Campus closures during the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 School Years shifted the instructional delivery model to virtual or hybrid learning models, significantly impacting students' school experiences. The surveys taken by stakeholders, identified the most important areas for improvement as academic needs, social-emotional needs, access to technology tools, and safety measures. Multi-tiered systems of support will be a collective priority across all three schools, and will be interwoven with Expanded Learning Opportunities planning, to ensure a focus on student needs in the areas of learning recovery and acceleration, as well as student mental health and wellness in the wake of the global pandemic.

A description of how students will be identified and the needs of students will be assessed.

The Chula Vista Learning Community Charter School (CVLCC) will use quantitative and qualitative data to identify student needs and assess their progress. Quantitative data will include but not limited to local measure assessments (i.e. iReady, Achieve3000, Diagnostic Reading, End of Unit/Course, Writing, etc.), standards-based/content area grades, individual needs of students with disabilities as defined and outlined within their Individual Education Program (IEP), California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) and English Language Proficiency Assessments for California (ELPAC). Qualitative indicators will include but not limited to teacher recommendations, formative assessments and observations, and stakeholder surveys to monitor the progress of at-risk students.

A description of how parents and guardians of students will be informed of the opportunities for supplemental instruction and support.

Teachers will monitor student academic achievement and review progress with parents on a regular basis. Learning contracts that include supplemental instruction and support will be established for students at-risk of not meeting grade level standards during parent-teacher conferences and monitored throughout the year. In addition, the Student Study Team process, which includes the parents, general education teachers, transdisciplinary team and administrator, will be used for students who are 2 or more years behind to provide a higher level of supplemental instruction and support. The Team will monitor student progress on a weekly basis and reconvene at the end of a 6 to 8 week cycle to document results and develop next steps. Parent notifications/information will be provided in both English and Spanish.

A description of the LEA's plan to provide supplemental instruction and support.

The Chula Vista Learning Community Charter (CVLCC) School will use the Expanded Learning Opportunities Grant to address the persistent and recently amplified achievement gap due to distance learning as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. CVLCC will improve its Tier 1 Universal Core Instructional (General Education) Program through high quality professional development and use a Gradual Release of Responsibility Model to effectively support teachers and support staff with the implementation of best instructional practice to accelerate student learning through the observation of model lessons, guided collaborative planning, partner teaching with instructional coaches and the development and analysis of formative and summative assessments to monitor student learning and inform instructional practice. CVLCC will strategically support at-risk students through targeted and proven Tier 2 interventions, such as but not limited to the enhancement of differentiated learning supports, extended learning opportunities, additional small group

instruction, 1 on 1 support, and online learning supports/credit recovery. In addition, CVLCC will support the individual needs of students with disabilities through intensive Tier 3 push-in/pull-out academic, social-emotional, and other integrated supports as defined and outlined within their Individual Education Program (IEP) as it relates to learning regression and recoupment.

A description of how ELO Grant funds are being coordinated with other federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds received by the LEA.

Based on stakeholder input, best practices and data analysis, CVLCC will align the use of Expanded Learning Opportunities Grant Funds to the federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds to make certain all students are able to return to school full-time, best meet the needs of at-risk students and maximize the resources to close the persistent and recently amplified

achievement gap by developing a high quality tiered instructional program that is consistent across each grade level/department, articulates from Transitional Kinder – 12th Grade and utilizes universal, targeted, and intensive support systems to meet the academic and social emotional needs of all students.

Expanded Learning Opportunities Grant Plan Instructions: Introduction

The Expanded Learning Opportunities Grant Plan must be completed by school districts, county offices of education, or charter schools, collectively referred to as Local Educational Agencies (LEAs), that receive Expanded Learning Opportunities (ELO) Grant funds under California *Education Code (EC)* Section 43521(b). Instructions: Plan Requirements

An LEA receiving ELO Grant funds under *EC* Section 43521(b) is required to implement a learning recovery program that, at a minimum, provides supplemental instruction, support for social and emotional well-being, and, to the maximum extent permissible under the guidelines of the United States Department of Agriculture, meals and snacks to, at a minimum, students who are included in one or more of the following groups:

- low-income,
- English learners,
- foster youth,
- homeless students,
- students with disabilities,
- students at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation,
- disengaged students, and
- students who are below grade level, including, but not limited to, those who did not enroll in kindergarten in the 2020–21 school year, credit-deficient students, high school students at risk of not graduating, and other students identified by certificated staff.

For purposes of this requirement

- “Supplemental instruction” means the instructional programs provided in addition to and complementary to the LEAs regular instructional programs, including services provided in accordance with an individualized education program (IEP).
- “Support” means interventions provided as a supplement to those regularly provided by the LEA, including services provided in accordance with an IEP, that are designed to meet students’ needs for behavioral, social, emotional, and other integrated student supports, in order to enable students to engage in, and benefit from, the supplemental instruction being provided.

- “Students at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation” means students who are identified as being at risk of abuse, neglect, or exploitation in a written referral from a legal, medical, or social service agency, or emergency shelter.

EC Section 43522(b) identifies the seven supplemental instruction and support strategies listed below as the strategies that may be supported with ELO Grant funds and requires the LEA to use the funding only for any of these purposes. LEAs are not required to implement each supplemental instruction and support strategy; rather LEAs are to work collaboratively with their community partners to identify the supplemental instruction and support strategies that will be implemented. LEAs are encouraged to engage, plan, and collaborate on program operation with community partners and expanded learning programs, and to leverage existing behavioral health partnerships and Medi-Cal billing options in the design and implementation of the supplemental instruction and support strategies being provided (*EC* Section 43522[h]).

The seven supplemental instruction and support strategies are:

1. Extending instructional learning time in addition to what is required for the school year by increasing the number of instructional days or minutes provided during the school year, providing summer school or intersessional instructional programs, or taking any other action that increases the amount of instructional time or services provided to students based on their learning needs.
2. Accelerating progress to close learning gaps through the implementation, expansion, or enhancement of learning supports including, but not limited to, any of the following:
 - a. Tutoring or other one-on-one or small group learning supports provided by certificated or classified staff.
 - b. Learning recovery programs and materials designed to accelerate student academic proficiency or English language proficiency, or both.
 - c. Educator training, for both certificated and classified staff, in accelerated learning strategies and effectively addressing learning gaps, including training in facilitating quality and engaging learning opportunities for all students.
3. Integrated student supports to address other barriers to learning, such as the provision of health, counseling, or mental health services, access to school meal programs, before and after school programs, or programs to address student trauma and social-emotional learning, or referrals for support for family or student needs.
4. Community learning hubs that provide students with access to technology, high-speed internet, and other academic supports.
5. Supports for credit deficient students to complete graduation or grade promotion requirements and to increase or improve students’ college eligibility.
6. Additional academic services for students, such as diagnostic, progress monitoring, and benchmark assessments of student learning.
7. Training for school staff on strategies, including trauma-informed practices, to engage students and families in addressing students’ social-emotional health needs and academic needs.

As a reminder, *EC* Section 43522(g) requires that all services delivered to students with disabilities be delivered in accordance with an applicable IEP.

Fiscal Requirements

The following fiscal requirements are requirements of the ELO grant, but they are not addressed in this plan. Adherence to these requirements will be monitored through the annual audit process.

- The LEA must use at least 85 percent (85%) of its apportionment for expenditures related to providing in-person services in any of the seven purposes described above.
- The LEA must use at least 10 percent (10%) of the funding that is received based on LCFF entitlement to hire paraprofessionals to provide supplemental instruction and support through the duration of this program, with a priority for full-time paraprofessionals. The supplemental instruction and support provided by the paraprofessionals must be prioritized for English learners and students with disabilities. Funds expended to hire paraprofessionals count towards the LEAs requirement to spend at least 85% of its apportionment to provide in-person services.
- An LEA may use up to 15 percent (15%) of its apportionment to increase or improve services for students participating in distance learning or to support activities intended to prepare the LEA for in-person instruction, before in-person instructional services are offered.
