WHAT ARE SUN BUCKS?

SUN Bucks is the new name for Summer EBT. Eligible families of school-age children will receive \$120 per child for qualifying groceries.

Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis until August 31, 2025.

Families that are not automatically enrolled should apply for SUN Bucks directly. Apply here: newmibridges.michigan.gov

Note: Families will be automatically enrolled in SUN Bucks if they are already enrolled in SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families), or FDPIR (Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations) benefits or meet the requirements for free or reduced-price school meals.

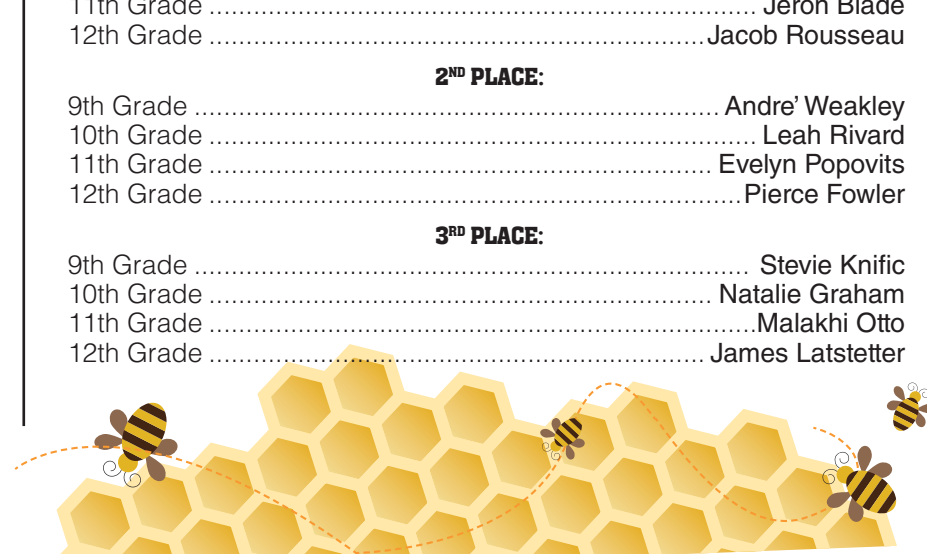

SUMMER SCHOOL OPPORTUNITIES FHS 2025

FHS 2025 Summer School offers students the opportunity to make up lost credits needed for graduation, or to strengthen the understanding of skills in a course previously taken.

OPTION I provides students with in-person instruction. Classes will meet July 8th-July 31st on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 8:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. Students are required to attend all of the classes in-person. There is no cost for this Summer School option as it is a grant funded program; however, spots are limited, and when the class is full there will be no additional seats or classes available. Students will be provided with a Chromebook to use during Summer School. The classes will be taught by Flushing High School teachers. Additional details will be provided in the upcoming weeks as to what classes will be available and how to register your child. If you are unsure of what classes your child needs to take, please contact their counselor.

OPTION II will provide students the opportunity to make up lost credits or to strengthen their level of understanding in a course previously taken. This is offered through the Raider Virtual Academy (RVA). RVA classes provide students with the opportunity to move at their own pace through the required coursework, and are online so they can be completed from home or in the lab. RVA uses the Edgenuity online curriculum. The cost for an RVA class is \$100 per class and students may register for a maximum of two classes. RVA Summer School classes will be held June 17th - July 24th. A lab will be open at Flushing High School three days a week for students to receive support or to work in a classroom atmosphere. The final exam for each of these classes must be taken in the lab at Flushing High School on or before July 24th.

Kaiden is the son of John and Magen Randol. He is a member of the National Honor Society, the Science

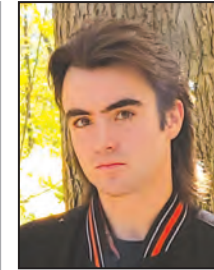

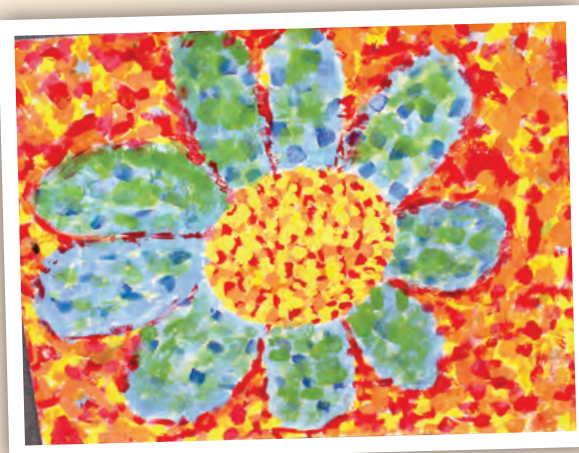
