### Third Grade Angels by Jerry Spinelli


(AR reading level: 2.9)


## Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing by Judy Blume

# The Lemonade War by Jacqueline Davies (AR level: 4.0)

"For a full hour, he poured lemonade. 'The world is a thirsty place,' he thought as he nearly emptied his fourth pitcher of the day. 'And I am the lemonade king.'"

Evan Treski is people-smart. He's good at talking with people, even grownups. His younger sister Jessie, on the other hand, is math-smart - but not especially good at understanding people. She knows that feelings are her weakest subject. With just five days left of summer vacation, Evan and Jessie launch an all-out war to see who can sell the most lemonade before school starts. As the battleground heats up, there really is no telling who will win - and even more important, if their fight will ever end.

### The Cay by Theodore Taylor






## The City of Ember by Jeanne DuPrau


#### The Lightning Thief by Rick Riordan



## Prisoner B-3087 by Alan Gratz




# The Outsiders by S.E. Hinton

But what starts as a quirky experiment turns into a deeper journey as they uncover the truth behind Calvin's life. With humor, heart, and a dash of mystery, this book will make you laugh, think, and see the world a little differently.







# The Uglies by Scott Westerfield

Tally is about to turn sixteen, and she can't wait. In just a few weeks she'll have the operation that will turn her from a repellent ugly into a stunningly attractive pretty. And as a pretty, she'll be catapulted into a high-tech paradise where her only job is to have fun.

But Tally's new friend Shay isn't sure she wants to become a pretty. When Shay runs away, Tally learns about a whole new side of the pretty world—and it isn't very pretty. The authorities offer Tally a choice: find her friend and turn her in, or never turn pretty at all. Tally's choice will change her world forever.


# Life of Pi by Yann Martel


The son of a zookeeper, Pi Patel has an encyclopedic knowledge of animal behavior and a fervent love of stories. When Pi is sixteen, his family emigrates from India to North America aboard a Japanese cargo ship, along with their zoo animals bound for new homes.


The ship sinks. Pi finds himself alone in a lifeboat, his only companions a hyena, an orangutan, a wounded zebra, and Richard Parker, a 450-pound Bengal tiger. Soon the tiger has dispatched all but Pi, whose fear, knowledge, and cunning allow him to coexist with Richard Parker for 227 days while lost at sea. When they finally reach the coast of Mexico, Richard Parker flees to the jungle, never to be seen again. The Japanese authorities who interrogate Pi refuse to believe his story and press him to tell them "the truth." After hours of coercion, Pi tells a second story, a story much less fantastical, much more conventional--but is it more true?

# Painting the Black by Carl Deuker

In his senior year of high school, late-bloomer Ryan Ward has just begun to feel the magic of baseball: the magic of catching a wicked slider, of throwing a runner out, of training hard and pushing limits. But when one of his teammates clearly pushes the limits too far, Ryan is faced with a heartbreaking dilemma: he must choose between his love for the game and his integrity.







### Ender's Game by Orson Scott Card

In order to develop a secure defense against a hostile alien race's next attack, government agencies breed child geniuses and train them as soldiers. A brilliant young boy, Andrew "Ender" Wiggin lives with his kind but distant parents, his sadistic brother Peter, and the person he loves more than anyone else, his sister Valentine. Peter and Valentine were candidates for the soldier-training program but didn't make the cut--young Ender is the Wiggin drafted to the orbiting Battle School for rigorous military training.

Ender's skills make him a leader in school and respected in the Battle Room, where children play at mock battles in zero gravity. Is Ender the general Earth needs? But Ender is not the only result of the genetic experiments. The war with the Buggers has been raging for a hundred years, and the guest for the perfect

general has been underway for almost as long. Ender's two older siblings are every bit as unusual as he is, but in very different ways. Between the three of them lie the abilities to remake a world. If the world survives, that is.

### The Hate U Give by Angie Thomas

Sixteen-year-old Starr Carter moves between two worlds: the poor neighborhood where she lives and the fancy suburban prep school she attends. The uneasy balance between these worlds is shattered when Starr witnesses the fatal shooting of her childhood best friend Khalil at the hands of a police officer. Khalil was unarmed.

Soon afterward, his death is a national headline. Some are calling him a thug, maybe even a drug dealer and a gangbanger. Protesters are taking to the streets in Khalil's name. Some cops and the local drug lord try to intimidate Starr and her family. What everyone wants to know is: what really went down that night? And the only person alive who can answer that is Starr.


But what Starr does—or does not—say could upend her community. It could also endanger her life.

#### Twisted by Laurie Halse Anderson

High school senior Tyler Miller used to be the kind of guy who faded into the background. But since he got busted for doing graffiti on the school, and spent the summer doing outdoor work to pay for it, he stands out like you wouldn't believe. His new physique attracts the attention of queen bee Bethany Milbury, who just so happens to be his father's boss's daughter, the sister of his biggest enemy, and Tyler's secret crush. And that sets off a string of events and changes that have Tyler questioning his place in school, in his family, and in the world.







### *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Nighttime* by Mark Haddon

In Mark Haddon's The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time, 15-year-old Christopher Boone, who is autistic, investigates the death of his neighbor's dog, Wellington, believing he was murdered. This investigation leads him on a journey that uncovers family secrets and forces him to confront his own limitations and the world around him. Christopher's journey is a Bildungsroman, exploring his growth, independence, and the challenges of navigating the world with autism.

## *Revolver* by Marcus Sedgwick


In Revolver by Marcus Sedgwick, 14-year-old Sig finds his father's frozen body in their remote Alaskan cabin and is subsequently confronted by a man, Gunther Wolff, who claims his father owes him gold from ten years prior. The story unfolds in a tense, psychological thriller as Sig, faced with a dilemma, must decide whether to use his father's revolver to defend himself and his sister or trust the teachings of his parents. The narrative alternates between the present and flashbacks, revealing Sig's father's role in the Alaska Gold Rush and his dealings with Wolf.


# We Were Liars by E. Lockhart




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#### Escape from Camp 14 by Blaine Harden

The heartwrenching *New York Times* bestseller about the only known person born inside a North Korean prison camp to have escaped. #### Snow Flower and the Secret Fan by Lisa See

Some girls were paired with laotongs, "old sames," in emotional matches that lasted throughout their lives. They painted letters on fans, embroidered messages on handkerchiefs, and composed stories, thereby reaching out of their isolation to share their hopes, dreams, and accomplishments.

Snow Flower and the Secret Fan is a brilliantly realistic journey back to an era of Chinese history that is as deeply moving as it is sorrowful. With the period detail and deep resonance of *Memoirs of a Geisha*, this lyrical and emotionally charged novel delves into one of the most mysterious of human relationships: female friendship.
