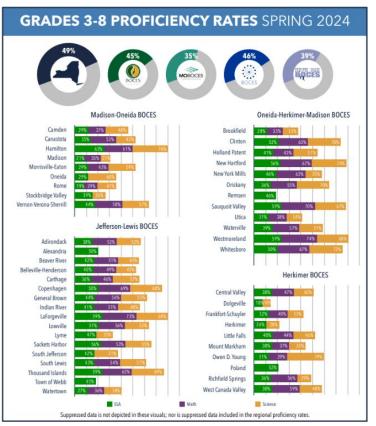

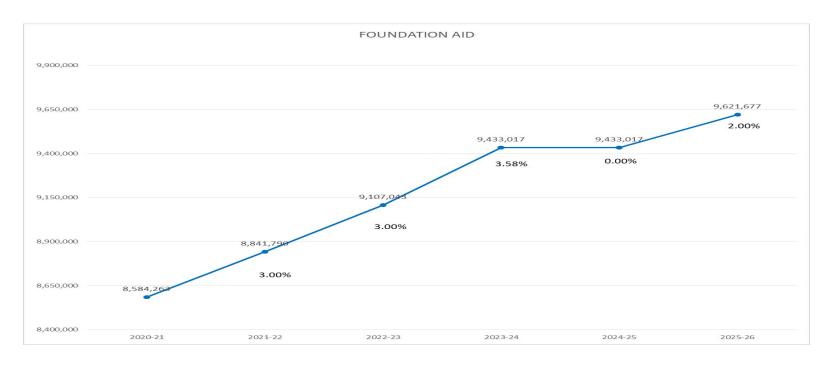

School Budget Development

- 1. The Board of Education is tasked with adopting a budget to bring before the voters for approval but relies heavily on input from the administration of the district.
- 2. Each year the budget process for all school districts has an inherent degree of unpredictability.
- 3. Sauquoit Valley CSD's primary sources of revenue are aid from NYS (~58.0%) and taxes from the property owners of the district (~34.2%). Other revenues (~3.9%) and the allocation of savings (~4.0%) make up the remaining resources needed to balance our budget.
- 4. The school board approaches the budget development process attempting to put forth a budget that provides the greatest opportunities for the students while recognizing the financial commitment of the taxpayers and the limitations on other resources.

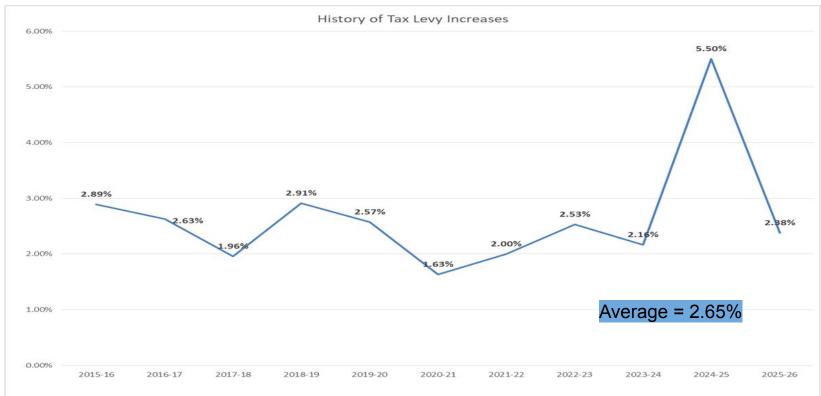
State Aid Outlook





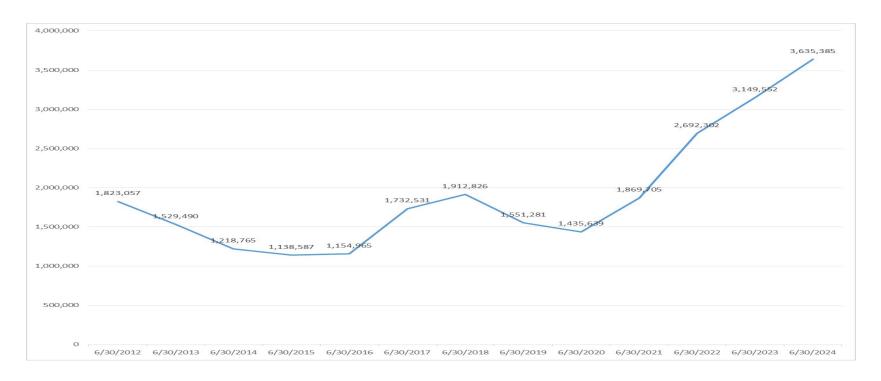
Foundation Aid represents nearly %'s of the total state aid that Sauquoit Valley receives. Increases to Foundation Aid have slowed in recent years as illustrated in the chart above. Aid increases that do not keep pace with inflationary costs of the district will negatively impact programs over the long run if cost savings cannot be realized.

10-Year Tax Levy History



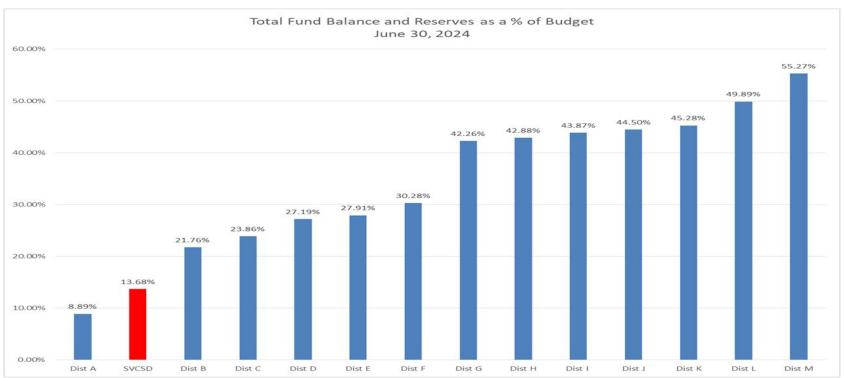


SVCSD's Fund Balance History

This Budget...

- 1. Maintains all programs that are in place for the 2024-25 school year.
- 2. Adds one special education position that was eliminated in 2024-25.
- 3. Continues the investment for an annual capital outlay project of \$100,000.
- 4. Proposes a tax levy increase at the tax cap of 2.38%.



What the Voters Will Decide

- Proposed budget for the 2025-26 school year \$27,187,654 budget with 2.38% tax levy increase.
- The purchase of two (2) diesel school buses not to exceed \$360,000.
- The purchase of one (1) zero-emission bus not to exceed \$190,000.
- The election of two members to the Board of Education for a term of three years commencing July 1, 2025 and expiring on June 30, 2028.
