News and Updates

'Swatting' schools would bring harsher penalties under Senate-passed legislation from Altoona Mirror 04/07/2025

'Swatting' schools would bring harsher penalties under legislation approved by the state Senate on Tuesday [April 1]. Republican supporters of the measure said the increased penalties are needed to combat a spate of hoax threats that have forced schools to close and prompted emergency responders to flood school buildings. Senate Bill 96 would make perpetrating hoax threats against schools a third-degree felony and require that anyone convicted of committing that offense be required to reimburse emergency response agencies for the cost of sending personnel and equipment to school campuses in response to the 'swatting' report. But Democrats argued that the measure is unduly harsh and would create the potential that people who hear rumors of planned school violence won't notify authorities out of concern that they could be penalized if the rumors are untrue.

Lawmakers aim to open the door for more teachers from Capitolwire, 04/11/2025

The House Education Committee will meet later this month or early May to begin moving legislation intended to make it easier for would-be teachers to get the state certification needed to instruct a classroom. The push comes as the state continues to grapple with a shortage of candidates for teaching jobs. The state issued 7,677 new-teacher certifications in the 2023-24 school year. That was the most

since 2020-21. But there are still far fewer new teachers entering the field than the state saw a decade ago. The state issued 12,907 new-teacher certificates in 2013-14. The number of emergency permits issued to staff to fill teaching positions has ballooned as schools struggle to find candidates. There were 8,800 emergency permits issued in 2013-14. In 2023-24, there were 28,000 emergency permits issued – a nearly 220% increase.

Why judges blocked the Trump admin's school DEI crackdown NPR, 04/26/2025

Three federal judges, in Maryland, New Hampshire, and Washington, D.C., ruled Thursday [April 24] that the Trump administration had overstepped when it ordered the nation's schools to stop all diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) programs as well as classroom teaching the administration might consider discriminatory. For the moment, this means the U.S. Department of Education cannot make good on its threat to punish noncompliant districts by withholding vital federal funding, including dollars that help K-12 schools serve low-income students and children with disabilities.

Federal Updates


- Race Discrimination: On April 3, the U.S. Department of Education <u>announced</u> that it would require state education agencies (SEAs) to complete, within 10 days, a <u>certification</u> of their compliance with their antidiscrimination obligations in order to continue receiving federal financial assistance. SEAs are responsible for collecting certification responses from their local education agencies (LEAs). Pennsylvania Acting Secretary of Education Dr. Carrie Rowe advised LEAs that while the federal letter referenced DEI, it "did not identify those practices or define 'illegal DEI,' and there are no federal or state laws generally prohibiting efforts relating to diversity, equity, or inclusion."
- The President's FY 2026 Discretionary Budget Request

The President released his FY2026 budget proposal on May 2, seeking to cut \$163 billion in non-defense discretionary funding (also referred to as a "skinny budget" because it does not list specific funding requests for all programs and initiatives). Sections of note include:

- Streamline K-12 Education Funding and Promote Parental Choice: The Budget continues the process of shutting down the Department of Education. The budget maintains full funding for Title I and special education funding under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). To limit the Federal role in education, the Budget creates a new K-12 Simplified Funding Program that consolidates 18 competitive and formula grant programs into a new formula grant, and a Special Education Simplified Funding Program that consolidates seven IDEA programs into a single grant. The Budget also increases charter school funding by \$60 million.
- General Research and Education: Funding for Artificial Intelligence and quantum information sciences research is maintained at current levels.

Pennsylvania's 2025-26 budget negotiations remain ongoing:

- The Democratic-led House supports Governor Shapiro's proposal, including the \$75 million Basic Education Funding increase and \$526 million adequacy investment.
- The Republican-led Senate has raised concerns about:
 - o Fairness of the adequacy formula (97% of funds went to 348 districts)
 - o Reliance on one-time revenue sources like surplus funds and new taxes on marijuana and skill games
 - Need for performance-based funding reforms
- Charter school reforms and a statewide cyber charter tuition cap are also being debated as part of the education package.

State Legislative Actions

SB9: Fairness in Women's Sports Act, Sen. Judy Ward (R)

The Fairness in Women's Sports Act requires all athletic teams at Pennsylvania public school entities and public institutions of higher education to be explicitly designated as male, female, or coed based on biological sex assigned at birth. The bill prohibits students of the male sex from participating on teams designated for females and establishes legal avenues for students or institutions to seek damages or injunctive relief if they feel they suffer harm or retaliation due to violations or reporting of the law.

<u>SB10</u>: Pennsylvania Award for Student Success Scholarship Program, Sen. Ward (R)
 Amends the Public School Code, establishing the Pennsylvania Award for Student Success (PASS)

Program and the Pennsylvania Award for Student Success Scholarship Fund. The program would provide publicly funded scholarships for eligible students to attend participating nonpublic schools. Eligibility is limited to students living within the attendance boundaries of low-achieving public schools and whose household income is below 250% of the federal poverty level. The bill creates scholarship accounts administered by the State Treasury, with funding amounts based on grade level and special education status, and defines allowable expenses. It also includes administrative oversight, reporting requirements, and limitations on state regulation of nonpublic schools that participate in the program.

SB96: New Felony Criminal Penalties for Reporting Emergency Threats towards School Facilities, Sen. Brooks (R)

Amends Title 18 (Crimes and Offenses), in assault, further providing for the offense of terroristic threats. Removes language providing for restitution and adds language providing for the costs of responding to a threat which outlines what a person convicted of violating this section or adjudicated delinquent shall be sentenced to pay. Adds that a threat relating to a school entity or institution of higher education constitutes a felony of the third degree.

SB127: Holocaust Education Bill, Sen. Doug Mastriano (R)

Amends the Public School Code, in terms and courses of study, making instruction on the Holocaust, genocide, and human rights violations mandatory for all Pennsylvania school entities beginning in the 2026-27 school year. The instruction must be age appropriate, sequential, and integrated into social studies and language arts curricula. The bill requires the Department of Education to update curriculum guidelines, provide in-service training, and ensure public transparency by having school entities post curriculum summaries or resource links online. It repeals the previous optional Holocaust education provision and replaces it with these mandatory requirements. 05/06/2025 – Reported as committed from Education and first consideration



SB227: PSBA to be Considered a State-affiliated Entity, Sen. Kristin Phillips-Hill (R)

Amends the Public School Code, in duties and powers of boards of school directors, to officially designate the Pennsylvania School Boards Association (PSBA) as a "State-affiliated entity" under Pennsylvania's Right-to-Know Law. The bill also reaffirms that school boards may appoint delegates to PSBA conventions, pay related expenses, and use school funds for PSBA membership dues and activities.

<u>SB246</u>: Weapons in Schools: Providing for the notification of parents, guardians, and school employees, Sen. Coleman (R)

Amends the Public School Code, in student supports, requiring all Pennsylvania school entities, private schools, and nonpublic schools to notify parents, guardians, and school employees within 24 hours of specific incidents, including weapon possession, bullying, harassment, serious bodily injury, or property damage occurring on school property or during school activities. Notifications must be appropriately targeted to those affected, comply with student privacy laws, and not conflict with law enforcement reporting or emergency response plans.


SB315: Career and Technical Education Equipment Grant Funding, Sen. Culver (R)

Amends the Public School Code, in career and technical education, further providing for career and technical education equipment grants. Requires the Department of Education (PDE) to use data for the calculations under this section based on the most recent years for which data is available, as determined by PDE, and shall fix the data as of the first day of June preceding the school year in which the allocation occurs. Stipulates that if, after the data based on the first day of June is found by PDE to be incorrect, PDE shall revise the calculations accordingly.

• SB700: Literacy Achievement for All Pennsylvania Students, Sen. Robinson (R)

Amends the Public School Code, in evidence-based reading instruction, mandating all school entities adopt approved reading curricula by the 2030-2031 school year and implement universal reading screenings for students in grades K-3 starting in 2026-2027. The bill requires targeted intervention plans for students with reading deficiencies, parental notification of deficiencies, and structured professional development for educators. It establishes a grant program and restricted state account to fund implementation and mandates annual public reporting on student progress and curriculum adoption.


HB354: The "What is Your Pennsylvania Story" Act, Rep. Solomon (D)

Establishes guidelines for the development and availability generally regarding "What is Your Pennsylvania Story". Requires PDE to develop guidelines in a manner that provides professional educators who teach social studies with the information and strategies to be incorporated into instruction for 2025-2026 and 2026-2027 to encourage students to share their stories. Adds that the act expires at the conclusion of the 2026-2027 school year.

HB411: Providing a COLA to SERS and PSERS (formerly HB1416), Rep. Malagari (D)

Grants a new supplemental annuity increase for certain retired members of the Public School Employees' Retirement System (PSERS) and the State Employees' Retirement System (SERS), beginning July 1, 2025. Eligible retirees – those who retired before July 2, 2001, and are not credited with Class T-D, D-4, or AA service – will receive a percentage-based increase to their current monthly pension amount, with hire percentages applied to earlier retirement dates (up to 24.5%). The cost of the increase will be amortized over ten years beginning in 2026.

• HB819: AP Exam Cost Reduction, Rep. Malagari (D)


Establishes the Access to Rigorous Courses of Study for all Students Grant Program to expand secondary students' access to college-level courses such as AP, IB, dual credit, and career and technical education. The bill directs the Department of Education to set benchmarks, collect disaggregated participation data, and provide grants for educator training and exam fee subsidies, particularly for students from low-income backgrounds. School entities that offer fewer than eight rigorous courses become eligible for support, and the Department must report progress every five years to evaluate statewide access and equity.

HB17: Mandating Cursive Handwriting, Rep. Dane Watro (R)

Amends the Public School Code to require instruction in cursive handwriting alongside print and joined italics as part of English language instruction in all elementary public and private schools.

HB191: Requiring AEDs at School Athletic Events, Rep. Tim Brennan (D)

Amends the Public School Code by updating and expanding requirements for CPR and AED instruction, access, and emergency planning in public schools. Mandates biennial CPR/AED training for staff and volunteers, the development of cardiac emergency response plans, and the presence of trained personnel and functional AEDs in every school building and at athletic activities. Also establishes a statewide AED program, allows for grant funding and donations, and sets minimum maintenance and reporting standards.

HB1326: Increasing Efficiency and Transparency in School Transportation, Rep. Friel (D)

Amends the Public School Code, in pupils and attendance, to improve transparency and accuracy in pupil transportation reporting. It allows school districts to use digital measurement tools for calculating transportation distances and prohibits the Department of Education from requiring manual reporting. Beginning with the 2025-2026 school year, school entities must submit detailed data, including student counts, homelessness status, transportation costs by school type, and vehicle usage, and the Department must publish this information annually online and notify legislative committees when it becomes available.

HB1401: Teacher Certification GPA Requirement, Rep. Young (D)

Amends the Public School Code, in certification of teachers, setting a statewide minimum admission standard for Pennsylvania teacher preparation and alternative certification programs. It requires a 2.8 GPA for entry into initial or advanced educator preparation programs, with exceptions for up to 10% of candidates who may be admitted under alternative criteria.

HB1402: Teacher Certification Fees, Rep. Schweyer (D)

Amends the Public School Code, in certification of teachers, capping fees charged by the Pennsylvania Department of Education for issuing teaching certificates and conducting professional

educator discipline reviews at no more than \$50. This applies to both certification eligibility reviews under Section 1201 and discipline-related fees under Section 1216.1 of the Public School Code.

HB1403: Professional Development for Teachers, Rep. Borowski (D)

Amends the Public School Code, in certification of teachers, modifying continuing education requirements for inactive teaching certificates. It removes fees for obtaining inactive certification and allows educators to reactivate their certification either by completing 30 hours of continuing education within 18 months or by accepting a job offer from a school entity that commits to ensuring completion of those hours within the educator's first two years of employment.

HB1404: Second Career Certification, Rep. Curry (D)

Amends the Public School Code, in certification of teachers, renaming Pennsylvania's "intern certificates" as "second career certificates" and expands the eligibility and issuance criteria for instructional and career and technical education (CTE) certification pathways. The bill allows certain certificates to be issued on credential review and work experience even without occupational competency exams and extends the validity of postbaccalaureate second career certificates from three to five years.

HB1405: Veteran's Service Experience for CTE Certification, Rep. Munroe (D)

Amends the Public School Code, in certification of teachers, expanding eligibility for Pennsylvania's Career and Technical Education (CTE) teaching certificates to include veterans with at least 8,000 hours (equivalent to four years full-time) of military experience in a relevant occupational area. This applies to both the Career and Technical Intern Certificate and the Instructional I Certificate.

HB1407: Updated Teacher Certification Levels, Rep. Nelson (D)

Amends the Public School Code, in certification of teachers, revising Pennsylvania's instructional certification structure by consolidating grade spans beginning in the 2027-28 school year. New certifications will be issued in three categories: Primary (PreK-6), Secondary (6-12), and Specialized Areas (PreK-12), replacing the current narrower grade band model.

New Legislation

Curriculum & Instruction

 HB684: Strengthening Pennsylvania's Structured Literacy Initiative (Act 135 of 2024), Rep. Ortitav (R)

Mandates that Pennsylvania school entities adopt evidence-based reading instruction curricula and conduct universal reading screenings for students in grades K-3 three times annually. Students identified with reading deficiencies must receive written notification to parents and individualized reading intervention plans. The bill also establishes a state-administered grant program to support professional development, instructional coaching, and implementation efforts, with required reporting and accountability measures to monitor school compliance and student progress.

• HB1238: Limiting Student Use of Mobile Devises in K-12 Classrooms, Rep. Gleim (R) Prohibits students from using mobile devices during instructional time. Directs governing bodies of school entities to adopt a policy that restricts students from possessing or using mobile devises during instructional time. Provides for exceptions to limiting a student's use of a mobile device when the student: is a member of a volunteer fire company or EMS rescue squad, has a need for a mobile device due to a medical condition of the student or immediate family member, has a disability and the use of a mobile device is required by the student's IEP, is an English language learner and uses the device for translation, has permission from a teacher to use a mobile device for educational purposes, or is otherwise permitted to do so under the policy.

HB1288: Dual-Language Immersion Programs for K-12 Students, Rep. Cepeda-Freytiz
 Directs PDE to develop a toolkit and curriculum guidelines for instruction on foreign languages for all public school students beginning with the 2026-2027 school year. Requires each district to create a foreign language curriculum for grades K-12, using the foreign language toolkit and

curriculum guidelines developed by PDE and allowing the district to choose the foreign language that relates most to the demographics of the district for the curriculum.

HB1351: Adoption of Chapter 49 Regulations Related to Culturally Relevant and Sustaining Education ("CR-SE"), Rep. Scialabba (R)

Amends the Public School Code, in terms and courses of study, prohibiting the integration of culturally relevant and sustaining education (CRSE) into Pennsylvania's educator preparation, induction, and continuing professional development programs. Also abrogates existing state regulations that require or support CRSE in educator certification processes, including those governing institutional approval, induction plans, and professional education.

HB1398: Prohibiting "No-Zero" Grading Policies, Rep. Gaydos (R)

Establishes that classroom teachers must assign grades that reflect a student's actual mastery of an assignment. It prohibits school district policies from requiring teachers to assign minimum grades regardless of student performance and permits districts to allow students a chance to redo failing assignments or exams for a revised grade.

SB573: Blood Donation Education for Students, Sen. Boscola (D)

Integrates blood donation education into the health courses already required in public schools to equip students with knowledge about the life-saving impact of blood donation.

SB589: Interscholastic Sports for Physical Education Requirement, Sen. Dush (R)

Enables school board directors to permit students to satisfy the physical education requirements by their participation in an interscholastic sport. This may be utilized twice per school year for seasonal interscholastic sports.

• SB645: Cursive Handwriting in Schools, Sen. Langerholc (R)

Mandates the teaching of cursive handwriting in Pennsylvania public and charter schools at an appropriate grade level.

SB663: Promoting Hearing Health Education in Pennsylvania's Schools, Sen. Muth (D)

Requires the Pennsylvania Department of Education, in consultation with the Department of Health and experts in hearing impairment, to develop or identify a model curriculum on deaf and hard of hearing education by the 2025-2026 school year. The curriculum must be age-appropriate,

aligned with state academic standards, and address topics such as causes of hearing loss, prevention, assistive devices, and hearing-related stigma. School entities may adopt the model curriculum or create their own, and instruction may be delivered by educators or qualified community volunteers under supervision. Cyber charter schools may deliver the instruction online and are exempt from in-person curriculum requirements.

• HB1121: Ensuring Access to Applied Behavior Analysis in Schools, Rep. Carroll (D)

Requires schools to provide the accommodations needed for students to receive private-pay applied behavior analysis (ABA) services to students at school. Further requires ABA technicians undergo all necessary background checks to work in a school.

• HB1283: The Integrated Student Supports Act, Rep. Hill-Evans (D)

Establishes the Integrated Student Supports Program and Fund to reduce dropout rates and improve graduation rates in K–12 public schools by addressing academic and nonacademic barriers to learning. The bill requires the Pennsylvania Department of Education to designate a nonprofit provider of evidence-based student support services, and allows public school entities to apply for competitive, dollar-for-dollar matching grants to implement strategic plans developed by locally established advisory councils. All grant funding must be used exclusively for services delivered by the designated organization, with annual reporting on student outcomes required.

HB1078: Ensuring Our Students Receive Effective Eye Health Exams, Rep. Cepeda-Freytiz (D)
 Directs that each child of school age be given a vision screening by school health personnel or a
 screener or an eye health examination by an ophthalmologist or optometrist on an annual basis.
 Additionally, before students begin school in fourth and eighth grade, they will receive a
 comprehensive eye exam.

SB619: CPR Certification for Coaches and Afterschool Supervisors, Sen. Muth (D)

Requires all coaches of athletic teams and supervisors of afterschool activities to be certified in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and trained in the use of an automated external defibrillator (AED) and to renew their certifications every two years through the American Heart Association, American Red Cross, or an equivalent course of instruction approved by the Department of Health.

SB620: Updating AED and Emergency Preparedness Requirements to Protect Against Sudden Cardiac Arrest in Schools, Sen. Muth (D)

Requires all public school buildings in the Commonwealth have at least one active, working automated external defibrillator (AED) and require that each building has a trained emergency response team and action plan in place. Also requires enhanced reporting about AED locations in school buildings and other important device information.

• SB720: Increasing the Effectiveness of Student Vision Examinations, Sen. Gebhard (R) Amends the Public School Code, in school health services, expanding school vision screening requirements by mandating comprehensive eye health and vision examinations by an ophthalmologist or optometrist upon school entry and in grades 4 and 8. Also requires such exams before 504 evaluations and Title I reading program enrollment. Parents must submit documentation of these exams, but schools are not required to provide or fund them.

HB1253: School Violence Reporting, Rep. Hanbridge (D)

Strengthens reporting and safety requirements across public and nonpublic schools. The bill mandates biennial reporting of incidents involving violence, weapons, drugs, alcohol, and tobacco; requires updated memoranda of understanding between schools and law enforcement; and directs the School Safety and Security Committee to issue standardized protocols and model agreements. Schools or agencies failing to comply may be ineligible for certain state-administered grants.

Requires all public schools be equipped with silent panic alarms that directly notify law enforcement in the event of a school-based emergency.

HB1246: Protecting Students from Cold School Temperatures, Rep. Hanbridge (D)

Provides that school entities maintain a temperature-controlled environment within the target range of 68 to 79 degrees Fahrenheit in all occupied areas of a facility "to the greatest extent possible". Directs school entities to relocate students and staff from an area with a temperature below 63 or above 89 within two hours of the temperature measurement, report relocation within 24 hours. Requires the Department of Environmental Protection to conduct inspections of schools from which temperature-related relocations were required more than four times per school year.

• HB1081: Cyber Charter School Moratorium on Buildings, Rep. Prokopiak (D)

HB1115: Recovering Overpayments of Taxpayer Funds from Cyber Charter Schools, Rep. Friel

Limits cyber charter schools from accumulating an estimated ending unreserved, undesignated fund balance that exceeds 8% of total budgeting expenditures, a combined assigned fund balance and committed fund balance that exceeds 4% of budgeting expenditures, and a combined assigned, estimated ending unreserved, undesignated and committed fund balance that exceeds 12% of total budgeted expenditures.

Amends the Private Academic Schools Act of 1988 to permit the licensure of online schools. Also requires the State Board of Private Academic Schools to promulgate, within 18 months, any rules, regulations, policies, principles, and standards necessary to provide for the inclusion of online schools in the act, and prohibits the Board from issuing a license to an online school until those rules, regulations, policies, principles, and standards are in effect.

HB1372: Modernizing Our Cyber Charter School Law to Protect Kids and Taxpayers, Rep. Ciresi (D)

Provides for sweeping reforms to Pennsylvania's cyber charter school system. Establishes a standardized tuition rate for cyber charter schools (\$8,000 per student), limits cyber charter fund balances, enhances Department of Education oversight, and strengthens financial transparency and conflict-of-interest rules. The bill also restricts incentives for enrollment, requires annual audits, mandates more detailed reporting, and allows charter revocation for repeated noncompliance or low performance. It introduces new application, renewal, and amendment processes, and requires cyber charters to submit budgets and make them publicly accessible.

Additionally repeals the requirement in Act 1 for districts to have a Personal Income Tax (PIT) or earned income tax (EIT) increase approved by voter referendum.

It also reinforces existing restrictions against holding certain public offices or being employed by the same district, career and technical school, intermediate unit, or community college in which the

individual serves. This bill applies only to school directors elected or appointed after its effective date.

It mandates supplemental wage payments for employees earning less under existing contracts and provides for state reimbursement to school entities making those payments through 2029-2030. prohibits public school boards from entering contracts that pay education support staff below the established wage threshold.

The bill outlines eligibility, required instructional subjects, evaluation processes, participation in public school extracurriculars, and funding amounts based on state averages and special education categories. Public school districts lose a portion of their state subsidies for students enrolled in this program, and funds can be carried over year to year or used for postsecondary education within two years of high school graduation.
