




SCHOOL SHOOTINGS AND VIOLENCE ARE PREVENTABLE: KNOW THE SIGNS AND TELL A TRUSTED ADULT TO GET HELP.

Advanced research on school shootings and violence reveals one commonality: before every mass shooting attack, act of violence, or suicide, there are warning signs. Once we know the signs, we can get help to intervene.

SANDY HOOK PROMISE'S SAY SOMETHING ANONYMOUS REPORTING SYSTEM PROVIDES THAT CRITICAL FORMULA:



Sandy Hook Promise (SHP) teaches young people how to recognize warning signs and threats of violence— especially on social media— from individuals who may be in crisis and "say something" to a Trusted Adult. They can find a safe space and Trusted Adult by reaching out to our *Say Something* Anonymous Reporting System (*Say Something* ARS).

The Say Something Anonymous Reporting System (Say Something ARS) is a companion to the core training that ensures your school community has access to a Trusted Adult on demand.






WHY OUR ANONYMOUS REPORTING SYSTEM IS DIFFERENT

	Other Anonymous Reporting Systems (ARS)	Say Something Anonymous Reporting Systems
Tips and Alerts	Flags content on school-issued devices and blocks content deemed dangerous.	Tipsters are taught to identify concerns on personal and school-issued devices, social media, observed behavior, etc.
Crisis Management	Hotlines may serve as a chat line for students in crisis. Often, the ARS reaches out to the school regarding serious reports.	Tips are managed by SHP's accredited National Crisis Center, the only center of its kind exclusively serving school communities 24/7/365.
		The Crisis Center engages in a direct, two- way dialog with tipsters to gather information, collaborate with the school team, district team, and law enforcement, and manage interventions.
Adult User Training	N/A	Adults in the school community are also trained in the warning signs of violence. District and school teams receive specialized training on tip management to ensure tips are handled appropriately.
Account Management Plan	N/A	Dedicated account management team provides ongoing support for users including technical support, training and recommendations for best practices in the field of violence prevention and school safety.
Law Enforcement Training	N/A	Crisis Center establishes a relationship with local law enforcement and provides training on collaborative tip management and rapid response.
In-Person Training Option	N/A	In-person training is available to schools with technology challenges, special needs, etc. Training is additionally offered remotely or digitally on-demand.
Costs	For-profit business	Say Something ARS is part of Sandy Hook Promise, which is a nonprofit organization. Costs are heavily subsidized by Sandy Hook Promise through grants and donor contributions.





OUR ANONYMOUS REPORTING SYSTEM HAS PROVEN RESULTS

Empowering Students to Speak Up

Anonymous reporting systems (ARS) are associated with fewer school-based violent behaviors and have the strongest effect compared to any other type of prevention strategy. In August of 2022, the Journal of School Violence published "The Effectiveness of the Say Something Anonymous Reporting System in Preventing School Violence: A Cluster Randomized Control Trial in 19 Middle Schools." Researchers found that the Say Something ARS training and its approach to school safety worked and provided a successful, sensible solution for students to get help quickly and effectively.

Feeling Safer at School

Examining more than 700 students in Miami-Dade County Public Schools over nine months, researchers found that the *Say Something* Anonymous Reporting System "improved the likelihood of self-efficacy and intention to report threats of violence." The study also found that interventions also promoted a "safer perception of school safety" with less school violence.

The research also showed that Say Something ARS impact and improvement grew over time. After three months, and again at nine months, students' willingness to report warning signs continued to rise.

Also, students reported feeling safer at school after using the program.

POTENTIAL TRACEDY AVERTED BECAUSE OF A SAY SOMETHING ANONYMOUS REPORTING SYSTEM TIP

A tragedy was averted in North Carolina when Sandy Hook Promise's National Crisis Center received multiple calls and texts through the *Say Something* Anonymous Reporting System, about a student's violent plan for a mass school shooting attack.

The Crisis Center team worked with district officials and local authorities to uncover the direct threat indicating that the student intended to do harm at the elementary, middle, and high schools in Elkin City. The *Say Something* anonymous tips led to the district shutting down all schools for the day for further investigation. Later, an arrest was made as the threat was determined to be credible. The student had both a plan and access to a weapon.




If it wasn't for those students speaking up, the day could have ended in tragedy," said Superintendent Myra Cox. "The *Say Something* program gave students the information and anonymous reporting tools they needed to take action.











TEEN CREDITS THE SAY SOMETHING ANONYMOUS REPORTING SYSTEM WITH HELPING TO SAVE HIS LIFE

Ethan was just 15 years old when he began to fall into a deep depression. Hobbies that he once enjoyed no longer held any interest. He withdrew from social and extracurricular activities at school. Two years later, he considered hurting himself. Ethan credits the *Say Something* Anonymous Reporting system to helping save his life.

If they didn't get that call, I think it would have been inevitable, I wouldn't have made it. I found myself in a dark place like I'm sure many can relate. The truth is that this pain that I had, and a lot of people have, is what makes you a stronger person and helps you find who you are. It is the light at the end of the tunnel. A lot of people do not see it that way when they're in it, but I'm an example of that. Someone was concerned for me and contacted the anonymous tip line and since that time I've been helped.


ABOUT THE NATIONAL CRISIS CENTER


Sandy Hook Promise's National Crisis Center launched in the fall of 2019, with a mission to provide a safe and confidential Trusted Adult for students to reach out to for help.

The Crisis Center is the only one of its kind exclusively dedicated to school-based anonymous reporting nationwide, supported by highly trained and compassionate counselors who monitor the app, website, and hotline 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. In 2023, the National Crisis Center was accredited by the American Association of Suicidology as an approved crisis intervention program as defined by a set of quality standards.

The Crisis Counselors listen to student concerns, provide relevant resources, and reach out for help when







THE FOUNDATION: SAY SOMETHING

Sandy Hook Promise's age-appropriate, social-emotional learning standards-aligned *Say Something* program teaches students in grades K-I2 to recognize warning signs and threats — especially on social media — of someone who may be considering harming themselves or others, and how to intervene by telling a Trusted Adult.

Students Learn to Save Lives in Three Easy Steps:



Recognize The Signs

Learn about different types of warning signs or threats and how to spot them, especially on social media.



Act Immediately, Take It Seriously

Understand strategies to take action and overcome potential barriers to being an Upstander rather than a bystander.



Say Something

Learn how to intervene by telling a Trusted Adult or using an anonymous reporting system.

WARNINGS SIGNS AND CONCERNING BEHAVIOR

The *Say Something* Anonymous Reporting System is designed to prevent individuals who may be in crisis from hurting themselves or others by intervening to get them help. As a result of this approach, *Say Something* ARS will report on the following primary behaviors or threats that could lead to potential violence or self-harm (not an all-inclusive list):

	Regularly bullying or intimidating others		Warning students to stay away from school or events
	Extreme mood or personality changes		Expressing a fascination with weapons

	Hanging out with negative role models		Extreme, prolonged sadness of distress


ABOUT SANDY HOOK PROMISE


