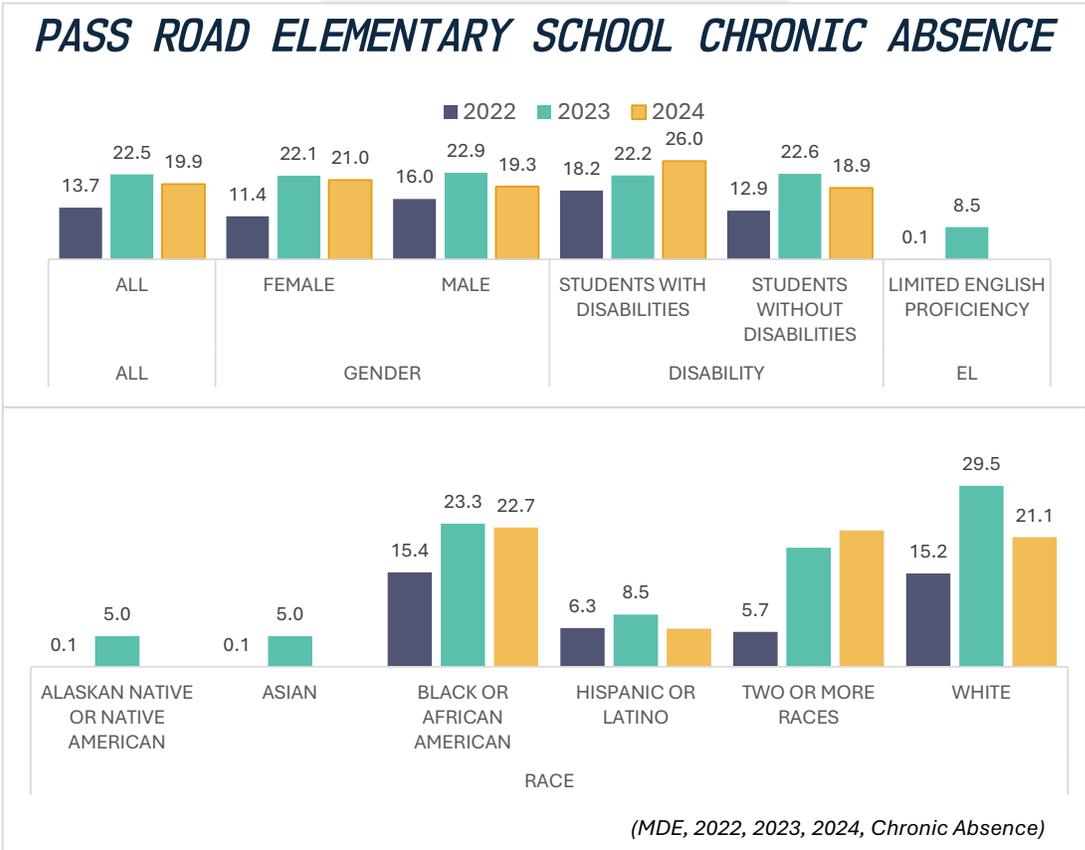


Figure 194: Pass Road Elementary School Chronic Absence

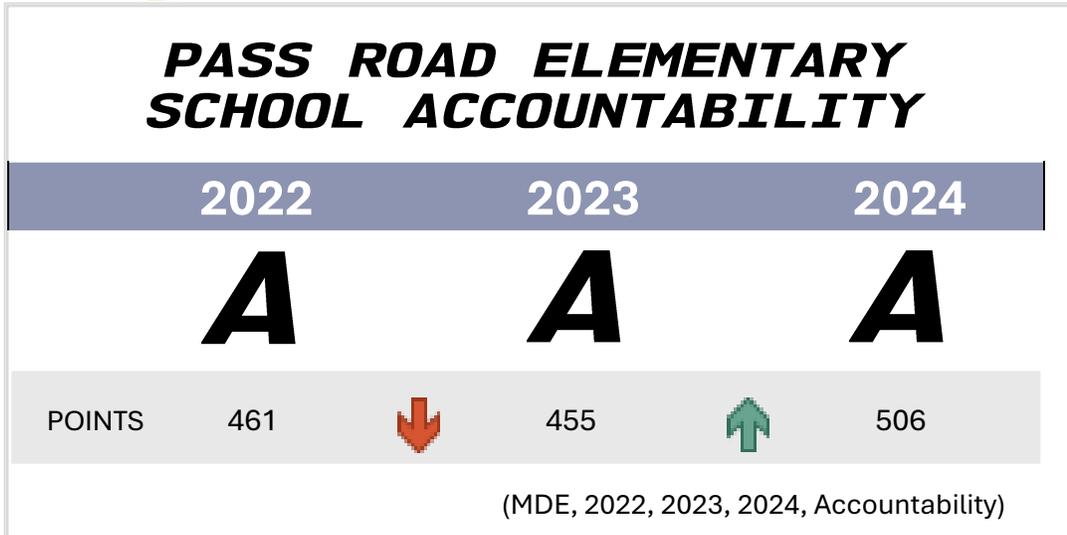


Figure 195: Pass Road Elementary School Accountability

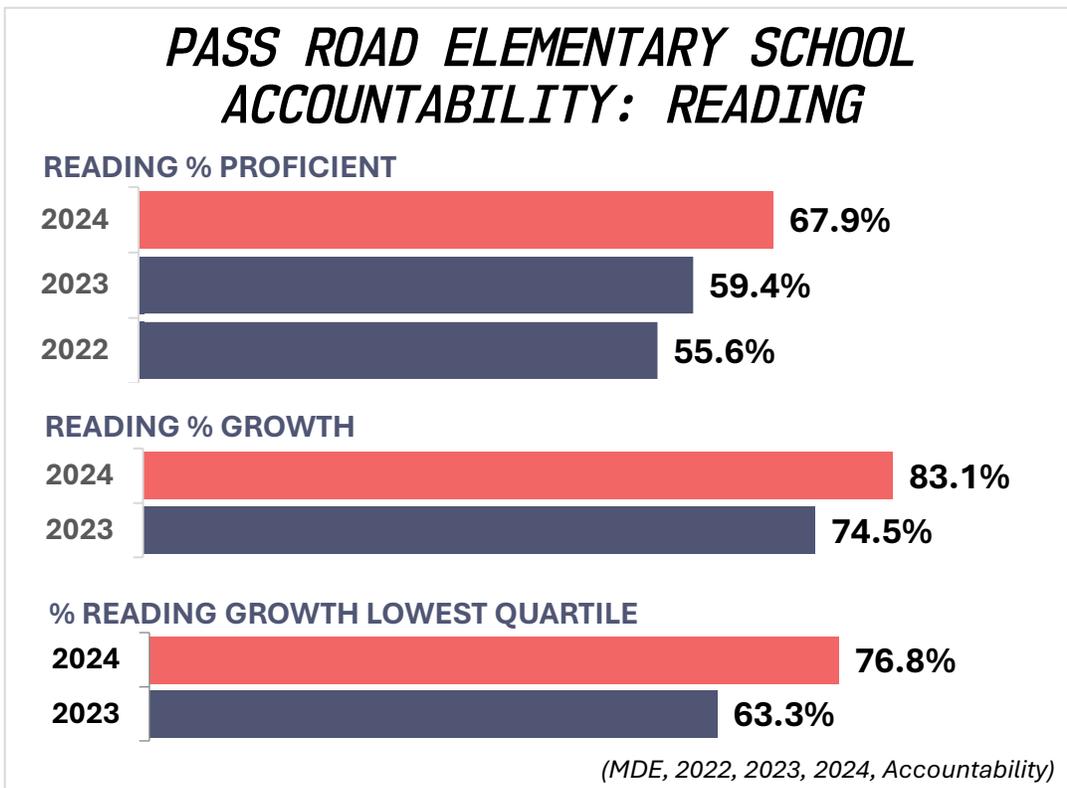


Figure 196: Pass Road Elementary School Accountability: Reading

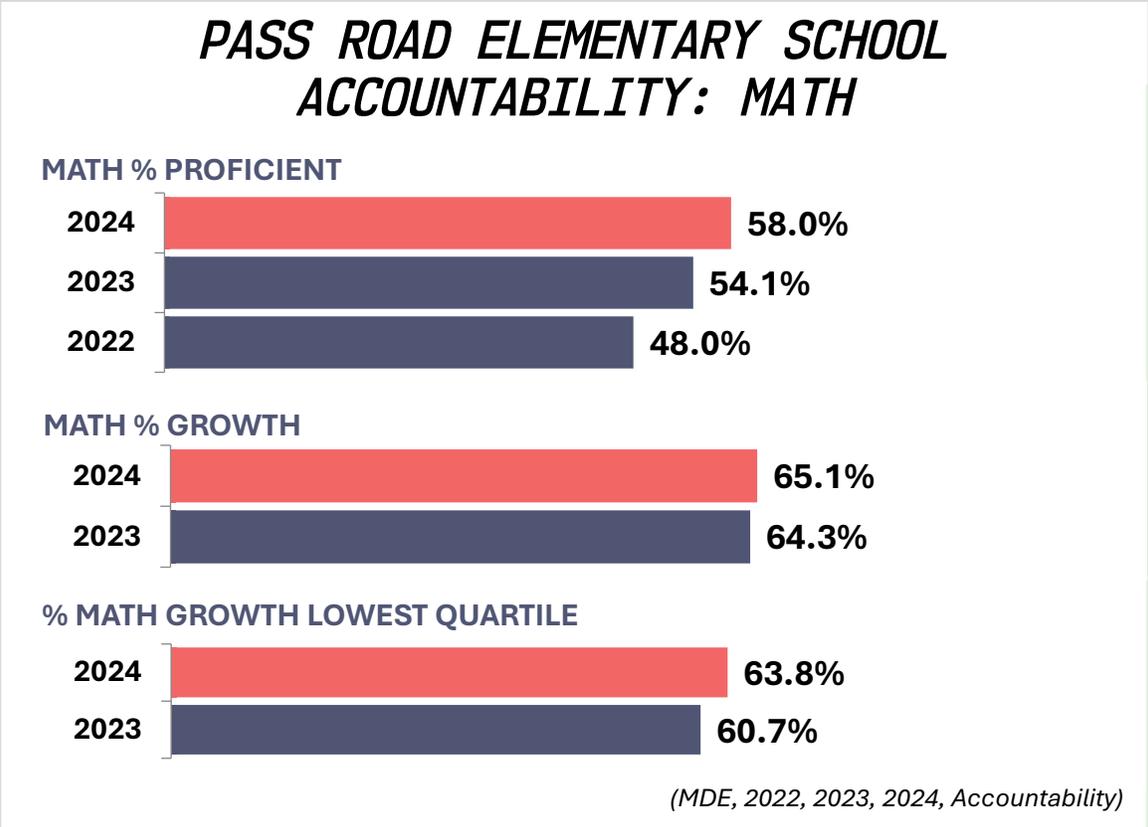


Figure 197: Pass Road Elementary School Accountability: Math

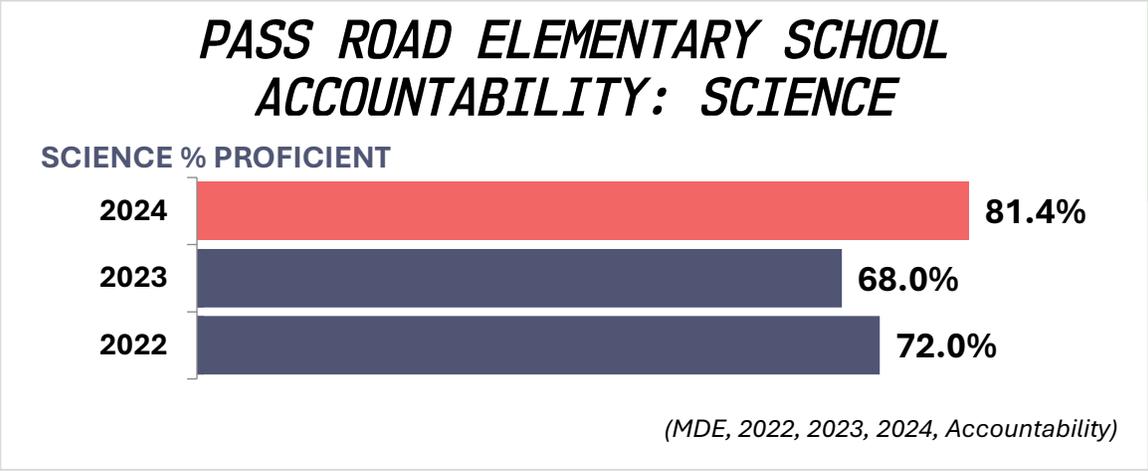


Figure 198: Pass Road Elementary School Accountability: Science

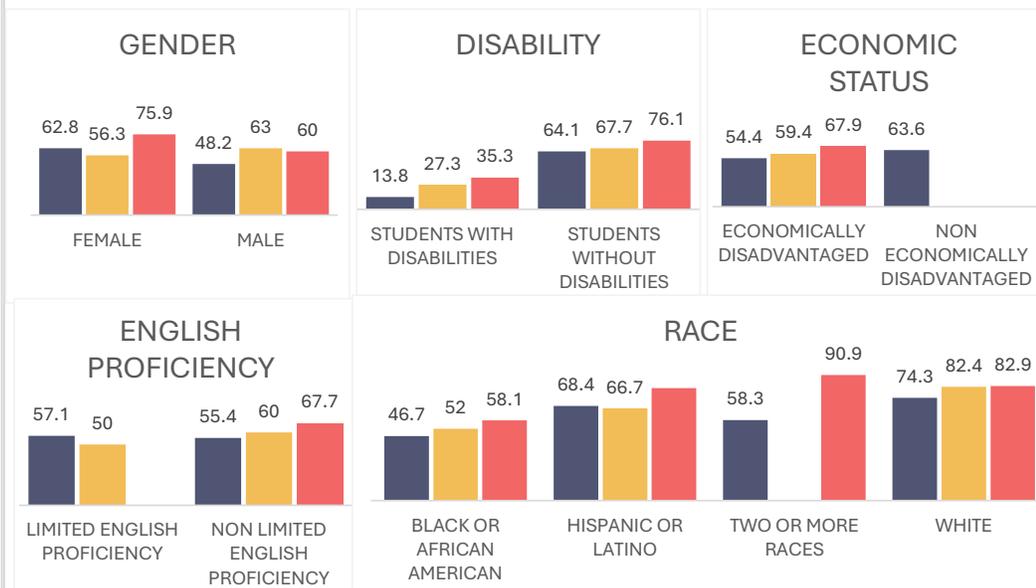

Figure 200: Pass Road Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

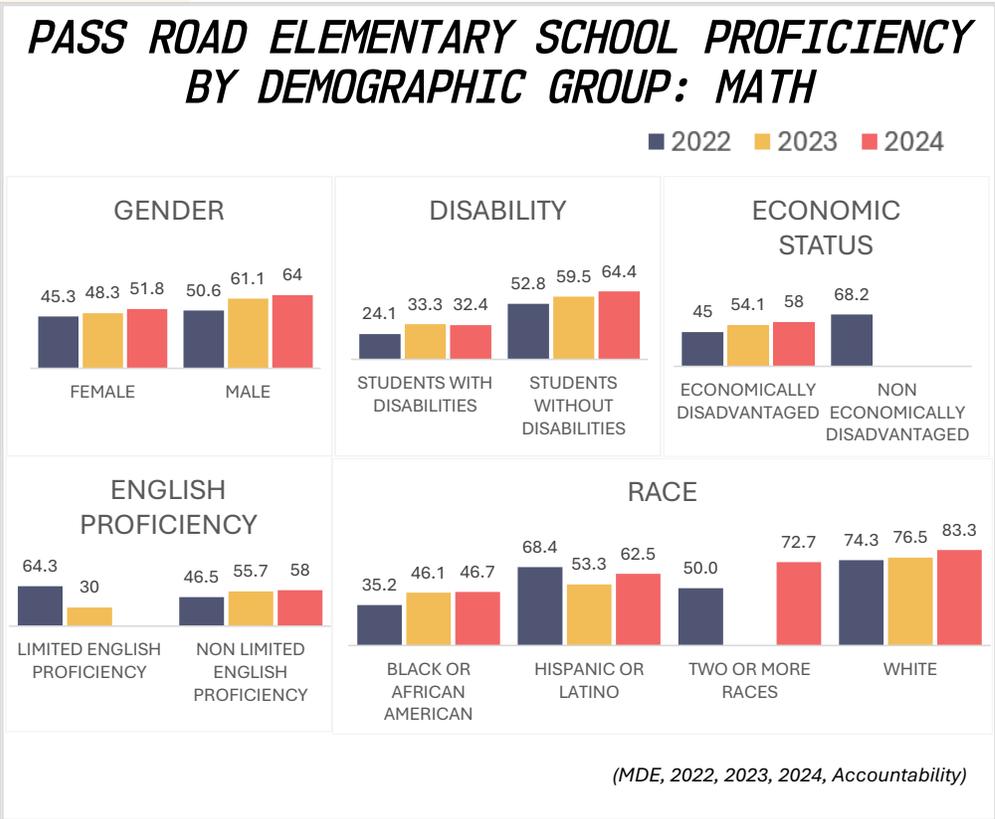


Figure 201: Pass Road Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

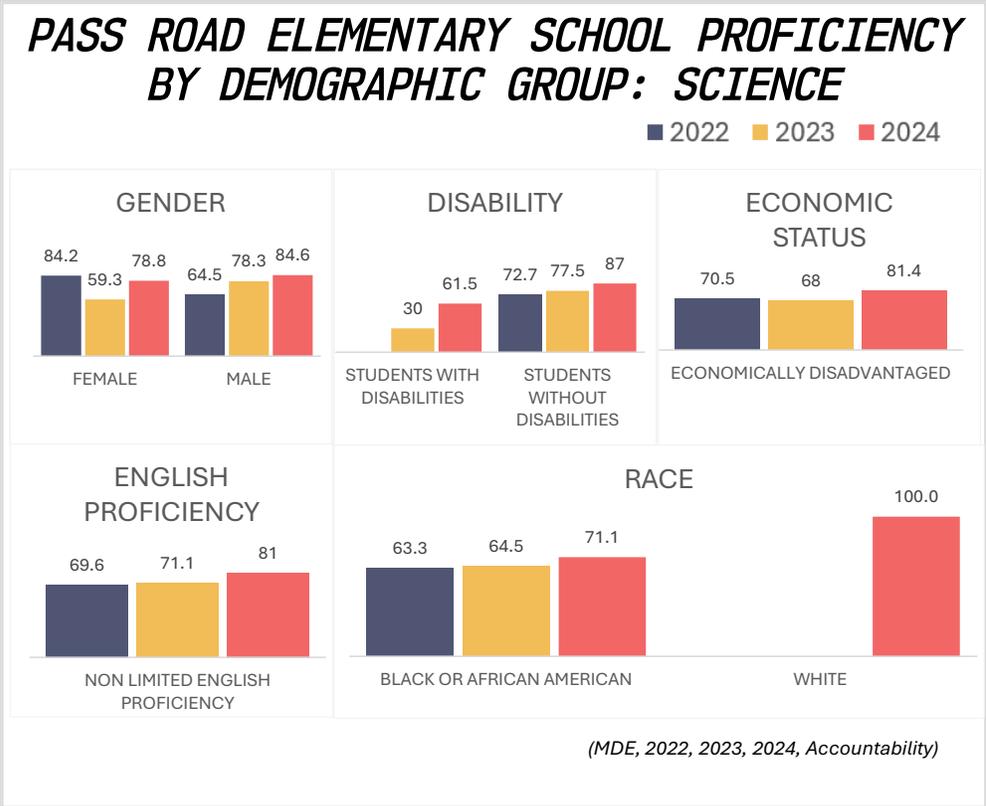


Figure 202: Pass Road Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

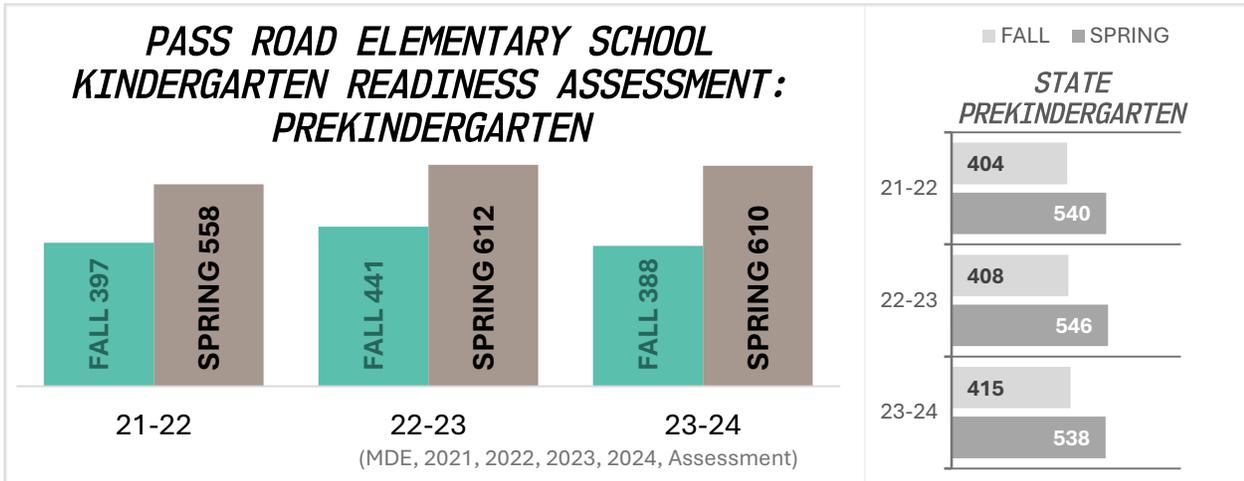


Figure 203: Pass Road Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Prekindergarten

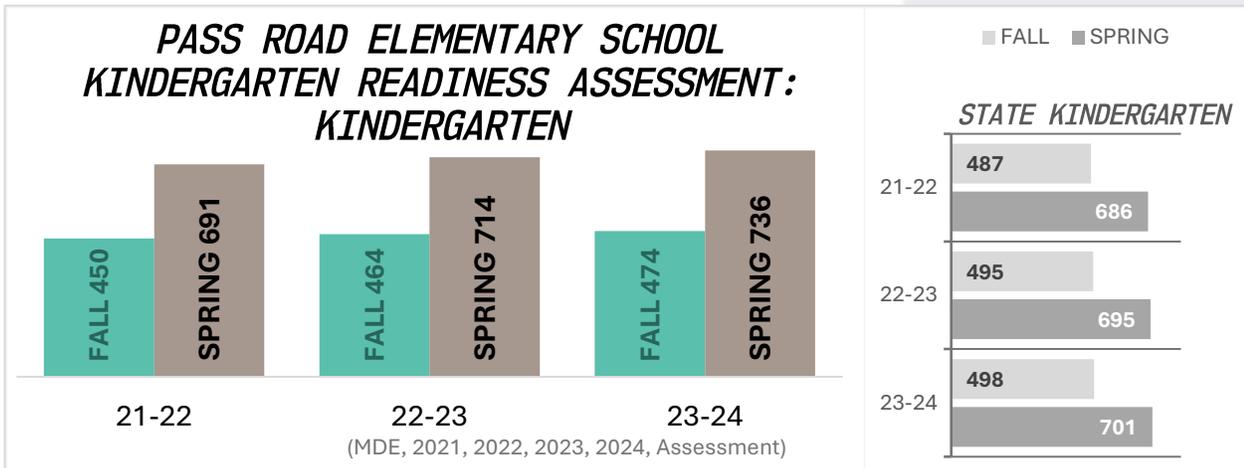


Figure 204: Pass Road Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Kindergarten

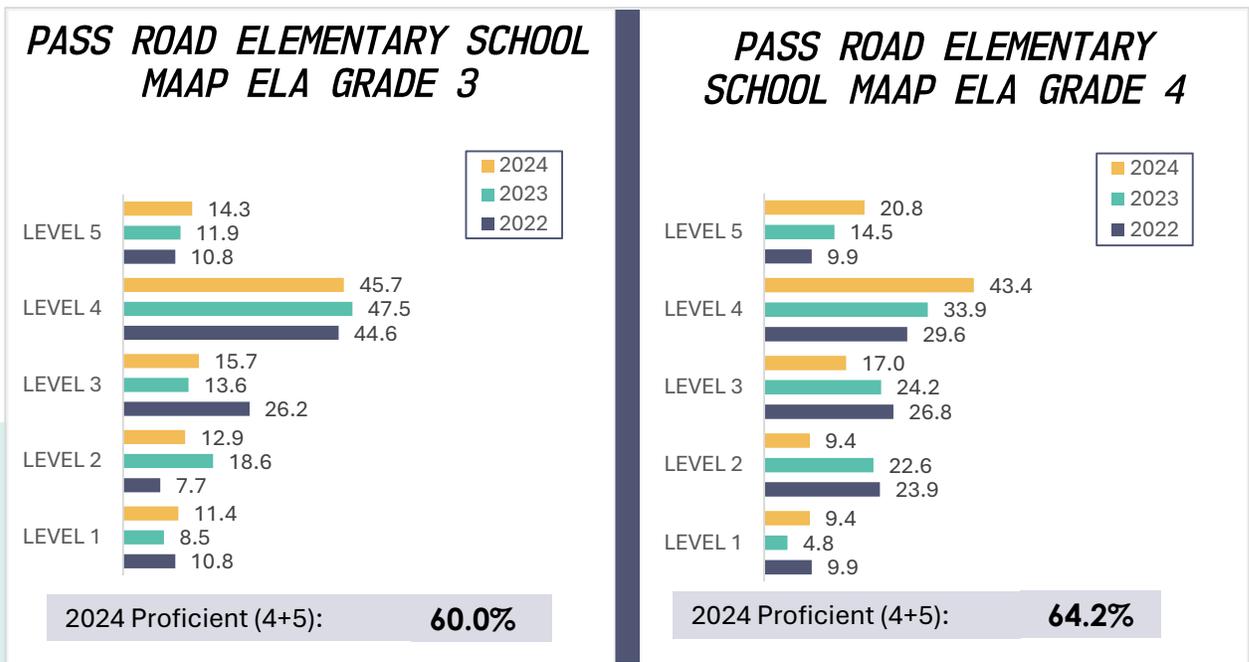


Figure 206: Pass Road Elementary School MAAP ELA Grades 3 and 4

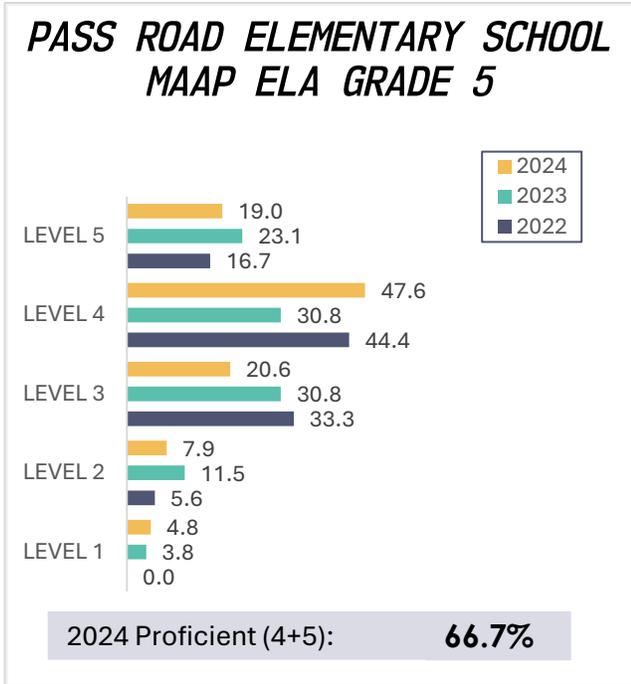


Figure 207: Pass Road Elementary School MAAP ELA Grade 5

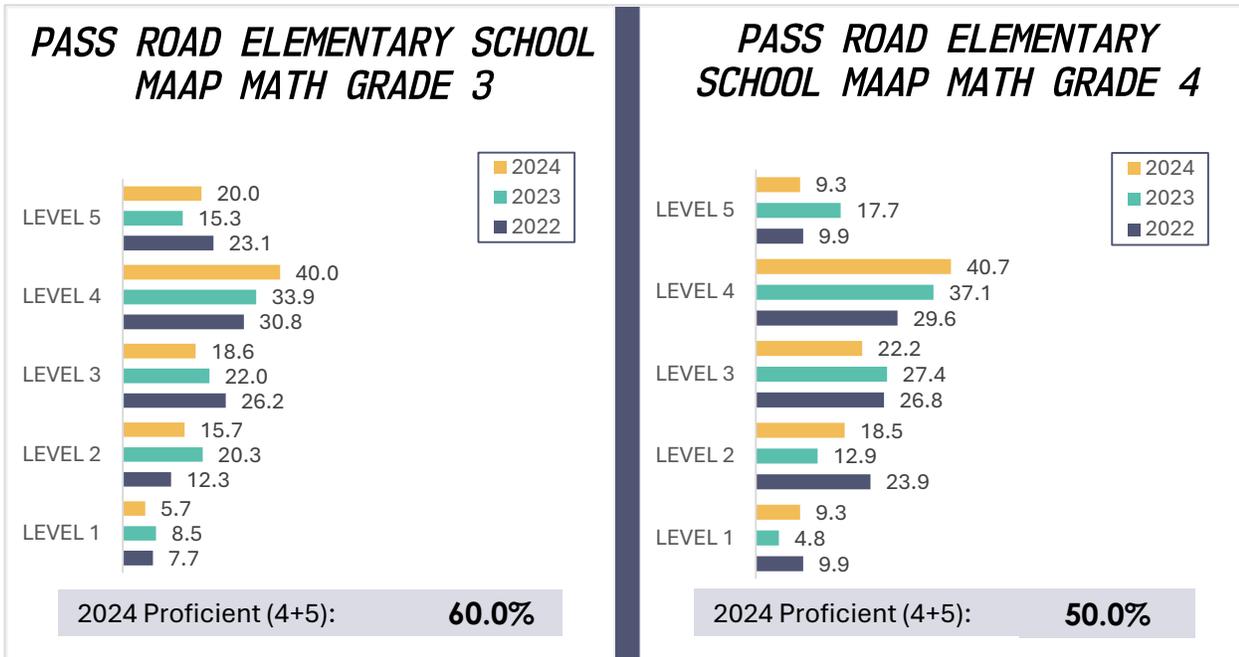


Figure 208: Pass Road Elementary School MAAP Math Grades 3 and 4

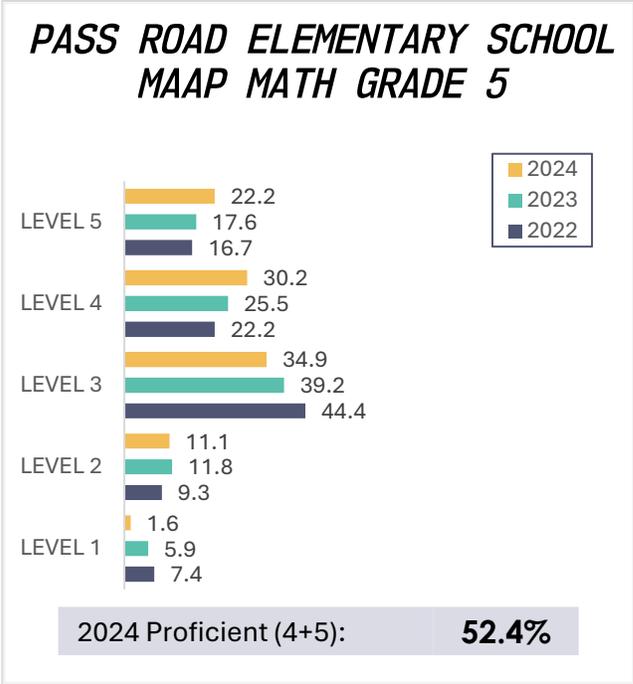


Figure 209: Pass Road Elementary School MAAP Math Grade 5

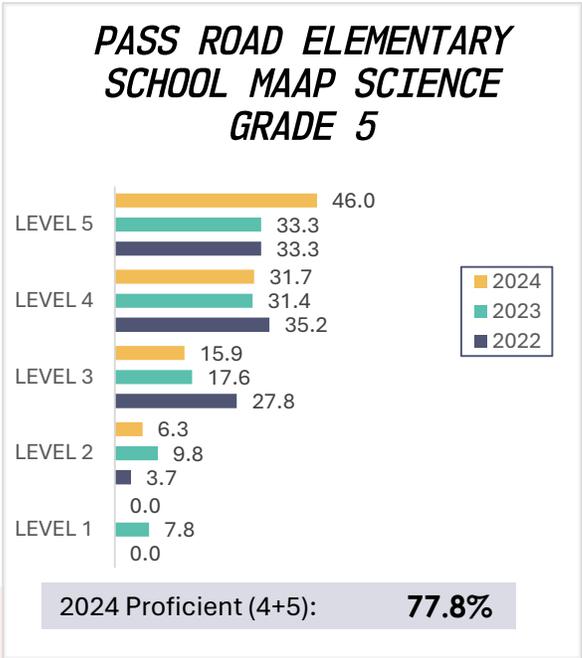
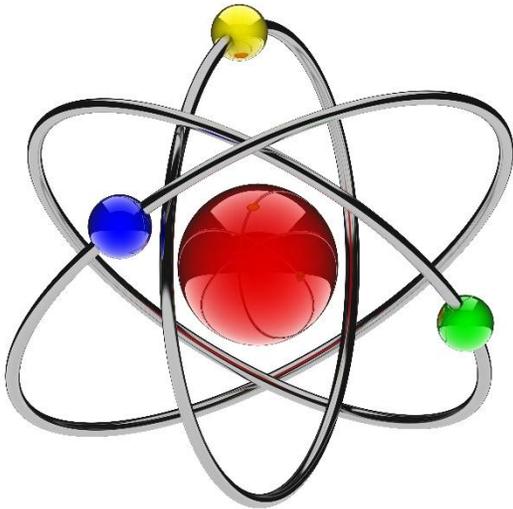


Figure 210: Pass Road Elementary School MAAP Science Grade 5

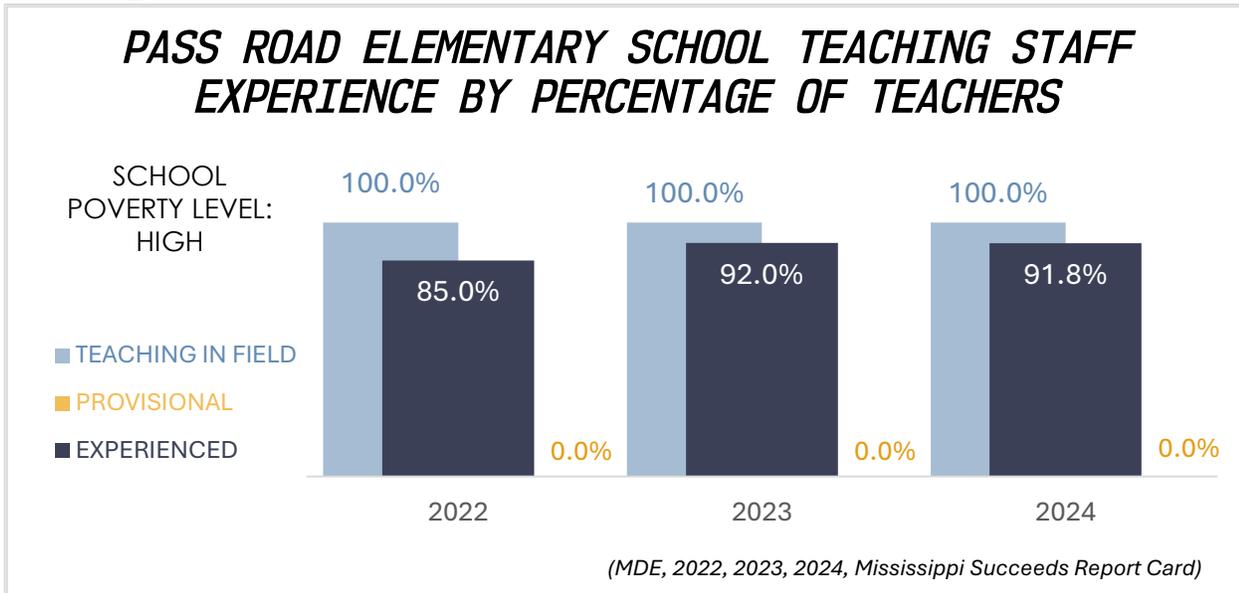


Figure 211: Pass Road Elementary School Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers



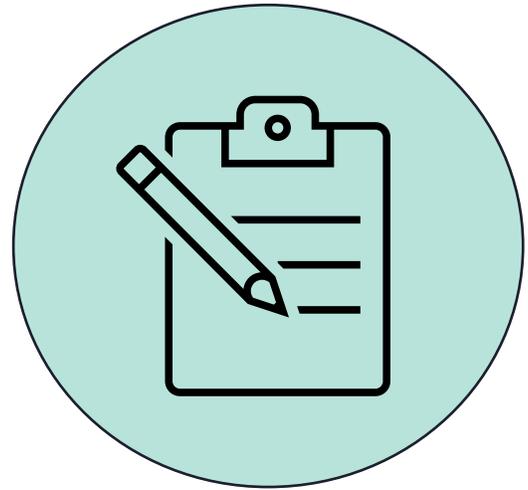

Figure 215: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Average Daily Attendance

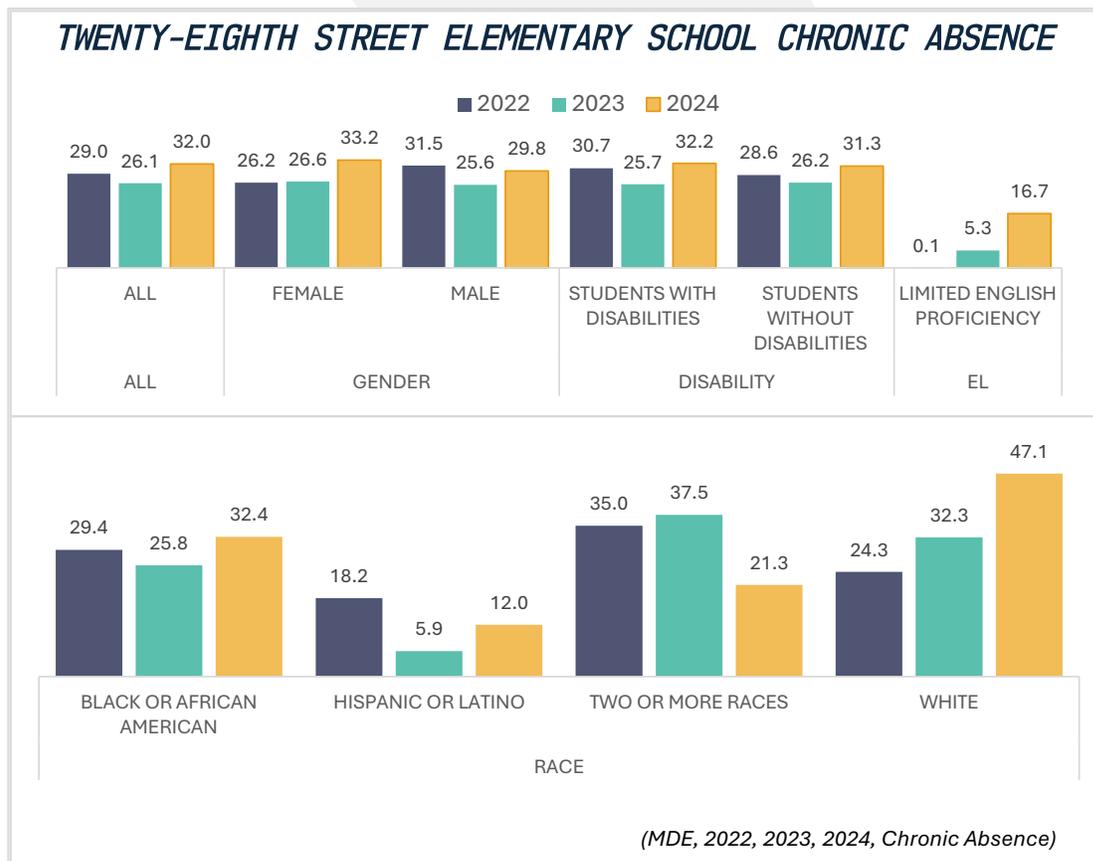


Figure 216: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Chronic Absence

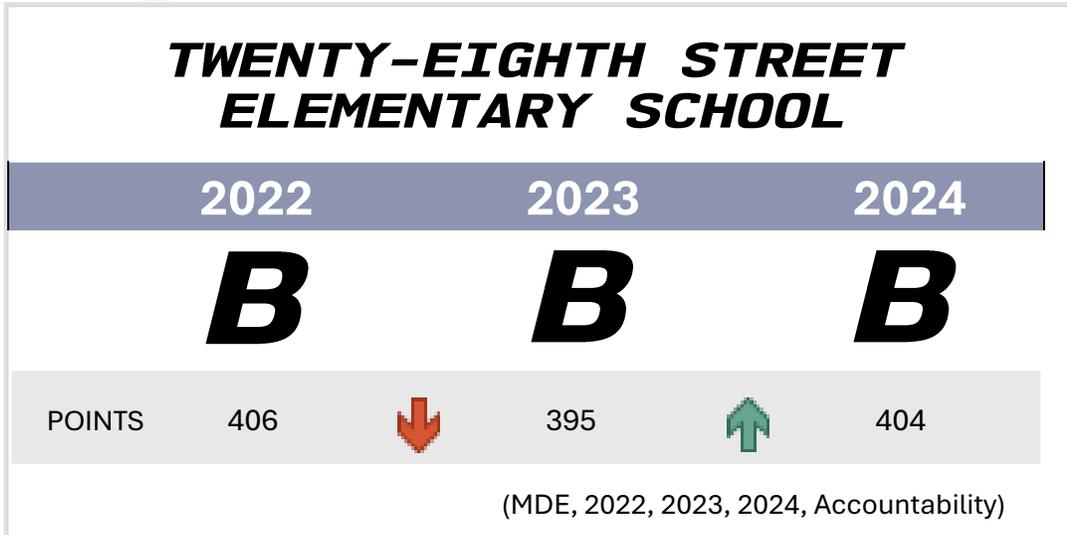


Figure 217: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Accountability

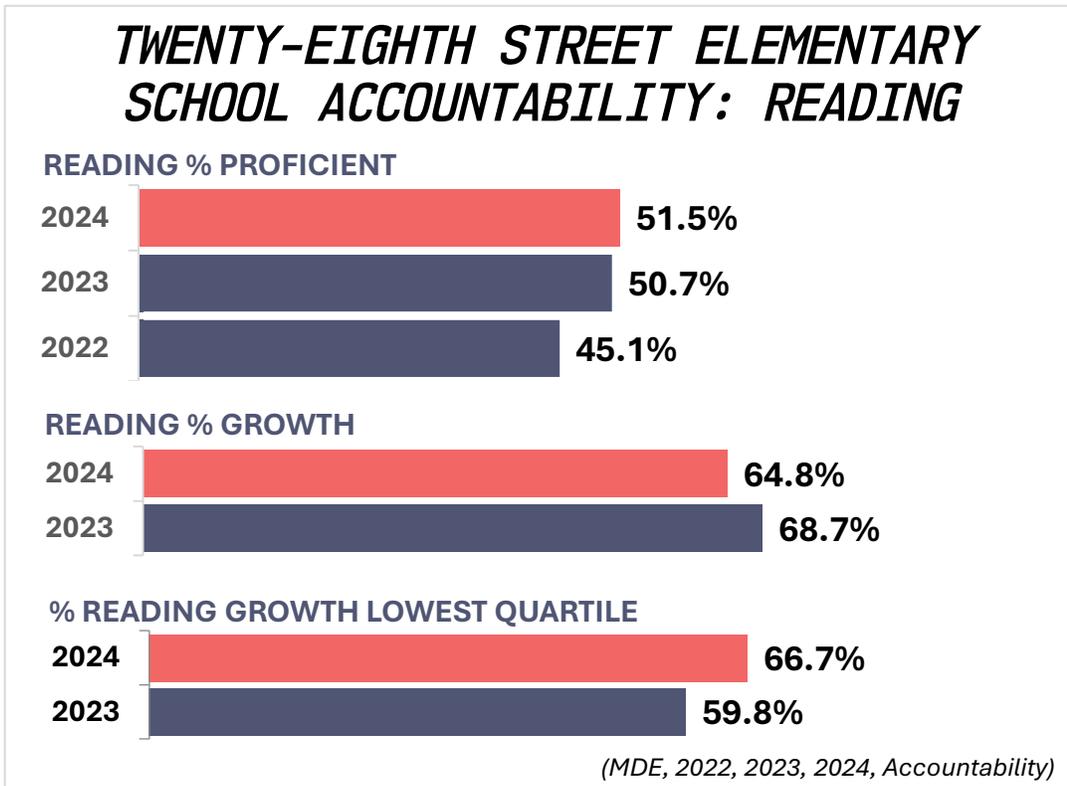


Figure 218: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Accountability: Reading

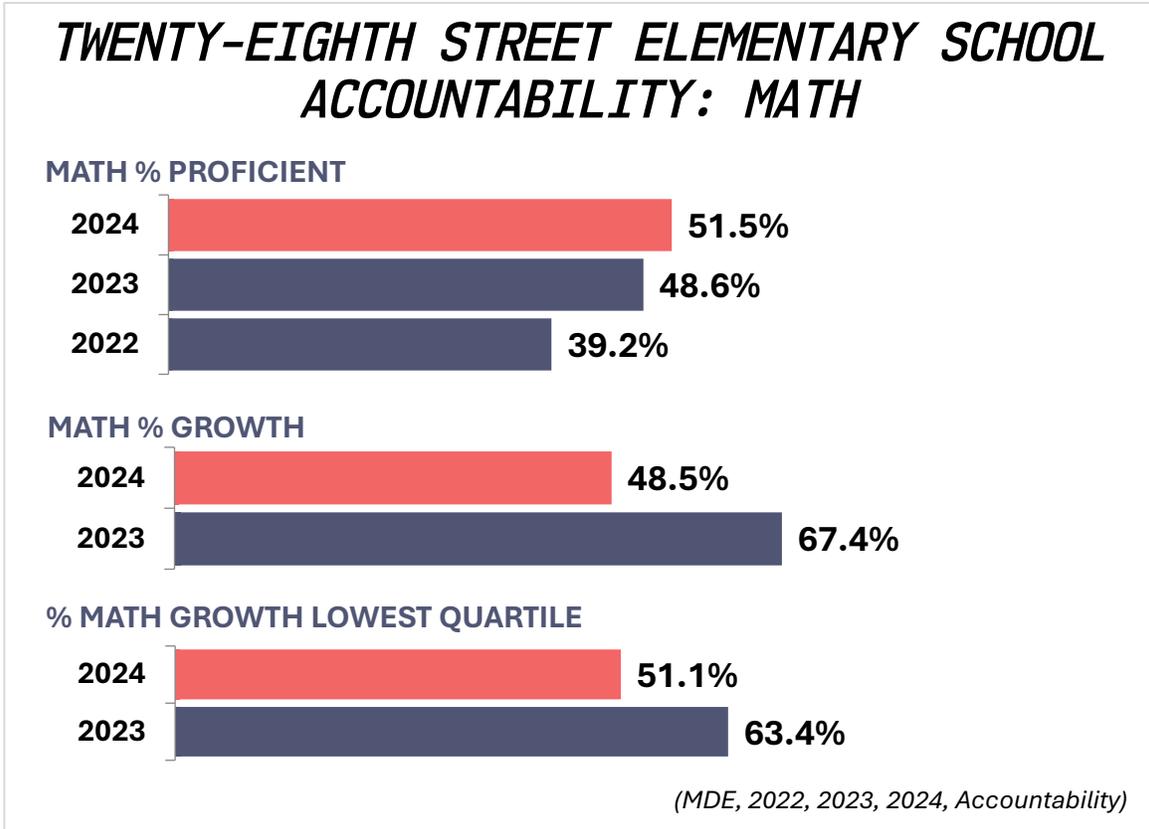


Figure 219: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Accountability: Math

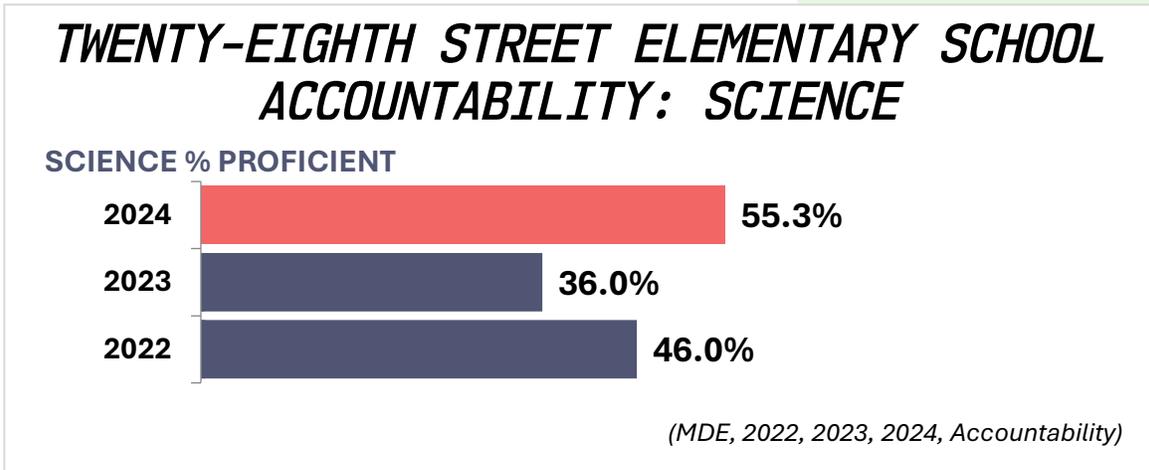
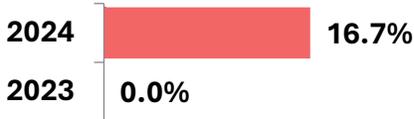


Figure 220: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Accountability: Science

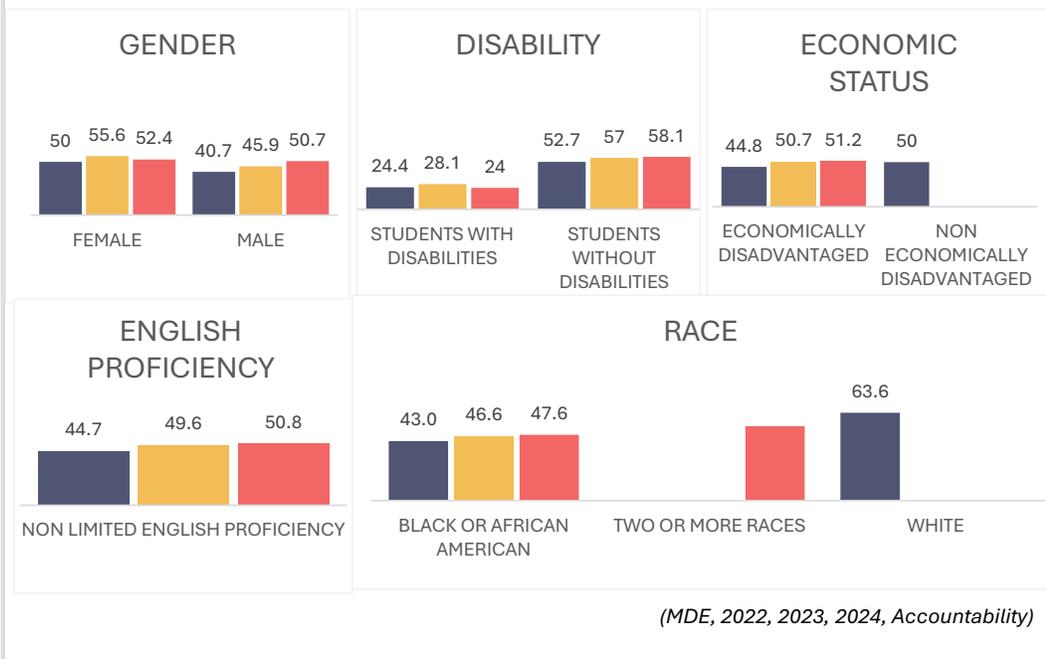

Figure 222: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

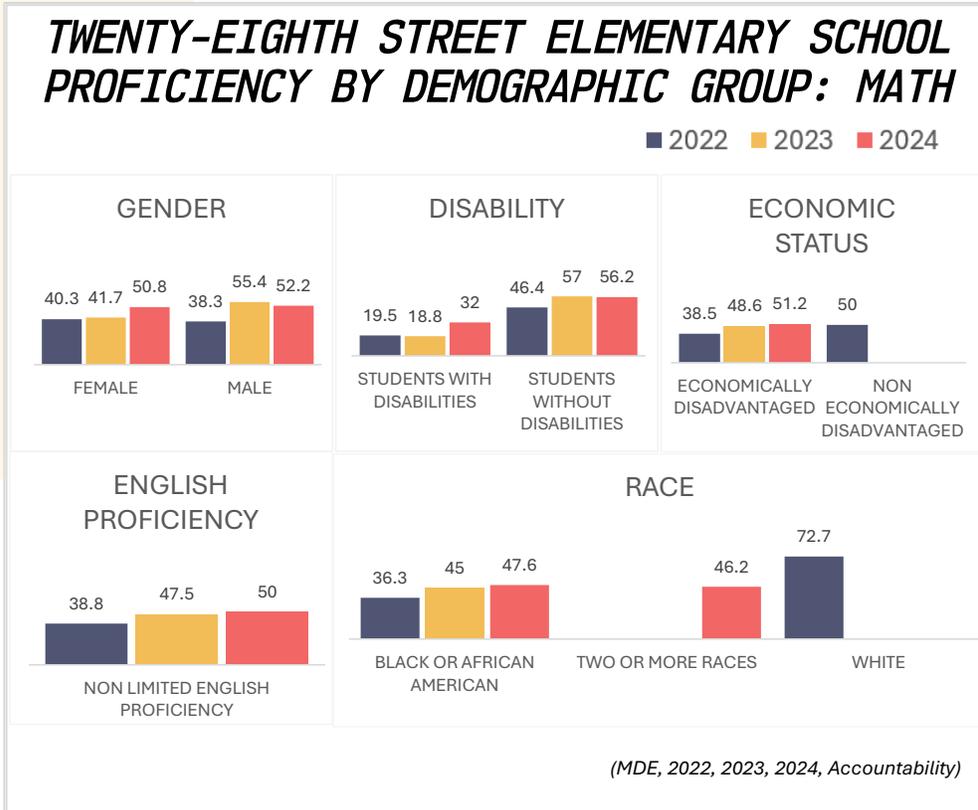


Figure 223: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

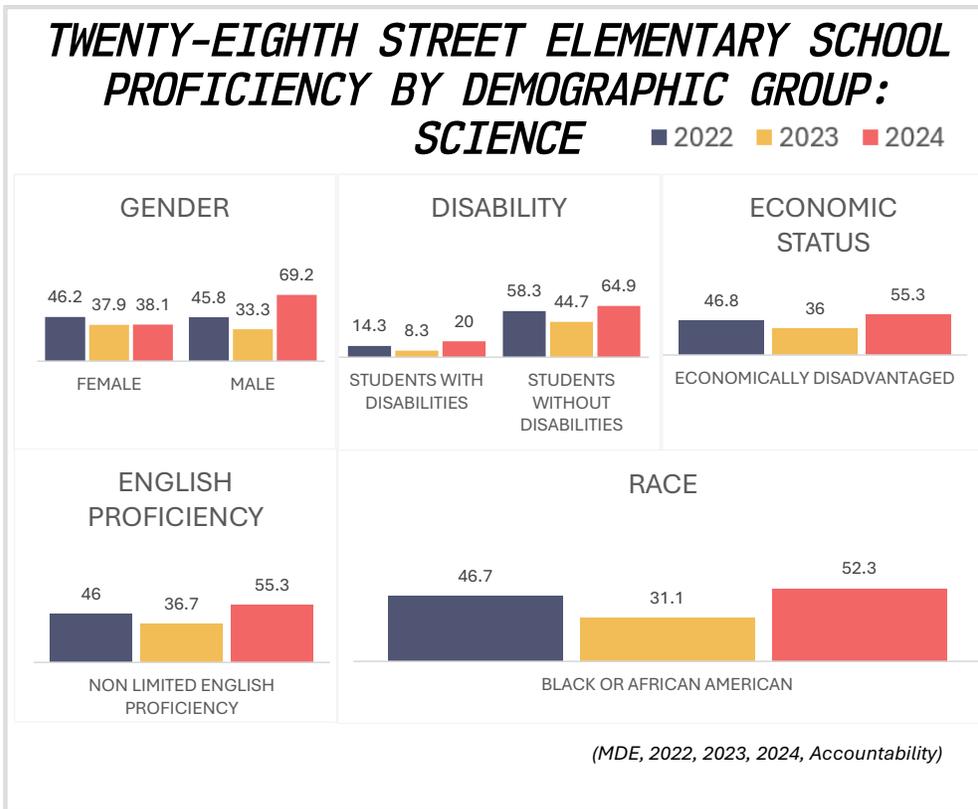
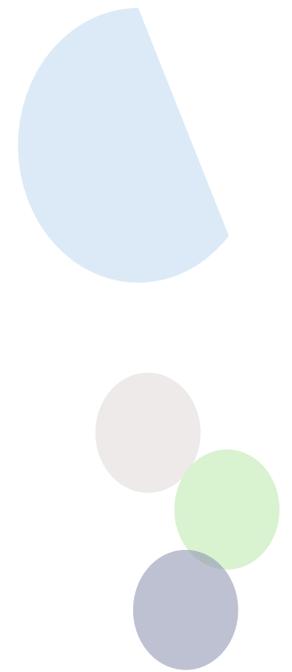


Figure 224: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

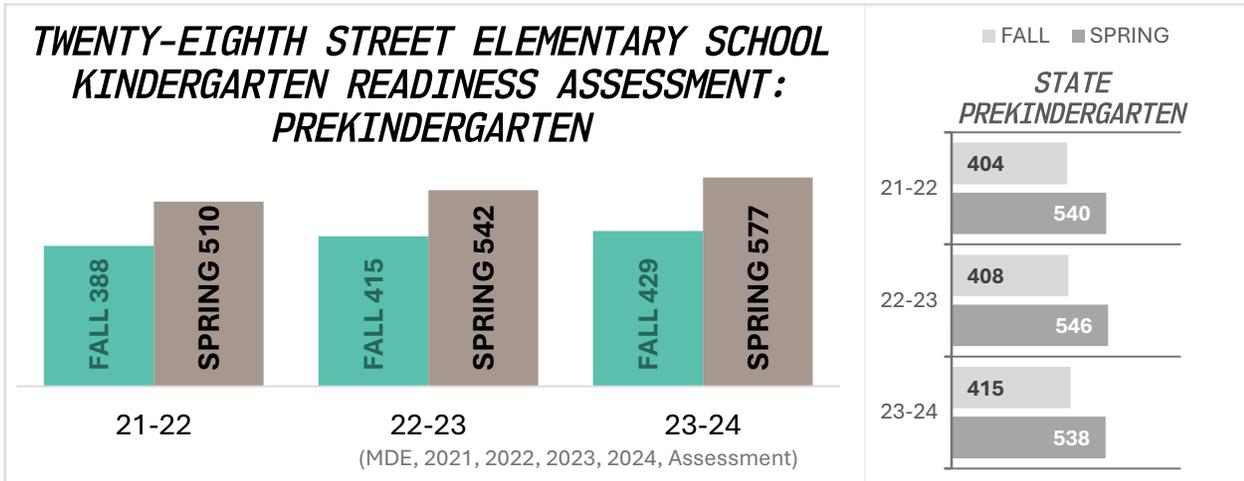


Figure 225: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Prekindergarten

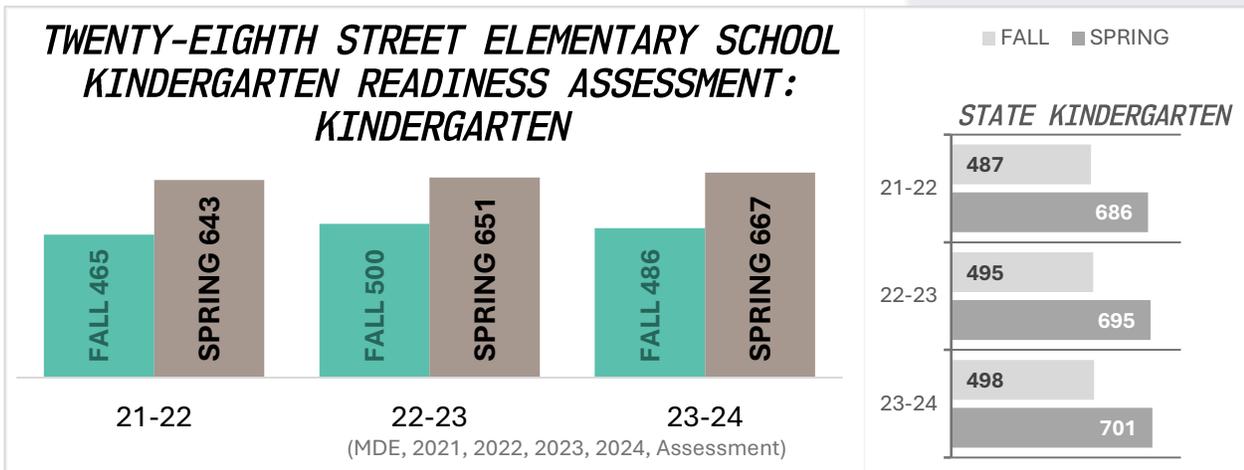


Figure 226: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Kindergarten

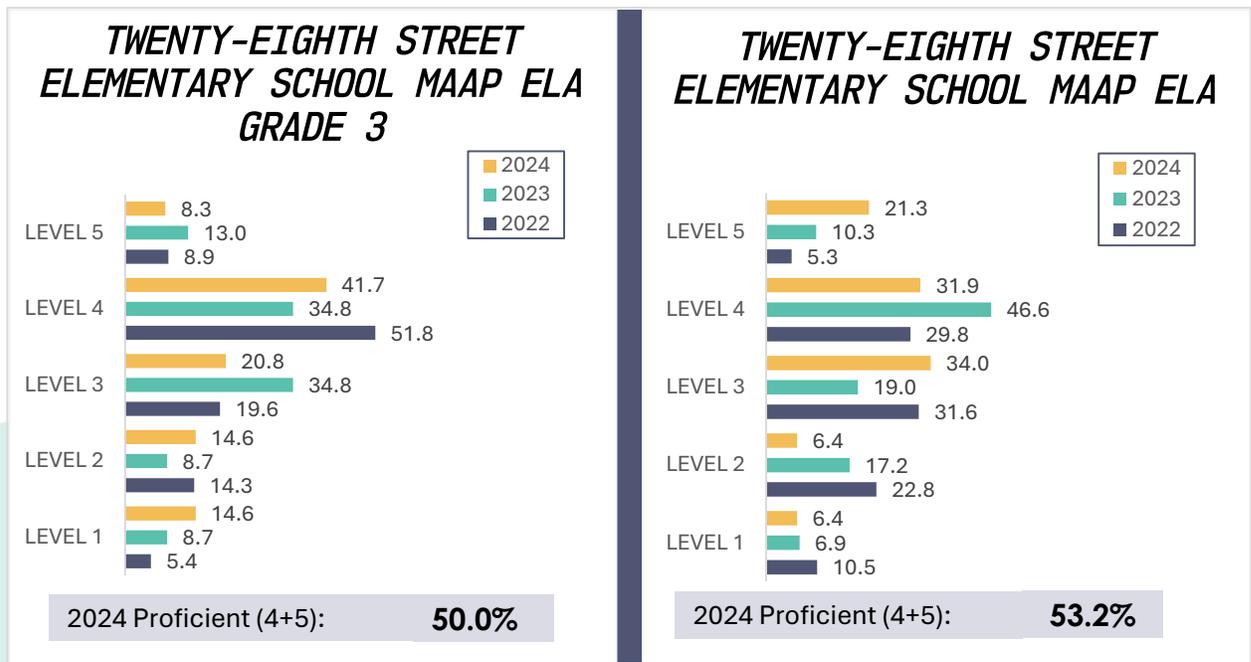


Figure 228: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School MAAP ELA Grades 3 and 4

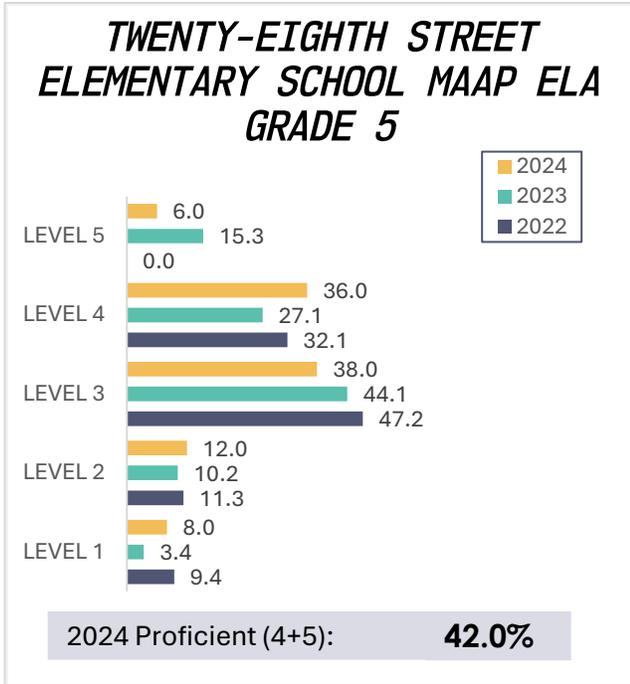


Figure 229: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School MAAP ELA Grade 5

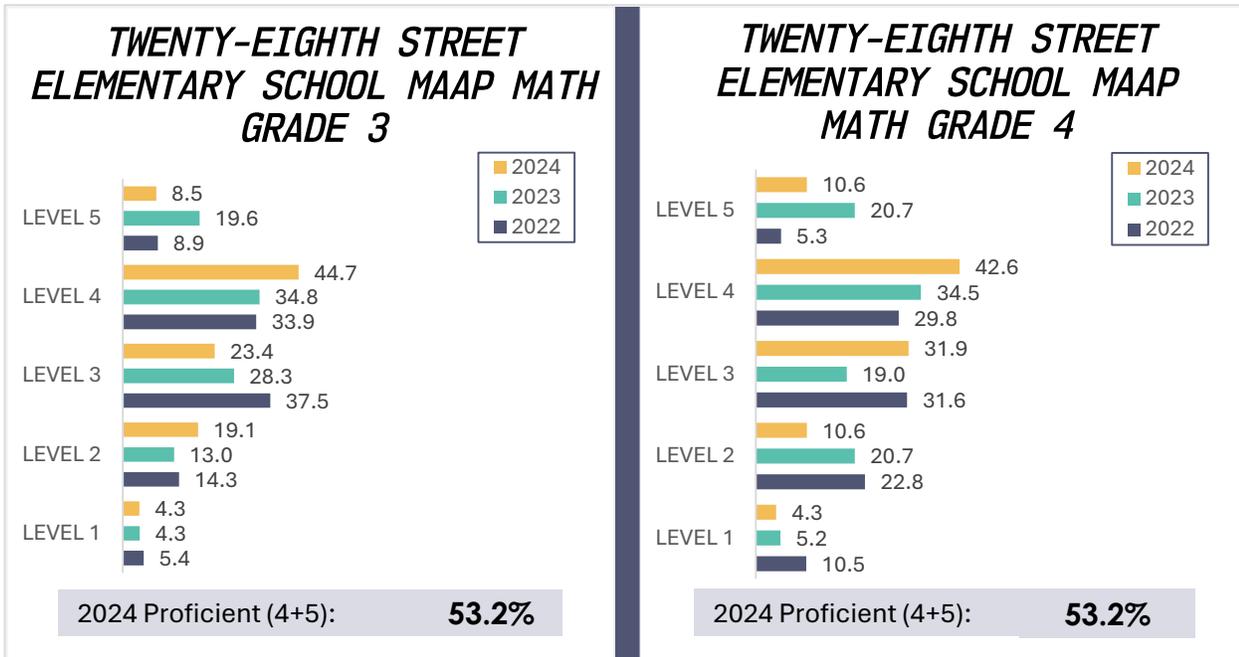


Figure 230: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School MAAP Math Grades 3 and 4

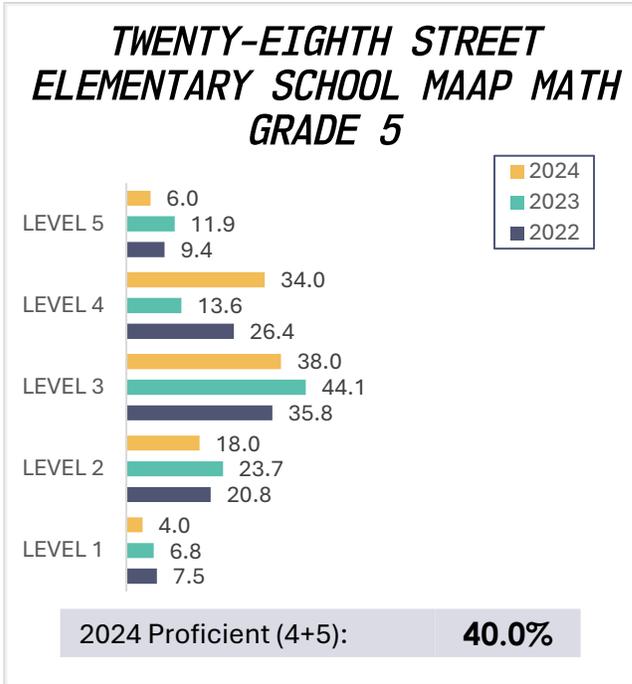


Figure 231: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School MAAP Math Grade 5

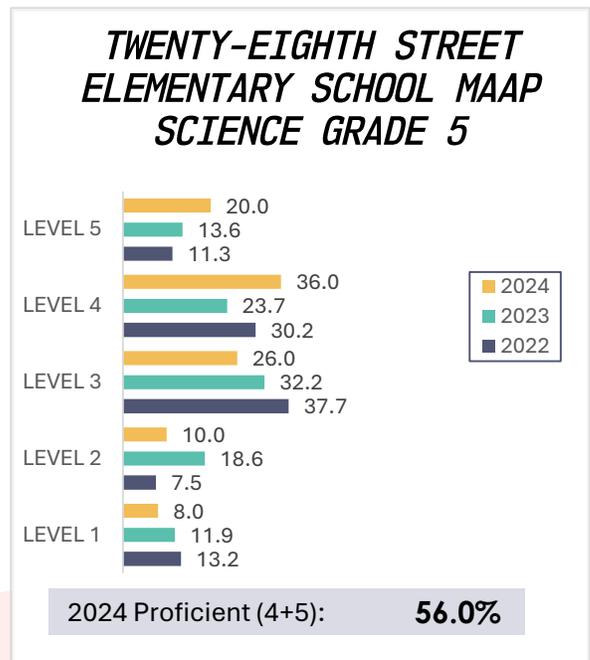
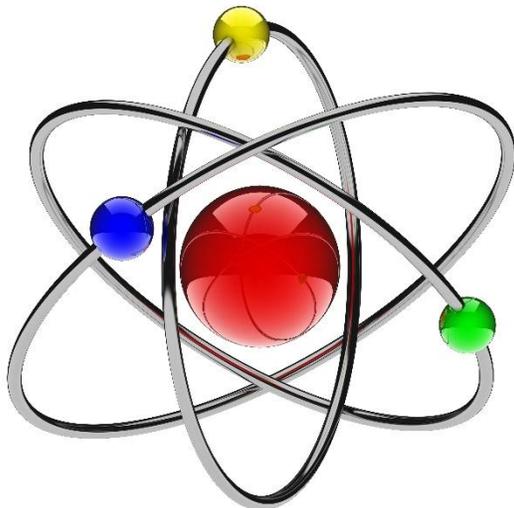


Figure 232: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School MAAP Science Grade 5

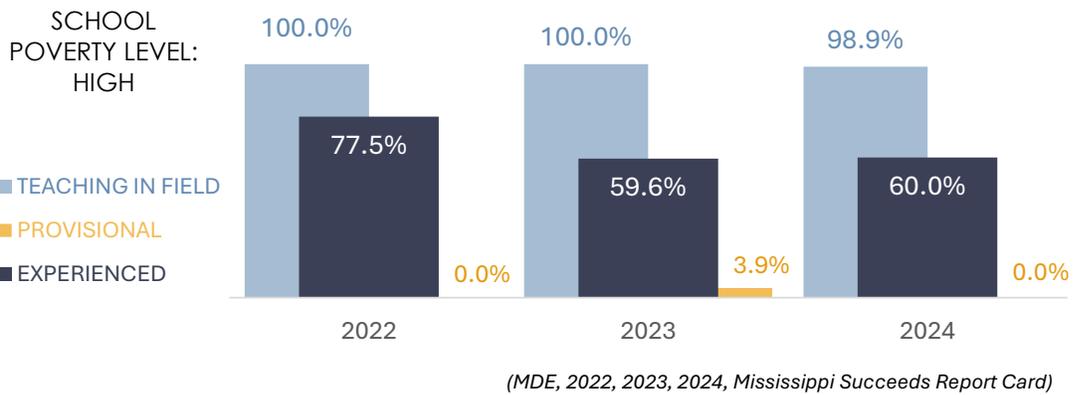


Figure 233: Twenty-Eighth Street Elementary School Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers



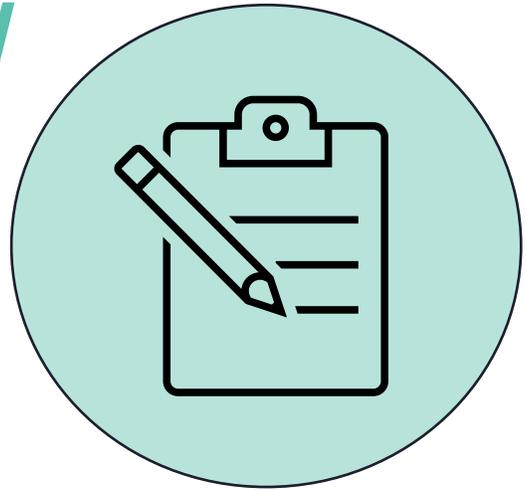

Figure 237: West Elementary School Average Daily Attendance

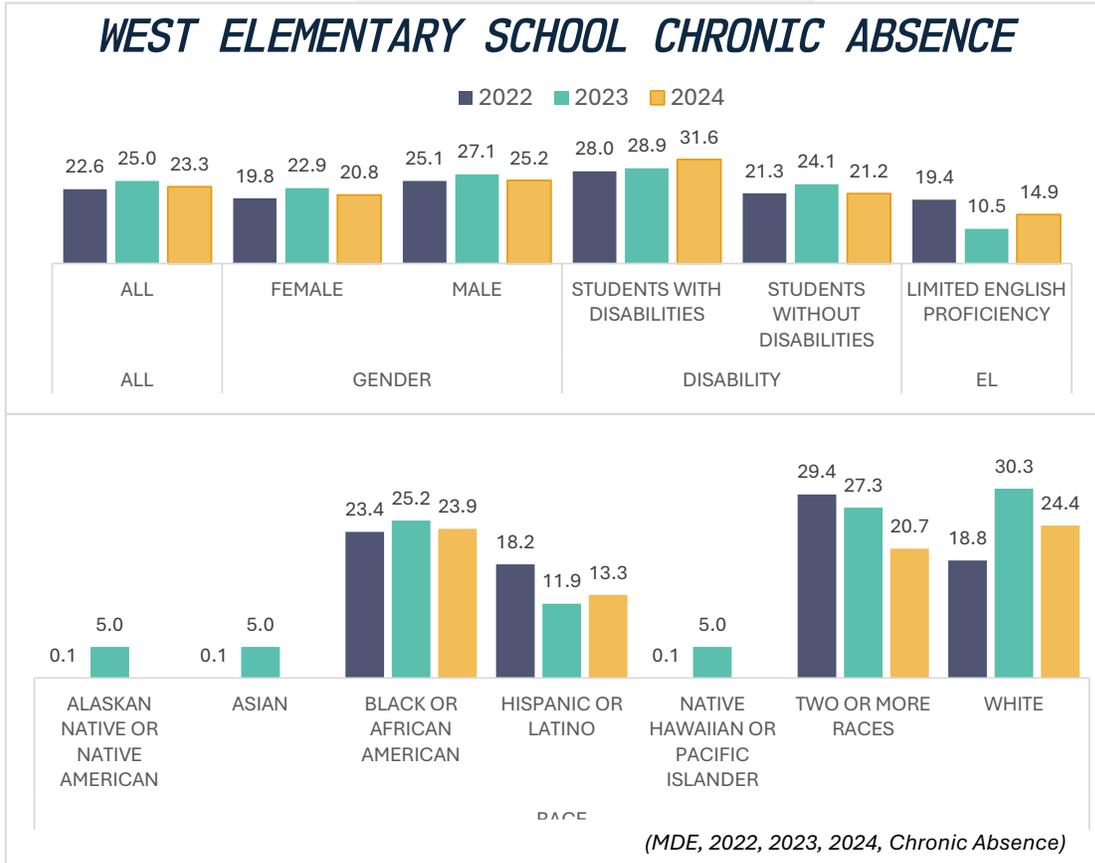


Figure 238: West Elementary School Chronic Absence

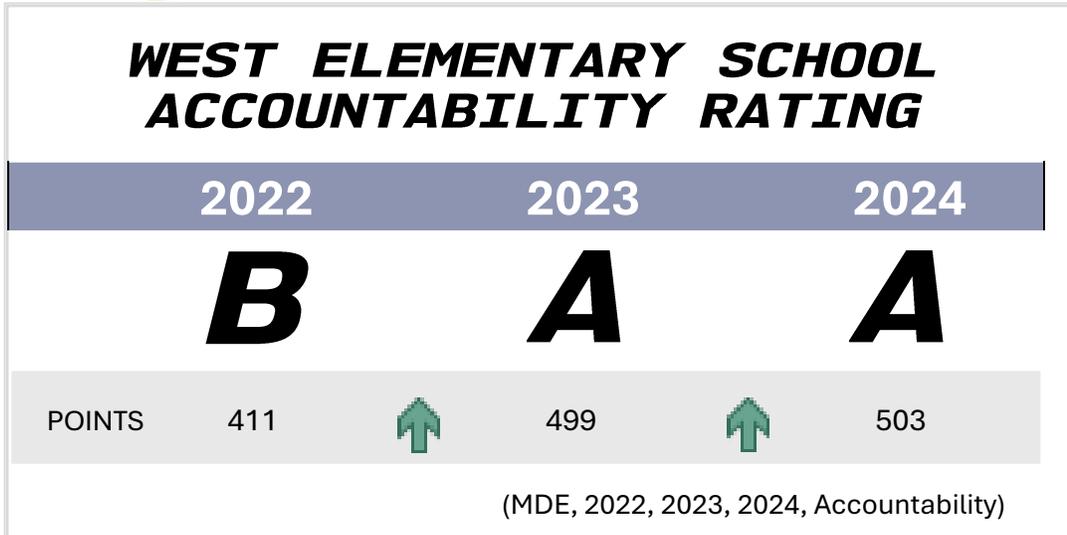


Figure 239: West Elementary School Accountability

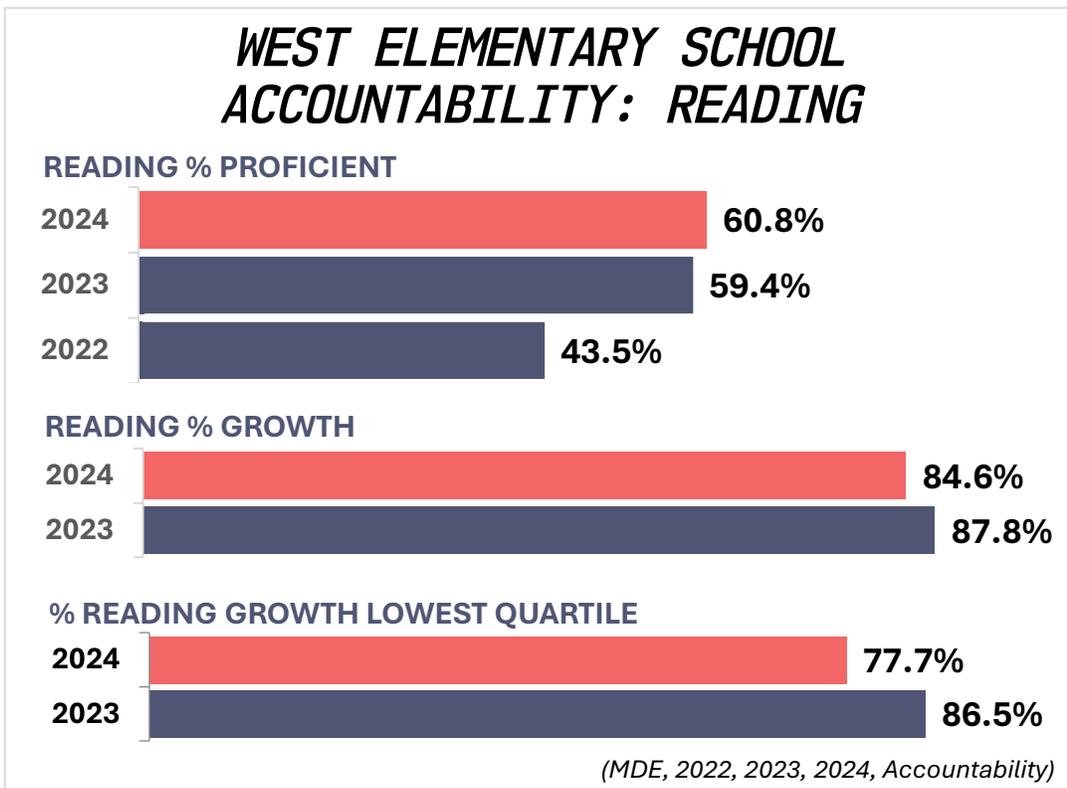


Figure 240: West Elementary School Accountability: Reading

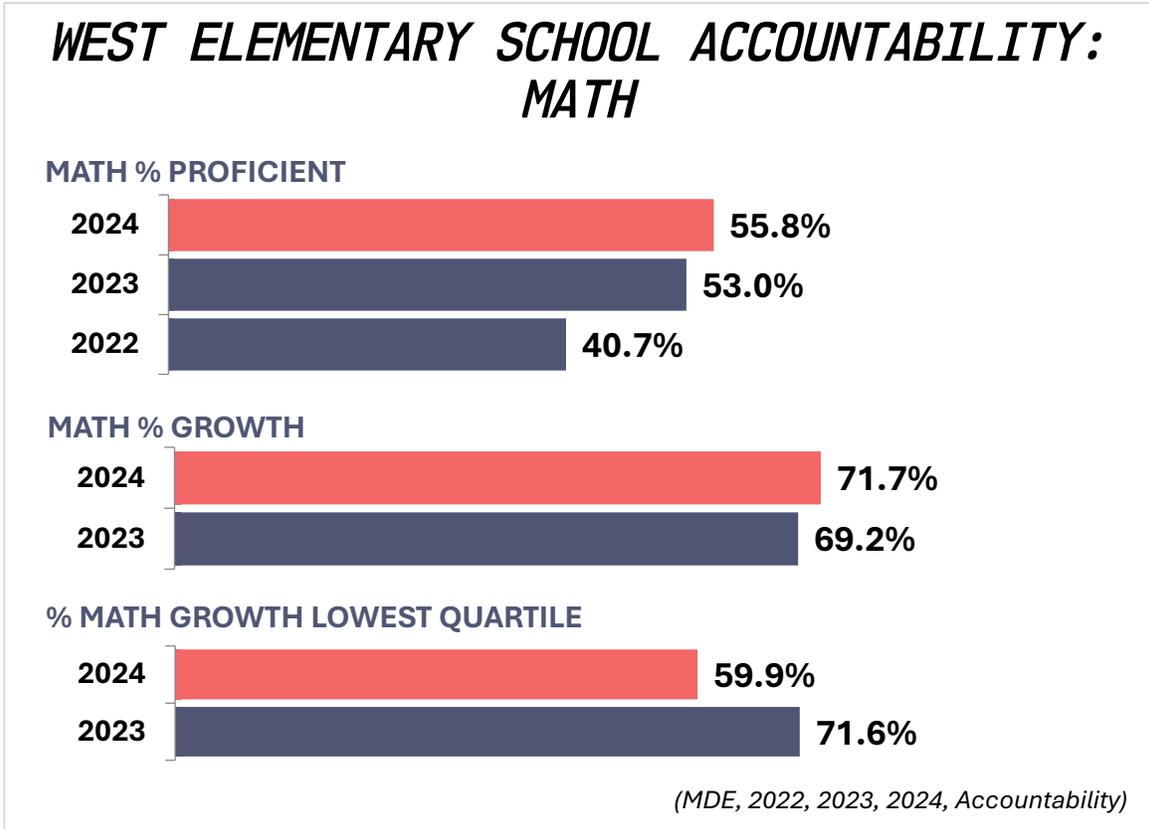


Figure 241: West Elementary School Accountability: Math

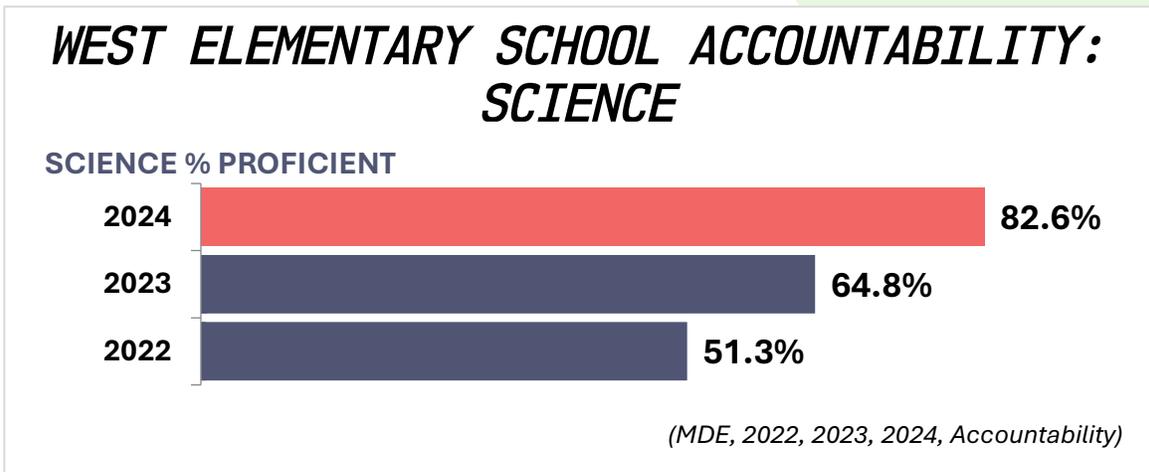


Figure 242: West Elementary School Accountability: Science



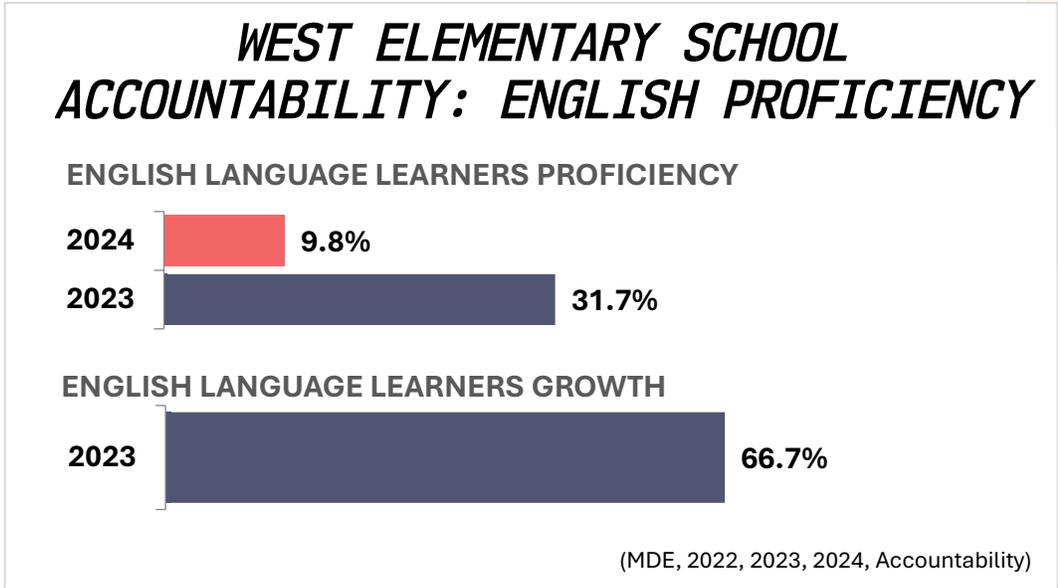


Figure 243: West Elementary School Accountability: English Proficiency

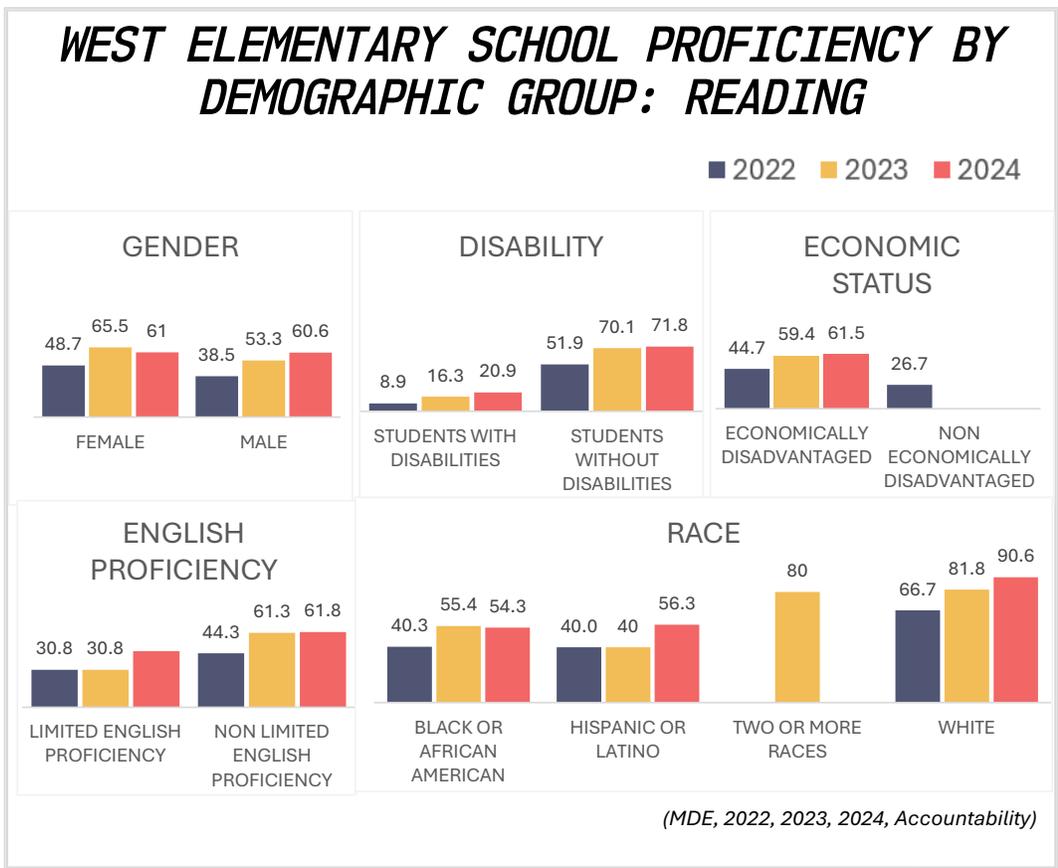


Figure 244: West Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Reading

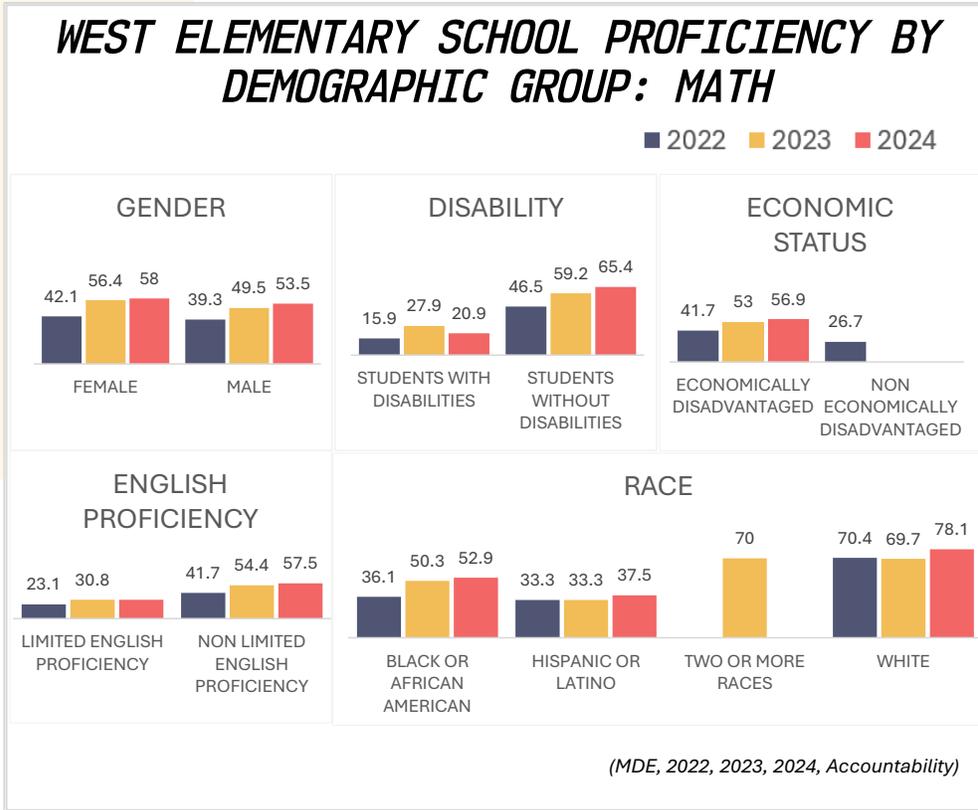


Figure 245: West Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Math

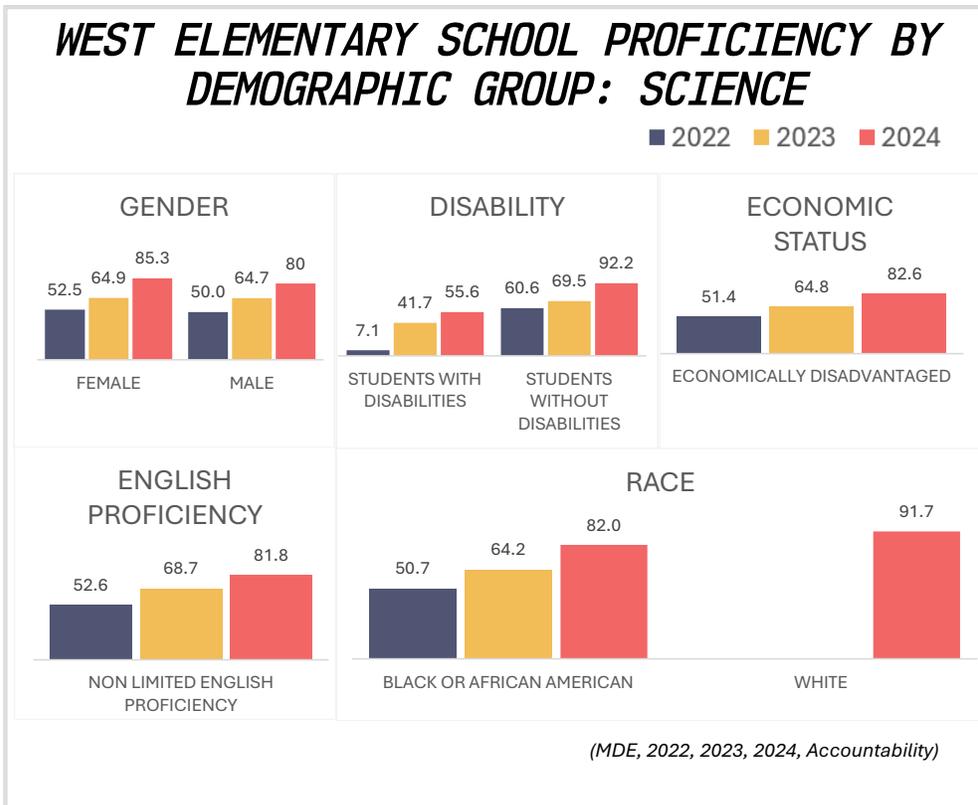
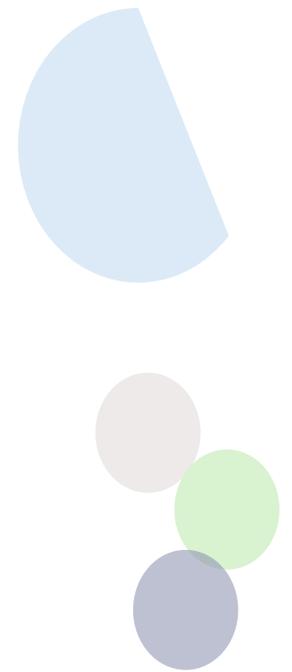


Figure 246: West Elementary School Proficiency by Demographic Group: Science

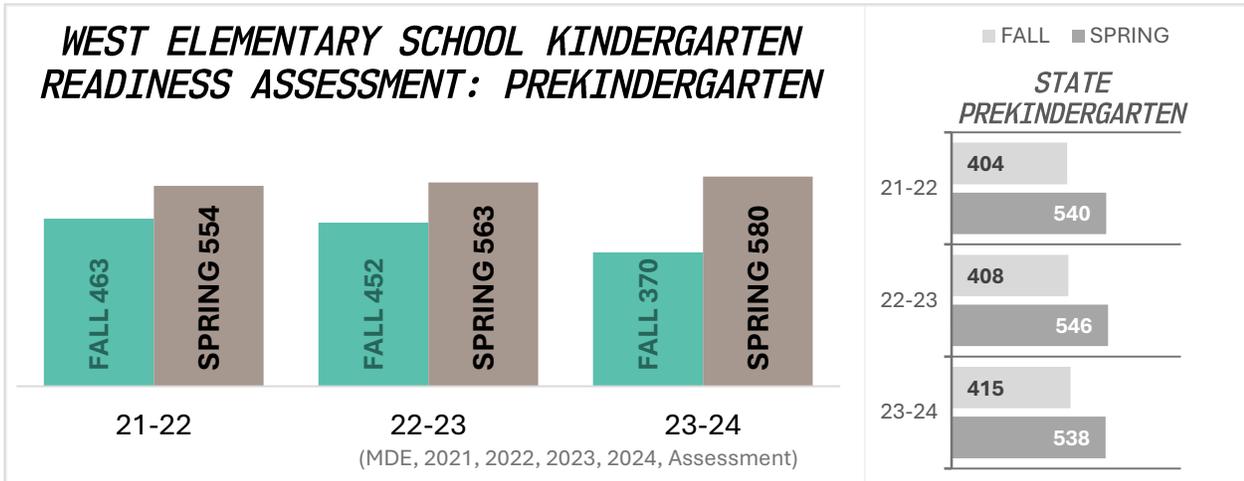


Figure 247: West Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Prekindergarten

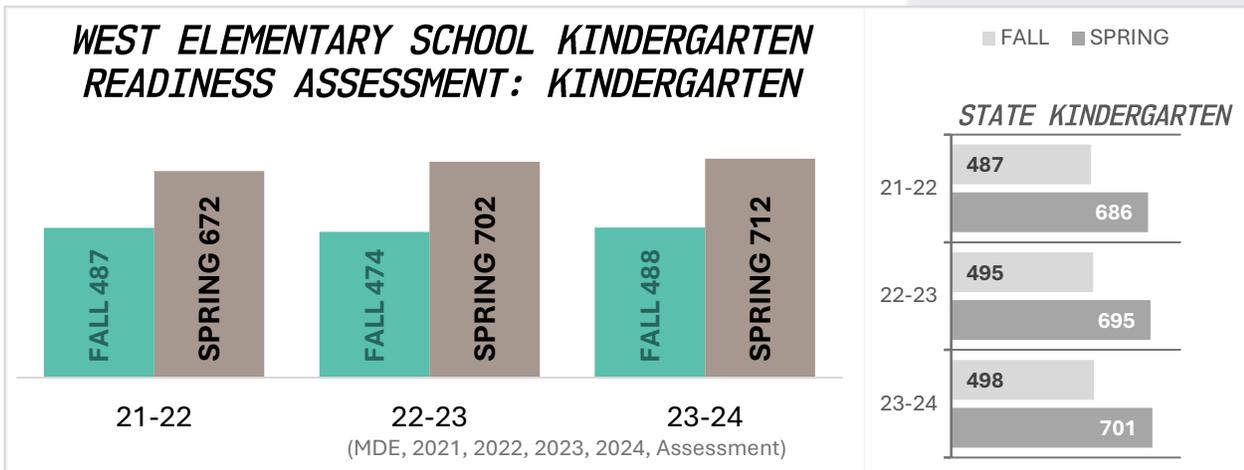


Figure 248: West Elementary School Kindergarten Readiness Assessment: Kindergarten

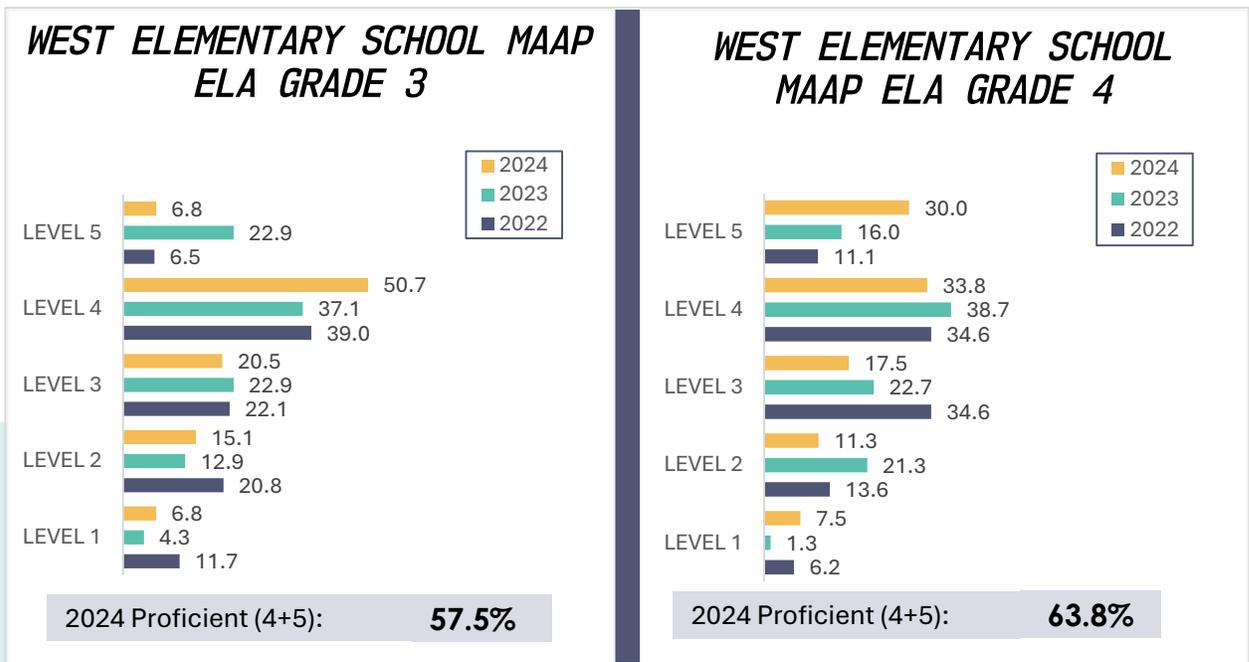


Figure 250: West Elementary School MAAP ELA Grades 3 and 4

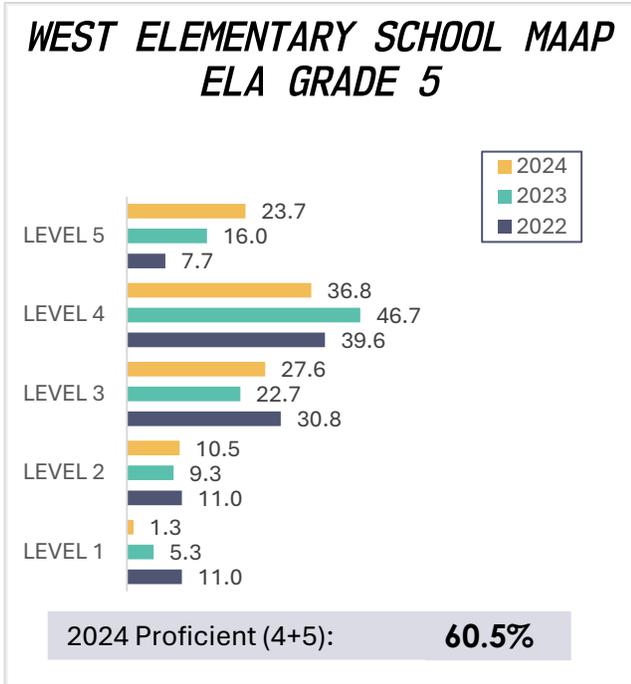


Figure 251: West Elementary School MAAP ELA Grade 5

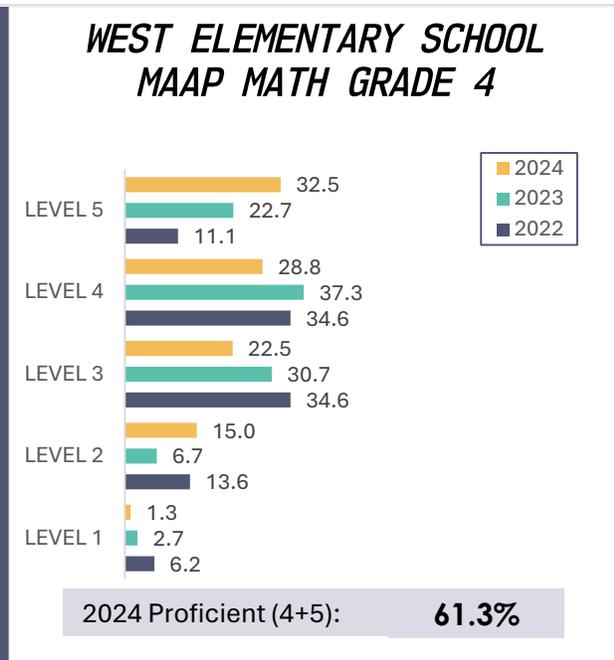
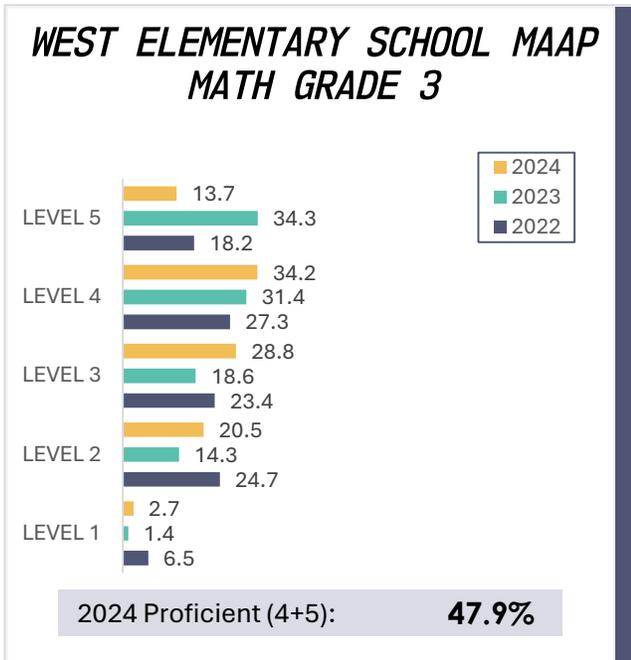


Figure 252: West Elementary School MAAP Math Grades 3 and 4

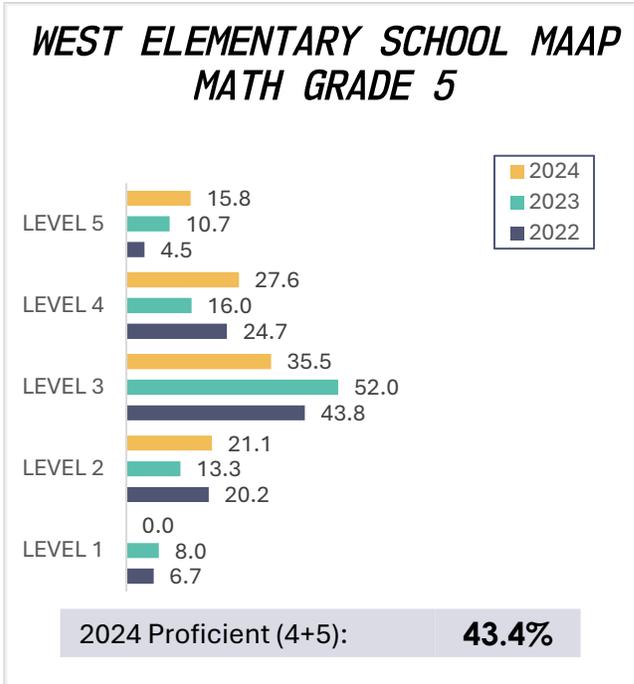


Figure 253: West Elementary School MAAP Math Grade 5

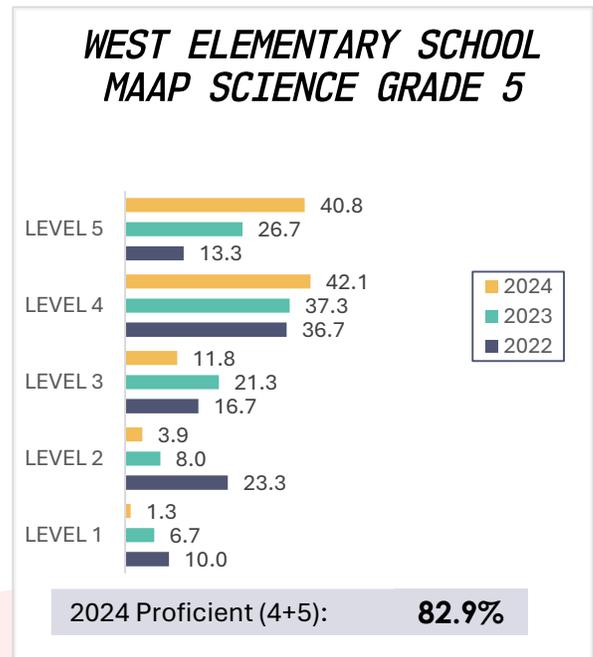
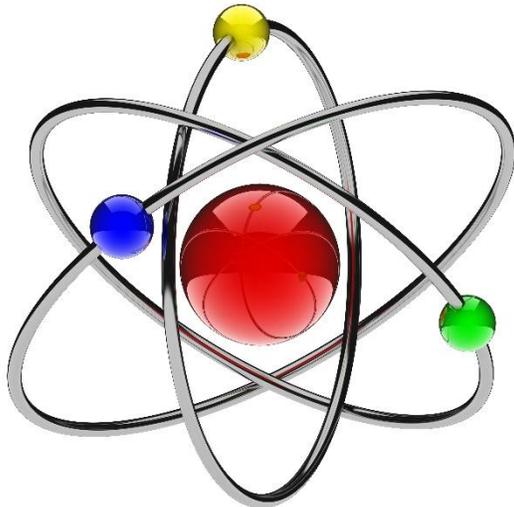


Figure 254: West Elementary School MAAP Science Grade 5

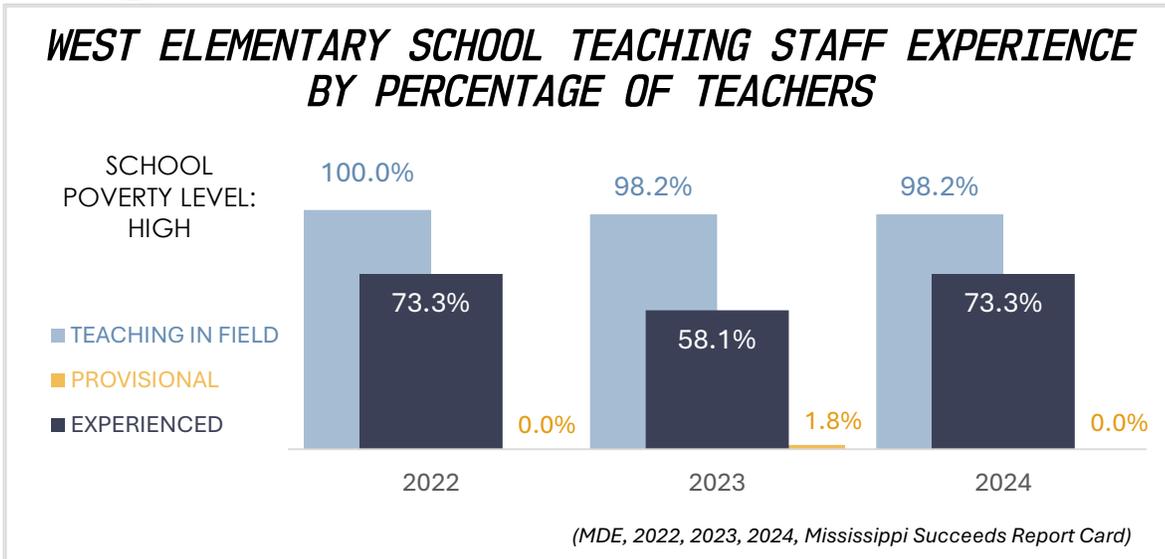


Figure 255: West Elementary School Teaching Staff Experience by Percentage of Teachers

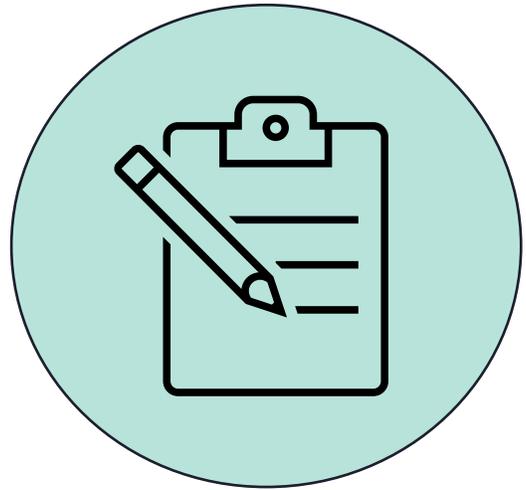
