The Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) is demonstrating what environmental sustainability and climate resiliency mean in practice for education.

Environmental sustainability isn't just about surviving—it's about thriving. LACOE is working toward a regenerative approach that goes beyond minimums, replenishing what is taken from the environment to create better futures for students.

LACOE is developing a comprehensive 5-year Sustainability Action Plan in partnership with the Greater Los Angeles Education Foundation. This strategic roadmap will guide efforts to reduce energy consumption and waste in LACOE-operated schools while also supporting local education agencies with their sustainability goals.

The importance of this work is underscored by student perspectives. LACOE's Student Advisory Council consistently ranks climate among their top three priorities. Students have expressed that people cannot

defend something they're not intimately familiar with, highlighting why environmental education matters.

On May 1st, LACOE hosted its 4th Green Schools Symposium at the Natural History Museum, designed to be "inspirational, educational, and actionable" for attendees. Participants will leave with practical knowledge about making their schools greener.

LACOE's green initiatives extend beyond planning to action, with programs including outdoor marine field study, Earth Month listening sessions and Clean Air Day pledges.

While some sustainability work happens behind the scenes—like HVAC upgrades, aerator faucets, and energy-efficient building materials—the impact is significant even when not immediately visible.

Environmental sustainability and education share the same goal: helping students thrive in the future. The work LACOE does today creates the conditions for that success tomorrow.

Dulles Math Cotsen Grant

Dulles Elementary School has been awarded a Cotsen grant to enhance math instruction. This grant focuses on deepening teachers' understanding of Cognitively Guided Instruction (CGI) and the new Illustrative Math series, building on our CGI work.

The initiative includes targeted coaching and professional development to ensure effective, student-centered math instruction in all elementary grades. Key elements involve:

- **Coaching and Mentoring:** A district math mentor and external consultant guide teachers in implementing the Math State Standards with CGI pedagogy and the Illustrative Math curriculum.
- **Classroom Observations and Lab Days:** Teachers collaborate and observe one another to strengthen math instruction skills.

This initiative is designed to improve teachers' understanding of student mathematical thinking, enhancing instructional practices and preparing

students for success in the CA Common Core Mathematics Standards. The result is a positive impact on student learning, with increased engagement and improved math skills.

Counting Collections: Building Number Sense and Growing Mathematicians

DD Johnston Elementary is proud of the math skills that our young scholars are developing through the counting collection strategy. Counting collections help students develop a strong foundation in number sense and counting skills, including one-to-one correspondence, cardinality, and grouping, which are crucial for future mathematical understanding.

Collections can range in size from small collections under 30, to well above 1000. Students must decide how to count and represent their collection, often using groupings of 5, 10, 25 or 100. Teachers extend student thinking by asking probing questions which cause the students to mentally manipulate the quantity of their collection with a question like, "How many would you have if I take away 12." This provides opportunities for students to develop their ability to solve problems using mental calculations. In addition, counting collections develops mathematical thinking critical to proficiency in higher math skills, place value, addition, and subtraction, along with multiplication and division. The counting collections strategy is one that

allows Johnston teachers to tailor instruction to meet individualized needs while building a lively, supportive and engaging classroom learning environment. At Johnston, when a teacher says it's time for Counting Collections, kids CHEER!

In the gym, on the stage, and out on the fields, LMHS had one of our best Winters ever. Boys Basketball was invited to CIF Open Division and played extremely well against the top teams in the state and country. Our Girls Basketball team won league for the first time in 31 years



and finished as Runner-Up in the CIF Final. Girls Soccer finished as the Runner-Up for CIF, but won the State Championship for Division IV tournament a week later. Our Cheer team won the state championship and later earned a bronze medal at the National Competition. And our Winter Guard has earned multiple awards this competition season and is headed off to championships later this month.

Our Spring Sports are off to a great start with Softball ranked #37 in the country and #4 in California. Baseball is ranked #5 in the nation and #3 in the state. It is quite rare for a public school to be so highly ranked in both softball and baseball. Go Mats!

Lampton's Junior Coaches

The Junior Coach Program at the elementary school level empowers students to become leaders through play. Designed to foster social-emotional learning, leadership development, and positive school culture, the program trains selected upper-grade students—typically 4th and 5th graders—to serve as role models during recess and other school activities.

Junior Coaches receive training from school staff on essential skills such as conflict resolution, teamwork, inclusion, and responsibility. Through this training, they learn how to facilitate games, encourage participation among their peers, and help resolve minor conflicts using simple tools like rock-paper-scissors. By leading by example, Junior Coaches help create a safe, inclusive, and fun recess environment for all students.

The program also builds confidence and communication skills, providing real opportunities for students to practice leadership in a supportive setting. Junior Coaches often report improved self-esteem and stronger connections with both peers and adults. Teachers and school staff notice a more positive recess climate, fewer behavioral issues, and increased student engagement throughout the school day. The program is rooted core values of respect, healthy play, and inclusion, the Junior Coach Program is a powerful way to cultivate a positive school culture from the playground up.

A study conducted by Brigham Young University, Johns Hopkins University, and the Heritage Foundation found that such students had higher test scores and better classroom performance compared to their peers. Additionally, these experiences enhanced students' cultural awareness over time.



The data collected tied field trips with an increase in student engagement and attendance. The data also showed Lobos who attended multiple field trips had fewer behavioral infractions and higher attendance rates. Lobos having opportunities made learning more dynamic and

enjoyable, encouraging students to be more involved in their education. Students toured USC Engineering department, Long Beach State, Biola, Dominguez Hills, and Knotts Berry Farm Band Festival were just a few trips taken this year. Los Alisos will continue to foster opportunities to tie learning with world experiences.
