

Javan Rhinos are one of the most poached animals in







HOW RECORD PLAYERS WORK

For Christmas this year, I was gifted a record player as well as various vinyl records. After playing my records numerous times, a question still sparked in my mind; how do record players actually work? You've probably seen them in many different places before, or even just as symbols of music. After doing some research, I finally understand how tiny little grooves can create music!

Let's start off with the different parts of a record player: some of the parts include the stylus (or needle), the turntable, the counterweight, and the tone arm. Record players' designs may slightly differ, but all

typically include
all of the parts
listed above.
When you play a
vinyl record, the
record spins on
the turntable and
the stylus is
carefully placed
in the record's
tiny grooves. As
the record spins
around and
around, the stylus



vibrates from the grooves. Those vibrations are known as sound vibrations or sound waves. The stylus picks up these sound vibrations and converts them into electrical signals that are fed into amplifiers so you can hear the music. How are the different pitches of the music created? Well, the frequency of the sound wave determines how high or low the sound will be. So when vinyl records are played, the sound waves create the many different pitches of the music.

In conclusion, record players are usually will stay with the same electromagnetic devices that pick up sound people.
