PIONEER'S PATH TO SUCCESS

Pioneer's Path to Success Program is a transition program for high school age students attending Pioneer Education Center. Pioneer's goal is to have students explore various volunteer or community-based instruction sites to enable students to practice and learn job skills to prepare them for their post-graduation goals.

Students volunteer at sites such as WQED, Global Links, Geek Adrome, Brookline Library, Goodwill and Meals on Wheels. Our students' complete tasks such as sweeping/mopping, sorting clothing, labeling items, and wiping tables. While completing these tasks, staff provide accommodations, as needed, and assess the students' work skills in different work environments.













PITTSBURGH CONROY: Community-Based Vocational Training (CBVT)

Pittsburgh Conroy's Community Based Vocational Training (CBVT) Program was started in September of 2001. Since that time between 35-40 students per school year have trained at various businesses and organizations throughout the Pittsburgh region. Currently, our students are training at Light of Life Donation Center, Eat N Park, Pittsburgh CAPA Food Service, Hamilton Presbyterian Church, Happy Days Dessert Factory, Thriftique, Wyndham Grand Hotel, Northland Library, UPMC Mercy Hospital, Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh and Kuhn's Supermarket.

The primary goal of CBVT is to provide hands on vocational learning experiences for our amazing students. Weekly training sessions allow our students to gain a better understanding of their vocational strengths and weaknesses. Guidance and support are provided by Conroy Job Coaches. Staff work cooperatively with our young adult students to ensure success. Several of our graduates this year are moving onto employment and additional training at CCAC North.







Community-Based Vocational Education (CBVE)

The Community Based Vocational Education (CBVE) Program provides work experiences at various businesses in the community. The goal of CBVE is to expose students to the world of work by assessing soft skills and practicing job skills in a real-work environment. These experiences increase student performance and independence in the following areas: communication, social skills, following directions, task completion, hygiene, attendance, punctuality, self-advocacy, problem solving, motivation, community travel, and organization. Students also have the chance to practice and explore a variety of tasks and occupational areas to determine their strongest interests, natural talents, and career goals.



Prior to beginning their work experiences, students participate in "Job Club" to learn about the "world of work" and determine their preferences for the work experience. Students complete occupational interest inventories and community exploration activities. They also practice pre-employment skills such as interviewing, filling out job applications, creating a resume, dressing appropriately for the job and maintaining good personal hygiene.

Participation in the program is based on individual needs and recommendations are made by the IEP team. For some students, their CBVE experience lead them to paid employment after graduation. This year, we placed a total of 52 students at various sites across the city this year including the Pittsburgh Public Schools - Board of Education mailroom, Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh (main campus), Eat N Park, Kuhns Market, Carnegie Library of Accessible Media for Pennsylvanians (LAMP), Mt. Washington Senior Center, Seton Center Daycare and Shop N Save. Our students worked hard this year to increase their soft skills, technical skills and social skills. Most importantly, they had an opportunity to learn work skills in a real work environment.



Spotlighting Change

The CBVE program has seen its fair share of change this school year. Sadly, we lost a dear friend and program coordinator, Alicia Stone. Alicia lost her battle with Pleomorphic Xanthroastrocytoma (PXA), a rare type of brain tumor, in December 2024. Alicia worked as the Program Coordinator for the CBVE program since 2018. In her absence, the program continued to run with the support of our veteran Assistant Teacher, Roxie Eibeck. Roxie stepped up to keep the program running smoothly. She served as liaison between our school teams and worksites, conducted job club activities with students in the classroom, assigned students to their worksites, coordinated transportation and also served as a job coach 4 days/week. We appreciate all of Roxie's hard work and dedication to the program.

We recently filled our second Assistant Teacher position that had been vacant since last school year. Michelle Gehringer is a former Personal Care Aide who most recently, was contracted as a Job Coach for the CBVE program. We are happy to have Michelle with us full-time as we enter into this next school year. The CBVE program would not be able to function without the support of our Job Coaches to assist our students on the worksites. We rely on contracted coaches to provide this support. This year, we added three new coaches to our team - Michaela Page, Liz Pascarella and Pancho Timmons. This well-rounded team worked hard to ensure our students had great work experiences!

As the school year comes to a close, we look forward to one last exciting new change for the 2025-2026 school year. CBVE will welcome a new Program Coordinator – Louise Alfer.



Louise will bring a wealth of knowledge and experience from Conroy as their CBVT Coordinator & Life Skills Teacher to the CBVE program at PSE. We look forward to having Louise on our team!



WESTINGHOUSE: Start on Success (SOS)

This year was a great year for transition programming at Pittsburgh Westinghouse Academy 6-12! Nine seniors participated in Start on Success Internships in industries ranging from culinary to education to retail. In the fall, seniors visited The Highmark Caring Place as part of Disability Mentoring Day. Afterward, one student applied for and received The Linda Dickerson Scholarship from Bender Leadership! Also, in association with Bender Leadership and OVR, two juniors and two seniors participated in a CWI experience at CVS Oakland. Other additional transition experiences that students participated in included the Giant Eagle Young Leaders Academy, University for a Day at CCAC Allegheny, and the TCCAC Mock It Til You Rock It Event. Students had the opportunity to meet peers from other schools as well as gain confidence in professional settings. To end the year, students in 10-12th grade will attend the Dan Miller Disability Summit. Also, 10th grade students will participate in two volunteer opportunities: serving lunch at the Homewood Senior Center and bagging donated items at 412 Food Rescue.

Another Great Year of the Start on Success Program



As the school year comes to a close, nearly 150 students, staff, parents, and community partners gathered on May 13th to celebrate the achievements of students in the PSE, Start On Success (SOS) program. Throughout the school year, SOS students have demonstrated dedication and growth through their paid internships—gaining hands-on experience, developing valuable job skills, and building professional networks. Internship placements spanned a variety of employment settings across the city, including Allegheny General Hospital, the University of Pittsburgh, the City of Pittsburgh, Ammon Recreation Center, Tech25, and the Westin Hotel, just to name a few. The SOS program is made possible thanks to funding from Partner4Work and the Pennsylvania Office of Vocational Rehabilitation.

The Start On Success staff and students extend their sincere thanks to all of our community and employer partners, as well as Pittsburgh Public Schools staff and administration for their support in making these meaningful work experiences possible









PPS Students Learn Travel Skills



Travel training provides students ages 14 to 21 with disabilities, the opportunity to gain the skills to travel independently. A student may need to learn a walking route, or a route using one or multiple pieces of public transportation. This year, many students took advantage of this transition program to help them get where they need to be.

Pittsburgh's public transportation system, Pittsburgh Regional Transit (PRT), continues to work on several projects to improve the transportation system. These improvements bring detours, delays and inconveniences. Many students who use and who are learning to use public transportation must navigate these changes on a regular basis. The closure of the Mt Washington transit tunnel has resulted in the rerouting of rail transit and buses. PRTX bus rapid transit project continues to alter several bus routes and stops. Several infrastructure projects have led to temporary detours. These changes make navigating routes more complicated.

The Mt Washington tunnel is slated to reopen in October of 2025. Rail and bus transit will then use the tunnel again. Eventually, the Oakland, Uptown and Downtown area will see dedicated bus lanes allowing for more efficient transportation through these areas and into downtown. Bus rapid transit (PRTX) is currently in the construction stage and will soon be able to better serve this highly traveled area. Additional sheltered stops have been added as central stops in Oakland.

As PRT repairs and improves the public transit system and pedestrian infrastructure, new options will present themselves for more efficient and safer traveling.

SOS Partnership with Pioneer

During my 15 years of being a transition counselor, I felt this year really captured what true transition is and in thinking outside the box. One of my seniors will be attending the Compass program at Duquesne next school year while completing a work experience at Pioneer. My student has a goal of working in a water setting after the completion of his programming at Duquense/PPS. In an ideal world he would like to be an aquatics assistant or some type of rehab water assistant. With that in mind, the Allderdice team in collaboration with the student's mother and staff at Pioneer have developed a beautiful transition plan for him next school year. He will be attending Pioneer where staff have agreed that he can assist with some of the water therapy activities and also be included in some other leadership positions.

It's truly amazing when you have a team of individuals with the students' goals and needs at the frontline work together and create something so beautiful and meaningful.

OVR Partnership

One of my seniors who is an individual with giftedness and cerebral palsy was connected with OVR last school year. With the collaboration between PPS and OVR we have created a wonderful transition plan for this young man. He will be attending the University of Pittsburgh and majoring in Political Science. OVR has been working with the student and family to assist him with getting appropriate assistive technology for college, while getting him assessed to become a licensed driver in the future.

Over the summer they will also be working with him to get a paid work experience since there will need to be some job carving to meet his individual needs.

With this partnership, he will have a very bright and successful future ahead of him.
