As we reflect on the 2024–2025 school year so far, we are grateful for God's faithfulness and the incredible achievements of our HBA family. This has been a season of celebration, service, and spiritual growth-one that truly reflects our mission and values.

Last year, we marked a historic milestone with our 75th Anniversary and Concert, a joyous celebration

of God's gracious hand upon HBA for over 75 years. Your dedication made this unforgettable event possible, and we continue to see that same commitment in all areas of school life.

Our Christian Ministries and Student Activities teams have created opportunities for spiritual renewal, including Christian Emphasis Week (CEW), camps, and service projects. We've rejoiced in witnessing new salvations and recommitments of faith while also strengthening our community through events like MAC Week and mission trips.

Academically, our students have excelled across disciplines. The HBA Legal Eagles won the 2025 Hawai'i High School Mock Trial State Championship, and 17 students earned 34 Scholastic Art Awards. Three students from the Class of 2027 placed first in the Japan Wizards Competition, earning a trip to Japan, while 24 elementary students medaled in five Science Olympiad events.

On the courts and fields, our Division 2 Girls Varsity Volleyball and Division 2 Boys Cross Country teams claimed state championships, showcasing the dedication and teamwork of our student-athletes and coaches.

# Celebrating 75 Years

For 75 years, Hawai'i Baptist Academy has shaped tomorrow's leaders, fostering spiritual, intellectual, physical, social, and emotional growth. With God's abundant blessings, we've empowered generations to bring honor to Him. Join us in celebrating 75 years of growth and success as we reflect on HBA's journey through the past, present, and future.



"Christ for Every Nation" was the vision that led Southern Baptist missionaries to establish Hawai'i Baptist Academy. In 1949, founders Hugh and Mary McCormick welcomed 36 students to a campus in Honolulu's Makiki district, using army barracks as classrooms. By 1953, HBA served grades 1-12, expanding its mission beyond the church to the wider community. HBA's first graduating class consisted of just three students in 1954; today, we celebrate a legacy of over 5,000 alumni.



1963 Operation of the school is transferred to the Hawai'i Baptist Convention. The McCormicks and other missionary teachers retire and move back to U.S. Mainland. + Kindergarten added.


1970 Retiring U.S. Air Force Col. Stanley Alan Sagert is elected by the HBC Board to head HBA as superintendent and authorizes him to raise critical funds to support the school.

1972 The 13.6-acre estate in Nu'uanu estate at 2429 Pali Highway is acquired through public auction for \$553,000. This property provided land for what would become the middle and high school campus. The school at this time was located on 1234 Heulu Street in Makiki.



**1977** The Mainland Advisory Council (MAC) holds its first meeting in Honolulu.

**1982** Isaiah 40:31 is adopted as the new Alma Mater.

**1983** The Shiraki Building is completed.

**1986–1998** HBA's Leeward Coast outreach brought education and faith to over 1,000 children, thanks in part to the generosity of John and Donna Stanford.





**1987** HBA purchases the Sacred Hearts Convent School at 21 Bates Street in Nu'uanu for its elementary campus, a transaction that required Vatican approval.

**1988** Dan Kong becomes HBA president.

**2006** The middle school campus is completed and named after former school president Dan Kong.

**1991** HBA hosts the 50th anniversary luau for Olivet Baptist Church at the Stan Sagert High School campus. The church became affiliated with the Southern Baptists in 1941 under the Rev. Victor Koon, a Baptist missionary from Texas who served in China. President Dan Kong, a former pastor of Olivet, spoke at the July 28 morning service.



## **1994 Richard T. Bento** becomes HBA's fourth president. In 1978 he began his service to HBA as chair of the School Program Committee (now known as the board

of directors). From 1985

**2024** In May HBA breaks ground for its new elementary school campus facilities. Part of the school's Campaign for Transformation: expansion on the Richard Bento Elementary campus and the establishment of the Institute of Hope Endowment supporting specialized programs and professional development in addition to scholarship support.

## Jam for Jesus


Led by Rhona Halmos, this group shared uplifting worship music, creating a moment of reflection and praise.

# Capstone Projects

In the academic sphere, Capstone students, under the guidance of Middle School Principal George Honzaki, presented their year long research projects, demonstrating their problem-solving skills and commitment to making a difference:

## Kiera Liew & May Shiraishi— Genki Balls for a Cleaner Ala Wai

Kiera and May worked to improve water quality in the Ala Wai Canal by introducing Genki Balls—eco-friendly mud balls that help break down pollution. Partnering with

their science teacher and The Genki Ball Ala Wai Project, they organized a school-wide Genki Ball Day and later helped launch over 1,000 Genki Balls into the canal.





Luke Uyehara, Luke Wrobel & Alex Fujimoto— Raising Awareness on Video Game Addiction

This team researched the effects of video game addiction and created an educational video to spread awareness. After multiple outreach attempts, they partnered with Honu House Hawai'i, a nonprofit focused on addiction recovery, which now features their video as a resource on its website.

# Good News, Bad News, Good News

YMCA Camp H.R. Erdman, Mokuleia, Waialua, Oʻahu | August 21-22, 2024

For our middle schoolers, 7th Grade Camp was their first Christian Ministries camp experience, marking an important milestone in their transition from elementary to middle school. This special time away was filled with faith, fun, and meaningful connections, helping students build a strong foundation as they navigate this new season of life. The theme for this year—"Good News, Bad News, Good News"—reminded students of God's love, the reality of sin, and the incredible gift of Jesus paying the price for that sin. A key verse that shaped the camp was **Romans 8:38-39**, which powerfully reassures us that nothing can separate us from God's love.



## **Faith in Action**

Throughout the camp, students engaged deeply in their faith. Chapel sessions sparked curiosity and Family Groups provided a space for asking important questions. It was inspiring to see not only the 7th graders grow in their faith but also the student counselors who led discussions and guided younger students toward Christ.

## God at Work

One of the most powerful moments of camp was during worship in chapel. Students sang passionately alongside their friends, and many stayed afterward to pray for one another. It was clear that God was moving in their hearts, reminding them that His love is constant and unshakable, no matter what they face.

## Building Connections in a Challenging Season

Middle school can be a difficult time filled with change and uncertainty. This camp experience helped students feel a sense of belonging-not just in their friend groups, but in God's family. They were reminded that they are deeply loved and that true forgiveness comes through Christ. Romans 8:38-39 was a beautiful reminder that no struggle, fear, or failure can separate them from God's love.

## Finding Community Through Discipleship

To help students find their place, several unique clubs were created:

• **4–9 Club**—A group for students 4'9" or below, based on 1 Samuel 16:7, emphasizing that God looks at the heart, not outward appearances.

- Wonderfully Wired Society (Braceface Banditos)—Inspired by 2 Corinthians 12:9, this group celebrates that our weaknesses can be used for God's glory.
- CATs (Chapel Advisory Team)— A team dedicated to Bible study and brainstorming ideas for future chapels.

Through these groups, students found encouragement, support, and a sense of belonging.

7th Grade Camp was more than just a few days away—it was a time of transformation. As their first Christian Ministries camp, it helped them grow in their faith, build new friendships, and experience God's unshakable love in a whole new way.

# This is Love

The Salvation Army Camp Homelani, North Shore, Oʻahu | February 12-14

Over a few meaningful days on the North Shore, our sophomore camp stepped away from the everyday rhythm of school life to reflect on one powerful truth: "This is love." The theme of sophomore camp centered on understanding the depth of Jesus' love; that He first loved us, and because of this, we are called to love others.

Through chapel messages, small group discussions, and team-building activities, students explored how Christ's love shapes our identity and our relationships. A highlight of the weekend was learning about the Five Love Languages: a practical way to understand how we give and receive love. The Love Languages are:

- Words of Affirmation—Speaking encouraging and uplifting words that build others up
- Quality Time—Giving someone your full attention and being present
- Acts of Service—Doing something helpful or kind for someone else
- **Gifts**—Giving thoughtful or meaningful items that show you care
- **Physical Touch**—Using appropriate gestures like high-fives, hugs, or pats on the back

"Sophomore Camp is a chance for students to reflect on God's love and how it transforms the way we love one another," shared Charles Poore, High School Ministries Coordinator. "We talk about how Jesus expressed love through quality time with His disciples, affirming them, serving them—even ultimately going to the cross. The greatest act of service ever done for us is Christ's death on the cross, and the greatest gift we can ever receive is salvation."

By learning how Jesus modeled each love language, students were challenged to think about how they can love others well in their own lives. The weekend also gave students the chance to grow closer to their classmates, deepen their faith, and experience God's love in a personal way.

A visit to the Clark Memorial Sapporo Campus was a highlight, as students connected with their Japanese peers through fun games and local snacks. At Hokaido University, they explored campus life at a national



university, gaining insight into higher education in Japan.

She also emphasized the value of cross-cultural friendships, saying:

"While we study vocabulary and grammar in the classroom, what truly matters when communicating with native speakers is the willingness to share our hearts. God wants us to live in communities, and I believe that traveling to foreign countries and making new friends is a way to build new communities, honoring God's command."

With the next HBA Japan trip planned for fall 2026, students are already looking forward to new adventures this time in Kyushu, where they'll explore historic Christian sites and the city of Nagasaki.

# HBA Wins Volleyball State Championship

HBA has returned to the top of the girls division 2 volleyball mountain. The Eagles relied on precise serving and passing—along with their trademark defense—to defeat Le Jardin Academy 25–20, 25–20, 25–16 in the final of the New City Nissan/HHSAA Girls State Volleyball Championships on November 2, 2024 at the Cannon Activities Center on the campus of BYU-Hawaii in Laie.

Outside hitter Marisa Nakata '25 led the Eagles with 17 kills, 10 digs, and 2 service aces, while middle blocker Brooke Brennan had 7 kills (.333 hitting percentage) and 3 blocks. Kylie Ancheta '26 chipped in 6 kills and 10 digs. Libero Jaclyn Miyazawa '27 had 12 digs and middle Makana Doane '25 added 4 kills and 4 blocks. Setter Katelynn Albano '25— last year's starting libero dished out 34 assists and added 8 digs and 2 blocks.

HBA won three consecutive ILH and state division 2 championships 2007 to 2009. They added a league and state title in 2015. In the past eight seasons, they had another league title and finished as state runner-up three times, most recently in 2022 when the core of this team was sophomores.

Entering as the ILH champion and the tournament's top overall seed, the Eagles faced MIL runner-up Seabury Hall in the quarter-final round and posted an efficient 25-7, 25-16, 25-21 victory. The semi-final against KIF champion Kapa'a was anything but easy. After dropping the first two sets decisively, the Warriors rallied to win the next two sets, fighting off two HBA match points the fourth set.

The teams traded points in the fifth set before the Eagles ultimately pushed through, narrowly escaping with a 25-16, 25-18, 20-25, 25-27, 15-11 victory over the upstart Warriors.

Nakata was named the tourney's Most Outstanding Player. Joining her on the all-tournament team were Albano, Ancheta, and Miyazawa. # HBA Boys Cross Country Claims State Championship

## HBA again sits atop the state in Division 2 boys cross country.

The Eagle boys won the 2024 Honolulu Marathon/HHSAA **Division 2 State Cross Country** Championship November 2, 2024 at the Keopuolani Regional Park in Kahului, Maui.

HBA's 39 points provided a surprisingly comfortable margin over defending D2 state champion Seabury Hall (53). The other Division 2 schools posting team scores were (in ranking order) Hawai'i Prep, Hanalani School, Kamehameha-Hawai'i, Parker School, and Kaua'i High. Had all schools been scored together in one division, HBA would have placed 5th overall out of 21 scoring teams.

Leading the way for the boys was Xan Waialeale '25, whose time of 17:14 was good for 16th place overall. Other scoring runners were Madan Abe '27 (22nd, 17:27), Codey Chung '26 (29th, 17:49.54), Cade Matsumoto '26 (30th,

The HBA boys have now won two of the past three D2 state titles and have

a state-leading six overall. The Eagles won the inaugural D2 Championship in 2012.

This marked our HBA girls team's third runner-up finish (2016 and 2017). The team won four consecutive state championships between 2018 and 2022 (No state championships were held in 2020).

A: Khaleesi: Ariel so I could sing my heart out under the sea.


**Q:** What's one fun fact about you that people might not know?

Hawai'i Baptist Academy's Aspiring Leaders Academy (ALA) launched its first season this past year, marking an exciting step forward in the school's commitment to leadership development. As part of the Institute of Hope-a pillar of HBA's Campaign for Transformation-this initiative seeks to equip prospective leaders with the skills and knowledge necessary to serve with humility and a heart for Jesus.

## A Vision for Growth and Impact

The foundation of ALA is deeply rooted in biblical leadership. Just as Jesus mentored a small group of disciples and empowered them to lead others, ALA fosters leadership development in an intentional, relational, and mission-driven way.

Amy Vorderbruegge, Vice President of Academics and leader of the ALA program, shared the vision behind this initiative:

"The goal of the Aspiring Leaders Academy is to equip prospective leaders with the skills and knowledge necessary to be servant leaders with a heart for Jesus. The program was initiated to grow leaders from within HBA, expanding their leadership skills in their current positions while also engaging them in the prospect of additional leadership roles. Learning from both current HBA leaders and leaders in the Hawaii community allows us to experience the core value of humility—knowing there is always more to learn."

As the program evolves, its reach will expand beyond HBA's faculty and staff. The first two years of ALA focus on nurturing leaders within HBA. By year three, the vision is to extend an invitation to the broader Christian school community, offering this transformational leadership experience to other educators and leaders across the state.

## A Year of Learning and Leadership

The Aspiring Leadership Academy is a year-long program featuring 10 dynamic sessions that equip participants with essential leadership skills, strategic thinking, and communication tools.

Sessions focus on team dynamics, self-awareness, vision and strategy,

delegation, decision-making, and corporate communication. Participants also develop skills in navigating crucial conversations, organizational awareness, and financial stewardship in ministry. The program culminates in a capstone project, where cohorts present actionable solutions to real challenges at HBA.

By integrating HBA's core values, ALA fosters a culture of servant leadership, empowering participants to apply their learning in meaningful ways that will shape the school and beyond.

# Fourth Graders Explore Maui

March 5-7, 2025

For 16 years, Hawai'i Baptist Academy's fourth graders have embarked on an unforgettable journey to Maui, immersing themselves in the island's rich history, breathtaking landscapes, and vibrant culture. This annual trip not only brings classroom lessons to life but also strengthens bonds between students, teachers, and parents–all while deepening their understanding of God's creation.

## A Journey of Discovery and Fellowship

Reflecting on the value of this special trip, fourth grade teachers Mrs. Hasha, Mrs. Iseri, and Mrs. Rawlings shared:

"Visiting the island of Maui has been an amazing experience for the past 16 years. The fourth graders and their parents become awestruck with God's beauty as they visit various sites. Students become curious about the

history and geography of Maui, including 'Iao Valley, the sugar and whaling industries, the impact of missionaries, unique tropical flowers and plants, and beautiful animals and marine life. It is truly a blessing to witness the



bonding of faculty, parents, and their children while on the Maui trip. The fourth graders immensely enjoy the fellowship with one another that is typically filled with joy and laughter. It is our hope and prayer that the fourth graders will cherish these experiences and memories for years to come."

## New Experiences

A significant part of past Maui trips included a visit to Lāhainā, where students explored historical sites such as the Baldwin Missionary Home, the banyan tree, and the Old Prison. However, following the devastating fires, adjustments were made to the itinerary.

"Usually, on day two of the three-day excursion, we would spend time in Lāhainā on the historical walking tour," the teachers explained. "Since the fire, we have made adaptations to our itinerary. This year, we visited the Maui Animal Farm, which quickly became a favorite with the kids. We also experienced our first-ever whale watch—a truly memorable addition to the trip!"

Despite the changes, the students experienced an enriching journey filled with exciting new stops, including: Alexander



#### Maui Ocean Center

& Baldwin Sugar Museum, 'Iao Valley Lookout Hike, Bailey House Museum, Maui Ocean Center, Whale Watching, Maui Animal Farm, Hawai'i Wildlife Discovery Center, and Maui Tropical Plantation.

#### **Faith in Every Step**

Christian Ministries Coordinator Cindy Gaskins played a vital role in incorporating faith into the trip's discussions and reflections.

"Each evening after dinner, we closed the day with a recap of things students enjoyed and learned, making connections with scripture," she shared.

One such moment occurred at the Alexander & Baldwin Sugar Museum, where students learned about Samuel Baldwin, a key figure in the sugar industry. Cindy used this opportunity to draw a direct connection between Baldwin's legacy and the history of HBA.

"Samuel Baldwin was once the manager of the Haleakalā Ranch on Maui—one of the many enterprises under Alexander & Baldwin. He and his family spent time both on Maui and in Honolulu, where their estate was located at the corner of Bates and Nu'uanu Street. That very property later became home to Our Lady of Peace School in 1933. In 1934, the land was transferred to the Sisters of the Sacred Hearts, and a new convent school—Sacred Hearts School—was completed in 1938. Decades later, in 1987, that very property became part of Hawai'i Baptist Academy."

This moment helped students see how history is not just a series of events, but a part of God's greater plan.

"I pointed students to **Acts 17:26-28**: 'From one man he made all the nations... and he marked out their appointed times in history and the boundaries of their lands. God did this so that they would seek him... though he is not far from any one of us.' You are not at HBA by accident; God has you in a place to know Him."

By tracing the path from Maui's sugar industry to the very land on which they learn today, students were reminded that God's hand is at work in every detail—past, present, and future.

#### **Experiencing God's Creation in a Meaningful Way**

Throughout the trip, students encountered God's power and creativity in new and exciting ways.

"Creation is always a perfect way to see God's power, creativity, and beauty," Cindy said. "Listening to the whales sing when the boat captain placed the microphone in the ocean, holding critters at the animal farm, learning about plants and sugar cane—each experience pointed to how God provides through creation. Seeing the regrowth of the banyan tree in Lāhainā reminded us of beauty from ashes."

As the fourth graders returned home, they carried with them not only newfound knowledge but also cherished memories and a deeper appreciation of God's presence in all things. The Maui tip continues to be a transformative experience, one that students will hold in their hearts for years to come.

During their trip to Maui, our fourth-grade students met with representatives of King Kamehameha III Elementary School.

When the devastating fires swept through Lāhainā, the Hawai'i Baptist Academy 'ohana responded with compassion, prayer, and support. Two years later, that spirit of aloha is still at work—this time through a special gift from our extended HBA community at Warren Baptist Church in Augusta, Georgia.

Moved by the ongoing recovery efforts in West Maui, the Warren Baptist Church Foundation generously donated funds to HBA to support families affected by the fires. Their desire was simple: to bless the Lāhainā community in a meaningful and lasting way.

In God's perfect timing, the donation aligned with HBA's annual 4th Grade Maui trip. During the trip, students, teachers, and staff attended a special dinner banquet where they met with representatives from King Kamehameha III Elementary School: Charlotte Patao, acting vice principal, and Dorice Garcia, educational assistant. The school leaders shared heartfelt updates about their temporary campus, the resilience of their students, and the ongoing challenges facing their community—especially with many families still displaced.

With their guidance, HBA has committed to using the funds to provide uniform shirts and staple school supplies for the students of KKIII, helping ease the financial burden many families face as they prepare for the upcoming school year.

We are excited to continue this partnership with King Kamehameha III Elementary School and have plans to visit their campus in the near future. As we walk alongside our neighbors in Lāhainā, we give thanks for the connections God has orchestrated. 
